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### **DRAFT REGULAR MEETING MINUTES THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 13, 2012 EWA BEACH PUBLIC LIBRARY**

**CALL TO ORDER:** Chair Celeste Lacuesta called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. **Quorum was established with six (6) members present.** Note – This 11 member Board requires six (6) members to establish quorum and to take official Board action.

**Board Members Present** – Rodney Boucher (Appointed at this meeting), Ariel De Jesus, Kurt Fevella, Joe Hartsell, Steve Knauer, Celeste Lacuesta, Kevin Rathbun, and Mitchell Tynanes (Appointed at this meeting).

**Board Members Absent** – Frankie McCurley and Saipeti Tagovailoa-Amosa.

**Vacancies** – There is currently one (1) At-Large Vacancy on the Board.

**INTRODUCTION OF BOARD MEMBERS:** Those present introduced themselves. Rathbun read the Board speaking rules. Lacuesta encouraged those present to address all comments to the Board and to not make negative comments to one another.

#### **CITY MONTHLY REPORTS:**

**Honolulu Fire Department (HFD)** – Captain Robert Abley reported the following;

- **August 2012 Statistics:** Included 7 rubbish fires, 2 vehicle fires, 126 medical emergencies, 2 search/rescues, and 10 miscellaneous calls for service.
- **Fire Safety Tip:** Fire Prevention Week (FPW) was established to commemorate the Great Chicago Fire that occurred on October 8, 1871. The International Fire Marshals Association observes the anniversary nationally to remind the public about importance of fire prevention. Since 1922, FPW has been observed on the Sunday through Saturday period in which October 9 falls. The National Fire Protection Association selected "Have 2 Ways Out" as the theme for FPW 2012. In October, children attending elementary schools statewide will be receiving a fire fighter's safety guide from their teachers. Parents are encouraged to review the guide with their child, create and practice fire escape plans, test fire alarms, and consider the other safety tips.

**Community Weed and Seed** – Officer Makamos reported the following;

- **Underage Drinking:** Officers have been conducting underage drinking sweeps and issuing citations to adults and arresting juveniles that were drinking or had possession of alcoholic beverages in public places.
- **Narcotics:** Weed and Seed officers and the HPD Narcotics division have been actively involved in drug investigations in the Ewa Weed and Seed area. Officers conducted controlled purchases of



methamphetamine from a male and female and requested a search warrant that was granted and executed. The female was arrested after officers located illegal drugs, scales, and other drug paraphernalia inside her vehicle. Bail has been set at \$25,000. The male suspect was not arrested. Both are residents of Ewa Beach.

- Truancy: 17 Campbell High School students were arrested for truancy at Ewa Beach Community Park on August 23, 2012.
- National Night Out: Officers assisted with the National Night Out celebration held at Whole Foods Kailua on August 7, 2012.
- Cyberbullying/Bullying: Officers gave a presentation on cyberbullying/bullying to 4th Grade students at Kaimiloa Elementary School on August 15, 2012.
- Cleanup: Officers will be assisting with the "Get the Drift and Bag it Oneula Beach Park" cleanup and the Project CLEAN in Waipahu on September 15, 2012.
- Ohana Distribution: There will be an Ohana Food Distribution and Bingo Night at the Ewa Beach Boy's and Girl's Club on September 21, 2012. Help is needed to unload food at 12:30 a.m.

Honolulu Police Department (HPD) – Sergeant Russell Won circulated statistics and noted an increase in auto thefts. The following tips were suggested;

- Do not leave valuables in unattended parked vehicles. The items will attract criminals if seen.
- Vehicle alarms are good deterrents against auto thefts. Criminals don't want attention.
- When going to any of the beaches on Oahu, try to park close enough to hear and see your vehicle.
- Call 911 to report suspicious people or activities when driving or walking in parking areas.
- Remember to lock your doors.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed;

1. Speeding: A Board member noted there is a speed limit sign on Fort Weaver Road with a specified time posted on the sign. It was asked if the fine is doubled for drivers to break the speed limit during the specified time. The officer noted that the sign is posted within a school zone. It was reported that drivers who speed within a school zone face a \$200 fine.
2. Homeless: A Board member noted that homeless individuals have been migrating to properties near Kalaeloa and Coral Sea Road. It was reported that there are two (2) parks located in the area (One (1) Federal and One (1) City). It was noted that the Federal police have been instructed by the City to not engage homeless individuals on City property. An update was requested on the situation.

FILLING OF BOARD VACANCY: Lacuesta reported that the Board currently has three At-Large (3) vacancies on the Board and asked if there were any individuals who wished to volunteer to fill the vacancies. Four (4) individuals volunteered to fill the vacancy.

**A recess was called at 7:15 p.m. to allow the Neighborhood Assistant to verify the residency of the individuals. The Neighborhood Assistant was able to verify the residency of three (3) of the individuals. The meeting was called back to order at 7:24 p.m.**

Lacuesta allowed the three (3) individuals to introduce themselves to the Board and community. Rodney Boucher, Mitchell Tynanes, and Jeff Havelock introduced themselves and declared their intent to serve on the Board. Following introductions, votes were taken to fill the vacancies.

- Vacancy 1: Hartsell nominated Boucher, Lacuesta nominated Havelock, and De Jesus nominated Tynanes. There being no other nominations, nominations were closed. After discussion, Lacuesta and De Jesus withdrew their nominations. **Boucher was UNANIMOUSLY APPOINTED to fill one (1) At-Large vacancy on the Board, 6-0-0 (Aye: De Jesus, Fevella, Hartsell, Knauer, Lacuesta, and Rathbun).**

- Vacancy 2: De Jesus nominated Tynanes. There being no other nominations, nominations were closed. **Tynanes was UNANIMOUSLY APPOINTED to fill one (1) At-Large vacancy on the Board, 6-0-0 (Aye: De Jesus, Fevella, Hartsell, Knauer, Lacuesta, and Rathbun).**
- Vacancy 3: Lacuesta nominated Havelock. There being no other nominations, nominations were closed. **Havelock was NOT APPOINTED to fill the At-Large vacancy on the Board, 2-4-0 (Aye: De Jesus and Lacuesta No: Fevella, Hartsell, Knauer, and Rathbun).**

**A recess was called to allow the Neighborhood Assistant to administer the Oath of Office to Boucher and Tynanes. During the recess the Neighborhood Assistant verified the address of an individual interested in filling the At-Large Vacancy on the Board. The meeting was called back to order at 7:38 p.m.; eight (8) members present.**

- Vacancy 3: Lacuesta noted that Roger Lacuesta had also expressed interest in filling the At-Large vacancy and disclosed that Mr. Lacuesta was her husband.

**C. Lacuesta relinquished the gavel to De Jesus.**

**Knauer raised a point of order and expressed that the Board had already taken action to fill the vacancies. Knauer suggested the filling of the final vacancy be conducted at the next regular meeting. It was decided that the Board would conduct the filling of the At-Large vacancy at the next meeting.**

**De Jesus relinquished the gavel to Lacuesta.**

ELECTED OFFICIALS:

Governor's Representative – Leila Kagawa reported the following;

- Hawaii State Teachers Association (HSTA): The HSTA has agreed to accept Federal Mediation and Conciliation services as recommended by Governor Abercrombie.
- Strategic Partnerships: The Abercrombie Administration is building strategic partnerships with the Asia-Pacific region to deliver on New Cay goals for energy, a sustainable economy, and stewardship of the environment. The Governor will be working with officials from China, Japan, and various Pacific governments (American Samoa, Commonwealth of the Northern Marianas, and Guam).

Questions, comments, and concerns followed;

1. School Lunch: A Board member raised concerns regarding unsanitary food distribution practices at several of the public schools in the area. It was noted that one (1) cook has been assigned to provide meals for five (5) different schools. It was reported that the cook is distributing food instead of cooking it. It was further noted that the individual is paid six-figures by the State. It was reported that the individual had disposed of equipment without keeping a record. It was suggested an investigation be conducted. It was also suggested a Board of Education representative attend future Ewa Neighborhood Board meetings.
2. School Supplies: A Board member expressed the need for toilet paper, soap, new text books, and clean water fountains at all schools in the area.
3. Department of Education (DOE) Representative: A Board member requested a DOE representative attend Ewa Neighborhood Board meetings to discuss overcrowding at schools in the area and other requests that have not been addressed.
4. Board Resolutions: A Board member noted that the Board had submitted several resolutions regarding Campbell High School. An update on the status of the resolutions was requested.
5. Election Outsourcing: A community member criticized other states for outsourcing elections duties to foreign countries. It was asked of Hawaii is considering doing the same.

6. Public Lands Development Corporation (PLDC): A community member expressed that it is wrong for PLDC to use public land without public oversight.
7. Hawaii Community Development Authority (HCDA): A Board member criticized HCDA for not being transparent in its dealings.
8. Solar Tax Credit: A community member noted that the solar tax credit is being taken away. It was noted that Hawaii pays the highest electric rates in the nation. It was expressed that the State should reconsider removing the solar tax credit.
9. PLDC: A community member criticized PLDC as being the most corrupt land/power grab in the history of Hawaii. It was expressed that the draft rules do not respect adjacent property owners.
10. State Preservation Office: A community member expressed that the State Preservation Office is horrible.
11. Solar Farms: A community member reported that HCDA wants to expedite solar farms in Kalaeloa without public involvement.
12. Kalaeloa Bio-Safety Laboratory: A Board member reported that the bio-safety laboratory is on the Ewa Development plan; however, bio-safety laboratory officials have never come to the Ewa community. It was noted that Ewa residents want answers regarding the laboratory.
13. Solar Contractors: It was asked if the reason for the solar tax credit removal has to do with solar contractors telling consumers that they will install systems with no down payment. It was noted that there is no clear definition on what a solar panel system is. The State is currently trying to clarify the law.
14. Smart Meters: It was asked if Hawaii is looking at implementing smart meters. It was asked if smart meters give off any type of emissions.

Mayor's Representative – Kaleve Iosefa reported the following;

- Unilateral Agreement: The Unilateral Agreement condition requires Haseko to provide an endowment to a community foundation that will support community efforts. The Ewa Beach Community Trust Fund was established in 1995. The Hawaii Community Foundation Board of Directors oversees the dissemination of any money from this trust fund. The Board of Directors' decision to disseminate any money from this fund is based on recommendations made by a community advisory group consisting of three members appointed by Haseko (Lisa Enanoria, Mark Kennedy, and Rodolfo Ramos) and four members appointed by the Foundation Board (Arline Eaton, Paul Oshiro, Dennise Parish, and Tim Tucker).
- Ewa Mahiko Park: Ewa Mahiko District Park is irrigated with R1 water from the Honouliuli Plant. Water from the plant is pumped into a pond at Ewa Villages Golf Course. There are two pumps that pump the water out. One services the golf course and the other services the park and the medians along Renton Road. Water service was disrupted several times for various reasons, pump was shut down, valve needed to be cleaned/replaced, break in the line, etc. There were also breaks to the parks irrigation system by the gym contractor which caused the water to be shut down for long periods of time resulting in the brown grass. Once the irrigation system was repaired, the area was watered heavily to stimulate grass growth.
- Puuloa Bus: The City Department of Transportation Services (DTS) is aware of the Ewa community's desire for bus service for the residents of the Waterfront at Puuloa and has been working with the Ewa Neighborhood Board, Councilmember Berg's staff, and representatives of the Hunt Companies to develop an compromise solution that could involve a public-private partnership to provide shuttle service between Puuloa and the Ewa Transit Center. Due to the relatively isolated location of the Puuloa community, the operating costs associated with providing standard bus service to Puuloa Road residents are prohibitively high, and requiring DTS to reduce service to another community in order to extend bus service to this area.
- Sludge Transportation: The City is not transporting sludge from the Sand Island Wastewater Facility to the Ewa Wastewater Facility.

- School Bus: In response to the DOE's cuts in school bus service, DTS has been increasing bus service on existing routes whose ridership is expected to increase due to the DOE cutbacks. However, this is intended only to bridge the gap until the DOE is able to formulate a more permanent solution to its school bus problem. Federal regulations prohibit the City from being a direct provider of school bus services, and consequently preclude the City from undertaking route modifications specifically to meet school bus needs, such as those suggested for TheBusRoute 44.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed;

1. Street Light: A Board member reported a street light pole needs to be repaired near Ilima Intermediate School.
2. Oneula Beach Park Lights: A Board member reported that lights are out at Oneula Beach Park.
3. Traffic Light Calibration: A Board member asked when the new traffic lights on Keoniula Boulevard will be calibrated.
4. Crosswalk: A Board member requested a crosswalk on Papipi Road, near Kapolei Parkway. Another Board member expressed that improvements need to be made along Papipi Road due to the high volume of children that traverse the street to and from school.
5. Thank You: DTS was thanked for providing numerous road repairs in Ewa.
6. Unilateral Agreement: A community member argued that the unilateral agreement was supposed to ensure that monies from Haseko would go directly to the community and not to a charity. It was noted that membership of the community advisory group is out of date. Haseko reported that there are two (2) different agreements made. One called for the formation of The Ewa Beach Community Trust Fund and the other was to set aside monies for road improvements.
7. Rail: It was asked if tax money is still being spent on rail even though the project has been halted. An update was requested on the issue.
8. Jeri Padilla: Jeri Padilla was recognized for gathering over 600 names for a petition to restore City funds for bus routes. It was noted that a request was sent to City Council to draft a certificate of recommendation for her community involvement.

**The Board UNANIMOUSLY AMMENDED the agenda to allow for the presentation of the certificate to Jeri Padilla, 8-0-0 (Aye: Boucher, De Jesus, Fevella, Hartsell, Knauer, Lacuesta, Rathbun, and Tynanes).**

Presentation of Certificate for Jeri Padilla – The Chair and Board recognized and presented Jeri Padilla with a certificate of commendation for her service to the community in gathering over 600 names on a petition to restore funding for bus routes.

**A recess was called at 8:31 p.m.; the meeting was called back to order at 8:33 p.m.**

Councilmember Tom Berg – Councilmember Berg circulated a newsletter and reported the following;

- Kalaeloa Historic Trails: A resolution on the identification and preservation of historic trails in Kalaeloa was passed.
- Resolution 12-173 and Resolution 12-174: Resolution 12-173 (urging the mayor to find funding in the city budget to restore service cuts instituted to city bus routes) and Resolution 12-177 (suspending the farebox recovery policy on funding the operating costs of the city bus system for fiscal year 2013) were both unanimously passed by the City Council. Berg noted he had opposed Bill 14 which included cuts to the funding for bus routes.
- Bill 14: Berg reported that he was the only Councilmember to vote against Bill 14. It was noted that the Bill must be revisited to restore bus funding.

- Town Hall Meeting: A town hall meeting has been scheduled for October 4, 2012.
- Transit Efficiency: Councilmember Berg reported that the Federal government has issued a statement stating that rail transit is not efficient. Instead the Federal government has recommended an elevated guideway for buses.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed;

1. Haseko Unilateral Agreement: A community member requested Berg research the proper use of the \$2 million from Haseko.
2. HCDA Investigation: It was noted that HCDA controls both areas in Kalaeloa and Kakaako. It was expressed that HCDA decided to move the bio-safety laboratory from Kakaako to Kalaeloa without consulting the community. It was suggested an investigation be conducted on HCDA.
3. Temporary Agriculture Shelters: With the passage of Resolution 12-174, a Board member asked who would be monitoring waste coming generated by the shelters.. Berg noted there are new technologies that could make it possible for the shelters to remove themselves from the public utility grid altogether. It was noted that the State Department of Health (DOH) and the City Department of Planning and Permitting will monitor the property to ensure all health and safety laws are being followed.
4. Security: A community member noted that several farmers have had their livestock stolen and suggested and made the notion that on-property housing could also provide security when farmers are not present to tend their property.
5. Rail Cars: It was asked and clarified that \$10 million has been contracted out to California for the construction of rail cars.
6. Vehicle Registration Increases: It was asked if the City would be increasing car registration fees. It was noted that there is both a City and State tax associated with vehicle registration. It was reported that the City does not have any plans to increase City vehicle registration fees at the moment.
7. Housing Eligibility: It was asked and clarified that the temporary shelters on agriculture land are only being permitted for five (5) years. It was noted that when homeless individuals accept a job and housing with a farmer, their eligibility for State housing will be revoked. It was explained that at the conclusion of the five (5) year program, individuals employed by farmers would need to re-apply for housing and be placed at the bottom of the priority list.
8. Ewa Development Plan: It was asked and clarified that after the Ewa Development Plan passes the Planning Commission; it is sent to the Mayor for review and assigned a bill number. After the plan has been assigned a bill number, the plan will go before the public for review and comment.

**An outburst occurred in the audience and a recess was taken at 8:54 p.m. The meeting was called back to order at 8:55 p.m.**

Senator Will Espero – Senator Espero circulated a newsletter and reported the following;

- Appointments: Senator Espero was appointed to the Steering Committee for the Justice Investment Initiative, the Government Contracting Task Force, and the Clean and Sober Task Force.
- Social Security Building: Ground was broken for the new Social Security Administration Office Building next to Kapolei Library.
- Civil Air Show: There will be a Civil Air Show presentation for the youth on September 15, 2012.
- Campbell High School: Campbell High School will be celebrating its 50th anniversary on September 29, 2012. The community is invited to attend the homecoming game.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed;

1. Dormitories: It was asked and clarified that construction of dormitories at the University of Hawaii-West Oahu (UHWO) will commence after campus construction has been completed. It was noted that there is not enough rooms for students.
2. Bio-Safety Laboratory Meeting: A Board member noted that the deadline for commentary on the Bio-Safety Laboratory at Kalaeloa was due by September 7, 2012. The Board member noted that the Senator agreed to help facilitate a meeting with lab officials and the community but did not follow up. Espero noted that he had tried to contact lab officials; however, they did not agree to make a presentation. Espero further noted that he does not have the authority to force a meeting with lab officials and the community. Espero noted that he will continue to contact the officials and encouraged the Board and community to do the same.
3. Half-Way/Sober Homes: A Board member expressed the need for more regulation of Half-Way or Sober homes.
4. Informed: A Board member noted that other legislators around the area knew about plans for the Bio-Safety Laboratory in Kalaeloa in advance and asked why Espero didn't find out until later.

**Knauer called a point of order and noted that the Chair had mentioned that no one should be making negative comments toward speakers.**

5. Explanation: Espero noted that the reason he may have not been informed of the lab plans was because it was not located in his senate district. It was suggested that the other legislators may have found out earlier because it fell within their districts.
6. Feedback: Espero was accused of not providing any feedback to the community after agreeing to facilitate a meeting with Bio-Safety Laboratory officials. Espero reiterated that he has no control over University of Hawaii officials and suggested the community provide collective testimony at the next public hearing.
7. Act 55: It was asked and clarified that Espero voted in favor of Act 55 (creation of the PLDC). Espero noted that the development of lands will not only be reserved for developers; it may also be used for partnerships with schools, hospitals, or other similar entities to develop public lands.

**Verbal sparring ensued and a recess was taken at 9:17 p.m. The meeting was called back to order at 9:18 p.m.**

8. PLDC Draft Rules: It was asked and clarified that Espero did not have a copy of the draft rules when voting in favor of Act 55. Espero explained the process of forming entities such as the PLDC. It was explained that the PLDC needed to be created first. Following the creation of the PLDC, it would be up to the PLDC to draft rules and submit them to the legislature and Governor for approval. Espero noted that the draft rules are currently being reviewed and discussed. Public comment on the rules will be taken before a final decision is made.

**Verbal sparring ensued and a recess was taken at 9:23 p.m. The meeting was called back to order at 9:24 p.m.**

9. Public Hearing: A Board member asked when the next public hearing is scheduled for the draft rules. Espero noted that he would inform the community when a date is set.

Representative Kymberly Pine – Kauai Alapa circulated a newsletter and reported the following;

- Pohakupuna Road: Repairs to Pohakupuna Road are part of a package of roads that are scheduled to be repaired. It was noted that crews are currently working on roads in Kalihi. Crews are expected to begin repairs to Pohakupuna Road in October.
- Night Flights: The State limits the amount of air traffic over residential areas in Ewa during night hours.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed;

1. City Issues: A Board member asked why the representative is covering so many City issues. It was

explained that the issues were reported because a response was not given from the City when inquired about. It was suggested she focus on City Issues. Another Board member suggested the State and City work together for the benefit of the community.

2. Hospital: An update on the status of the old Hawaii Medical Center-West was requested.
3. School Concerns: A Board member inquired about the list of school related concerns submitted by the Board a few months ago.
4. Fort Weaver Road: An update was requested regarding the widening of Fort Weaver Road. It was noted that the road only needs to be re-stripped.
5. Reapportionment: Concern was raised over the Reapportionment Committee placing Ewa in the same district as Waipahu. It was noted that the two (2) communities are different and do not share the same interests.
6. Councilmember Berg: A member of Councilmember Berg's staff noted that she does respond to inquiries from State legislators as it pertains to City issues.
7. Campaign Money: It was noted that Representative Pine had accepted campaign donations from companies that use Genetically Modified Organisms (GMO). A Board member noted that community members should show respect for the representative and refrain from attacking the campaign.
8. Act 55: It was asked why Representative Pine voted in favor of Act 55. Alapa refrained from answering the question in the absence of the representative.
9. Collaboration: It was expressed that the representative has never collaborated with other local legislators. It was suggested she collaborate with others especially for issues like the bio-safety laboratory. A Board member expressed that area legislators need to work together regardless of party affiliation.
10. Attendance: it was suggested all area representatives attend the next meeting prior to the general election.

RESIDENTS'/COMMUNITY CONCERN:

1. Board Activity: The Board was accused of not holding community meetings and not doing anything worthwhile.

**Verbal sparring ensued and a recess was called t 9:47 p.m. The meeting was called back to order at 9:50 p.m.**

2. Disclosure: A Board member noted that individuals should disclose any affiliations to parties before making comments during the meeting.
3. Ewa emergency Preparedness Fair: Boucher disclosed that he is a volunteer with the Ewa Beach Emergency Preparedness Committee. Boucher thanked the community for participating in the recent Ewa Beach Emergency Preparedness Fair.
4. District 1 Emergency Preparedness Plan: It was noted that Councilmember Berg is taking input for the District 1 Emergency Preparedness Plan through mid-October
5. Study: It was reported that \$54,000 has been granted to do a study on the Ewa battlefield.
6. Development: It was noted that the development of the Ewa Plains is destroying the limu in the area.

**The Neighborhood Assistant departed the meeting at 10:00 p.m. The Board secretary continued the minutes.**
