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DRAFT REGULAR MEETING MINUTES THURSDAY, MAY 9, 2013 EWA BEACH PUBLIC LIBRARY

CALL TO ORDER: Chair Ariel De Jesus called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. **Quorum was established with seven (7) members present.** Note – This 11-member Board requires six (6) members to establish quorum and to take official Board action.

Roll Call: The Neighborhood Assistant performed a roll call and noted a quorum of seven (7) members.

Rules of Speaking: Rathbun read the Board rules of speaking. De Jesus recognized Chair Sylvia Young of the Neighborhood Commission. Young noted that the Neighborhood Commission has received the Board’s resolution on lifting the sanctions placed upon the Ewa Neighborhood Board; however, it was not received in time to place on the May agenda. The item will be on the June Neighborhood Commission agenda. It was noted that the independent presiding officer would not be present at tonight’s meeting. However, the independent presiding officer recommended that Chair De Jesus be given the opportunity to run tonight’s meeting.

PUBLIC SAFETY (FIRST RESPONDER) REPORTS:

Honolulu Police Department (HPD) – Lieutenant Joseph Trinidad reported the following;

- **April 2013 Statistics:** Included 618 total arrests, 517 adult arrests, 101 juvenile arrests, and 7613 total calls for service.
- **Safety Tip:** The graduation season is fast approaching and a high number of parties and celebrations are anticipated. In an effort to control the consumption of alcoholic beverages by minors, HPD shares the following excerpt of the Hawaii Revised Statutes as it pertains to underage drinking: “A person, including any licensee as defined in section 281-1, commits the offense of intoxicating liquor to a person under the age of 21 if the person knowingly sells or offers for sale, influences the sale, serves, delivers, or gives to a person intoxicating liquor, and the person receiving the intoxicating liquor is a person under the age of 21; or permits a person to possess intoxicating liquor while on property under his control, and the person possessing the intoxicating liquor is a person under the age of 21. Promoting intoxicating liquor to a person under the age of 21 is a misdemeanor”.



Weed and Seed – Officer Mike Nakagawa reported the following the following events;

- Weeding:
 - Officers have been conducting underage drinking sweeps, issuing citations to adults and arresting juveniles that were observed drinking or in possession of alcoholic beverages in public places.
 - Officers arrested an adult male for graffiti at the Ewa Pointe Marketplace. The suspect was arrested after he was observed spraying graffiti on the walls and electrical boxes next to Ewa Pointe Chinese Restaurant after three (3) nights of surveillance. There are also about five (5) previous cases of graffiti which may be connected to the same suspect.
 - Officers arrested 28 truants from Campbell High School.
 - Ewa Weed and Seed (WS) executed a search warrant at 91-1009 J Fort Weaver Road which resulted in dangerous drugs, paraphernalia, and illegal gambling devices. Monies were forfeited.
- Seeding:
 - The 5-week Ewa Weed and Seed Junior Golf Program started on April 3, 2013 and is being held at the Coral Creek Golf Club. 25 youth are signed up for the program. The Campbell High School golf team assists with instruction.
 - Weed and Seed and Community Policing Team (CPT) officers attended a Career Day presentation at Makaha Elementary School on April 5, 2013 and at Ilima Middle School on April 19, 2013.
- Upcoming Events:
 - May 13 to 17, 2013 – Police Week
 - May 18, 2013 – Neighborhood Restoration Project in the area of the Campbell High School Complex
 - May 24, 2013 – Ohana Food Distribution at the Ewa Beach Boy's and Girl's Club
 - June 6, 2013 – Start of the Ewa Weed and Seed Culinary Arts Program

Mitchell Tynanes arrived at 7:10 p.m.; **eight (8) members present.**

Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Update – Chief Patricia Dukes reported that Ewa has had their own ambulance service for the past 10 months. During that time, the Ewa ambulance service has responded to over 2,400 calls. The ambulance is currently stationed at the Ewa Villages Golf Club. There are plans to renovate the old Ewa Fire Station and use it to house the Ewa ambulance. The bill that would have allocated funds to perform the renovation died and renovations have been halted until monies become available. The Ewa ambulance services the area 16 hours daily.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed;

1. Definition: It was asked and clarified that an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) is able to provide basic life support services.
2. Coordination: It was asked and clarified that EMS coordinates with other emergency responders during emergencies; however, the county has their own ocean safety personnel that take the lead on oceanfront emergencies. EMS assists as needed.
3. Tsunami Inundation Zone: Concern was raised that the old Ewa Fire Station is located within the tsunami inundation zone.
4. Closest EMS Services: It was asked and clarified that the closest EMS services are located in Waipahu and Kalaeloa.

De Jesus relinquished the gavel to Rathbun.

Ewa EMS – De Jesus moved, and Boucher seconded that Ewa Neighborhood Board fully support the acquisition of the old Ewa Beach Fire Station at Pohakupuna Road to be converted into an Emergency Medical Services Ambulance Service Unit/Station and to retain the current ambulance service station at Ewa Villages Golf Course.

Discussion followed;

1. Differing Issues: Concern was raised that the motion deals with two (2) different issues. Concern was raised that the community did not have an opportunity to discuss the issue.
2. Timing: It was noted that the Honolulu Fire Department (HFD) representative had arrived and suggested the agenda be moved to address HFD. It was expressed that it is too soon to take action on the EMS matter.
3. Uninhabitable: It was noted that the station is currently uninhabitable and not suited to house an ambulance at this time. De Jesus explained that the facility would be renovated before the ambulance is moved in.

The motion was ADOPTED, 7-0-1 (Aye: Boucher, Bresslauer, Caoili, De Jesus, Rathbun, Tynanes, Weinberger
Abstain: Knauer).

Honolulu Fire Department (HFD) – Captain Dwayne Lee reported the following;

- April 2013 Statistics: Included 6 structure fires, 2 rubbish fires, 4 vehicle fires, 116 medical emergencies, 1 search/rescue, and 35 miscellaneous calls for service. There was one (1) major incident involving three (3) companies, which caused \$100,000 in damages.
- Safety Tip: Energy saving Compact Fluorescent Light (CFL) bulb usage is becoming more common in homes and at work. In addition to using less electricity, they also have positive impact on the global climate. When a CFL bulb burns out, it may smoke and blacken at the plastic base. This is normal and not a fire safety issue. CFL bulbs are made of glass and can break. Be careful when removing from packaging and installing or removing it from a socket. CFL bulbs contain a small trace of mercury within the glass. When broken, mercury will immediately dissipate into the air. Concentrations of mercury will likely approach zero in an hour or so. If a CFL bulb breaks:
 - Open a window to allow the room to ventilate for five (5) to 10 minutes.
 - Turn off the air conditioner.
 - Collect the broken glass and visible powder using stiff cardboard, tape, or a damp paper towel.
 - CFL bulbs should never be discarded with the household trash. Contact your local government or visit epa.gov/cfl/cflrecycling or earth911.org for local recycling options.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed;

Thank You: Boucher disclosed that he is a member of the Ewa Beach Emergency Preparedness Committee and thanked HFD for their support.

RESIDENT & COMMUNITY CONCERNS & ANNOUNCEMENTS:

1. Neighborhood Board: The Ewa Neighborhood Board was criticized for becoming increasingly inept over time. It was noted that the Board does not hold committee meetings and urged the Board to get more active.
2. Train Ride: The community was invited to attend the annual 4th of July train ride.
3. Ewa Battlefield: It was reported that the Ewa Battlefield is a registered historic site. It was noted that the field was attacked on December 7, 1941. Concern was also raised of a facility in Barber's Point releasing hazardous materials.
4. Ewa Watershed Management Plan: The Community was invited to attend a community meeting on the Ewa Watershed Management Plan on May 21, 2013, from 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m., at Kapolei Hale, Conference Room A.
5. Ewa Development Plan: It was asked and clarified that the Ewa Development Plan was passed in 2011. However, there have been no recent updates. It was noted that Representative Cabanilla circulated part 1 of the plan at the last meeting.

6. Recognition: The Ewa Beach Emergency Preparedness Committee received a plaque and a certificate of recognition at the Pride for Ewa Fair.
7. Oneula Beach Park: The community was invited to attend the Oneula Beach Park cleanup on May 19, 2013, at 8:00 a.m.

BOARD ADMINISTRATION AND PLANNING:

Treasurer's Report – Rathbun read the Treasurer's Report and noted expenditures of \$61.60 and a remaining balance of \$529.06. The report was filed.

Approval of the April 11, 2013 regular Meeting Minutes – **Tynanes moved, and Weinberger seconded to approve the April 11, 2013 regular meeting minutes as amended. The motion was ADOPTED, 7-0-1 (Aye: Boucher, Bresslauer, Caoili, De Jesus, Rathbun, Tynanes, Weinberger Abstain: Knauer).** Corrections included;

- Page 7 – Hawaii Prince Golf Course should read **Ewa Beach** Golf Course.

Filling of Board Vacancies – De Jesus opened the floor for nominations of candidates interested in filling the At-Large vacancy on the Ewa Neighborhood Board. Kaleve Iosefa-Tufono introduced herself and expressed her interest in filling the vacancy.

A recess was taken at 7:45 p.m., to allow the Neighborhood Assistant to verify the candidate's residency. The Neighborhood Assistant verified the residency and the meeting was called back to order at 7:47 p.m.

Rathbun nominated Iosefa-Tufono to fill the At-Large vacancy on the Ewa Neighborhood Board. Caoili moved, and Boucher seconded to close nominations. Iosefa-Tufono was APPOINTED to fill the At-Large vacancy on the Ewa Neighborhood Board, 7-1-0 (Aye: Boucher, Bresslauer, Caoili, De Jesus, Rathbun, Tynanes, Weinberger Nay: Knauer).

A recess was taken at 7:49 p.m. to allow the Neighborhood Assistant to administer the Oath of Office to Iosefa-Tufono. Meeting called to order at 7:53 p.m. Following the recess; nine (9) members present.

GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS REPORT:

Marine Corps Base Hawaii – A representative was not present; a report was not provided.

Councilmember Kymberly Pine – Councilmember Pine circulated a newsletter and reported the following;

- Honouliuli Wastewater Plant Odor: Money has been allocated in the City budget for the remediation of odors stemming from Honouliuli Wastewater Plant.
- Housing First: A meeting was scheduled with the Mayor to discuss the Housing First initiative. The initiative provides the homeless with housing while assisting them to receive treatment at the same time.
- Moae Ku Phase II: Councilmember Pine attended the groundbreaking of Moae Ku Phase II; which will feature affordable housing for low and very low income families.
- Committee Meeting: Neighborhood Commission Office (NCO) Executive Secretary Nicole Velasco has been invited to the next Committee on Intergovernmental Affairs and Human Services meeting on May 16, 2013, at 2:30 p.m.
- Town Hall Meeting: The Mayor will be holding a town hall meeting on May 16, 2013, at 6:30 p.m., at Kapolei Hale.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed;

1. Thank You: Pine was thanked for pushing for projects in the district and for providing more affordable housing opportunities for families.

2. Ewa Train Ride: Pine was invited to attend the Ewa train ride on July 4, 2013.
3. Historic Trees: It was expressed that historic trees need to be preserved. Pine noted she would add historic trees to the Ewa Development Plan provision for historic sites.
4. Skype Testimony: A community member asked if live testimony could be sent for City issues using Skype.
5. Varona Villages: It was asked if there are any budget items for Varona Villages. It was reported that promises were made 15 years ago to repair Varona Villages. It was suggested extending the Varona Villages historic area classification to include nearby cultural and historic site; like the Ewa Train Station.

Councilmember Ron Menor – Councilmember Menor reported the following;

- City Budget: The City Council is finalizing the budget. Budget Committee Chair Ann Kobayashi is in favor of funding for TheBus Route-E, and Weed and Seed. The budget has been passed out of committee and is expected to be passed by the full council.
- Road Repair: Councilmember Menor met with various stakeholders to discuss the repair and maintenance of North Road, fronting the Waterfront at Puuloa. Options include having the City maintain the road as a private road, transferring the road to the City, or have the City pave the road and have the private property owner maintain after paving.
- Varona Villages: A resolution has been drafted to develop a working group to discuss a plan to repair Varona Villages.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed;

1. North Road: It was noted that North Road needs to be repaired and have sidewalks or walking paths installed. Menor suggested implementing Complete Streets initiatives when repairing the road.
2. Thank You: Menor was thanked for being proactive and engaging others to find a solution to problems. Menor was also thanked for helping get Varona Villages roads repaired and for getting Route-E into the budget.
3. Waterfront at Puuloa: Concern was raised that children walking from the Waterfront at Puuloa do so without a sidewalk and limited lighting.
4. Ewa Train Ride: Menor was invited to attend the Ewa train ride on July 4, 2013.
5. Renton Road: It was asked and clarified that the repairs to Renton Road is anticipated to commence before the end of the year.

Mayor's Representative – Pamela Witty-Oakland reported the following;

- Varona Villages: A meeting was set with the City Managing Director to discuss the future of Varona Villages. Assignments were given to different departments to follow up on. A meeting will reconvene in 60 days to review the assignments given to the departments.
- White Recycle Bins: The white recycle bin program has been phased out and replaced with the availability of the curbside blue recycle bins and the HI-5 recycling centers. HI-5 centers accept many types of materials for recycling.
- Papipi Road: HPD will continue to monitor Papipi Road for traffic violations.
- Town Hall Meeting: The Mayor will be holding a town hall meeting on May 16, 2013, at 6:30 p.m., at Kapolei Hale.
- Grant-in Aid: The Department of Community Services is going through the first round of Grant in Aid proposals on May 17, 2013.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed;

1. Ewa Manager's Mansion: An update was requested on the completion of the Ewa Manager's Mansion.
2. Deadline Extension: An extension to the FY2013 Grant in Aid submittal deadline was requested.
3. Grant in Aid: It was asked and clarified that the Grant in Aid monies are derived from the General Fund. It was explained that the funds come from the monies taken from the rail tax.

Governor's Representative – Leila Kagawa reported that the Bills passed by the 2013 Legislature are now under review and on their way to Governor Abercrombie's desk for signature. The Governor invites community members to express their thoughts on specific measures. To do so, go to the State of Hawaii's new Web portal at eHawaii.gov and search for "Contact Governor Abercrombie." Be sure to include the specific bill number. In general, the Governor has until early July to sign bills passed by the Legislature. However, the Governor must notify the Legislature of potential vetoes by June 24, and will be reviewing bills together with his staff and departments prior to that date, so please provide your comments as soon as possible. The Governor has already enacted several dozen measures during session. These include House Bill 411, which strengthens the rights of female sexual assault victims by ensuring that they are provided accurate, unbiased information about (and access to) emergency contraception when receiving emergency medical care at Hawaii's hospitals. Bill 8 was also passed and would allow the public to traverse county beach parks after park closure hours.

Senator Will Espero – Senator Espero circulated a newsletter and reported the following;

- Capitol Improvement Projects: CIP in the Ewa/West Oahu include: Design and construction for electrical upgrades at Campbell High School (\$1 million); Plan, design, construction, and equipment for campus/athletic facilities at Ewa Makai Middle School (\$18.4 million); H-1 P.M. west-bound contraflow lane construction and realignment (\$15 million); Plan, design, construction for drainage at the south end of Fort Weaver Road (\$3 million); Fort Weaver Road lane expansion from Geiger Road to Keoneula Parkway (\$36 million); Design and construction of Road B connecting UH-West Oahu to Kualakai Parkway (\$3.5 million); Design and construction of UH-West Oahu Allied Health Building (\$11.8 million); Ewa Elementary School 8-classroom expansion (\$9.6 million).
- UH-West Oahu: Congratulations were extended to UH-West Oahu graduates who graduated at the university's first spring commencement ceremony.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed;

1. Uh-West Oahu Dorms: It was asked if dorms for UH-West Oahu are a priority. Espero note that the topic of dorms is still under discussion. It was noted that the State is looking to lease out a portion of land adjacent to UH-West Oahu to a Japanese university and have both institutions share the dorms. Espero explained that the plan is to form a public-private partnership with the Japanese university and have them shoulder a portion of the cost for the dorms.
2. Rail Tax: It was asked if there is any information of the State retaining monies from the rail tax.
3. Hazardous Materials: Concern was raised of hazardous materials being produced at a facility at Barber's Point. Espero noted that the Navy has been contacted about the hazardous materials.
4. Campbell High School Electrical System: It was asked if the monies to upgrade the Campbell High School electrical system could be used to install photovoltaic (PV) panels. Espero to follow up.
5. Tokai University: Concern was raised of a private institution (Tokai University) building on leased public lands. It was expressed that the State is doing exactly what the Public Lands Development Corporation (PLDC) was set up to do. Espero clarified that the PLDC has been dissolved and noted that the land being leased was set aside by the State to be leased to a private lessee with the intent of creating public-private partnerships.

6. Campbell High School Track and Field: It was suggested Campbell High School enter into some type of public-private partnership to repair the Campbell High School track and field. Espero noted that a new field slated to be installed by the end of the year.

Senator Mike Gabbard – Rock Riggs circulated a newsletter and reported the following;

- Construction Funding: Construction projects include: Kualakai Parkway expansion (\$15.001 million); H-1 Kunia interchange improvements (\$780,000); East Kapolei High School (\$5 million); East Kapolei Middle School (\$5 million).
- Senate Bills (SB): The following bills were past during the most recent legislative session:
 - SB 1087 relating to the formation of Green Infrastructure Financing Program
 - SB 19 relating to the clarification of the law to allow renters and commercial tenants to also gain access to the benefits of lowering their electrical bill through PV credits.
- Listen Story: The next listen story with Senator Gabbard is scheduled for June 22, 2013, at the Kapolei Starbucks, next to Chevron.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed;

Kualakai Parkway Extension: Concern was raised that the Kualakai Parkway extension would destroy the existing Ewa rail line. It was noted that the rail station and the rail line are historic sites. Riggs noted that the State Department of Transportation (DOT) is aware of the issue. It was asked why Senator Gabbard is not fighting to preserve historic sites.

Representative Bob McDermott – A representative was not present; a report was not made available.

Representative Rida Cabanilla – A representative was not present; a report was not made available.

NEW BUSINESS:

Haseko Update – Sharene Saito-Tam reported that Haseko is awaiting the permit to construct the comfort stations at the District Park. The park is to include athletic courts, parking, and comfort stations. A 1/4-acre has been dedicated for a child care facility, 1 acre for a fire station, and 12 acres for Keoneula Elementary School. Haseko residential communities include pocket parks, bike lanes, and parking alleyways to replace on-street parking. The 248 acre golf course was designed to provide leisure as well as help with drainage issues. Previous plans to expand the marina were abandoned because the government noted an issue with disturbing an underground pipe. A recreational lagoon was planned in place of the previously proposed marina. The lagoon is open to the public. There is also marsh preservation land which is the nesting ground for three (3) endangered species of fowl. Haseko has also partnered with the community to engage in various service projects to clean the Oneula shoreline and clean out the marsh land in preparation for the bird nesting season. Haseko plans to build a new access way to Oneula Beach Park; which will be turned over to the City following construction.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed;

1. Canoe Hale: It was asked and clarified that land has been set aside for the construction of a canoe hale; however, the canoe club(s) need to come up with the funding to build the structure.
2. Comfort Station Haseko was thanked for organizing and participating in the cleanup of Oneula. It was asked and clarified that Haseko will be funding the new waterline for the Oneula comfort station.
3. Hole: It was noted that there is a giant hole just above the preserve land. It was noted that ground water is being kept in the hole.
4. Marina: It was noted that the original phase 1 plan was to build the marina. The marina was originally supposed to be 120 acres, but has since been reduced to 40 acres. Concern was raised of the aeration of the water. Saito-Tam clarified that 3-million gallons of water flow in and out of the lagoon and keeps the water clean.

Crown Castle Telecommunications Tower Modification – Keoni Fox reported that Crown Castle is looking to modify its existing antenna located on North Road. The towers will be modified to extend from 120-feet to 130-feet. The project is anticipated to begin in early 2014. Emergency communication services will not be interrupted.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed;

1. North Road Repairs: It was suggested Crown Castle help fund repairs on North Road.
2. Community Benefit: It was asked if there would be any type of community benefit. It was noted that Crown Castle will be applying for a new height variance conditional use permit.
3. Reasoning: It was asked and clarified that the reasoning for the extension is to improve service for the carriers who utilize the line.

Tynanes moved, and Rathbun seconded to support the replacement of the Castle Crown telecommunications line on North Road. The motion was ADOPTED 8-0-1 (Aye: Boucher, Bresslauer, Caoili, De Jesus, Iosefa-Tufono, Rathbun, Tynanes, Weinberger Abstain: Knauer).

Hale Kipa – Alika Campbell reported that the Hale Kipa Transitional Housing is for young single mothers, between the ages of 18 and 22, transitioning out of homelessness. The property is owned by the City and Hale Kipa is seeking a renewal on their lease. Eight (8) out of the 10 women living at the facility have found employment, four (4) have obtained higher education, and seven (7) have made other types of self improvements.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed;

1. Rooms: It was asked and clarified that the facility has five (5) bedrooms. A live-in resident stays overnight and a case worker is present during the day. Each mother is limited to two (2) young children.
2. Referrals: It was asked and clarified that referrals for the program are received from various service providers around the island.
3. Transition Period: It was asked and clarified that the transition period for the housing is between six (6) to nine (9) months. Residents are trained on life skills.

Weinberger moved, and Tynanes seconded to approve the extension of the Hale Kipa lease.

Discussion followed;

1. Lease: A timeline of the lease was requested. It was noted that the current lease is not set to expire until a few more months.
2. Homelessness: Support was expressed for homelessness initiatives.

The motion was UNANIMOUSLY ADOPTED 9-0-0 (Aye: Boucher, Bresslauer, Caoili, De Jesus, Iosefa-Tufono, Knauer, Rathbun, Tynanes, Weinberger).

COMMITTEE & DELEGATES:

Intergovernmental Affairs, Human Services, and Legislative Committee – No Report.

Parks, Education, Sports, Arts Committee – Tynanes reported there will be an Oneula Beach park cleanup on May 19, 2013. A community meeting to discuss homelessness is scheduled for May 22, 2013, at Asing Park.

Planning, Permitting, Zoning, Environmental, Public Works, Sustainability Committee – Rathbun reported that the City's Planning and Permitting Committee is reviewing the Ewa Development Plan and hopes to bring to the full council for vote in June.

Public Safety and Economic Development – Boucher thanked the various individuals who participated in the last committee meeting. Minutes are forthcoming.

Transportation Committee – No report.

Oahu Metropolitan Planning Organization (OMPO) – No report.

ANNOUNCEMENTS:
