DRAFT REGULAR MEETING MINUTES
THURSDAY, OCTOBER 13, 2016
OAHU VETERANS CENTER

CALL TO ORDER: Chair David Yomes called the meeting to order at 7:01 p.m. **Quorum was established with eight (8) members present.** Note: This nine (9) member Board requires five (5) members to establish quorum and to take official Board action.

Board Members Present: Larry Baird, Eric Ching, David Czar, Patti Igawa, Chandra Kanemaru, Lennard Pepper, Roderick Spadinger, and David Yomes.

Board Members Absent: Dennis Egge.

Roll Call of Board Members: Quorum was established with eight (8) members present.

CITY AND COUNTY POLICE/FIRE

Honolulu Fire Department (HFD): Fire Fighter III Johnathan Kam reported the following:

- September 2016 Fire Statistics: There was 1 structure fire, 0 wildland/brush fires, 1 nuisance fire, 0 cooking fires, and 9 activated alarms with no fire. There were 130 medical emergencies, 2 motor vehicle collisions with pedestrian, 9 motor vehicle crashes/collisions, 1 mountain rescue, 0 ocean rescues, and 2 hazardous materials incidents.
- Halloween Safety Tip: When selecting a costume, stay away from long, trailing fabric. Trailing fabric can become a trip hazard or may attach to an object that can cause the individual to fall. If creating a homemade costume, select fire resistant materials. When providing a mask for children, ensure that the eye holes are large enough for the child to see out from. Provide children with flashlights or glow sticks so that the child can see and be seen. It is safest to use a flashlight or battery-operated candle for a jack-o-lantern. Real candles should not be used, as it may be an ignition source for fire if left unattended. However, if real candles are used, ensure that children are well supervised at all times when candles are lit.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed: Nuisance Fires: Baird asked for the definition of a nuisance fire. Fire Fighter III Kam will follow-up.

Honolulu Police Department (HPD) District 3-Pearl City: Sergeant Richard Jang reported the following: September 2016 Crime Statistics: There were 4 motor vehicle thefts, 2 burglaries, 11 thefts and 4 unauthorized entries into motor vehicles (UEMV); and a total of 6,152 calls for service and 367 calls for service for beat 384.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed: Tailgating: A community member asked if HPD could better monitor the issue of motorists tailgating. Chair Yomes noted that individuals should call 911 and report those who tailgate.

Honolulu Police Department District 5-Kalihi: Sergeant Brent Bonnell reported the following: September 2016 Crime Statistics: There were 3 motor vehicle thefts, 1 burglary, 15 thefts and 6 unauthorized entries into motor vehicles (UEMV); and a total of 631 calls for service for beat 550/551.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed:

1. Traffic Signals: A community member raised a safety concern about the traffic signals along Salt Lake Boulevard at the intersection of Ala Lilikoi Street and at Arizona Road and that there are instances when motorists go through a red light due to not seeing the traffic signal. The community member also raised a concern that it is difficult to make a turn at the traffic lights. Sergeant Bonnell will follow-up.
2. Speeding on Ala Napunani Street: Chair Yomes commented that a concerned resident relayed to him that speeding still continues on Ala Napunani Street and that drivers need to play their part to be safe drivers and to report speeding motor vehicle's license plate number and call 911.
3. Traffic Signal Barrier: Baird commented that there were previously plans to install a barrier around the traffic signal around the first traffic signal. Baird also suggested if barriers or distinguishable lights on the traffic signals could be considered along Salt Lake Boulevard for the two (2) traffic signals at the intersections along Salt Lake Boulevard on Arizona Road and Ala Lilikoi Street as a safety measure. Baird further clarified that the barriers discussed is supposed to prevent drivers from seeing the second traffic signal at the next intersection. Czar suggested that the traffic lights could be of differing colors to make it more distinctive.
4. Board Priorities: Pepper commented about the Board's priorities and requested that the total calls for service be broken down into specific categories as to what the calls were for. Sergeant Bonnell answered that he will follow-up, but the information is also on www.honolulu.gov. Chair Yomes commented about the crime statistics have been standardized for several years by HPD.

COMMUNITY CONCERNS: Resident Noelle McMillan noted that on Ala Lilikoi Street, at the Salt Lake Shopping Center side of the road, there is a difficulty designating where it is appropriate to legally park on the curb in relation to the red painted curb area; fire hydrant; and no parking sign. McMillan believes that individuals are only ticketed when bus drivers call 911 due to difficulty navigating in the area.

GOVERNMENT OFFICIAL REPORTS

Governor David Ige's Representative: Deputy Director Jo Ann Uchida Takeuchi, Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs, announced that copies of the Capital Connection newsletter were circulated and highlighted the following:

- Hearing for Biosecurity Plan: Governor Ige held several public meetings in October 2016 regarding measures to improve the State's policies regarding the threat of invasive species.
- Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) Public Meeting: There will be a public meeting regarding ESSA, at Moanalua High School at 6:00 p.m. on Wednesday, November 2, 2016. Community feedback regarding the project is due by Tuesday, March 7, 2017.
- Completion of a Change Order Relating to Drain Repair on Salt Lake Boulevard: Many of the questions relating to the Salt Lake Boulevard area is due to the completion of a change order relating to drain repair on Salt Lake Boulevard.
- Kahuapaani Street Off-Ramp Signage: The construction work sign near the Kahuapaani Street Off-ramp is still in effect. The contractor is completing contract work at another site before returning to the site.
- Loop Detector: The loop detector at the intersection of Kahuapaani Street and Salt Lake Boulevard will be investigated once the repaving work on the right lane is completed.
- Ala Alii Street Sidewalk Repair: Once work is complete with the change order relating to the drain repair on Salt Lake Boulevard, the contractor will be required to repair the sidewalk on Ala Alii Street.
- Electric Box at the Median of Puuloa Road and Salt Lake Boulevard: Department of Transportation (HDOT) will take action about the concern of homeless individuals residing near the electric box at the median of Puuloa Road and Salt Lake Boulevard when necessary.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed:

1. Aloha Stadium: Pepper commented about the Aloha Stadium being released of its requirement to be used for recreational purposes and a committee being formed by the stadium manager. Pepper further commented that the committee's purpose is too important to be led by just the stadium manager and recommend that Governor Ige appoint someone to lead the committee. Pepper further suggested that community members should be considered to be members of the committee.
2. Kahuapaani Street Off-Ramp Signage: Baird noted his disappointment that the construction work at Kahuapaani Street off-ramp was delayed for several years and not completed in a timely manner.
3. Ala Alii Street Sidewalk Repair: Ching clarified that the gravel used to create a driveway on Ala Alii Street by the contractor needs to be removed once work is completed.

4. Corner of Loina Place and Luapele Place: Ching requested that the street lights at the corner of Loina Place and Luapele Place needs to be repaired.
5. Electric Box: Spadinger commented about the safety concern with the electric box at the median of Puuloa Road and Salt Lake Boulevard being left open and suggested that the box be concealed.

Mayor Kirk Caldwell's Representative: Director Robert Kroning, Department of Design and Construction (DDC) reported the highlights in the City's Newsletter and the following:

- Make-A-Difference Month: October 2016 is Make-A-Difference month with the Department of Facility Maintenance (DFM) Storm Water Quality Branch. Community residents are encouraged to volunteer at any of the following clean-up events: Saturday, October 15, 2016 with Pearl Harbor Bike Path Clean Up; Friday, October 21, 2016 with Kailua Adopt-A-Block; Sunday, October 23, 2016 with Palolo Adopt-A-Stream; Friday, October 28, 2016 with Kahawai Adopt-A-Stream; Saturday, October 29, 2016 with Manoa Adopt-A-Stream or Nanakuli Adopt-A-Stream; Saturday, November 5, 2016 with Kalihi Adopt-A-Stream or Waikiki Adopt-A-Block; and Saturday, November 12, 2016 with Ewa Adopt-A-Block. Volunteers must be 12 years of age or older to participate in the clean-up events. For more information, call 768-3300 or visit, www.cleanwaterhonolulu.com.
- Traffic Signals: The Department of Transportation Services (DTS) checked the intersections on Ala Liliroi Street and Arizona Road along Salt Lake Boulevard and determined that there are adequate traffic lights at both intersections. DTS will continue to monitor the intersection and make adjustments as needed.
- Abandoned Vehicles: The Department of Customer Services (CSD) inspectors checked the vicinity of the corner of Haloa Drive and Olino Street and was unable to locate an abandoned vehicle.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed:

1. Political Campaign Signs: Chair Yomes commented about campaign and business signs being posted at the corner of Wainaka Street and Salt Lake Boulevard and asked if the signs could be removed if it is on City property.
2. Traffic Signals: Baird requested that Director Kroning follow-up regarding the concerns brought up under HPD relating to the traffic signals along Salt Lake Boulevard. Director Kroning will follow-up.
3. Waste: A community member commented about waste flowing into the Salt Lake Waterways due to Tropical Storm Darby and that the waste returned in September 2016. The community member asked that the City should get the Honolulu Country Club to pay for the damage caused by waste flowing into the waterway. Chair Yomes asked if his community board is doing anything on the issue. The community member answered in the negative.

Senator Glenn Wakai: Senator Wakai circulated a newsletter and highlighted the following:

- Multi-Purpose Room at Radford High School: The Multi-Purpose Room at Radford High School is nearing completion. In 2013, Senator Wakai and Representative Aaron Johanson secured additional funds to finish the classroom which will be used for the school's culinary program. In September 2016, a \$2,532,900 contract was awarded to finish the room. Construction is scheduled to begin in March 2017.
- Radford High School Improvement Projects: Radford High School was awarded up to \$1 million in improvements, including drainage improvements; re-roofing to several buildings and portables; repeating the interior of building E and adding electrical circuits to building M; and the cafeteria will be repainted and will include the relining of the chill box.
- Moanalua High School Track Construction: Construction of the Moanalua High School track will start in November 2016.
- Electric Box: Senator Wakai is working on the concern about the safety concern with an electric box at the intersection of Salt Lake Boulevard and Puuloa Road and will provide an update at the next regular meeting.

Questions, comments, and concerns:

1. Plastic Bag Ban: Spadinger asked if the State could look into a study relating to the effectiveness of the plastic bag ban. Senator Wakai responded that the State could implement a study, but commented about the cost of the study.
2. Electrical Circuits: Baird asked why electrical circuits will be installed into building M of Radford High School. Senator Wakai noted that he did not have the details about the project.
3. Radford High School Bleachers: Czar commented about the visitor bleachers at Radford High School being too low and suggested if the old risers could be put back. Senator Wakai will follow-up with the Department of Education (DOE).

Councilmember Joey Manahan: Councilmember Manahan circulated a newsletter presented the following:

- Bill 50 Relating to Road Rage: Bill 50 was deferred due to testimony from HPD stating that Bill 50 would be difficult to enforce and that there are some First Amendment issues. It was suggested that the State Legislature to review the Bill.
- Salt Lake District Park Pool Heaters: About \$440,000 was appropriated for the Salt Lake District Park pool heaters. Councilmember Manahan talked with Mayor Kirk Caldwell who had expressed his support in the release of the funds for the pool heaters. Councilmember Manahan will follow-up with the Board when the funds will officially be released.
- Abandon Vehicle: Councilmember Manahan thanked the City for its efforts in towing away the abandoned vehicle at Haloa Drive.
- Salt Lake Waterway: Pending legislation regarding the Salt Lake Waterway is being drafted by DFM and will be introduced by Councilmember Manahan. Councilmember Manahan has attempted to discuss the issue with the Honolulu Country Club.
- Streetlight Repairs: DFM repaired the streetlights at 1616 Ala Hahanui Street. If there are any streetlights that are in need of repair, contact Councilmember Manahan's Office at 768-5007, or contact DFM at 768-5300.
- Grass Cut at the Median Strip of Haloa Drive: A request was submitted for the grass to be cut at the median strip of Haloa Drive.
- Ala Napunani Street Road Resurfacing Project: The Ala Napunani Street Road Resurfacing project will begin in late 2016 and will include the restriping of the lanes. Residents were notified about the project.
- Aloha Stadium: Councilmember Manahan agrees that there needs to be an advisory group regarding the concerns at Aloha Stadium and that potential investors for Aloha Stadium is being considered. Portions of Aloha Stadium is on City property.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed:

1. Salt Lake District Park Pool Heaters: Director Kroning announced that the funds for the Salt Lake District Park pool heaters was released.
2. Complete Streets Project at Ala Napunani Street: Director Kroning announced that an individual was hired to manage the Complete Streets project and that Ala Napunani Street was reviewed. Director Kroning further stated that a proposal may be introduced to reconfigure the street from four (4) lanes to two (2) and include a turn lane.

At 7:58 p.m., Chair Yomes relinquished the gavel to Pepper and departed from the meeting. Seven (7) members were present.

3. Bill 50 Relating to Road Rage: Baird commented that the traffic lights need to be synchronized to reduce the behavior of road rage. Councilmember Manahan responded that once the Joint Management Traffic Center is established, DTS and HDOT can better work together to improve the synchronization of the traffic lights. Baird commented about the traffic lights configuration at Nimitz Highway at night not working well.

At 8:00 p.m., Chair Yomes returned to the meeting and Pepper returned the gavel to Chair Yomes. Eight (8) members were present.

4. Aloha Stadium: Pepper suggested that the committee for Aloha Stadium needs to include community members. Councilmember Manahan noted that it could be considered to invite Aloha Stadium staff to present on the issue of future use. Pepper responded that it is too soon to schedule a presentation on this issue at this time.
5. Man Hole Replacement: Czar noted that the man holes need to be replaced and the road work in Foster Village needs to be completed. Director Kroning noted that the contractor is working on the issue. Czar commented about his motor vehicle being damaged by the construction work. Director Kroning that there are signs with the contact number for the contractor to address concerns about the project.
6. Plastic Bag Ban: Spadinger commented about the plastic bag ban and asked if the Council is considering what the community thinks about the plastic bag ban. Councilmember Manahan responded that the City does not have the infrastructure to recycle plastic bags. Councilmember Manahan further responded that a study about the effectiveness of the ban could be considered. Councilmember Manahan suggested that the issue about plastic bag ban should be considered at the State level. Czar commented that plastic bags get sent to H-Power.

7. Delay with City Services: Pepper commented about the delays with City services and that there are more abandoned vehicles on Olin Street.

Representative Linda Ichiyama: Representative Ichiyama circulated a newsletter and reported the following:

- Photo Session Fundraiser: There will be a holiday photo session with Kenneth's Photography at Salt Lake Elementary School Library from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on Saturday, October 29, 2016.
- Intersection of Puuloa Road and Salt Lake Boulevard: Baird presented a map to Representative Ichiyama regarding the traffic light configuration at the intersection of Puuloa Road and Salt Lake Boulevard and it will be reviewed by HDOT in part of a larger traffic study.
- Plastic Stanchions: HDOT reviewed the plans for plastic stanchions along Salt Lake Boulevard towards Ala Napunani Street and raised a concern that creating a dedicated right hand turn would make it pedestrian safety concern. Chair Yomes clarified that his suggestion was to move the crosswalk at the corner of Salt Lake Boulevard and Puuloa Road upward about 10 feet so that motor vehicles making the right turn would be able to make eye contact with pedestrians using the crosswalk.

Representative Aaron Johanson: Cody Hesarling circulated a newsletter and reported the following: Community Talk Story: There will be a Community Talk Story event at the Pearl Ridge Elementary School Cafeteria at 7:00 p.m. to 8:30 p.m.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed: State versus City Sponsored Meetings: Ching asked for a comparison between a Neighborhood Board meeting and a State Town Hall meeting. Hesarling answered that a town hall meeting could cover a larger scope of the community and is a State sponsored event whereas a Neighborhood Board meeting is City sponsored. Hesarling further noted that town hall meeting also includes more State officials.

COMMUNITY UPDATES

Honolulu Authority for Rapid Transportation (HART): Chris Wong from HART reported the following:

- West Oahu Station: Drill Shaft Operation for Station Foundation work is being done.
- Farrington Station: Drill Shaft Operation for Station Foundation work is being done.
- Kamehameha Highway Station: Received Notice to Proceed (NOP) Order in October 2016.
- West Oahu Farrington Guideway: Operation of median, road restoration, and signal foundation is being wrapped up to be completed by the end of 2017.
- Kamehameha Highway Guideway: Operation of median, road restoration, and signal foundation has begun. The span from Kaonohi Street to Kanuku Street, the truss is being demobilized. Kiewit will also be doing construction work in the area for utility operations.
- Aloha Stadium Station: The final drill shaft was completed. Columns are now being filled.
- Holiday Hours: In the near future, holiday construction hours will be implemented.
- Traffic Updates: For traffic updates, visit, www.honolulustransit.org or contact 566-2299.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed: Campbell Industrial Park: Ching asked about the precast work at Campbell Industrial Park. Wong answered that Kiewit is turning over precast yard to a new contractor.

U. S. Military: Victor Flint circulated a handout about Red Hill and reported the following:

- Red Hill Town Hall Meeting: The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), Department of Health (DOH), US Navy, and the Defense Logistics Agency held their annual public meeting on the Red Hill Administrative Order on Consent (AOC). The meeting will was held at Moanalua Middle School on Thursday, October 6, 2016. There were issues of individuals protesting at the meeting.
- Water Quality at Red Hill: The water is clean and safe. There are no fuel leaks and plans will be implemented to prevent future fuel leaks.
- More Information: For more information about Red Hill, contact 473-0662.
- BWS Plans: The BWS have plans to build three (3) more wells on Red Hill. EPA has advised BWS that the construction would be expensive and would be a hazard that could endanger the aquifer.
- US Navy Plan: The US Navy plan is currently under review.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed:

1. Monitoring Wells: Ching commented about the confusion that BWS instilled about the information of the aquifer and the monitoring wells. Ching further commented about his anticipation for the US Navy's

upgrade plans for the Red Hill facility. Flint responded that ground water is water that is in the ground and that the US Navy strategically determined where to drill the monitoring wells. Flint further noted that the monitoring wells are located into the aquifer to monitor the aquifer and that there are constituents in the ground water that are not from Red Hill.

2. Water at Red Hill: Baird commented about the differencing statement from BWS that the water at red hill was not contaminated at the Red Hill Town Hall meeting and that the water was contaminated at the September 2016 Board meeting. Baird further commented that there were no facts to back up why the water may be contaminated. Baird stressed the need for a presentation about this issue in 2017.
3. Hydrocarbon: Czar asked if hydrocarbon was found in the ground water and if the hydrocarbon could come from motor vehicles. Flint answered that hydrocarbons were found but is unsure of the source.
4. Town Hall Meeting: Chair Yomes asked and Flint answered that the Red Hill Town Hall meeting was in part of the agreement for the AOC. Chair Yomes further commented about statements made by US Navy and BWS.

SCHOOLS: There was no representative; no report was provided.

BOARD OF WATER SUPPLY (BWS): Aaron Acosta reported the following:

- September 2016 Main Breaks: There were no water main breaks.
- 2016 to 2017 Halawa Xeriscape Garden Workshop Schedule: The BWS and Friends of Halawa Xeriscape Garden continue to offer workshops that highlight the concept of xeriscaping. The new 2016 to 2017 xeriscape workshop schedule features dozens of new and popular workshops that offer useful tips on how to maintain a beautiful and water-efficient garden. - Sea Level of Wells: The Halawa Shaft is 100 feet above sea level which is drilled down to the aquifer.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed:

1. Disaster Emergency Plan: Pepper requested that the BWS review their disaster emergency plans.
2. Aquifer: Baird asked for the distance from sea level and the location of the aquifer.

BOARD BUSINESS

Request to have High School Video Tape Regular Meetings: Chair Yomes reported that the request to have Radford High School video tape the regular board meetings will be delayed and that the contract cannot be switched over to Radford High School or another vendor until negotiated in January 2017.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed: Videotaping Contract: Pepper expressed the urgency to ensure that Radford High School is not excluded from the videotaping contract. Chair Yomes responded that he will work on the issue to make sure that Radford High School will be able to do the videotaping of Board meetings starting in February 2017.

PRESENTATIONS

Community Impact Study Regarding Military Bases: Jeff Donahue from Weston Solutions reported the following: US Army's Force Reduction Action at Schofield Barracks and Fort Shafter: The Mayor's Office of the Economic Development (OED) has procured through a grant funding an economic study relating to the US Army's force action at Schofield Barracks and Fort Shafter. The first phase of the analysis/assessment includes outreach to the communities in the Schofield and Fort Shafter areas to determine communities most impacted. Retail, education, defense contracts, workforce and labor related impacts will be reviewed. Community Impact surveys were circulated for the public to fill out.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed:

1. Strategic Impact: Ching asked if the strategic impact will be evaluated. Donahue answered that Weston Solutions is only evaluating the impacts for the City.
2. US Army Troop Reductions: Spadinger asked and Donahue answered that the economic study will only address the City impacts and will not specifically evaluate how to change the decision regarding the troop reductions. Donahue further added that after the studies are completed, Weston Solutions will also determine damage mitigation strategies for the City. Donahue further commented that impacts may include reduction of student enrollment, and reduction to workforce.
3. Updates: Chair Yomes noted that he welcomes the return of Weston Solutions to provide an update at the next regular meeting.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Salt Lake Boulevard Widening: There was no report at this time.

HART Rail Transit Project: There was no report at this time.

CHAIR'S REPORT: Chair Yomes noted that each Board member received copies of correspondences he received.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Treasurer Spadinger reported a balance of \$255.49 for September 2016.
