## Help Incident Command Center

The 20-foot Matson container is configured as an Incident Command System (ICS) Emergency Operations Center (EOC) for the Hau'ula Emergency Leadership Preparedness (HELP) Committee. HELP committee members will coordinate recovery operations following an incident if the highways are closed. The 40-foot Matson container holds emergency supplies and equipment for conducting Recovery Operations.



# Hau'ula Emergency Planning and Evacuation Guide

This brochure contains valuable information on what you need to do before a disaster occurs, and after you receive a warning to evacuate. It is recommended that this guide be kept handy by all households for family emergency planning and future reference.

Most of Hau'ula's Population and the surrounding communities are in a low lying coastal area located within the updated Honolulu City and County 2010 Evacuation zones. Families that develop an emergency plan in advance are more likely to survive natural disasters such as tsunamis, hurricanes and flooding, to name a few.

The Hau'ula Emergency Plan is a partnership between the Hau'ula Community Association's (HCA), Hau'ula Emergency Leadership Preparedness (HELP) Committee, and the Latter Day Saints (LDS) Laie Hawaii Stake's Hau'ula Wards located in Hau'ula. The LDS Hawaii Stake Disaster Plan will include all disaster preparedness, awareness, training, and evac-

uation notification for all Hau'ula residents, including non-church members, living within the evacuation zone and Ward Borders. The HCA's HELP Recovery Plan, separate from the LDS Plan, will provide supplemental incident recovery support operations including debris removal and emergency communication within its capabilities following a disaster, using both church and non-church community volunteer resources.

This Plan is APPLICABLE TO ALL HAU'ULA RESIDENTS AND PARTICIPATION IS VOLUNTARY. However, families are encouraged to develop their own Family Emergency Plan, using the many Disaster Preparedness Checklists and references currently available through their church, Civil Defense, City and County of Honolulu, Department of Emergency Management, Federal Emergency Management Agency, and other government or private organizations. You can also consult your telephone directory for family disaster kit and evacuation information.

**Families that develop an emergency plan in advance are more likely to survive natural disasters. Plan ahead. Have an emergency kit ready to go.**

## Hau'ula Tsunami Evacuation High Ground Sites outside the City and County Evacuation Zone with limited or no water or bathroom facilities:

- Hau'ula Kai Shopping Center 54-223 Kamehameha Highway
- Elaine Chang Foundation/Ohana Family of the Living God (OFLG) 54-223 Kamehameha Highway
- Private residential properties above Hau'ula Homestead Road (HHR)
- Hau'ula LDS Mauka Chapel at 55-75 HHR
- United Church of Christ/OFLG, end of Cane Haul road near 54-070 HHR.

## Other Tsunami Evacuation Sites in Laie, Malaekahana, and Kahuku (not shown):

- BYU-H, Cannon Activity Center (CAC), Limited space
- Kahuku High and Intermediate School
- Kahuku Elementary School
- Gunstock Ranch in Malaekahana
- Kahuku Subdivision behind Kahuku Hospital.

## Laie Hurricane Evacuation Sites (not shown):

- BYU-H Cannon Activities Center (CAC) — Public Only
- BYU-H Stake Centers — Students Only

## Kahuku Public Emergency Shelters (not shown):

- Kahuku Elementary School
- Kahuku High and Intermediate school

**Note:** *Pets are not allowed in shelters. Plan ahead to protect pets.*

## Families that live in the Evacuation Zone should:

- Prepare your Family Emergency Plan in advance to include a 5–7 day emergency Kit and Evacuation Procedures using the Hau'ula Community Family Emergency Plan Booklet and other references cited on the front page.

- Select your high ground evacuation assembly areas in advance. If you plan to remain in the area, it is wise to plan carefully and rehearse this plan for your family's safety.

- Be aware that a common predicted occurrence in your locale is being isolated by damage or impassible roads. We are vulnerable to flooding, downed trees and utility poles, weakened bridges, etc. Plan for limited travel in the event of a natural disaster.

- When considering an evacuation to an assembly area, as described in this brochure, understand that these are for the preservation of life and are to serve as many people and families as possible. Due to limited assembly area space, only ONE vehicle should be used to transport people and emergency items to the site. Additional vehicles should be parked outside the assembly area or left

at home. Streets near assembly areas MUST remain clear enough for emergency vehicles to pass.

- These assembly areas do not have adequate facilities such as water, electricity, sleeping or toilet facilities. Do not expect to receive food at these areas. Each family or individual should come prepared with sufficient food and water, hygiene, and basic shelter supplies to sustain themselves for at least 5 days or until local authorities deem it safe to leave.

- Persons administering the assembly areas may be property owners or their designated representative, religious leaders (on church property), or Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) volunteers. Evacuees will follow the directions of these individuals or groups in order to maximize safety and accommodate the greatest number of people. Those not willing to adhere to these directions should seek shelter elsewhere.

- Good neighbors should help those near to them who are disabled or elderly and

discuss plans to assist them in the event of an evacuation.

- Community members are encouraged to attend local Preparedness and Self Reliance Fairs offered in our area. There are several held annually including those offered at the Brigham Young University–Hawaii Campus and Hau'ula Elementary School. All are free and will provide much information and resources on preparing your family against disaster.

## HURRICANE

Hurricane season is from June through November of each year. If directed to evacuate, proceed to the nearest shelter located in Laie — most likely the BYU-Hawaii (CAC), or Kahuku Elementary or Kahuku High and Intermediate schools — as directed by Civil Defense or other emergency officials.

Shelters opened by Civil Defense and the American Red Cross will be opened to all members of the general public. You must bring your family's emergency supplies. They are not provided by the shelter.

- Be sure to bring your emergency kits including food, water and bedding for at least 3 days.
- With enough warning time, secure your home from high winds and water damage.
- If instructed by emergency officials, or if you suspect your home will sustain damage, shut off water at the main valve and electricity at the main breaker.

## TSUNAMI

Although tsunamis are monitored across the Pacific by the U.S. Federal and State Government, an undersea earthquake near Oahu could generate a destructive wave that could strike us literally within minutes ... anytime of the year.

### That's why it's important to be ready to:

- Immediately go Mauka (inland) or to higher ground if you feel the ground move.
- Evacuate low lying coastal areas if you hear the Civil Defense warning sirens (other than normal monthly tests)
- See Evacuation sites shown on map and noted in this brochure.
- Refer to the 2010 Department of Emergency Management Evacuation Maps in front of the phone book, if you are not sure you are in the evacuation zone.
- Remain where you are if you are not in the evacuation zone to avoid traffic build-up.
- Listen to your radio and follow instructions of Emergency Officials.
