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REGULAR MEETING MINUTES THURSDAY, MAY 18, 2006 MAKIKI DISTRICT PARK ARTS AND CRAFTS BUILDING

CALL TO ORDER: Chair John Steelquist called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. without a quorum present.

MEMBERS PRESENT: John Steelquist, John Bigay, Charles Carole, Sue Hillmann (elected at this meeting), Richard Kawano, Susan Lai Young, Allan Lee, Martin Schiller, Craig Thistleton and Joseph Zuiker.

TREASURER'S REPORT- Treasurer Martin Schiller reported that as of May 10, 2006, there was an ending balance of \$1,077.58 in the Operating budget, -\$503.29 in the Publicity budget and \$4.22 remaining in the Refreshment budget. The Treasurer's report was accepted as read.

(7:04 p.m.) A quorum was established.

FILLING OF THE VACANCY FOR SUBDISTRICT 1- Chair Steelquist asked if there were any volunteers for Subdistrict 1, which is mauka of Wilder Avenue and the Tantalus area. Sue Hillmann volunteered and said that she was a resident of Round Top for 45 years. There were no further nominations.

Board member Joe Zuiker moved and Board member Allan Lee seconded that the nominations be closed. The motion carried unanimously, 9-0-0. Sue Hillmann was elected to the Neighborhood Board by unanimous consent. Neighborhood Assistant K. Russell Ho administered the Oath of Office for Sue Hillmann.

Chair Steelquist mentioned one thing that the Neighborhood Board does differently from Robert's Rules of Order is that a majority vote (9) is needed of the total number of members (17) instead of the number of members present.

APPROVAL OF THE APRIL 20, 2006 REGULAR MEETING MINUTES- There were no corrections made. The minutes of the April 20, 2006 regular Board meeting were approved as circulated. Due to an "electronic glitch," the approval of minutes of the Special Board meeting on May 4, 2006 would be deferred to the next meeting.

COMMUNITY CONCERNS:

Honolulu Police Department (HPD)- Sgt. Albert Lee handed out the following statistics for April 2006:

1. There were 3 robberies (+2 from last month), 14 burglaries (-3 from last month), 28 unauthorized entries of motor vehicle (UEMV) (+8 from last month), 14 auto thefts (+5 from last month), 1 aggravated assault (same as last month), 5 simple assaults (same as last month), 110 motor vehicle collisions (MVC) (+10 from last month), 17 D.U.I. (+4 from last month), 0 sex assaults (-2 from last month), 4 family offenses (-5 from last month), 3 drug offenses (+1 from last month), and 9 graffiti (+4 from last month).

2. Unauthorized Entry into a Motor Vehicle (UEMV) and auto thefts are slightly up.

Question, answers and comments followed.

1. Board member Richard Kawano had concerns about excessive loud noise at night. It may come under the Department of Health (DOH) and they would bring out a decibel meter.
2. Karl Rhoads, from the Downtown Neighborhood Board No. 13, reported speeding on Kinau Street between Victoria Street and Pensacola Street and reported that on April 18 between 6:00 and 9:00 p.m., he was crossing at the intersection at King Street and Sheridan Street, but the officer in HPD vehicle number 681 did not yield to him in the crosswalk.
3. Board member John Bigay asked if the officer sees a person discarding a cigarette butt in the rear-view mirror, does he stop and issued a citation. Sgt. Lee replied yes, he does.

Chair Steelquist thanked Sgt. Lee and the HPD.

Honolulu Fire Department (HFD)- Captain Debbie Eleneki, Makiki Station, handed out the written report and highlighted the following:

1. In May 2006, there were a total of 78 calls for service: 9 fires, 53 medical emergencies and 16 miscellaneous service calls. There were no major or unusual incidents.
2. Fire Safety Tip- Prepare a fire escape plan. Map out your escape routes with at least two ways out of each room. Designate a location outside of the house where everyone can meet. Know where the closest phone is located to call 9-1-1.

Questions, answers and comments followed.

1. A Board member expressed his concern about the six months that Round Top Drive would be blocked on Tantalus. According to Captain Eleneki the road is blocked at 2497 Round Top Drive. It takes about fifteen minutes to get from the Makiki Station to the blocked area and another ten minutes to get emergency workers through the area. According to the road maintenance people, the road will be blocked for a minimum of six months. For medical emergencies they may attempt to reach the area from both sides (from Tantalus Drive and Round Top Drive). From the barrier at 2767 Round Top Drive, it took them eight minutes, without carrying any medical equipment, to get to the next address. Fire trucks have to come from the Tantalus Drive side.
2. Board member Kawano asked what were "miscellaneous service calls." Capt. Eleneki replied those included assisting the police with general clean up after an auto accident, people stuck in elevators and animal rescue.
3. Board member Zuiker asked if the six-month closure was really necessary. Chair Steelquist mentioned that it was on the agenda.

There were no further questions.

Chair Steelquist thanked Captain Eleneki.

Board of Water Supply (BWS)- (7:17 p.m.) Cat Sawai handed out a chart of the proposed rate increases and reported the following:

1. The Board of Water Supply proposed rate increases were passed at a public hearing on May 15. They should be posted on their website soon.
2. There were no main breaks in May.
3. Congratulations to the winners of the Board of Water Supply's water conservation week poster contest! Out of more than 2500 entries, the judges have chosen the 12 first- second- and third-place winners for

each grade level, as well as honorable mention winners. Congratulations to Sally Choy from Stevenson Middle School.

Questions, answers and comments followed.

1. Board member Kawano said that he supported the water rate increase.
2. Sawai mentioned a rock wall project at the Nuuanu Reservoir.
3. She answered a question about the multi-unit water rate.

Chair Steelquist thanked Sawai.

Residents' Concerns-

Hazardous Condition- Karl Rhoads mentioned the parking around 1068 Kinau Street. If drivers are exiting the driveway, they cannot see the cars coming off the freeway at a high rate of speed. Chair Steelquist mentioned the Board would look at the whole area from 1060 Kinau Street between Victoria Street and Pensacola Street.

NETWORKING OF NEIGHBORHOOD BOARDS:

Makiki Stream- No report.

Sidewalk improvements- No report

Pawaa Park- No report.

Makiki Community Plan- Chair Steelquist had a copy of the plan from Department of Planning and Permitting (DPP) from February 2005.

Makiki Stream- Board member Zuiker asked if it would be cleaned again. Chair Steelquist mentioned that they cleaned it right before the March floods. The Mayor's representative Waterhouse would follow up in her report tonight.

Traffic and Transit- Pat Lee was not present, so there was no report on the Honolulu High-Capacity Transit Corridor Project (HHCTCP).

(7:25 p.m.) Chair Steelquist reported that he received a phone call concerning closing of one bus stop on Beretania Street and one on King Street. Department of Transportation Services (DTS) wants to close mid-block bus stops and bus stops in front of an intersection. If there was interest, Chair Steelquist could invite someone from Department of Transportation Services (DTS) to attend a meeting.

Chair Steelquist also received a letter concerning curb ramps. There would be four cuts on Wilder Avenue at Punahou Street, Makiki Street, Keeaumoku Street and Kewalo Street. Also, on Nehoa Street there would be curb ramps at Mott-Smith Drive and at Punahou Street. It would take 150 days and there would be one-lane closures.

Board member Zuiker asked about the money for sidewalks. Chair Steelquist thinks that it may have lapsed in December 2005. Board member Kawano asked about the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) requirements. Chair Steelquist mentioned the partial use of Federal funds for these curb ramps.

ELECTED OFFICIALS:

Senator Gordon Trimble- Senator Trimble gave the following report:

1. There was \$11 million appropriated for the preparation for the avian (bird) flu pandemic. Senator Trimble attended a recent high-level briefing. The Surgeon General estimated that 40 percent of

employees would not show up for work. As there is no cure, they may quarantine people. Like preparing for a hurricane, they recommend having three to five days of food and water on hand.

2. Concerning the Governor's "Pedestrian Safety" bill, it would have increased penalties. When it got to the House, Representative Joe Souki added on the "red light" cameras. Senator Colleen Hanabusa killed this portion of the bill in conference committee. As this is an election year and 20 percent of the Senate is running for the Second Congressional District seat, there was "political maneuvering by the Democrats" at the end of the Legislative session.
3. When he came to the Board four years ago, he had three interests- a ferry system, competition in ocean freight and raising the State income tax standard deduction. He mentioned that Matson bought new ships to go to China and other companies were expanding. The State has increased the income tax standard deduction to 40 percent of the Federal income tax standard deduction.

Questions, answers and comments followed.

1. Board member Kawano asked about the \$300 million going to the Department of Education (DOE). He wants it to go to the teachers, the classrooms and supplies rather than to the bureaucracy and salaries. Senator Trimble mentioned that the Legislature has no control over how the Superintendent of the DOE spends the money.
2. Board member Zuiker expressed his appreciation of Senator Trimble's attendance and insightful comments over the years.

As there were no further questions, Chair Steelquist thanked Senator Trimble.

Senator Carol Fukunaga- (7:35 p.m.) Senator Fukunaga distributed her newsletter and reported the following:

1. On the March floods, it has been six weeks from the flooding. The Legislature has passed funding for emergency road repair and stabilization of the land. Senator Fukunaga mentioned a six-month closure of Round Top Drive and that there is one way in on Tantalus Drive. Chair Steelquist mentioned that since this item was on the agenda, he wanted to discuss it now. Due to the increased heavy traffic, Tantalus Drive is full of potholes. After the initial activity after the floods, Chair Steelquist had trouble getting updated information. It seems each government agency had only its information and that there was no over-all co-ordination. Senator Fukunaga announced that on Monday at the Capitol, the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR), the State Parks Division, Forestry Division, former Makiki Representative Jim Shon, who formed a community advisory group, John Cummings from Oahu Civil Defense (OCD) and Ed Texeira, State Civil Defense (SCD) would meet. Many State agencies may have limited their comments due to liability questions and the State has also passed tax credits for residents who suffered damages.
2. Board member Zuiker asked about the Insurance Commissioner's oversight of insurance rate increases for Hawaii Medical Services Association (HMSA), Kaiser, etc. Senator Fukunaga mentioned that there was no agreement in conference committee, but finally, the Senate Chair of the Consumer Protection Committee agreed with the House version of the bill. Board member Zuiker mentioned that the bill might have favored the insurance companies.
3. Resident Ray Sasaki asked about the funding for the roads and a previous landslide on Makiki Heights Drive. Senator Fukunaga explained about the \$15 million for emergency road repair. Former area resident Tracy Miyahara has notified the Mayor's Office about the slide. Miyahara thanked Senator Fukunaga for her personal response to residents' concerns.

Mayor's representative Waterhouse mentioned that the City has applied to the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) for \$10 million re-imbusement for repair roads and that this was a joint partnership with the State. Senator Fukunaga mentioned the State's contribution. Chair Steelquist suggested restricting the roads to local traffic, as construction vehicles, tour buses and street racers contribute to potholes. Senator Fukunaga again mentioned the Monday meeting at 5:00 p.m. at the State Capitol, Room 212. They would share information. A resident asked who in the City is monitoring

the eight-ton weight limit for the roads. Senator Fukunaga also mentioned signage and access for emergency vehicles.

Resident Ray Sasaki asked the Mayor's representative Waterhouse about the mudslide on Makiki Heights Drive, which occurred before the March 31 floods. Barriers were put up, but they keep falling down the hillside. Tracy Miyahara added that residents have re-positioned the barriers, but they keep falling down. Can someone monitor the area? Mayor's representative Waterhouse would follow up.

4. Board member Bigay asked about the bill concerning the noise from leaf blowers. Senator Fukunaga mentioned that it might have fallen to the wayside "in the crush of Energy Committee legislation." They had a lot of good energy bills.
5. Board member Kawano asked about the \$300 million for the Department of Education (DOE). Senator Fukunaga explained that part of the money goes to repairs and maintenance, according to the DOE priorities. The Governor has just released \$5 million to Roosevelt High School. Board member Kawano asked if any money went to the bureaucracy. Senator Fukunaga said that \$160 million is going to repair and maintenance, \$50 million is going to Capital Improvement Projects (CIP) and \$30 million is going to schools targeted to lose money under the Weighted Student Formula (WSF), like Stevenson Middle School. She did not know how much went to the bureaucracy. Board member Schiller asked for clarification on DOE spending. Senator Fukunaga mentioned that for the Roosevelt High School auditorium funding, it took two years for the priority to move up from below 100 to 63.

Board member Bigay asked about the \$14 million that was released for the Roosevelt High School auditorium funding. Senator Fukunaga mentioned that when this project was discussed after 1995, it was estimated at \$6 million. Each year they learned that the costs have increased.

Chair Steelquist thanked Senator Fukunaga.

Representative Sylvia Luke- No representative was present. Representative Luke's newsletter was distributed for review.

Representative Brian Schatz- No representative was present.

Governor's Linda Lingle's representative- (8:06 p.m.) Duane Okamoto, Deputy Director, Department of Agriculture, distributed the Governor's Weekly Update and highlighted the following:

1. The Governor released \$5 million for the Roosevelt High School auditorium to be completed by March 2007.
2. The Governor has signed three bills, which allocates \$40 million for the homeless service providers and addresses affordable housing.
3. The Department of Agriculture (DOA) will be focusing on controlling Couqui frogs on the neighbor islands. Another bill addressed DOA representation on the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) Council.

Questions, answers and comments followed.

1. Board member Zuiker asked about the \$40 million for the homeless service providers. Governor's representative Okamoto saw a varied list of organizations that will be receiving the funding.
2. Board member Kawano asked about work force housing, affordable rentals and supplements. Okamoto replied that he was not familiar with the details of the bills. Resident Tracy Okubo works for the Department of Human Services and mentioned vouchers and other information.

Chair Steelquist thanked Governor's representative Okamoto.

Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA)- Evan Neuschwander introduced himself and gave a Federal contact number- 1(800) 621-3362. He distributed a brochure and mentioned the Disaster Recovery Center at the Kahala Mall. If a person lost personal property, then he/she is eligible to recover funds. There are other State and Federal agencies, like the Small Business Administration (SBA), which also assist. People can also register at their website at FEMA.gov.

Questions, answers and comments followed.

1. There were questions about renters and multiple family dwellings. Neuschwander suggested that they register first and then work through the system. Chair Steelquist mentioned Federal funds for road repair.
2. Board member Kawano asked about Hurricane Katrina and New Orleans. Neuschwander did not comment on the national political level, but on his level, he is more concerned about informing the public about available assistance.

Chair Steelquist thanked Neuschwander.

Councilmember Rod Tam- No representative was present. Councilmember Tam's newsletter was distributed.

Councilmember Ann Kobayashi- No representative was present.

Mayor Mufi Hannemann's representative- (8:17 p.m.) Mary Pat Waterhouse, Director, Budget and Fiscal Services, reported the following:

1. Concerning the removal of bus stops on Kapiolani Boulevard, it is DTS' policy to involve the Neighborhood Boards in the discussion. Chair Steelquist already reported on them and added one on Beretania Street and one on King Street.
2. Concerning the parking spaces to be removed from Piikoi Street mauka from the Makiki Fire Station, only one parking space would be removed.
3. Concerning the re-stripping of Makiki Street, DTS will conduct a traffic study and inform the Neighborhood Board by August 2006.
4. Concerning the Makiki Library, it is about 50 percent complete. The estimated completion time is January 2007. Board member Zuiker asked about a walking path or trail around the Makiki District Park. Chair Steelquist did not remember that it was funded. Board member Kawano asked about the Administration Building. Mayor's representative Waterhouse would follow up.
5. Concerning the request that the Department of Planning and Permitting move the scheduled public hearing on the Contemporary Museum Conditional Use Permit (CUP) on May 19 to a venue in the Makiki community in the evening, the DPP sent a letter to everyone, including Chair Steelquist, denying the request.
6. Mayor's representative Waterhouse asked if Thomas Square was still an issue. Chair Steelquist explained that back in January someone asked if Thomas Square was closing at 10:00 p.m. The Neighborhood Board wanted to know about any possible closing and the reasons for the closing. The Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR) is waiting for a Board decision. This item has been on the agenda, but the Board had no strong feelings any way. It is waiting for the HPD or the DPR to give the facts supporting park closure. Mayor's representative Waterhouse understood that Park rules and regulations require approval from both the Neighborhood Board and the Parks Board before a park can be closed. She had some HPD statistics. From January 2006 to March 2006, enforcement activities in Thomas Square resulted in 44 illegal camping citations, 9 persons interviewed for suspicious or unusual activity, 4 warrant arrests, 4 trespass warnings, and 1 arrest for open lewdness. Officers will continue to monitor this location for illegal activities.
7. Concerning the Makiki Stream, the section makai of King Street to the Ala Wai Canal is being scheduled for maintenance by City crews to remove the silt and debris deposited from the recent period of heavy

storms in the next 60 days. Chair Steelquist mentioned that the Board is happy that the City cleared out the trash before the rains, but now there is dirt, mauka of Wilder Avenue. Senator Fukunaga mentioned that the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) has jurisdiction of the Makiki Stream above King Street.

8. In March there was a suggestion to change bulky item pick up to the first Wednesday of the month. To change a schedule would be very difficult and costly. The good news is that they are looking at additional crews for the urban area, not necessarily a second pick up.
9. Board member Zuiker requested an update on the use of volunteers to help Department of Facility Maintenance (DFM) repair and maintain sidewalks in Makiki. Mayor's representative Waterhouse stated that she would get back to the Board once the Corporation Counsel opinion is completed. The community group would still have to be bonded. Zuiker suggested that one or two City people would be bonded and the forty volunteers would work under them. Mayor's representative Waterhouse wants to wait for the opinion.
10. Board member Kawano mentioned the asphalt shortage that was in the news. Mayor's representative Waterhouse offered to find out from DFM how much asphalt they have on hand. Board member Allan Lee mentioned a newspaper article that stated that the suppliers have more than enough asphalt.
11. Board member Kawano requested a "mid-term sewer report" for the Makiki District. When Mayor's representative Waterhouse went to a briefing on the Waikiki sewers, she learned that one of the things that contributed to the recent break was that so much sand goes through the pipes that it erodes the pipes faster. Senator Fukunaga added that when the late Patsy Mink was a City Councilmember, the Makiki sewers were redone in two years. They used the latest technology of tunneling from Wilder Avenue to the University of Hawaii at night. There was very little noise and vibrations. Chair Steelquist also mentioned that the quick and good job done a few years ago on Beretania Street in front of the Honolulu Academy of Arts.
12. Concerning the re-stripping of Makiki Street, Chair Steelquist explained that there is parking on one side and no parking on the other, but the stripe goes down the center, making it narrow on the parking side. Department of Transportation Services (DTS) will look at it again and report back in August 2006.

Chair Steelquist thanked Mayor's representative Waterhouse for catching up on the reports from the last two months.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS:

Contemporary Art Museum Construction- (8:34 p.m.) Georgianna Lagoria reported that the public hearing is tomorrow at 10:30 a.m. at the Honolulu Hale Annex auditorium. Chair Steelquist mentioned that he received additional materials from the Contemporary Museum. Resident Ray Sasaki presented two letters, which may affect a Board vote to support the proposed renovations. One letter was from Director Henry Eng of the Department of Planning and Permitting (DPP) stating that they will investigate if the Contemporary Museum (TCM) violated the Conditional Use Permit (CUP) No. 86/CUP-10. The other letter was from Wendy Johnson, Vice President of the Hawaii Audubon Society, whose board of directors is concerned that the reflective glass surfaces may pose a significant danger to wild birds in a wooded area. Keith Kurahashi, representing TCM, presented a summary. Tracy Miyahara expressed her concern that she learned about the DPP letter only 24 hours before the public hearing.

Chair Steelquist mentioned that he would testify at the public hearing and requested a motion, similar to one that was made five years ago.

Board member Richard Kawano moved and Board member Allan Lee seconded that the Makiki/Lower Punchbowl/Tantalus Neighborhood Board No. 10 recognizes the serious problem and urges the neighbors and the Contemporary Museum to continue to work together in the future. The motion carried, 9-0-1. Vice Chair Carole abstained.

Board member Joe Zuiker moved and Board member Martin Schiller seconded that the Makiki/Lower Punchbowl/Tantalus Neighborhood Board No. 10 supports the Contemporary Museum's application for a Conditional Use Permit (CUP). Board member Zuiker spoke in favor of the motion, mentioning the benefits of the Contemporary Museum (TCM) and the proposed expansion. Board member Schiller read two letters and mentioned that he received more three e-mails from supporting to opposing TCM and/or the renovation.

There was some discussion over Ray Sasaki having a "conflict of interest" by being on the Board of Trustees of The Contemporary Museum (TCM), but opposing expansion plans.

Board member Bigay requested clarification of the "B-2" and "R-10" zoning classifications. Georgianna Lagoria explained that churches and museum are allowed in the "B-2" districts.

Ray Sasaki offered some additional comments about DPP investigations into alleged violations.

Board member Zuiker stated, "Let the minutes reflect" that prior to the last vote (at the May 4 Special Board meeting), he disclosed that one of his employee's first husband worked as a landscaper at The Contemporary Museum.

Ray Sasaki defended his disagreements with the rest of TCM Board.

Board member Zuiker moved and Board member Schiller seconded to call for the vote. The motion carried, 9-0-1. Vice Chair Carole abstained.

The motion was "that the Makiki/Lower Punchbowl/Tantalus Neighborhood Board No. 10 supports the Contemporary Museum's application for a Conditional Use Permit (CUP)." The motion did not carry, 4-3-3. A vote of 9 (quorum) was needed to pass. Yea- Thistleton, Zuiker, Lee and Schiller. Nay- Kawano, Lai Young and Carole. Abstained- Hillmann, Bigay and Steelquist. Chair Steelquist announced that the Board was split on this issue in the past and continues to see both sides.

Chair Steelquist thanked The Contemporary Museum and the neighbors.

Makiki Tantalus Recreation Area- No report.

Makiki District Library- Vice Chair Carole mentioned that the completion would be in January 2007.

Makiki District Park- Chair Steelquist mentioned graffiti on the walls again. He has received e-mails about graffiti and litter from residents and would place this matter on the agenda.

Makiki Heights Care Home- No report.

1214 Matlock Street- Board member Kawano reported "nothing new." It is being cleaned up.

Bulky Item Pick-up- Chair Steelquist mentioned that the Mayor's representative Waterhouse reported on this. He said it might be faster, but not more than once a month.

Support for Roosevelt High School- Previously discussed.

Thomas Square Park closing at 10:00 p.m.- Previously discussed.

NEW BUSINESS

Makiki Floods and Road Repair on Roundtop- Previously discussed.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Planning and Zoning- No report.

Transportation- No report.

Health, Safety, and Wellness- No report.

Newsletter- Treasurer Schiller had mentioned that Publicity Account was -\$503 after paying for the newsletter. He suggested moving money from the Operating Account to the Publicity Account to cover the deficit.
