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### **DRAFT – REGULAR MEETING MINUTES TUESDAY, APRIL 29, 2014 HAHAIONE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL CAFETERIA**

CALL TO ORDER: Chair Greg Knudsen called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. with 11 members present. (Note: This 15-member Board requires eight (8) votes to establish quorum and to take official Board action.)

Pledge of Allegiance: Eagle Scout Kendrick Chang led the Pledge of Allegiance and introduced himself.

INTRODUCTION OF BOARD MEMBERS: The Board members introduced themselves at this time.

### STATUS REPORTS

Honolulu Fire Department (HFD): Firefighters Edgar Ortega Jr. and Michael Dillman reported the following:

- April 2014 Statistics: There were 3 structure fires, 53 medical emergencies, 9 search and rescues, 16 miscellaneous calls.
- Fire Safety Tip – Fire Escape Plan: Ensure smoke alarms work. Create an escape plan considering doors and windows that can open. Know at least two ways out, designate a meeting place outside and practice twice a year. Teach children about smoke, to stay low to the floor, call 911 and never go back inside.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed:

1. Search and Rescue Details: Captain Kohn noted only one search and rescue was at Koko Crater Trail; two others were in the ocean.
2. Parking By Fire Hydrants: A community member inquired about who to contact as he called Honolulu Police Department (HPD) with no results. Captain Kohn affirmed that HPD is the correct contact.

Honolulu Police Department (HPD) – Lieutenant Clinton Sukekane reported the following:

- Fire Hydrant Parking: If a car is parked in front of a fire hydrant, call 911. If there is no response, call for a supervisor. A car must be 10 feet away from a hydrant.
- April 2014 Statistics: There were 5 motor vehicle thefts (MVT), 5 burglaries, 16 thefts, 13 unauthorized entries into motor vehicles (JEMV), and 5,822 total calls for service.
- Keiki Safety Tips: Remind children to not talk to strangers but to get away and let an adult know, and to use crosswalks and obey the lights.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed:

1. District Statistics: Lieutenant Sukekane directed Grey to the [www.honoluluupd.org](http://www.honoluluupd.org) for crime location maps.



2. Abandoned Vehicle: Lieutenant Sukekane will send an officer to inspect the abandoned vehicle on Ainahou Street per Grey's request. A vehicle is classified as abandoned if it has not moved for 24 hours.
3. Alarm System Company: Grey received notice from a new alarm company for an additional charge for a police permit. Lieutenant Sukekane noted HPD still responds to a sounding alarm regardless of permits.

Board of Water Supply (BWS): Rian Adachi reported the following:

- Main Break: There was one water main break on Thursday, April 24, 2014, at 723 Hahaione Street.
- Tours: Keiki are invited to tours and educational programs provided by BWS. To schedule a tour, e-mail [tours@hbws.org](mailto:tours@hbws.org) or call 748-5041.
- Contest: Adachi thanked students for participating in the Water Conservation Week Poster and Poetry Contest. Winners will be announced at an awards ceremony in May 2014.

FILLING OF BOARD VACANCY: Chair Knudsen opened the floor to candidates for the vacancy in Subdistrict 9. There were no candidates at this time. This item was deferred to the next meeting.

### COMMUNITY ANNOUNCEMENTS

Community Work Day: Reilly announced a Community Work Day to be held at the Keawawa Wetland and Hawea Heiau Complex on Saturday, May 10, 2014, from 8:30 to 11:30 a.m. Handouts were available.

Bike Month: Iwasa noted that May is Bike Month; a Bike to School Day will be held on Wednesday, May 7, 2014.

Ka Iwi Coast Walk/Run: Altonn shared that the second annual Ka Iwi Coast Walk/Run will be held on October 5, 2014, and registration is open online.

### PUBLIC-GENERATED ISSUES

Hanauma Bay Evening Program: Resident Bob Kern raised concern about the cancellation of the Hanauma Bay Thursday night program "to protect safety as the lights aren't working." The City has known about the lights for a couple of years and has done nothing. The Hanauma Bay Thursday night program was an education program featuring presentations from expert lecturers and scientists about the ocean. Kern requested Hanauma Bay be placed on the May 2014 agenda with a representative from the City to respond. A petition to support continuation of the program has been started. Sid McWhirter, vice president of Friends of Hanauma Bay, noted there were funds of \$4 million designated for Hanauma Bay that the City refused to release for repairs. Resident Lileikis noted his support for the program.

Koko Head Shooting Complex Incident: Resident Edward Hampton reported an incident on Sunday, March 30, 2014 at Koko Head Shooting Complex. Three hikers appeared at the floor of the range at 3:30 p.m. and marched across the range and over the berm, ignoring commands over the loud speakers to clear the range. HPD arrived too late to catch the hikers. Hampton noted hiking down the side of the mountain during live fire is dangerous and asked the City to make safety changes or close the trail. He stated that there is clear signage noting the area of live fire, but fencing is needed to keep hikers away.

Commercial Water Activity: Resident Jay Freeze voiced concern over the increase in commercial water activity within the community and requested the regulation of the large amounts of fuel used for the boats.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed:

1. Rules Presentation: Reilly recommended that DLNR's Division of Boating and Ocean Recreation present on the rules and regulations of the Moanalua Bay Recreational Plan for commercial water activity. Chair Knudsen noted a review of enforcement was needed and would consider placing it on a future agenda.
2. Investigation: Clark noted the Hawaii Kai Marina Community Association contacted the Coast Guard regarding fueling operations in the marina. The Coast Guard assured that operations are appropriate.

### PRESENTATIONS:

Department of Transportation Services: Glenn Moir from DTS provided a handout and reported the following:

- Revised Bus Transfer Rules: Currently, single-fare cash paying riders can transfer from one bus to another without additional fares. Some riders are counterfeiting transfers, selling transfers, and passing

transfers to other riders. To decrease fraud and operator/rider conflicts, beginning Tuesday, July 1, 2014, TheBus transfer will have a detachable coupon to allow for a maximum of 2 connections. Transfers will not be valid for return or round trips and will only be valid until the time shown at the top of the ticket. - Handi-Van Reduced Reservations Window: The Handi-Van will now reserve rides up to 2 days in advance instead of 7 days, in order to decrease service delays and create more timely service. Feedback has been positive.
- Volunteer Program: The City partners with community groups to maintain the bus stops. DTS provides the materials and supplies while the community groups provide the people and time.
- Wainiha St. Express Bus Route Petitions: DTS received 2 petitions relating to the Express Bus stops. The first petition led to discontinuing bus stops #3694 and 3695. Notice was posted. Only 2 calls were received (1 of these being negative) during the 30 days, so the stops were changed December 2, 2013. The removal petition cited traffic conflicts, speeding, and low ridership. The second petition was submitted Tuesday, May 7, 2014, requesting DTS assess the removal of said bus stops. The restoration petition claimed there was no substantial evidence to prove the speeding and pedestrian safety concerns. There would be no cost to change or keep the bus route; community input was requested.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed:

1. Support for Restoration: Residents Jean St. Pierre and Bernard Chong noted the cost effect for the City to restore the bus route was minor, applauded the bus drivers for their safe driving, and noted no accidents are on record.
2. Mariners Village 3 Townhouse Association Support: Herb Schreiner, speaking as vice president of Mariners Village 3 Townhouse Association, noted the Mariners Village 3 Board deeply discussed the issue and determined “not to bother” Lunalilo Home Rd. residents and to “keep their share of the noise.”
3. Lunalilo Street Safety Concern: Resident Joyce Kamahale noted the Wainiha Street bus stop was safer to use because there is no crosswalk on Lunalilo Home Rd. and it is a dangerous intersection. Garvin noted the Board was aware of the crossing hazard there and was waiting for the results of the traffic calming study from DTS.
4. Support for Removal: Resident Larry Adams voiced concern about the loud, speeding buses so close to the townhouses on Wainiha Street. He also expressed concern about safety and destruction of the road. The 27- foot wide road, with parking on both sides, was not designed for large heavy buses. The road is heavily pot-holed and has been patched numerous times. Resident Leslie Lukehart noted that she was afraid of the bus when exiting her car with her children and that many community children play outside there. Chair Knudsen requested DTS investigate the safety concerns on this bus route.

The Oahu Bike Plan: No representative was present and will be rescheduled.

Hawaii Kai Disaster Preparedness Plan: Resident Bill Vogt raised concerns about the lack of a Hawaii Kai disaster preparedness plan. A Category 4 storm would likely result in loss of power for 30 days or more. Civil Defense warns not to expect any outside help for 5 days or more. The communities of Ewa Beach and Kailua have been designated “Storm Ready” by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA). The Kailua Neighborhood Board created the Kailua plan and Vogt suggested the Hawaii Kai Neighborhood Board create a disaster preparedness plan. Garvin met with Vogt to discuss specifics concerning the content of the plan; contact with NOAA was needed and concerns specific to Hawaii Kai would need to be included. Chair Knudsen would review the Kailua Disaster Preparedness Plan and recommended Garvin work with Vogt to research details to include in the plan.

## OFFICIALS' REPORTS

Mayor Kirk Caldwell's Representative –Tim Houghton, Deputy Director of the Department of Environmental Services, reported the following:

- Road Repairs: Rehabilitation of Unit 25 is ongoing, including Lunalilo Home Road, Wailua Street, Hawaii Kai Drive and Mariners Cove.
- Parks: The Kamiloiki Community Park Recreation Building roofing construction project is ongoing with anticipated completion December 26, 2014. The Koko Head District Park Multipurpose Building improvements will go to bid on Wednesday, April 30, 2014. The Niu Valley Neighborhood Park Playground Structure is in the design and construction phase. The Sandy Beach comfort station roof improvements anticipated bid- opening date is Monday, June 30, 2014.

- Community for Keiki: April 2014 is Community for Keiki month. Mayor Caldwell thanked the Neighborhood Board members for their dedication to the community and their impact on the island's keiki.
- Summer Fun Program: For information about the Summer Fun Program, visit [www.honoluluparks.com](http://www.honoluluparks.com).
- Maunalua Bay Facility: The Maunalua Bay Beach facility was completed as of Tuesday, April 22, 2014. The Department of Design and Construction (DDC) plans work on the landscape for another 30 days.
- Traffic Calming: Investigation for traffic calming measures in areas in Hawaii Kai is ongoing and DTS will report findings by the August 2014 Board meeting.
- Sandy Beach Overnight Campers: A standard sign listing the park's prohibited activities should be installed at Sandy Beach Park within the next two weeks.
- 762 Lunalilo Home Road: The City is waiting for the foreclosure action on the home at 762 Lunalilo Home Road. Action to reduce fines in the settlement can only be taken once the violation is corrected.
- Hanauma Bay Website: The University of Hawaii Sea Grant program was reminded to use the Hanauma Bay email account only for information pertaining to Hanauma Bay.
- Hawaiian Electric Company (HECO) Box: This is an issue between HECO and the property owner, not City and County.
- ADA Curb Ramps: The curb ramps construction notice to proceed was issued on Monday, April 28, 2014. The project duration is one year and DDC was asked to create the schedule for Lunalilo Home Rd. as soon as possible.
- Roadwork: Hawaii Kai Drive was resurfaced.
- Signal Loops: Signal loops on Ahukini were restored after being damaged from the roadwork.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed:

1. Traffic Light Studies: Schreiner voiced concern about the \$5 million traffic lights study; the cost seems high and more than lights need to be considered.
2. HECO Box: Iwasa noted the City grants the permits in the area.
3. Repaving: Iwasa questioned how repaving priorities are determined. Hawaii Kai Drive was a relatively new road while other streets such as Wainiha St. were filled with potholes.
4. 762 Lunalilo Home Road: The Department of Planning and Permitting (DPP) has been in direct discussion with the owners of the derelict house
5. Repaving Concerns: Houghton clarified the repaving on Kalaniana'ole Highway would not be related to the Hawaii Kai street repaving and repaving would continue on City roads.
6. Hanauma Bay: Grey thanked Houghton for addressing the Hanauma Bay e-mail issue. Grey voiced concern about the funding for Hanauma Bay and asked if there is a way to have an audit since maintenance funds have not been expended. The Hanauma Bay Master Plan presentation at an earlier Board meeting was not well received and Grey would rather have the funding be spent for maintenance. Houghton will follow up with an update on the plan.
7. Cemetery Dumping: Grey raised concern about the asphalt dumping on the cemetery site. Houghton noted the permit violation was corrected and the permit to store material remains valid.
8. Kamilonui Place: Reilly requested the repaving of the road on Kamilonui Place; Grace Pacific donated repaving of half the road so only the other half needed repaving.
9. Botanical Garden: Reilly noted one of the City's botanical gardens has not been maintained and inquired whether the Hawaii Kai botanical garden would be expanded. Houghton will follow up.

Councilmember Stanley Chang – Michael Leong provided a handout and presented the following:

- 762 Lunalilo Home Road: DPP will look at the settlement and possible solutions for 762 Lunalilo Home Road. Leong would report back with the response.
- Hawaii Kai Carnival: DPP does not regulate the use of land for temporary activities such as a carnival.
- Resolution 14-22: The report in response to the Resolution 14-22 investigation of stockpiling issues at Hawaii Kai Memorial Park is a week late; the Deputy Director of the Department of Parks and Recreation has been contacted.
- Koke'e Mini Beach Park: DPP and HPD will respond to reports of unfinished trash pickup and homeless living in the bushes at Koke'e Mini Beach Park. The City is aware the park is on the night closure list.
- Moanalua Bay: The Moanalua Bay comfort stations have been repaired.
- Town Hall: Thank you for those who attended Councilmember Stanley Chang's town hall meeting on Monday, April 28, 2014, and congratulations to Hawaii Kai Hui for making Hawea Heiau and Keawawa Wetlands such a beautiful space.
- Hanauma Bay: An inquiry has been sent to DPR regarding the non-working lights and cancelled lectures. Sundays were suggested so that lights would not be a problem.

- Kamilonui Place: Councilmember Chang is discussing repair/repaving with Kamehameha Schools.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed:

1. Hanauma Bay Thursday Program: Grey recommended the Hanauma Bay night program be held on Tuesdays rather than Sundays, if a day change was needed.
2. Yellow Road Guards: Altonn noted sand was spilling onto the road from the stacked and broken yellow containers on the right side of Ainakoa Street approaching the freeway. This issue will be sent to DTS.
3. Thank you: Makino thanked Leong for clearing the drainage canal on Hahaione St.

Governor Neil Abercrombie's Representative – Randy Baldemore reported the following:

- Education: U.S. Secretary of Education Arne Duncan called Hawaii a “rising star.” Last year Hawaii’s fourth-graders surpassed the national average in mathematics for the first time. The State is changing curriculum for college readiness and the Department of Education (DOE) has put extra effort in to underperforming schools. The Legislature included early learning funding in their State budget drafts.
- Employment Trends: Employment trends can be found at the Hawaii Workforce Infonet, [www.hiwi.org](http://www.hiwi.org).

Questions, comments, and concerns followed:

1. High Occupancy Vehicle (HOV) Lane: Schreiner requested the HOV lane on Kalaniana'ole Hwy. be continued closer to the Hawaii Kai area. Altonn expressed disagreement.
2. Makapu'u Lighthouse Road: Schreiner requested an update on the Makapu'u Lighthouse trail renovation.
3. Kalaniana'ole Highway: Schreiner noted the traffic lights on Kalaniana'ole Highway are not sequenced correctly; traffic is congested at Ainakoa in the mornings and at Niu Valley in the evenings. The highway is presently closed at night for roadwork from Lunalilo Home Rd. to Kealahou St. and Chair Knudsen requested advanced notice in the future before any major construction projects.

Senator Sam Slom – Senator Slom provided a handout and reported the following:

- HOV Lane: Senator Slom noted the residents of Aina Haina did not want the HOV lane in the area.
- Legislative Session: The last day of the Legislative session is Thursday, May 1, 2014.
- Budget: The budget was passed today, Tuesday, April 29, 2014, with a vote of 75 to 1. Senator Slom voted against the budget because, although described as “austere,” the State will be out of cash by 2017 and he regards it as a “spending bill” rather than a budget.
- Family Court Judge: Attorney Henry Nakamoto is set to be confirmed as Hawaii’s newest District Family Court Judge of the Third Circuit on Thursday, May 1, 2014.
- Hawaii Health Connector: The State hired CGI to do a tax program that never worked and is now suing them. The same firm was hired for the HHC website that doesn't work. Senator Slom contacted the federal Government Accountability Office for an audit of the Hawaii Health Connector.

Senator Laura Thielen – No representative was present. Her newsletter was emailed to Board members.

Representative Gene Ward – Representative Ward provided a handout and reported the following:

- Sister States: The Bali-Hawaii Sister State Initiative was signed on Monday, April 14, 2014.
- Hawaii Kai Hui: Congratulations for the Hawaii Kai Hui's successful Mad Hatter fundraiser and “Great Tree” contest win.
- Maunalua Bay: The Maunalua Bay comfort stations have been repaired after 4 years.
- Beer Summit: Governor George Ariyoshi will speak at the Beer Summit on Thursday, May 8, 2014.
- Kalaniana'ole Highway: Phase 1 of the Kalaniana'ole Highway repaving project is to begin no later than Monday, June 30, 2014.
- Power Grids: The legislature passed a bill to move HECO toward getting more renewable energy to the consumers through micro-grids.

Representative Mark Hashem – No representative was present, and no report was available.

## OLD BUSINESS

Hawaii Kai Carnival: Donna Smith, vice president of EK Fernandez Events, followed up on concerns from the previous meeting about the Hawaii Kai carnival held in March 2014. Participants included a Hula Halau, a cheerleading organization, a military organization and a church group. Indirect participants were Hahaione Elementary School, American Red Cross, Kamehameha Schools, Special Olympics Hawaii, and Hawaii Speed

and Quickness. Smith read a statement from former Kaiser Coach Rich Miano stating his appreciation of EK Fernandez Events and noting the money raised from the carnival was distributed to Kaiser's football, wrestling, basketball, and girls' sports teams, plus 2 scholarships.

Discussion followed:

- Carnival at Kaiser: Schreiner requested EK Fernandez host a carnival at Kaiser High School.
- Kaiser Principal: Chair Knudsen relayed Kaiser Principal Justin Mew's statement from a conversation earlier that day. Mew reiterated that the school was not directly involved with the Kaiser carnival but is appreciative of the donations. The Kaiser Parent Teacher Student Association (PTSA) had considered hosting a carnival in the past and did not feel it would be cost effective. Other independent organizations support Kaiser and the school has formal fundraisers of its own. A carnival could negatively affect the academic purpose of the school.
- Down Payment: Mayor noted the Kaiser PTSA declined EK Fernandez events in part because of a required down payment. Smith stated EK Fernandez does not take a down payment. There is a full carnival with no charge or a smaller event with rental payment for equipment.
- Grass Refurbishing: Altonn inquired about restoration of the grass area used for the carnival. Community member Mark Polakah noted the grass was in better condition than previously.
- Organizations: Smith confirmed for Altonn that the only Hawaii Kai entities that benefited from the event were Hahaione Elementary School and Hawaii Speed and Quickness. No other groups contacted them.
- P-2 Preservation-Zoned Land: Iwasa noted there are no rules for the temporary use of P-2 preservation-zoned land. She is working with DPP on this concern.
- Traffic Problems: Iwasa noted there were traffic problems at the carnival due to vehicles stopping in the bike lanes for passenger drop-offs.
- Kaiser High School: Reilly asked if Smith would be open to conversation with the Kaiser High School PTSA. Smith noted it was unlikely they would do an event at this school because they were turned down by the principals three times.

Resolution 14-22: Chair Knudsen noted the Department of Planning and Permitting (DPP) would follow up with the status of Resolution 14-22 to investigate stockpiling issues at Hawaii Kai Memorial Park. Iwasa noted Councilmember Kymberly Pine introduced Bills 35, 36, and 37 in response to the stockpiling issue and the dumping in Waianae.

#### NEW BUSINESS

Second Honolulu Ekiden Relay Race: Brent Imonen from the Honolulu Ekiden Foundation noted the Relay Race is scheduled for Sunday, June 1, 2014. The race will start at Kapiolani Park, proceed to Kalaniana'ole Highway, pass Koko Marina and Hanauma Bay and turn around at Sandy Beach. There will be an aid station at Maunalua Bay on the grass between the highway and the boat parking area. One lane will be closed on Kalaniana'ole Highway to Koko Marina and also from Hanauma Bay to Sandy Beach. Imonen is in the process of working with two volunteer groups (preferably Hawaii Kai based). Roberts Hawaii is sponsoring the Moanalua Bay Aid Station. This relay race will have about 1,000 runners in teams of 2-to-6 members. The goal is to have everyone finished and back within three hours and the road reopened by 9:00 a.m.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed:

1. Preparation: Chair Knudsen asked when permitting was received for this event. Imonen contacted DPR several months ago and HPD AND DPP last week. Notices have been sent to the Neighborhood Boards in the race areas.
2. Maunalua Bay Aid Station: Imonen clarified the Maunalua Bay Aid Station will be located on the grassy area and not the roadway; volunteers and HPD will monitor for safety.
3. Attendance: Imonen noted race attendance was expected to be up to 1,000 participants.
4. Road Openings: Altonn asked what time the roads reopened in 2013. Imonen explained that last year the roads opened 30 minutes later than the 8:30 to 9:00 a.m. goal for this year. There will not be any solo runners this year.
5. Churches: Resident Ron Livingston asked how the traffic would affect the two main churches on the race route. Imonen is meeting with them to work on this.

COMMITTEE REPORTS – There were no reports.

APPROVAL OF MARCH 25, 2014 REGULAR MEETING MINUTES – **The March 25, 2014 minutes were APPROVED with corrections by UNANIMOUS CONSENT, 11-0-0 (Aye: Altonn, Clark, Garvin, Grey, Iwasa, Knudsen, Makino, Mayor, Monk, Reilly, and Schreiner).** Corrections made: Spelling – On Page 1, the name “Alton” should be changed to “Altonn”.

TREASURER’S REPORT: Reilly reported for Rutkowski a total of \$20.20 spent in March 2014, with a remaining balance of \$242.73. The report was filed.

OTHER BOARD ANNOUNCEMENTS: There were none at this time.
