**Hawaii State Association of Counties**

For the last 3 years, I am honored to have served as the representative for the Honolulu City Council on the Hawaii State Association of Counties (HSAC). HSAC consists of the councils and mayors of each of the four counties of Kauai, Maui, Hawaii and City & County of Honolulu. HSAC advocates for county programs and services and represents the county governments before the Hawaii State Legislature, administrative agencies and federal government. Its executive committee includes representatives from Kauai County Council, Hawaii County Council, Maui County Council and Honolulu City Council.

Each legislative session, HSAC submits a bill package vetted and approved by all four county councils of the state, on measures to help maximize the effectiveness and performance of the county governments to improve the quality of life for all Hawaii residents. Some of the measures included in the 2017 HSAC Legislative Package are as follows:

1. A bill for an act relating to the transient accommodations tax. To implement the recommendations of the State-County Functions Working Group advocating for a more equitable distribution of a 55-45 percent split of the Transient Accommodations Tax (TAT) between the state and counties.

2. A bill for an act relating to tort liability. To delete the sunset provision for the liability exceptions for county lifeguards. Each time a county lifeguard responds to a call for help, current law provides them legal immunity and protection for damages resulting from rescue, resuscitative, or other lifeguard services. This law is set to sunset in June, exposing county lifeguards to liability risks. The counties seek to permanently provide legal immunity for county lifeguards by repealing the sunset date in the law, which will ensure civil liability protection for county lifeguards – a benefit state lifeguards currently have.

3) A bill for an act relating to important agricultural lands. To allocate \$250,000 to the counties in the next two fiscal years for the identification and mapping of Important Agricultural Lands.

4) A bill for an act relating to unadjudicated traffic fines. To direct the traffic fines and forfeitures collected for untested traffic infractions to the county in which the citation was issued.

5) A bill for an act relating to unmanned aerial vehicles. To regulate operators of unmanned aircraft systems.

6) A bill for an act relating to community meetings. To enable councilmembers to freely attend community and educational meetings.

7) A bill for an act relating to government records. To allow certain government records to be shared among councilmembers where no commitment to vote on the matter is made or sought. The entire Bill package is available online at [www.hicounties.com](http://www.hicounties.com).



### [Free Pop-Up Legal Clinic](#)

Volunteer Legal Services Hawaii and the Native Hawaiian Legal Corporation are presenting a Pop-Up Legal Clinic at Waimanalo Elementary School Cafeteria on Saturday July 8<sup>th</sup> from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon. Pop-Up Legal Clinics are free to low and moderate income Hawaii residents and are designed to bring Volunteer Legal Services Hawaii's Neighborhood Legal Clinics directly into communities to ease access to civil legal services. Volunteer attorneys, law students and staff will be on hand to provide legal advice on; Divorce; child custody/visitation and support; child and adult guardianships; basic estate planning (wills, powers of attorney, health care directives); Chapter 7 bankruptcy; residential tenant issues (evictions); and collections.

Volunteer Legal Services Hawaii is a non-profit, 501(c)(3) legal service provider established in 1981, that provides legal assistance to the community through education, legal advice clinics, brief services, and referrals to pro bono attorneys for direct representation. Volunteer Legal partners with volunteer attorneys to provide services to those who qualify based on income and legal issue. Volunteer Legal understands that not everyone can afford an attorney, but may be able to help themselves resolve legal issues if they are given the right information, professional support, and assistance. Volunteer Legal staff and its volunteers assist with civil legal problems through services designed to help people handle legal problems on their own.

Individuals wanting to participate are urged to call (808) 528-7046 to make an appointment and no later than June 30<sup>th</sup> to reserve a spot. This will allow staff to match the applicant with the appropriate volunteer attorney based on legal matter topic. Walk-ins will be accepted but will be seen based on availability only. ### [Subsidized Spay and Neutering Services in Waianae and Waimanalo Homesteads](#)

Poi Dogs & Popoki is offering subsidized spay and neutering services for dogs and cats owned by native Hawaiians living on Hawaiian Homestead in the Waianae and Waimanalo communities through a PetSmart Charities grant and the Big Fix, PDP's mobile spay/neuter clinic. All pets receive a microchip identification, pain meds and a cone for the head. Fees are \$20 for dogs and \$5 for cats and verification of native Hawaiian ancestry is by self-report. Pet owners will be asked if they are native Hawaiian and if they live on Hawaiian Homestead in Waianae (or Nanakuli) or Waimanalo. If the pet owner does NOT live on homestead but still needs assistance, pet owner must identify a native Hawaiian registry or program that verifies their ancestry and identify if they have ohana in Waianae or Waimanalo. Verification of Native Hawaiian ancestry by the following:

- 1) Hawaiian Homestead Lessee (can be any homestead)
- 2) Ho'oulu Registry for Kamehameha Schools
- 3) Kau'inoa Registry
- 4) Native Hawaiian Roll Commission
- 5) Operation Ohana registry
- 6) Native Hawaiian registry
- 7) Alu Like recipient
- 8) Queen Lili'uokalani Trust recipient
- 9) Lunalilo Home resident
- 10) Papa Ola Lokahi recipient
- 11) Hawaiian Civic Club member
