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DRAFT – REGULAR MEETING MINUTES
THURSDAY, MAY 14, 2009
EWA BEACH PUBLIC LIBRARY

CALL TO ORDER: Chair Kurt Fevella called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m., **with a quorum of eight (8) members present.** Chair Fevella explained that the Board would be unable to take action on agenda items, but that reports and discussion would still be allowed. Note: This 11 member Board requires six (6) votes for a quorum and to take official action.

INTRODUCTION OF BOARD MEMBERS: Board members introduced themselves at this time. Chair Fevella congratulated Oscar Ramiscal and the Campbell High School Saber Media for taking second in the nation at a competition in Florida during the Spring break.

By UNANIMOUS CONSENT, the State Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) Division of conservation and Resources Enforcement (DOCARE) was added to the agenda, 7- 0-0 (, Berg, Fevella, Knauer, C. Lacuesta, Lynn, Purdy, Tynanes).

By UNANIMOUS CONSENT, the Hoopili Project was added to the agenda, 7- 0- 0 (Berg, Fevella, Knauer, C. Lacuesta, Lynn, Purdy, Tynanes).

Filling of Vacant Board Seat (replacing Clint Gueso) – Lynn nominated Taetuli Tafai to fill the vacancy. By UNANIMOUS CONSENT, Taetuli Tafai was appointed to fill the vacancy, 7-0-0 (Berg, Fevella, Knauer, C. Lacuesta, Lynn, Purdy, Tynanes); **eight members now present.** NA Frank administered the oath of office.

REPORTS:

Honolulu Fire Department (HFD) – Capt. D. Lee reported:

- **Statistics for April 2009** – 3 structures, 3 wildland, 7 rubbish, 2 vehicles, 94 medical and 32 miscellaneous calls.
- **Fire Safety Tip** – The risk of wildland fires increases as summer approaches. Make a 30-foot wide fire break by clearing vegetation and clutter around all structures. Some wildland fires could force the evacuation of neighborhoods. Have an emergency preparedness plan ready in case of such an event. Consider the route you would take and other preparations you could have in place if you need to evacuate your home due to an emergency. If your property borders an area where wildland fire could occur, consider the need for fire department access in case the fire approaches your home.



- Follow up: Ma Ke Kula Cleanup – The area was checked today and any violations will be reported to the Fire Prevention Bureau for follow up and possible citation.

Question, comment, and concerns followed:

1. Fire Safety Hazards on Private Properties – Report properties that pose a fire hazard or wildland to HFD Fire Prevention Bureau. HFD are doing rolling inspections in all areas and when they see a hazard the Fire Prevention Bureau is notified and a violation citation is issued to the property owner.

Honolulu Police Department (HPD) – Sgt. E. Namoca circulated the statistics report and highlighted:

- Community Police Team (CPT) Message of the Month: This is the time of year when our children will be graduating from high school or will be going on there summer break. As parents and guardians, we have an obligation to educate our children the importance of driving safely and the importance of not drinking alcohol while under the age of 21. With graduation parties coming up in the next few months, HPD will be doing their part to protect the communities and our children from careless drivers by continuing traffic enforcements, implementing roadblocks, and also Traffic Awareness Sign waving campaigns throughout the island. We all need to do our part to make our roads safe for everyone. On behalf of Major Michael Moses and the men and women of the Kapolei Police Station, have a safe and happy summer.
- Ewa Weed & Seed Unit (HPD) – Sgt. E. Namoca circulated the Weed & Seed statistics and was available for questions.

Questions, comments and concerns followed:

1. District 8 was thanked for doing a good job in the Ewa Beach area.
2. Community members were encouraged to join the Neighborhood Policing Team. It was noted that graduation season is near and schools have “Project Graduation” for graduates to be safe and have fun without using alcohol.

Bautista arrived at 7:20 p.m.; nine members now present.

Mayor Mufi Hannemann’s Representative – Ross Tanimoto reported:

- Hanakahi Street Bus Shelter – In August 2008, there was a count of 23 passengers boarding per day,
- Provided by the City Department of Transportation Services as an average total daily boarding count for the bus stop on Roosevelt Avenue at Fort Barrette Road. The boarding and counts are weekday averages from December 2008 to February 2009 for all bus stops on Roosevelt Avenue. The counts are broken down by trip time and include all the trips for each bus stop. The highest count of 17 passengers boarding, were at the bus stops at Roosevelt Avenue opposite Bougainville Street and Fort Barrette Road.
- Ewa Mahiko Park Racquet Ball and Community Swimming Pool Request – Is still under review by the City’s Department of Design and Construction (DDC).
- Cleaning and Maintenance of the Ewa Beach Canal of Pohakupuna Road - Due to lack of personnel and funding, there is no set schedule for stream maintenance. Streams are maintained on a need basis. Parts of Honouliuli Stream are privately owned and not under the City’s jurisdiction. Please specify the area of request.
- Pohakupuna Road Repaving – Presently this road is not programmed to be resurfaced, but has been identified as in need of resurfacing and will be programmed for contract resurfacing as funds become available. The Division of Road Maintenance (DRM) staff routinely inspects all City owned and maintained roadways island wide to determine the roadway’s pavement condition. All roadways found to be in need of rehabilitation will be programmed for contract rehabilitation, which involves removal of prior asphalt overlays through cold planning, reconstruction of failed pavement areas where the pavement structures has deteriorated to where it can no longer support the traffic loads and resurfacing with a new asphalt concrete surface course.

Questions, comment and concerns followed:

1. Hanakahi Street Bus Stop – Follow up will be done as to how the counts are taken and during what time frame. It was also requested that the bus counts be taken between 4:30 and 6:00 a.m. (peak times) and that the Board be contacted so a member could witness the counts.
2. Pohakupuna Drainage – Follow up will be done regarding a previous request that water was going into the ocean and not the drain.
3. A comment was made that the community need City service that need to be compromised and stated that the City has other priorities on their list.
4. Ewa Region Plan – It was noted that the Ewa region has no development plan and that the Ewa Development Plan has been delayed and is 10 years late for public review.
5. Papipi Road – What happened to the money allocated for drainage, sidewalks, etc and the existing wall problem on the side of this road.
6. Follow up will be done regarding a substandard drain reported fronting Ewa Beach Elementary School where water is going into the ocean and not flowing into the drain at the corner.

Belford arrived at 7:27 p.m.; 10 members now present.

Board of Water Supply – The written report was provided.

Councilmember Todd Apo – Tracy Omori distributed the written report and highlighted:

- A special Budget Committee meeting is scheduled for Monday, May 18, 2009 at 9:00 a.m. to discuss CD2 amendments, CD, and Capital Improvement Projects.

Questions, comments and concerns followed:

1. Sgt. Pacheco from District 8 had provided to the Ewa Neighborhood Security Watch the ordinance that covers all of Ewa Beach.
2. Knauer reiterated that last October all area elected officials were each asked about specific (actual accomplishments) done for the area, and had only received a response from Representative Cabanilla and Knauer again asking the question..
3. Comments – a) \$350 million will be used for rail transit. It was asked how much funding is there for road and sidewalk improvements for Ewa Beach. b) A majority of the people voted for rail transit.
4. Follow up will be done regarding a drainage estimate that was requested for the older side of Ewa Beach.

Without objection, the agenda was taken out of order to Board Business, b. Recognitions.

BOARD BUSINESS:

Recognitions:

Certificate of Recognition - James Campbell High School Saber Media – Chair Fevella presented instructor Oscar Ramiscal and the Campbell High School Media a lei and a Certificate of Recognition for placing second in the Pacific Service announcement category in an on-site competition Student Television Network Convention in Orlando Florida during the spring break. Oscar Ramiscal thanked the Board and noted this is the second year of national competition, for James Campbell High and Saber Media students.

Certificate of Appreciation - Rich Hargrave was presented a lei and a Certificate of Appreciation for his services as a former Board Chair, Board member, and for his dedication to the community. Chair Fevella announced that refreshments were available outside of the library.

The agenda order resumed.

State Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) Division of Conservation & Resources Enforcement (DOCARE) – Field Supervisor W. Mundy introduced Officer Guy Humphreys, and noted that they are assigned to the Leeward area.

- Last summer manpower for the Leeward area was increased to seven officers and one field supervisor. DOCARE has a total of 28 officers. DOCARE is State law enforcement pertaining to sea/water, hunting, etc., and work with HPD, Weed & Seed, and the Parks Departments.
- Complaints have been received about a Hawaiian monk seal (endangered species list) lying on an area beach being harassed by children and teenagers. The incident is under investigation.

Questions, comment and concerns followed:

1. Call 643-DLNR (3567) to report suspicious activity or endangered species being harmed.
2. Lacuesta announced a field trip to a Hawaiian site (federal bird preservation) in Kapolei (next to parcel 24) on Saturday, May 30, 2009 at 9:00 a.m. It was recommended that hard soled shoes be worn. The bird preservation was turned over by the federal government to the State Department of Hawaiian Home Lands. Other sites in the reserve are still under federal jurisdiction.
3. It was mentioned that DOCARE officers were witnessed issuing citations at One`ula Beach Park.
4. Regarding a penalty, the monk seal is protected under the environmental protection act and several state and federal acts. Charges may run from a misdemeanor up to \$1,000 fine. Joint enforcements are in agreement with the National Wild Service and violators are referred to the federal agency.
5. A request was made to check the Haseko Development are be check for encroachment of the federal bird reserve area on the west end.
6. The DLNR Aquatic Division did a preservation area on a Maui shoreline and was asked if a similar idea could be done in Ewa Beach because of the depletion of limu.
7. Follow up will also be done by the Board's Marine Committee Chair.
8. The monk seal incident has been reported to the National Marine Fisheries and HPD is monitoring the area.

Chair Fevella relinquished the gavel to Vice Chair Tynanes.

Resident/Community Concerns:

Outreach Shelters at Barbers Point – Tanya Tehotu, Waianae Community Outreach, asked the Board for a letter of support to be sent to the City Department of Transportation Services (DTS) and State Department of Transportation (DOT) requesting transportation services (in/out) for people living in shelters in Kalaeloa. **Without objection, Chair Fevella will draft a letter to DTS and DOT.**

Chair Fevella reclaimed the gavel.

Hoopili Project – Tom Berg reported: In October 2008, the Board had an opportunity to give testimony regarding the Ewa Development Plan, missed another opportunity in November 2008. The comment period was then extended to the end of January 2009 and finally mid March 2009. No board comments were received in March or April 2009. Chair Fevella explained that due to no keys to the library that meeting was cancelled. However, former Chair Hargrave advised those present that individual comments be submitted. Berg continued that the next hearing is scheduled for May 15, 2009 and to date no comments from the Board have been submitted. On behalf of the Board, he offered to take comments to the Land Use Commission (LUC) meeting on May 15, 2009.

Discussion followed:

1. Knauer commented that at the Board's December Legislative Committee meeting the matter was discussed and words and ideas toward this issue were formulated.
2. It was noted that there will be two more LUC meetings on the issue. A request was made that the Board send a letter asking that the project be delayed until the residents are informed.
3. Chair Fevella relayed that the Hoopili Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS) was put on a previous agenda by the former chair.
4. A comment was made that the community would like to have full information and intricacies relating to the project.
5. A suggestion was made that the verbage delay of the project be included rather than opposition.
6. It was requested that this matter be placed on the June agenda.

Knauer moved recommending that Board member C. Lacuesta represent the Board at the LUC meeting requesting more time for discussion and reaching a conclusion, and delaying their decision. The motion was **ADOPTED, 9-0-0** (Aye: Bautista, Belford, Berg, Fevella, Knauer, Lacuesta, Purdy, Taifai, Tynanes; Abstain – Lynn).

Berg moved, and Belford seconded that the Board sent its previous letter relating to Honowai Street and reiterate the petition for reclassification from agriculture to urban use. The motion was **ADOPTED, 7-2- 1** (Aye: Bautista, Belford, Berg, Fevella, Kanuer, Taifai, Tynanes; No: C. Lacuesta, Lynn; Abstain: Purdy).

20th Annual Kapolei Outstanding Awards – Knauer announced that Chair Fevella was recognized for his individual efforts towards his community.

Review and Acceptance of the Regular Meeting Minutes of April 9, 2009 – **The April 9, 2009 regular meeting minutes were APPROVED AS CORRECTED by UNANIMOUS CONSENT, 10-0-0** (Aye: Bautista, Belford, Berg, Fevella, Knauer, Lacuesta, Lynn, Purdy, Tafai, Tynanes) with the following corrections:

- Page 5, Gentry Homes should read, "...Debbie Luning gave a history about the Gentry development on the Ewa Plains starting with Soda Creek, including the status of some of the major infrastructure improvements. Kapolei Parkway opened in 2006, and Keaunui Drive in October 2007. Eighteen and a half acres of land will be dedicated to the State for a new Middle School..."
- Questions, comments and concerns followed "...1) It was suggested to use tiles for solar energy rather than solar panels..." 2) delete second sentence..." 3) "...A second high school is planned if Ho'opili is approved for development..."

BOARD BUSINESS:

June 11, 2009 Holiday – Knauer moved and Tynanes seconded that the Board meeting be held on **June 18, 2009. By UNANIMOUS CONSENT, the June regular meeting will be held on June 18, 2009, Ewa Beach Public Library at 7:00 p.m., 10-0-0** (Aye: Bautista, Belford, Berg, Fevella, Knauer, Lacuesta, Lynn, Purdy , Tafai, Tynanes).

State Department of Transportation (DOT) – Jiro Sumada gave the following update:

- Fort Weaver Road Widening Project – This \$60 million project will increase the capacity of Fort Weaver Road by adding a lane in each direction from south of Laulaunui Way to Geiger Road. Major complete work thus far includes: a) northbound – Arizona Road to Laulunui Street (three lanes open); b) southbound – Laulaunui Street to Kolowaka Drive, paving, three lanes open North of Old Fort Weaver Road; c) traffic signal at Aawa Drive operational. Anticipated Intersection Openings – a) April 13, 2009, Old Ft. Weaver Road; b) May 31, 2009, Renton Road; c) August 18, 2009, Kolowaka Street; d) August 21, 2009, Geiger Road. Due to the contractor not dedicating enough work crews to the project that caused several delays in the late intersection opening (Ft. Weaver Road – November/December 2008; Old Renton Road intersection January 2009; and Renton Road intersection March 2009). Since that time the contractor has been forced to add more crews to the project and is making better progress. Payments to the contractor have been withheld and State DOT will be pursuing liquidated damages in accordance with the contract terms relating to contractor delays. More personnel and equipment have been added by Hawaiian Dredging and they will try to complete the project by August 21, 2009. Special Duty officers are now assigned at key intersections to assist with better traffic control.
- State DOT has started to include Special Duty Police officers at key intersections to assist with better traffic flow. Morning and afternoon peak traffic can now flow better and reduce the number of motorists that cheat by cutting in front of others waiting in line. For project updates and complaints visit www.hawaii.gov/dot/fortweaver, or call the hotline at 450-1555.
- North-South Road, Phase 1B – This \$143 million project will be a 4-lane highway connecting Kapolei Parkway, Farrington Highway, and the H-1 Freeway. The total project is being done in three phases: Phase 1A was completed in November 2007, where a 0.8 mile segment between Farrington Highway and Kapolei Parkway was constructed. Phase 1B will construct four lanes from Farrington Highway to Kapolei Parkway and is currently in progress and is scheduled to be complete in early 2010. Current on going work: a) continuing PCC paving (much paving is done at night). B) Highway lighting – installing conduit along North - south Road and at Farrington Highway intersection. c) Drainage channel – excavation ongoing; commencing landscaping. Plans are to open the newly construct four lanes to

traffic in January 2010, but there will be other non-work continuing past January into September of next year.

- North – South Road, Phase 1C – Phase 1C will construct a dew diamond interchange at the H-1 Freeway and construct six (6) lanes to connect with Farrington Highway. Construction anticipated completion is August 2009. The contractor is continuing installation of the traffic signal at the Farrington Highway intersection, streetlights and power pull boxes and duct lines; and constructing the Portland Cement Concrete Pavement (PCCP) anticipated opening date is August 2009. Based on past commitment from the previous State DOT Director, State DOT is now bound to wait until the entire project is completed from the H-1 to the Kapolei Parkway before opening the roadway to traffic. Since Phase 1 is finishing early, State DOT would like the Board's support to open the North – South Interchange to Farrington Highway as soon as construction is completed (August 2009).

Questions, comments and concerns followed:

1. Sidewalks at West Loch – It was mentioned that former State DOT Director Harada, promised a sidewalk would be installed on the (small section) Diamond Head Side of Ft. Weaver Road, which is owned by the state (Renton & Ft. Weaver Roads).
2. Follow up will be done about a request for a paved driveway into the cemetery located on the mauka side near Zippy's Restaurant. Under good faith this property was dedicated to the City, but the area is unimproved.
3. State DOT would appreciate any feedback relating to the North-South Road interchange at H-1 upon completion of construction in August 2009.
4. It was noted that Phase 1C be open as soon as possible.
5. Follow up will be done as to the cost for the landscaping on Ft. Weaver Road that has been planted, removed and replanted.
6. It was asked if the intersection of Aawa Street and Renton Road could be monitored during peak times.
7. Follow up will be done regarding a malfunctioning traffic signal near Kamaaina Kids changing every 30 seconds.
8. Follow up will be done if a mid-block pedestrian crosswalk is planned fronting Child and Family Services and if the stop light is permanent.
9. It was noted that why is when State DOT donates property such as concrete barriers, jersey barriers, etc. to a non-profit organization property ends up on State Department of Hawaiian Home Lands (DHHL) Lot 24. Recently, it was observed that the lot had brand new reflectors. According to Linda Ching of DHHL, they have papers for the items. But per State DOT there is no paperwork. Follow-up will be done. It was mentioned that the jersey barriers could be reused instead of being donated to a non-profit organization.
10. Follow up will be done regarding the traffic impact with the proposed 30,000 homes in the next 10 – 15 years.
11. Why was the community not informed about weekend work, what time is the contractor supposed to get off the road Monday through Fridays.
12. Why was the community informed about the North/South Road night activities? It was reported that incidents are happening causing injuries to workers and not being reported by the contractor to DOT. It was asked if this is a common practice with this contractor. Workers were told they would lose their jobs if the incidents were reported.
13. It was reported that semi-truck drivers are making a u-turn while on their cell phones.
14. Follow up will be done regarding the projected opening of Kapolei Parkway.
15. Announcement – Town Hall Meeting, Wednesday, June 3, 2009, West Loch Golf Course at 6:00 p.m. Notices will be sent out.

Berg moved and Tafai seconded that Phase 1C, H-1 Freeway to Farrington Highway is opened upon the completion. The motion was UNANIMOUSLY ADOPTED, 10-0-0 (Aye: Bautista, Belford Berg, Fevella, Knauer, Lacuesta, Lynn, Purdy, Tafai, Tynanes).

REPORTS:

Treasurer's Report – Treasurer Belford reported Operating Account balance is \$654.18; Publicity Account balance is \$1,100; and Refreshment Account balance is \$120. The report was filed.

Committees:

Executive - Bautista reported that he attended the Neighborhood Commission's May 4, 2009 meeting and observed an electronic voting presentation for this year's Neighborhood Board Elections. An alternative to this voting would be via the telephone.

Legislative & Capital Improvement Program – Berg reported: A) House Concurrent Resolution 108 was deferred by the Senate Transportation Committee. B) HCR 263, relating the Ewa Development Plan, Waianae Sustainable Plan Communities Plan and OMPO, passed the House, with OMPO creating a template with the City Department of Planning and Permitting to share information. C) House Bill 819, relating to crime, was sent to the Conference Committee due to a technicality and referred to the Finance Committee, but was not signed-off by the chair. The Senate had no physical ramifications relative to this bill.

Oahu Metropolitan Planning Organization (OMPO) Citizens' Advisory (CAC) – Chair Fevella reported that he received a letter from OMPO noting that the Board's representative had missed meeting and that a representative must be appointed in order for the Board's seat to be retained. He announced that he has appointed Coby Lynn to represent this Board at the OMPO CAC meetings.

Discussion followed: Belford said that he did not receive a letter regarding his absences and would have liked to been asked about it. He noted confusion because Chair Fevella did not have the letter with him at tonight's meeting.

Elected Officials: Chair Fevella announced that Board of Education representative Breene Harimoto and Governor's representative Tommy Johnson were unable to be in attendance this evening.

Chair Fevella announced that the meeting will end at 9:45 p.m.

Senator Will Espero – Senator Espero circulated his written report and highlighted:

- He recently spoke to the Youth Challenge cadets at the State Capitol.
- Attached with the written report was a handout with the budget deficit solution (pie chart).
- Students from Keoneula and Ewa Elementary Schools visited the State Capitol to learn how government operates.
- Neighborhood Commission Office (NCO) online Board election voting – Poor information has been announced and he sees a low return of 10%. This should be a big bust for the NCO, since voter turnout should be at least 25%.
- New homes and traffic – The Ewa Plains is closer to 20,000 homes with a minimum of 30-40 year build out.
- The Iroquois Point Band gave their annual Military Appreciation Day concert at the end of the legislative session.
- The rail system should be up and running in the next 12 years.

Chair Fevella announced that the meeting will adjourn at 9:45 p.m.

Questions, comments and concerns followed:

1. Did he sustain vetoes with regards to raising the hotel tax.; Representative Pine sustained vetoes.
2. Does he support the HGEA pay cuts and proposed furloughs proposed by Governor Lingle? In answer, he voted with the Democratic Majority to override the vetoes. The job of the Legislature is to balance the budget; the Governor negotiates with the unions.

Tynanes moved to extend the meeting until 10:00 p.m. There were no objections. Chair Fevella noted that if written reports are if speakers could highlight one or two items.

3. With regard to what has happened to the elected officials pay raise, and how years must be served to receive benefits, Senator Espero said he has no idea, has been an elected official for 18 years, and has no plans of leaving.

4. It will be clarified at the next meeting as to why there is no federal funding for schools. An email was sent to State Department of Education Superintendent Pat Hamamoto regarding eight classrooms for the high school, and Ewa Beach Makai Middle School principal Randy Moore regarding his school.
5. Regarding the option to accept the raise or not, the legislature would have to vote on the matter. Legislators took a five percent pay cut this session.
6. A comment was made that taxpayers money not be wasted to allow prisoners to vote and not to push legislation that do not benefit the taxpayers.

Representative Kymberly Pine – Tom Berg reported that Rep. Pine stands on her written report.

Other Reports:

Department of Hawaiian Home Lands – Darrell Ing reported:

- East Kapolei I, known as Kanehili, will consist of 403 lots, 201 by Gentry Homes. Start of construction was February 2009 with the first occupant moving in tomorrow. Phase 1 (111 houses) should be completed in December 2009; and Phase 2 (90 houses) completion in June 2010.
- East Kapolei II – A) East West Road construction was delayed due to protests. 2) Pesticide Mixing Plant - 1) EPA Brownfield Grant approved (\$200,000); B) EPA Brownfield loan approved for up to \$1.97 million. 3) Historic Preservation Chapter 106 consultant is completed, and was forwarded to the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) for review. 4) Clean up plan – Select a consultant and public input on the draft plan will be solicited.

DR Horton – Dean Uchida gave the following update: The project will be heard before the Land Use Commission tomorrow, which should take several months. Deliberations should take until the end of July followed by the final decision. DR Horton is working with the City for an East Kapolei transit station (one quarter mile radius). The City Department of Transportation Services (DTS) is holding workshops on station designs.
