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### **DRAFT REGULAR MEETING MINUTES TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 1, 2011 WAIANAЕ NEIGHBORHOOD COMMUNITY CENTER**

**CALL TO ORDER:** First Vice Chair D. Kawika Nahoopii called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. **with a quorum of seven (7) members present.** Note-This nine (9) member Board requires five (5) members to establish a quorum and to take official Board action.

**Board Members Present:** Calvin Endo, Al Frenzel, Suzanne Leonida, D. Kawika Nahoopii, Johnnie-Mae Perry, Albert Silva and Bob Smith.

**Board Members Absent:** Keith Pine (third absence).

**Vacancies:** One vacancy in sub-district 1 (Waianae).

**WELCOME/PULE/PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE/HAWAII PONO'I:** First Vice Chair Nahoopii welcomed everyone to the Board meeting and explained that previous Chair Jo Jordan has been selected to serve as the State Representative for the 45th House District. Congratulations were provided. Endo provided the pule followed by Frenzel leading the Pledge of Allegiance and First Chair Nahoopii in Hawaii Pono'i.

**VACANCY: Filling of one (1) vacancy in Sub-District One:** First Vice Chair Nahoopii explained that due to Jo Jordan becoming a State Representative, she could no longer serve on the Board.

It was noted that community member Irene Awana had expressed interest but is not present at this time. Community member David Oclitaria expressed interest but did not have proper identification at this time. **Silva moved and Perry seconded to postpone the filling until Board Business on the agenda. The motion was ADOPTED UNANIMOUSLY, 7-0-0, (Aye: Endo, Frenzel, Leonida, Nahoopii, Perry, Silva and Smith.)**

**ELECTION OF BOARD OFFICER: Chairperson:** First Vice Chair Nahoopii explained that due to the previous Chair's departure, the Board may elect a new Chairperson. **Silva nominated Smith and Perry nominated Nahoopii. Neither members were elected Chairperson due to insufficient votes, 4-3-0, (Smith: Endo, Leonida, Silva and Smith; Nahoopii: Frenzel, Nahoopii and Perry.)**

**Perry moved and Frenzel seconded to postpone election of a Chairperson until the March regular board meeting. The motion was ADOPTED UNANIMOUSLY, 7-0-0, (Aye: Endo, Frenzel, Leonida, Nahoopii, Perry, Silva and Smith.)**

**MONTHLY REPORTS PART 1: Honolulu Fire Department (HFD):** No representative present; no report available.

**Honolulu Police Department (HPD):** Lieutenant Tsuchida reported;

- **Crime Statistics for January 2011:** Included 551 total arrests in District-8; of which 351 were adult arrests and 160 were juvenile arrests, and a total of 1,869 total calls for service, compared to 1,714 in December.
- **Crime Safety Tip:** An unauthorized entrance to a motor vehicle (UEMV), commonly known as a vehicle



break-in, occurs frequently in the district. Residents were urged to lock vehicle doors and do not leave valuables in unattended vehicles and to call 911 to report suspicious people in the area.

Questions, comments and concerns followed:

1. Juvenile Arrest Details: It was questioned what were the most frequent violations by juveniles; Lieutenant Tsuchida will follow-up as he did not have the exact details of the arrests.
2. School/Teenage Fighting: A community member raised concerns with the lack of enforcement and arrests made during teenage or school fights. It was explained that in order to arrest a suspect, officers must observe the violation themselves, or have a valid eyewitness that is willing to provide a statement.
3. Sexual Assault Specifics: It was questioned and noted that the lieutenant did not have specifics on the sexual assault statistics. It was also noted that sexual assault cases are kept private for safety reasons.
4. Electrical Speeding Sign: A Board member reiterated a concern raised during the January meeting, noting that an electrical speed sign should be used at 85-890 Waianae Valley Road; Lieutenant Tsuchida will again relay the request.

U.S. Army 25th ID (Light): No representative present; no report available.

Ordnance Reef Update: Hudson Kekaula reported that projects are ongoing with the military pursuing the needed permits and coordinating with the proper agencies. The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) is scheduled to finish its report, which will be incorporated into the Environmental Assessment (EA).

Questions, comments and concerns followed:

1. Future Project Funding: Kekaula noted that future earmarks are unlikely to be obtained. The earmarks were to be used for several coinciding projects with Ordnance Reef such as the educational programs and the proposed information office. Funding for current ongoing projects is secured.
2. Available Information: It was questioned and clarified that the University of Hawaii (UH) sampling report is not yet completed; however the community may receive a copy of the NOAA report.

Board of Water Supply (BWS): Sandy Nahoopii-Soong reported;

- Water Main Breaks: No main breaks were reported for the month of January.
- General Water Announcements: The BWS and the State Department of Health (DOH) released test results of initial island-wide screening for Chromium VI. The test results collected at BWS water sources may be found at [www.boardofwatersupply.com](http://www.boardofwatersupply.com). According to DOH, the Chromium VI results are within the expected range of naturally occurring levels for Hawaii and are not indicative of industrial contamination.
- Halawa Xeriscape Workshops: Workshops are held each month and are geared toward community education and how to save water. Upcoming classes include composting with recycled materials, spiral gardening and a rain barrel catchments class. For classes call 748-5363 or email [tours@hbws.org](mailto:tours@hbws.org).
- Construction Project Update: The project is ongoing with nothing new or out of the ordinary to report.

Questions, comments and concerns followed:

1. Ongoing Sampling: It was questioned how much longer BWS intends to test sample around the island. Nahoopii-Soong noted its unknown at this time, however updates may be reviewed at the BWS website.
2. Landfill Discussions: It was questioned and clarified that the BWS is not in discussions with other departments regarding possible locations of a landfill.

3. Hydrant Pole Repair: A community member thanked BWS for their steadfast work in repairing a damaged pole surrounding a fire hydrant.
4. Landfill Well Testing: It was questioned and clarified that DOH should be testing wells surrounding landfills, not BWS. It is uncertain if DOH provides BWS with the test results; Nahoopii-Soong to follow-up. Several concerns were raised with the possibility of seepage from landfill locations occurring; First Vice Chair noted that this issue should be directed to the Health and Safety Committee.
5. Chromium VI: A community member questioned and was clarified that Chromium VI has been found, however according to DOH, the levels are indicative of natural levels and not industrial contamination.

Board of Education (BOE): No representative present; no report available.

#### BOARD BUSINESS/ACTION:

Approval of February 1, 2011 Regular Meeting Agenda: **Perry moved and Silva seconded to approve the February 1, 2011 regular meeting agenda. The motion was ADOPTED UNANIMOUSLY, 7-0-0, (Aye: Endo, Frenzel, Leonida, Nahoopii, Perry, Silva and Smith.)**

Approval of Regular Meeting Minutes for February 2, 2010, April 6, 2010, May 4, 2010, September 7, 2010 and January 4, 2011: First Vice Chair Nahoopii explained that although several of the minutes are incomplete, the Board should approve them as is, to ensure proper binding procedures. It was noted the Board may choose to re-adopt corrections to any set of minutes, at a future meeting.

**Silva moved and Frenzel seconded to bundle and approve as is, the February 2, 2010, April 6, 2010, May 4, 2010, September 7, 2010 and January 4, 2011. The motion was ADOPTED, 6-1-0, (Aye: Endo, Frenzel, Leonida, Nahoopii, Silva and Smith; No: Perry.)**

Treasurer's Report: Endo read the December 2010 Treasurer's Report highlighting a current expense of \$400.00 due to videotaping of the Board meetings, leaving a current balance of \$2,883.80. The report was filed.

#### COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Economic & Development: Perry announced there will not be a committee meeting in February due to an error that occurred when filing the Board agendas. The next meeting is scheduled for Friday, March 4, 2011.

Education: Endo announced the next meeting will be held on Thursday, February 10, 2011 at Waianae High School, Room B105 at 4:00 p.m. The Race to the Top Committee has provided the State Department of Education (DOE) with a binder of recommendations. School Community Council (SCC) members are needed; schools are to take up elections in the upcoming months.

Questions, comments and concerns followed:

1. In Peace Meetings/ Ke Ala Hanau Moku: A community member attended the January In Peace meeting, and was told that the group was unaware of Ke Ala Hanau Moku, whom presented at the Board's meeting last month. It was noted the group may be known by the name 'A Promised Neighborhood'.
2. Recommendations Available: It was noted that Endo has requested a copy of the recommendations, interested community members may want to contact Leihoku Elementary School for a copy.
3. Intercom System at Waianae High School: A community member raised issue with the new intercom or public announcement (PA) system at Waianae High School, explaining it is extremely loud.

Health and Safety: Perry announced there will not be a committee meeting in February due to an error that occurred when filing the Board agendas. The next meeting is scheduled for Friday, March 4, 2011.

Parks & Recreation/Parks Beautification: First Vice Chair Nahoopii questioned if there are any Board members that would like to Chair the committee. It was explained that a Board member must Chair the committee. Silva volunteered to Chair the committee with the assistance of community member Cathie Alana.

Planning & Zoning: Perry announced there will not be a committee meeting in February due to an error that occurred when filing the Board agendas. The next meeting is scheduled for Friday, March 4, 2011.

Transportation and Oahu Metropolitan Planning Organization (OMPO): Smith announced the next committee meeting will be held on Monday, February 7, 2011, in the current location, beginning at 6:00 p.m. Smith will also be attending the next OMPO meeting, and noted that the Community Advisory Committee (CAC) is similar to the Neighborhood Board, and is only advisory; however, concerns are raised and addressed at the CAC meetings.

Questions, comments and concerns followed:

1. Community Representation: A community member thanked Smith for attending the OMPO CAC meetings, noting that the community is now well represented.
2. Funded Programs by OMPO: A community member explained that in the past, OMPO had funded the Farrington Highway Safety Improvement Program, which installed missing street lights along the coast.

Leeward Housing Coalition: First Vice Chair Nahoopii announced the next coalition meeting is scheduled for Thursday, February 24, 2011 at 7:00 p.m. at Saint Phillips Episcopal Church on Saint Johns Road.

ANNOUNCEMENTS: Several announcements were heard at this time;

- Board Candidacy Applications: Board and community members have been provided copies of the Neighborhood Board candidacy applications. Interested members must file their candidacy by Friday, February 18, 2011 with the Neighborhood Commission Office (NCO).
- Community Book Sale: Community members were encouraged to participate in a buy-one, get-one free book sale on February 10 and 11, 2011 from 8:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at Hoaliku Drake Pre-School.
- Possible Fan Donations: Community member, George Grace, would be willing to purchase and donate several fans for the Board meeting room location. It was noted that although the offer is very generous, the area schools are in much greater need of the fans.
- Sustainable Communities Plan: It was announced that the Waianae Sustainable Communities Plan will be discussed in the near future. The plan does include several changes, including the light industrial complex. Community members are urged to attend a community meeting this week and a Land Use Commission (LUC) meeting on Wednesday, February 16, 2011 at Kapolei Hale.

COMMUNITY CONCERNS: Several community concerns were voiced at this time;

Incomplete Board Minutes: Several concerns were raised with the incomplete Board minutes that were passed tonight. It was also noted that the November 3, 2009 minutes were never passed or discussed by the Board.

Appointed Representative: Several issues were raised regarding the process and appointment of the new State Representative for District 45. Residents expressed the feeling of being cheated and kept out of the process. A separate community member noted that there were opportunities to get involved in the process. Concerns were raised with the current State law that allowed the Governor to appoint a Senator and then a Representative seat.

Contaminated Waters: Issues were raised regarding the leakage and contamination of the ocean from several dumpsites along the coastline. It was noted that Hokele Beach Park is one of the contaminated sites. Concerns were also raised with the contamination of medical waste from the Waimanalo Gulch Landfill.

Ono Polynesian Liquor: A Board member thanked community members for getting involved and providing testimony regarding the liquor license request from Ono Polynesian. The establishment was approved to sell liquor, but only between the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.

Use of Makua Valley: Community members raised concern with the military use of Makua Valley, specifically pertaining to the amount of traffic and damage the convoys will create for the community.

Sustainable Communities Plan: Several community members voiced concern with the Waianae Sustainable

Communities Plan, which will be heard by the Planning Commission on February 16, 2011 at Kapolei Hale. Concerns raised included the fact that the once proposed Waianae Regional Park has been re-designated to Nanakuli, and made a top-priority. It was noted that community and Board members fought for the park in the past, and strongly urged the community to again fight for the Waianae Regional Park.

Agricultural Benefits: A community member raised concern over the diminishing agricultural benefits from the Waianae and Nanakuli coasts. In the past, Waianae was the lead producer of goods for the entire island.

Heavy Rains and Flooded Roads: Several community members raised concern with the recent flooding caused by the heavy rains. It was noted that residents were stranded and could not leave their properties. A community member raised issue with the emergency access road being locked for most of the day.

Recycling at Landfills: A community member raised issue with the amount of waste entering the landfills and suggested landfills be mandated to have recycling facilities. A separate community member raised concerns with the possibility of landfills digging up buried materials to recycle them. It was noted that residents island wide should be urged to recycle, which would decrease the amount of trash going into the landfills.

Mining the Mountains: A Board member raised concerns with possible mining occurring in the mountains; a community member noted she will follow-up as she is in contact with those residents.

Tropic Land LLC: Roberta Searle, Community Liaison and Cultural Consultant, spoke in favor of the proposed light industrial park in Nanakuli. It was noted that Tropic Land LLC are willing to work with the community and agricultural districts. For more information contact Searle at 469-8212. A community member spoke in opposition to the light industrial park, and requested a special meeting be held to discuss the issue; Perry to follow-up.

Frenchy DeSoto Services: Condolences were offered to the DeSoto family with the passing of community member Frenchy DeSoto. Services will be held on February 2 and 3, 2011.

Race to the Top: Community members were encouraged to get involved in the education of their children. It was noted that comments and or suggestions pertaining to the Race to the Top grant, may be submitted to Principal Randal Miura of Leihoku Elementary.

Transportation Legislation: A community member suggested legislators look into possible legislation to address the transportation ailments in the district. A suggested piece of legislation would require tractor and semi-trucks to stay in the right lane of traffic when entering Nanakuli.

Additional Agenda Items: It was explained that the Nanakuli-Maili Neighborhood Board will be discussing the possibility to include State and City agencies and departments, such as the State Department of Health (DOH) and City Department of Environmental Services (ENV), to its agenda. It was suggested the Waianae Coast Neighborhood Board do the same.

Lahaina Street Sidewalk: A community member raised concern with the status of the Lahaina Street sidewalks, noting some locations don't even have concrete. It was also noted the paint striping has not been done.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS: No unfinished business at this time.

NEW BUSINESS: No new business at this time.

#### MONTHLY REPORTS PART 2:

Mayor's Representative: No representative present; no report available.

City Councilmember Tom Berg: Councilmember Berg provided Board members with a copy of the 2011 City Council Calendar, as well as a list of suggested Capital Improvement Projects (CIP), provided by previous Councilmember Todd Apo's records, members were asked to provide Berg's office with their CIP suggestions.

- Closure of Landfill: There are currently three measures in City Council that address the issues pertaining to Waimanalo Gulch and would close the landfill by July 2012. One measure looks to waive the Jones Act, allowing waste to be shipped, even internationally.

- Intergovernmental Ideas: The Councilmember is looking to include all levels of government in addressing the landfill issue, including the military. It was also noted that he opposes the alternative landfill site selection committee, and feels that the location of a new landfill is already a done deal.
- Alternative Energy: It has been suggested that an Energy Czar be formed with City and State officials, to focus on streamlining projects and issues pertaining to alternative energy.
- Homeless Issue on Coast: As one of the major issues facing the entire island, and with emphasis on the Waianae Coast, the Councilmember plans to address the homeless issue by looking at possible measures that would rezone a new land classification.
- Collaboration with State: The Councilmember noted he will be working closely with Senator Shimabukuro on several pieces of legislation regarding the closure of the Waimanalo Gulch Landfill. Berg also noted he was impressed by the safety measures put in place to stop runoff at the PVT Landfill.

Questions, comments and concerns followed:

1. Medical Waste Leak: Concerns were raised regarding the leakage of medical waste from Waimanalo Gulch Landfill. Councilmember Berg explained that he is looking into legislation that would require medical waste to be incinerated, as well as require ocean water quality tests.
2. Landfill Selection Repeat: Concerns were raised with the 13-member selection committee, noting that the community in the past has opposed site locations. Issues were raised that the committee will again select sites that are not in the best interest of the community.
3. Road Repairs Needed: Several community members requested road repair at several streets including Lahaina Street, Piliilau Avenue and Kili Drive.
4. Alternative Access Route: It was questioned and clarified that the Councilmember is in favor of an alternative access route; however he is not one of the 13 voting members on OMPO. The Councilmember suggested that all parties, City, State and Federal work together on this issue.
5. Homeless Cleanup: It was questioned and clarified that the Councilmember has not yet talked with homeless residents residing in Keeau Beach Park. The park is scheduled to be cleaned and subject to nightly closures in March.
6. Agricultural Taskforce: Concerns were raised with the City's Agricultural Task Force, noting that the community is not represented. It was questioned whom the members are, and what exactly is it they do.
7. Increased Water Charges: A community member raised concerns regarding the current water charges families are faced with, noting that many families live together and must now pay larger sums.
8. PVT Landfill Accolades: Concerns were raised with PVT Landfill, noting the close proximity to residential homes and the lack of monetary justification to damages. It was suggested the Councilmember remain neutral and listen to all residents before providing accolades.
9. CIP 2010/2011 List: It was questioned and clarified that the CIP request lists provided reflect requests from 2010 and 2011, which were provided by previous Councilmember Todd Apo.
10. Community Benefits Package: A community member raised issue with the Community Benefits Advisory Committee (CBAC), noting that all members are Mayoral appointed. It was suggested that members of the CBAC be Neighborhood Board members. Concerns were also raised with the recent auditing of CBAC funds by the Carlisle Administration.
11. Kaupuni Neighborhood Park: Concerns were raised with the construction of Kaupuni Neighborhood Park being put on hold due to the contractor working on another job in Nanakuli.
12. Waianae Valley Homestead Park: A community member noted that the repaving of Waianae Valley Homestead road is still not complete. The project was started in October 2010. Kaneaki Street will also

need to be re-stripped. The Councilmember requested that the specific information be emailed to him.

Governor's Representative: No representative present; no report available.

Senator Maile Shimabukuro: Senator Shimabukuro reported;

- Confirmation Hearing: The Senate Water, Land & Housing (WLH) Committee and Senate Hawaiian Affairs (HWN) Committee will be holding the confirmation hearing for State Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) Interim Director William Aila, Jr. on Saturday, February 12, 2011.
- Bills of Interest: Included in the Senator's report was a list of bills to be introduced including bills addressing housing, the environment, Hawaiian affairs and flood and natural disaster issues.
- Memorial Services: Former Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) Chairwoman and Hawaiian activist, Frenchy DeSoto, will be remembered in services on Wednesday, February 2, 2011 at 6:30 p.m. and Thursday, February 3, 2011 at 11:30 a.m. at the Mililani Mortuary, mauka chapel.
- Aloha Aina Day: Community members were encouraged to participate in the Aloha Aina Earth Day Recycling event on March 5, 2011 at Waianae High School from 8:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.
- Planning Commission: As previously stated, the Honolulu Planning Commission will be holding its hearing on the Waianae Sustainable Communities Plan on Wednesday, February 16, 2011 at 1:30 p.m. at Kapolei Hale.
- Mahalo Community: Community member Kapua Keliikoa-Kamai was thanked for work and volunteerism at the Senator's office. Applause followed.

Questions, comments and concerns followed:

1. Leeward Coast Housing Plan: A question was raised as to whether there is any check and balance routines completed by the State once a housing project is funded. The Senator explained the proper funding methods, and noted that if there is an issue regarding a specific project, residents may contact the Hawaii public Housing Authority (HPHA).
2. Opening Day Festivities: It was questioned and clarified that the Senator did provide Hawaiian food for the visiting constituents, which her office will pay for. The food was catered by Ulu Kekukui.
3. Budget Deficit Ideas: It was suggested that monies collected from the housing shelters, be returned to the State, which would then eliminate some debts or costs for HPHA.

Board member Leonida retired from the meeting at 10:00 p.m. A quorum of six (6) members present.

Board Member Keith Pine Third Absence: **Perry moved and Smith seconded to add discussion to Board member Pine's absences onto the agenda. The motion was ADOPTED UNANIMOUSLY, 6-0-0, (Aye: Endo, Frenzel, Nahoopii, Perry, Silva and Smith.)**

First Vice Chair explained that Board member Pine has accumulated three absences, tonight's meeting included. In accordance with the Neighborhood Plan, the Board shall send a letter, or authorize the Neighborhood Commission Office (NCO), notifying Pine of his absences.

**Perry moved and Smith seconded to authorize the Neighborhood Commission Office (NCO) in accordance with the Neighborhood Plan, to send a 'Three Absence Letter' to Board member Keith Pine. The motion was ADOPTED UNANIMOUSLY, 6-0-0, (Aye: Endo, Frenzel, Nahoopii, Perry, Silva and Smith.)**

Neighborhood Assistant Ribac retired from the meeting at 10:00 p.m. **First Vice Chair Nahoopii and Secretary Frenzel continued the minutes.**

Senator Maile Shimabukuro (Continued):

Community member questions/issues presented to Senator Shimabukuro:

- A community member explained the rules enforced by the State's Shelters; the Senator explained there are standard rules for all Hawaii shelters and would post the link to these rules on her blog.
- A community member was concerned about the lack of honey bees for the farmers and asked if the Senator was aware of any genetic engineering taking place in Hawaii.
- A community member asked about programs to help with college level education opportunities.
- A community member discussed the need for public hearings for landfill issues and questioned why PVT was not required to hold public hearings.
- A community member asked why trucks on Farrington Highway could not be restricted to certain lanes and cited for speeding in residential areas as well as better enforcement by Sheriffs.

Representative Jo Jordan: Rep. Jordan was present and provided an update on the following issues:

- Provided her thanks the Governor and democratic process for her nomination.
- Submitted 22 Bills and several CIP requests,
- Introduced a bill establishing a Makua Reserve commission.
- Introduced bills regarding homeless assistance, solid waste reduction by 75%, establishing a fund for green zones, landfill moratorium and prohibition of landfill expansions on the Waianae coast.
- Discussed her selection as Vice Chair of the Health Services Committee, member of Cultural and Arts Committee, Finance Committee, and Hawaiian Affairs Committee.

Community member questions/issues presented to Rep Jordan:

- A board member mentioned her misgivings regarding the selection process for filling the vacant house seat for District 45.
- A board member asked for an explanation of the Capitol Improvement Process; Rep Jordan explained that all actions go directly to the Finance Committee.
- Rep. Jordan explained that she would represent everyone to make the community better for ourselves and for our futures.

Representative Karen Awana: Rep. Awana was present and provided an update on the following issues:

- Heavy rains that flooded Farrington Highway.
- Flood waters in Lualualei Valley.
- Waimanalo Gulch overflow of medical waste.
- Emergency access for Waianae Coast residents.
- Free tax help statewide.
- CTAHR helping Waianae Coast farmers.
- Rep. Awana was assigned to the Economic Development and Education brackets, the Oahu Metropolitan Planning Organization – Policy Committee, the Association of Pacific Island Legislatures' Board of Directors, and Director of Women in Government organization.

- A board member asked about the results of Rep Awana's meeting with the EPA who visited the Waianae Coast.
