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### **REGULAR MEETING MINUTES TUESDAY, AUGUST 25, 2009 HAHAIONE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL CAFETERIA 595 PEPEEKEO STREET**

**CALL TO ORDER:** Chairperson Greg Knudsen called the meeting to order at 7:06 p.m. with **a quorum of nine members present**. (Note - This 15-member Board requires eight members for a quorum and to take official Board action.)

**VACANCIES:** One in Subdistrict 4 (Hahaione High Rise) and one in Subdistrict 8 (Lunalilo Park, Mauka), due to insufficient number of candidates in the Neighborhood Board Elections.

**APPROVAL OF JULY 28, 2009 REGULAR MEETING MINUTES:** **As there were no objections, the July 28, 2009 regular meeting minutes were APPROVED as corrected by UNANIMOUS CONSENT, 9-0-0 (AYE:** De Giacomo, Grey, Isgar, Knudsen, Levy, Makino, Monk, Tanabe, and Weller).

- Page 2, at the bottom, it should read, "Educational workshops conducted by garden experts, narrated tours of our garden, a free mulch giveaway and the ever-popular Unthirsty plants sale round out this special event."
- Page 3, under PUBLIC GENERATED ISSUES, it should read, "1) Natalie Iwasa suggested board committees be more active than they have been in the past, especially given all the projects like street lighting and sidewalk repairs on Lunalilo Home Road. At prior meetings, she suggested moving the crosswalk near the Esplanade. Moving the crosswalk is now not feasible with the new light pole base in the way."
- Page 4, under Mayor Mufi Hannemann's Representative, Comments followed, it should read, "1) A Board member asked how much money was spent by the City for chicken trapping in Fiscal Year (FY) 2009 and Fiscal Year (FY) 2010. Board members questioned that \$6,000 to \$7,000 or \$750/week was spent."
- Page 4, also under Mayor Mufi Hannemann's Representative, Comments followed, it should read, "7) Bob Kern felt that the response to the question posed last month was not adequate, and again asked how much is in the Hanauma Bay Fund."
- Page 4, near the bottom, it should read, "8) Regarding a homeowner's exemption to the real property taxes, Natalie Iwasa mentioned that renters should be considered, too."



- Page 5, in the middle, it should read, "Continuing Discussion/Action on Hawaii Kai Streetlight Project on Lunalilo Home Road - Gerald Hamada explained the need for the project and how the project took place. Lunalilo Home Road is one of the original streets in Hawaii Kai 40 - 50 years ago with no lighting improvement."...."The project currently uses 150-watt bulbs with staggered poles, alternating 150 feet apart, or 300 feet on one side; replacements will be about 100 feet apart on each side. They will complete Phase 1 and the Neighborhood Board can help decide on Phase 2 and Phase 3." And..."A question was asked about the impact the project might have on the Century Bike Ride. Other concerns brought up were regarding the extra electrical cost as well as more maintenance than if fewer poles were used."

SECRETARY/TREASURER'S REPORT: Chair Knudsen reported the previous Operating Balance was \$1,520.00. With \$66.99 expended for the printing and posting the agenda and minutes, the closing Operating Balance is \$1,453.01. The previous Publicity Balance was \$2,500.00. With no expenditures, the closing Publicity Balance was remained at \$2,500.00. The previous Refreshment Balance was \$120.00. With no expenditures, the Refreshment Balance remained at \$120.00. The Treasurer's report was filed.

#### STATUS REPORTS:

Honolulu Fire Department (HFD) - 1) July 2009 Statistics - 1 structure, 5 wildland, 1 rubbish and 10 vehicle fires; 42 medical emergencies, 5 search/rescue and 2 miscellaneous calls for service for a total of 67 alarms. 2) Fire Safety Tip: The Honolulu Fire Department (HFD) investigates reports of smoke to determine if a fire exists. While some fires are allowed or authorized under county and state regulations, most are unauthorized. When the HFD encounters an unauthorized fire, the Fire Captain will request that the fire be extinguished or have the fire crew extinguish it. If the fire is allowed, the Captain must determine if the fire is safe, properly contained, and not a nuisance to others. Examples of unauthorized fires: A) Bonfires on public beaches. B) Burning of household refuse. C) Burning of yard waste. Fires that are allowed when conducted safely and contained properly include: A) Cooking fires, including barbeques, grills, or imu. B) Bathing fires. Safe and proper conditions are as follows: A) In a safe location away from combustible materials, such as a structure or vegetation; B) Under safe conditions. Strong winds or dry weather conditions are unsuitable. C) With proper protection. A garden hose or fire extinguisher should be available for use. D) Under proper supervision. A responsible person who knows how to control the fire should be present until the fire is extinguished. One may be asked to move or extinguish the fire if complaints are received by the fire department. If one is making an imu, plan ahead and talk to the neighbors, so they know what to expect. Call the HFD's Fire Communication Center at 523-4411 at least 10 minutes, but not more than 20 minutes, prior to igniting the imu.

Comments followed: 1) An example of a bathing fire is the Japanese "furo." 2) Regarding ocean safety, there were rescues at Portlock, but not at the closed Hanapepe Brow area.

Honolulu Police Department (HPD) - Sgt. Maurice Asato reported: 1) August 2009 Statistics - 9 burglaries, 21 thefts and 37 UEMV (unauthorized entry into a motor vehicle) and the location of the various crimes in Hawaii Kai. 2) Noise complaints - 9. 3) There was a section, "Be Prepared Before Hurricane Season." 4) Contact District 7 at - [www.honolulu.dpd.org/patrol/d7](http://www.honolulu.dpd.org/patrol/d7).

Comments followed: 1) Ralph Bishop appreciated the four months of noise citation statistics, but questioned that the numbers were down from 20+ to 9 per month. He observed police officers sitting in their vehicles and suggested that HPD take action as the motorcycles pass by. HPD responded that 84 citations were issued and the officers may have other work to do.

Board of Water Supply (BWS) - Moani Wright reported - 1) Main Breaks - There were two main breaks on July 4 and on July 27, 2009. 2) Cross-Connection Control and Backflow Prevention - Keeping Oahu's drinking water safe is a top priority of the Board of Water Supply (BWS). If there is a main break or sudden drop in pressure, there is an extremely small chance that water from your pipe could backflow and contaminate the BWS system. To prevent this from happening, the BWS has a Cross Connector and Control Section to educate and work with the community to prevent backflow. Call them at 748-5470. 3) 21st Annual Halawa Xeriscape Garden Open House & Unthirsty Plant Sale Recap - Missed this year's plant sale? Visit [www.boardofwatersupply.com](http://www.boardofwatersupply.com) to view photos and an animated slideshow recapping the festivities. Comments followed: 1) Regarding the lights on Lunalilo Home Road, one light base is too close to a hydrant. Wright will follow up. 2) BWS has no plans for projects in Hawaii Kai in the next few years. 3) Someone suggested that a little inter-governmental co-ordination, like on Kapiolani Boulevard, would save cost, time and energy.

#### PRESENTATIONS:

"Celebrating 20 Years of Koko Crater Equestrian Center (KCEC)" - Clare Graef, a KCEC supporter and member of the Livable Hawaii Kai Hui, gave a PowerPoint presentation about the Koko Crater Stables (KCS) and honored Dr. Emogene Yoshimura, KCEC Manager. Graef asked for the Board's co-ordination with the 20th year celebration and for continued support for the contractual relationship with the City and KCS horse facility.

Representative Gene Ward also had a presentation in honor of the 20 years of the KCEC and Dr. Yoshimura.

State Department of Transportation (DOT) Presentation - Alvin Takeshita reported on four road projects: 1) Hanauma Bay - To provide more safety and efficiency, the Kalaniana'ole Highway and entrance to Hanauma Bay project has been completed. Guardrails have yet to be installed. 2) The road from the Blowhole to Lunalilo Home Road is considered "rural," while Lunalilo Home Road to Downtown is "urban." The "rural" section is a high accident area. DOT wants to install rumble strips by the fall of 2010. 3) On Kalaniana'ole Highway (Route 72), DOT wants to pave four miles from W. Hind Drive to downtown Honolulu. Re-striping and siding are planned for fall 2010 and there is no projected timeline. 4) Keahole and Hawaii Kai Drive right turn lane - DOT wants to start in early October 2009. The project is to last 10 months and they want to move the light poles. There will be no right turn, except from right lane after stop. Work will be done during non-peak hours, but not at night.

Comments followed: 1) A Board member requested a pedestrian-activated stop light at Lunalilo Home Road and Portlock Road. There may not be enough pedestrian traffic. 2) Regarding repaving, there is an eight- to 10-year cycle. 3) Regarding Alvin Takeshita's presentation, Natalie Iwasa asked for clarification of where the bike lane would be (on the outside of traffic lanes) and she voiced her concern that basically all the public was getting for the \$1.9 million is the movement of the traffic queue from Keahole Street to Kalaniana'ole Highway. 4) Herb Schreiner mentioned that rumble strips don't stop cars, but they served as an alert system to keep drivers from running into a ditch. 5) Other comments included - DOT should resurface all lanes; pedestrian stops can't wait until there is a pedestrian accident; check guardrails near Halona Cove; regarding repaving, pave only right lane and not all four and repave the bike the lane on Kalaniana'ole Highway after re-cutting the tree roots near Halemaumau Street.

#### PUBLIC GENERATED ISSUES:

1) Rich Turbin, 30 years with the Waiialae/Kahala Neighborhood Board and candidate for City Council, District 4, requested a Koko Stables branch in the Diamond Head area. 2) A woman in a wheelchair requested more curb cuts in the Hawaii Kai sidewalks, as they are "new work" and not Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) - compliant. She contacted Councilmember Djou's Office and will follow up. 3) Bruce Chapman mentioned that the "roosters contract" was not on Docushare. The Hawaiian Humane Society should make a presentation on why eradication is not possible. After 3 1/2 years of listening to the noise, he will volunteer to join a group for eradication. The purchase agreement would trap the roosters and send them to Waianae. 4) Cynthia Roca mentioned that the public should be steadfast regarding complaints about Steadfast Housing on Ahukini Street. Chair Knudsen will forward materials to State officials, Senator Sam Slom and Representative Gene Ward and to the HPD. Complaints can also go to HPD Vice/Narcotics. 5) Robert Kau added that Ahukini Street is noisy from 4:00 a.m. to 5:00 a.m. on. He suggested that they get better management to get the "bad elements" out.

#### OFFICIALS' REPORTS:

Mayor's Office representative - Gordon Bruce reported: 1) The Hanauma Bay fund for Fiscal Year (FY) 2009 should be completed soon and will be provided at the next meeting. Planned equipment replacement for this year will include replacing the eight touch screen computers in the Visitor Center. Minor repairs are on-going. Major repairs for the faux rock façade, stainless steel hand rails, parking lot and other CIP improvements have been requested and are in different levels of development. 2) A message was left for Board member Monk to please contact Department of Design and Construction (DDC). Monk said she met with DDC this morning. 3) The Board appreciated the DDC representative coming to the Board. However, the Board would like an immediate "pause" of the project and to meet with the DDC about "three times the lighting" and cost. Regarding the Lunalilo Home Road lighting, there will be a community meeting soon. 4) Regarding the Hawea Heiau and the violations by the

developer of Hale Alii, Department of Planning and Permitting (DPP) has issued four Notices of Violations ("NOV") on two separate parcels. A) For TMK: 3-9-008:039: 1. 2009/NOV-06-126, Grubbing without a permit, due August 27, 2009; NOV not corrected; August 28, 2009 referred to DPP's Code Compliance Branch. 2. A title search for the above TMK has been completed; Code Compliance Branch is drafting a Notice of Order ("NOO"), which is expected to be issued shortly. B) For TMK: 3-9-008:043: 1. 2009/NOV-06-146, Grading without a permit, due August 5, 2009; NOV not corrected; August 7, 2009 referred to Code Compliance Branch. 2. 2009/NOV-06-147, Stockpiling without a permit, due August 5, 2009; NOV not corrected; August 7, 2009 referred to Code Compliance Branch. 3. 2009/NOV-06-148, Grubbing without a permit, due August 5, 2009; NOV not corrected; August 7, 2009 referred to Code Compliance Branch. 4. Code Compliance Branch is waiting for a title search to be completed before issuing NOOs. Per DPP Inspector Joseph Correia, currently there appears to be no activity observed at these sites. 5) There is no "rooster contract" online. It is a "purchase agreement." Regarding the roosters in Hawaii Kai, for statistics from the recent "Chicken Round Ups," see attachment. The City and County of Honolulu has a procurement process that must be followed. The City welcomes any and all licensed and qualified bidders. Bruce again suggested that the Hawaiian Humane Society make a presentation on eradication. He will join a group to trap roosters on private property (Bishop Estate) next to the Park and Ride.

Comments followed: 1) Natalie Iwasa thanked the City for the community meeting on the Lunalilo Home Road lighting. Regarding Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) ramps, she asked how does the City decide which ones are chosen and how does the City set priorities for things like ADA ramps? Two ramps were done at the entrance of Mariner's Cove which get very little use, yet the intersection in front of Kamiloiki Elementary School does not have a ramp. 2) Board member Carl Makino thanked the City for sending a crew to clean up Hahaione Canal. 3) Board member Frank De Giacomo asked for more "chicken" numbers. There was no contract online. It was a purchase agreement. Trapped cats are neutered and returned to the area.

Councilmember Charles Djou reported: 1) U.S. Senator Edward Kennedy passed away about an hour ago. 2) Councilmember Djou wants to encourage more wind energy and preserve agriculture. 3) He clarified the bill, requiring motorists to pass bicyclists by three feet. 4) The City Council will finally have nine members. Ann Kobayashi will be sworn in soon.

Comments followed: 1) The City will put in three times the lights on Lunalilo Home Road, but does not spend money on curb cuts. Councilmember Djou will follow up. The roads and sidewalks should be shared by motorists, bicyclists and pedestrians.

Governor's Office representative - Russ Saito distributed the Governor's e-Newsletter and reported: 1) Statehood Commemoration activities at the Hawaii Convention Center included an all-day conference and 1950s/1960s-era music. 2) Recently, in the news, there were ads about using out-of-State workers at Aloha Stadium. It was a Department of Accounting and General Services (DAGS) job, requiring the removal and applying of a coating on the structural steel. Only certification is needed. Two companies were certified and one was a locally-based division of a mainland company. It must comply with all Hawaii laws. The unions want to pass a law to prevent mainland workers from coming in. Saito will talk with union leaders and explain State laws. He will follow up on Steadfast Housing. 3) Governor's appointee Judge Craig Nakamura was confirmed by the State Senate.

Senator Sam Slom reported: 1) The Statehood Celebration featured 2008 Olympic Gold medalist and former Hawaii resident Brian Clay and Board member Grey was spotted dancing. 2) Senator Fred Hemmings will serve out his term, but will not run for re-election. 4) U. S. Senator Daniel Inouye held a conference on the "Stimulus funds" of \$1.4 billion. 5) Recent economic reports show a slide of tourism. The Council of Revenues projections will come out this Thursday. 6) The November 13 layoff date is not "set in stone." The State could "raid the rail funds." 7) There was a town meeting on health care tonight, hosted by Councilmember Djou. 8) Regarding the lighting on Lunalilo Home Road, Phases I, II and III would total \$6 million.

Senator Fred Hemmings - No representative or report.

Representative Gene Ward welcomed back Chair Knudsen, acknowledged former-Councilmember Dan Clement in the audience and reported: 1) He thanked Natalie Iwasa for organizing the protest, opposing the Lunalilo Home Road lighting. 2) The DPP has no applications for Ka Iwi vacation cabins or the Golf Academy. 3) The energy of the first "Shark tours" meeting was at the health care town meeting tonight. He opposes all shark tours. 4) "A Day on the Farm" will be on Saturday, October 10 from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. to support the preservation of agriculture. 3) Health care in the U.S. has not reached the level of Hawaii. 4) Some good economic news for

Hawaii include that the USS Hawai'i, a "Virginia-class" nuclear attack submarine could pump \$17 million into the Hawai'i economy and the 30-foot telescope may add a \$1.2 billion investment. 5) Tenney Lum has passed away.

Comments followed: 1) Chair Knudsen recommended <http://safewatersforhawaii.com> to oppose shark tours. Representative Ward will be submitting a bill with increased fines for shark feeding.

Representative Lyla Berg reported: 1) Safewatersforhawaii.com highlights efforts to create a statewide ban on shark tours in Hawaii. Neighborhood Board No. 01 passed an anti-shark tours resolution. Neighborhood Board No. 02 was next and Neighborhood Boards No. 03 and No. 04 will complete the Neighborhood Boards for East Honolulu. 2) Last month's newsletter had an article on the Hawae Heiau. 3) This month, her newsletter highlighted the Freeway Service Patrol Pilot Program. 3) The "Hawaii Leader for a Day" 2009 Essay Writing Contest poses the questions - What are the historic places, Hawaiian cultural sites or locations of significance in your community, island or State? As an elected official, if you had to choose one location, what plan would you propose to respect and protect that site?" Essays must be received by 12:00 p.m. on Wednesday, October 7, 2009. Submit essays to Representative Berg, State Capitol, Room 324. 4) "Create Peace" videos must be submitted to Youth Xchange Video Competition, Olelo Community Television, by Monday, March 1, 2010.

Comments followed: 1) The Freeway Service Patrol does not extend to East Honolulu or Downtown.

#### OLD BUSINESS:

Continuing Discussion/Action on Hawaii Kai Streetlight Project - The City's Department of Design and Construction attended last month's meeting. Mayor's representative Bruce announced that Mayor Hannemann will have a community meeting on the Lunalilo Home Road lighting. Several comments followed: 1) How did Lunalilo Home Road get to be a commercial roadway? 2) Two traffic studies were done in 2006. 3) A light pole was moved from next to a fire hydrant to next to the fire station. 4) The City should change to flat lens and get wattage decreased. 5) The Board should get background information from City. 6) There were 100 signatures on a petition to stop the project. 7) The cost of installation is estimated at \$13,000 per light and \$80,000 extra for the energy. 8) The City had no community input. 9) It was suggested that the Board waits for the Mayor's meeting. The following five points were presented:

1. How, when, and why was Lunalilo Home Road upgraded to a "major commercial roadway" without community input? We have requested the entire planning/design and construction file for the project along with a list of all consultants.
2. We request information on the current electrical cost for the streetlights, as compared to projected electrical costs of lighting three times as many streetlights using 150-watt bulbs.
3. We request that if the new streetlights must remain, that their wattage be reduced from the planned 150 to 100 or 70. Based on information provided by the city and review of Illuminating Engineering Society of North American standards, 100-watt or possibly 70-watt bulbs should satisfy requirements for a major commercial roadway. Seventy-watt bulbs would considerably reduce future electrical costs, and still provide more light than the current number of streetlights.
4. We request that the amount of roadside poles be reduced by putting other street signs on the new light poles or eliminating some signs whenever possible. Approximately 20 signs are on stand-alone poles from Kalaniana'ole Highway to just beyond Koamano Street (Phase I).
5. We would like assurances that the current trees will not be chopped or drastically trimmed to accommodate the greater number of streetlights.

**Tanabe moved, Grey seconded that the Hawaii Kai Neighborhood Board No. 1 supports the five goals as previously listed. As there were no objections, the motion was ADOPTED by UNANIMOUS CONSENT, 9-0-0 (AYE: De Giacomo, Grey, Isgar, Knudsen, Levy, Makino, Monk, Tanabe, and Weller).**

Update on Closure of Public Beach Access from Hanapepe Loop, Portlock - It was suggested that the public right of way be re-opened until proper notice of closure is given. This item was deferred to the next meeting.

NEW BUSINESS:

Discussion/Action on Funding and Purchasing Problems at Hanauma Bay - The Mayor's representative's report covered some of the concerns. Another report is coming.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Parks & Recreation - Committee Chair David Tanabe reported on the committee meeting on Friday, August 7 at 6:30 p.m. at the Koko Head District Park Community Center. Board member Aaron Isgar chaired and 22 people attended. Topics discussed included: 1) The tennis courts to be rebuilt in the near future. 2) The BMX course needs maintenance. Activists are committed to the course. 3) Regarding the recreation equipment, swing sets may be coming back. 4) Lack of community input and communications with Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR) 5) Tramway access, discussions to follow. 6) Erosion on Goeas Field. 7) Illegal parking on weekends, suggestions to bike to events and using shuttle buses. 8) Hanauma Bay - at future meetings, \$5 million project. Mike Smith from DPR was present. 9) Dog Park has 34 volunteers and they will have a "poop bags" fundraiser. 10) Hanapepe public access. 11) Stables - They are having trouble with the City on using trails. Mike Smith will find out. Minutes will be submitted for posting on the website.

Comments followed: 1) There was concern about lights automatically coming on 45 minutes prior to sunset and staying on until about 9:30 p.m. when there is hardly anyone using the courts at night. It's a waste of electricity at a time when the city faces deficits. There was a suggestion to put a timer on the unnecessary lighting. 2) Other suggestions were to support Koko Head District Park and to contact former Parks Committee Chair Mary Houghton. 3) Representative Ward congratulated Aaron Isgar for chairing the committee.

Education, Transportation, Community Relations, Communications, Environment and Oahu Metropolitan Planning Organization (OMPO) - No report.

Planning and Zoning - Gary Weller reported that regarding the Hawae Heiau, the City does not know if the fines have been paid yet. The City has not addressed the affordable housing component. Chair Knudsen will keep this item and the wetlands on the agenda.

OTHER BOARD ANNOUNCEMENTS:

Board Member Announcements - Frank De Giacomo acknowledged Natalie Iwasa and Elizabeth Reilly for their work on the Lunalilo Home Road lighting project.

Status of Board's Authority to Fill Vacancies in Subdistricts 4 and 8 - Chair Knudsen announced that the Board will fill the vacancies in Subdistrict 4 and Subdistrict 8 in September.
