Throughout the conference, I was able to attend General Sessions and Educational Sessions Blocks which featured exceptional speakers like Louisiana's U.S. Senator David Vitter and motivational speaker Chef Jeff Henderson.

As the only organization that represents county governments in the United States, NACo provides essential services to the nation's 3,068 counties, advances issues with a unified voice before the federal government, improves the public's understanding of county government, assists counties in finding and sharing innovative solutions through education and research, and provides value-added services to save counties and taxpayers money.

### **Highlights from the General Sessions**

At one General Session, U.S. Senator David Vitter spoke about improvements in surface infrastructure in U. S. cities. Senator Vitter placed emphasis on establishing certainty through a six year bill and a long-term infrastructure plan. Senator Vitter added that it is vital for our counties to expand upon enduring projects aimed at improving the quality of life of citizens and the creation of long-standing jobs. Senator Vitter further stated that the implementation of a streamlined approval process as well as an accelerated review process was essential for the success of the long-term bill. Senator Vitter concluded with the notion of reestablishing confidence in the Highway Trust Fund by focusing on core highway programs that would encourage the Finance Committee to provide the required funding.

At another General Session, motivational speaker Chef Jeff Henderson described his journey from being a convicted felon to his current celebrity status, and provided insight as to how county leaders can produce creative solutions to address common issues in their cities. Chef Henderson highlighted the criminal element, education and health and welfare as important factors that influence people in our cities. Chef Henderson noted that there are many intelligent, skilled and successful people who are incarcerated, and suggested that they be used as an unconventional resource to assist people to become productive and successful citizens. Chef Henderson spoke passionately about how the young people need to know the importance of education and the opportunities it provides. Chef Henderson believes that if you can change peoples' thinking, you can change their behavior. Therefore, by providing people with a vision and a purpose, they will be able to change their thinking as well as their behavior. Chef Henderson concluded by saying, "If you can see it, you can be it."

### **Highlights from Educational Session Blocks**

During an Educational Session Block, Department of Transportation (DOT) Lobbyist, David Cole and John Diodati, former Chairman of the Morro Bay Wastewater Treatment Commission in San Luis Obispo, California, spoke on the importance of public engagement for successful county infrastructure projects.

Mr. Cole emphasized the importance of communication to facilitate public buy-in which is vital to getting more funding and getting things done. Cole added that an internal and external focus is important for knowing your people and creating a culture of teamwork, and to create new partnerships especially regarding economic development. The use of a multi-faceted communications campaign and creating co-ownership with the public and media was discussed especially with higher risk projects.

John Diodati presented a 40 year timeline of the Los Osos Wastewater Project that was under his supervision, which showed how the project ran into many challenges mostly due to poor public engagement. After permit appeals, delays and work stoppages, Diodati realized the need for community input to discuss the issues to make it a community driven project. Diodati concluded by saying with public engagement, the project received eighty percent approval from the public, improved confidence by lenders and the flexibility to make changes in the project.
