### Healthy Tip of the Month: Battery Safety

Now that you have unwrapped all of your gifts from the holidays, you are probably hunting around for the batteries that were not included for the latest gadgets and toys. The National Safety Council wants to remind everyone that the smallest batteries, also called button batteries, can pose a hazard for children. If swallowed or placed in the nose or ears, button batteries can cause serious injury or death, according to the National Capital Poison Center. More than 3,500 people of all ages swallow button batteries every year in the

United States. Most pass through the body and are eliminated, but sometimes they get hung up in the esophagus. An electrical current can form in the body, and hydroxide, an alkaline chemical, can cause tissue burns that can be fatal.

Here are some steps you can take to ensure battery safety:

- Look in your home for any items that may contain coin-sized button batteries
- Whenever possible, select batteries in child-resistant safety packaging
- Keep loose or spare batteries locked away
- Place devices out of sight and out of reach of small children
- Be mindful of toys belonging to older children in the home that might contain button batteries
- Share this life-saving information with caregivers, friends, family members and sitters

### Mayor's Office of Culture and Arts Seeks Art for the Joint Traffic Management Center

The City and County of Honolulu Commission on Culture and the Arts, as part of its Art in City Buildings Program, will commission a work of art for the Joint Traffic Management Center. **Artists are encouraged to submit their qualifications by the March 6, 2016 deadline.** This project is mandated by city law, which requires that one percent of the budget for construction of any new city buildings be set aside for including artwork. The budget for this project is \$300,000.

The artwork will be located at the southwestern corner of the building site, at the corner of King and Alapa'i streets. The artwork must be of an outdoor durable material, suitable for permanent installation within the established area.

- dangerous dog and dog bite investigations,
- barking dog complaints,
- cat identification law and other law enforcement investigations,
- case work,
- 24-hour rescue and response, and
