**Redlands/San Bernardino County & Long Beach/Los Angeles County, CA**

**Thursday, March 19, 2015**

- ❖ 9:00 a.m. – 9:30 a.m. Welcome, Introductions & Expectations
  - NACo President and Maui County Council Member Riki Hokama welcomed the 22 participants selected to participate in the transportation roundtable. As part of NACo President Hokama's initiative on America's transportation and infrastructure systems, NACo sponsored a special small group peer roundtable event.
  - Richard Leadbeater, State Government Industry Manager, Esri explained that NACo is partnering with long-time Premier Corporate Member Esri to help county leaders consider how they can better use their data to build smarter communities that can adapt their transportation systems and aging infrastructure for the needs of today and the future.
  
- ❖ 9:30 a.m. – 10:00 a.m. Defining Outcomes and Apps
  - Esri leaders provided an overview of the goal and purpose of the executive white boarding meetings and how the information helps shape the next generation of civic-minded applications. Participants saw a brief demo of applications that have been created based on feedback from government leaders.
  
- ❖ 10:00 a.m. – 11:30 a.m. The Universe of Innovative Technology
  - Roxanne Cox--Drake, Global Business Development Operations & Enablement, Esri facilitated the discussion. We looked at the universe of innovative technology and identified what we needed to know and what data we now have. Through this interactive session, participants shared their local needs and concerns, which shaped focus of the day. Shared Honolulu's need for effective communications tools, such as links to data, applications, etc. to have the additional resources for communications with constituents.
  
- ❖ 1:00 p.m. – 3:30 p.m. Small Group Working Sessions: Developing the Apps
  - Participants formed teams and built out ideas for application prototypes. In these small group sessions, participants described their ideas for apps and the types of problems these tools might solve in their counties.
  
- ❖ 3:30 p.m. – 4:00 p.m. Review of Meeting Expectations & Next Steps
  - Richard Leadbeater, State Government Industry Manager, Esri said that the results of Thursday's exercise will be shared with the innovation community (computer programmers, coders and software developers) to form alliances in the creation of new tools for county governments.

- The event continued with a tour of the Port of Long Beach, located in Los Angeles County, is one of the world's busiest seaports and a leading gateway for trade between the United States and Asia. 
