REGULAR MEETING MINUTES
THURSDAY, JANUARY 17, 2007
HALE AKOAKOA, ROOM 103-106
WINDWARD COMMUNITY COLLEGE

CALL TO ORDER – Chair Roy Yanagihara called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. with a quorum present.

FILLING OF VACANCIES, Subdistrict 2, Subdistrict 9 (one seat each) - Chair Yanagihara asked if there were any interested persons present to fill the vacancies

Sub district 2 – Christopher Steele offered to fill the vacancy and gave a brief background on himself and reasons for wanting to serve as a Board member. **Without objections, Christopher Steele was appointed to fill the vacancy in sub district 2.**

Chair Yanagihara called a two-minute recess while Steele's address was verified and the oath of office was administered.

Sub district 9 – There were no interested persons present to fill the vacancy.

7:08 p.m. Lum arrived (14 members present).

Without objections, the agenda was taken out of order to Elected Officials, Governor's Representative.

ELECTED OFFICIALS:

Governor's Representative – Scott Ishikawa circulated the Governor's Weekly Update and gave the following Kahekili Highway Beautification project update: trees, native plants and vines will soon be planted along the Kahekili Highway concrete canyon as the State begins a long-awaited \$4.08 million beautification project. The plan calls for 19 vine planters along the walls on both sides of the highway and two large planters between Kulukeoe Street and Kea'ahala Road and between Kahuhipa Street and Ha'iku Road. Creeping vines will grace the walls and native Hawaiian plants will line the medians, with Ishikawa adding that the plants are yet to be selected. Work is expected to be completed in December.

Questions, answers, comments:

1. Follow up will be done that the median walls are will be uniform in color.



2. Concrete barriers have been temporarily put up for the protection of the workers.
3. The bike lanes will be repaved.
4. Tree cutting along Kahekili and Pali Highways has started after a meeting with the Outdoor Circle. Approximately 200 albizia trees will be trimmed back. Albizia trees are a problem (grows tall and weak branches just break off) and a few have been removed from the H-2. Some iron wood trees will also be cut and once complete another meeting will be held with the Outdoor Circle. A new type of tree trimming called directional trimming will be used, which shifts the weight of the tree without removal.
5. Lights were reported extinguished on "town side" of Wilson Tunnel by Mr. Lum. Follow up will be done.
6. More funding from the Governor was requested for Kaneohe Bay. In response, some legislators will be asking for more funding since the incident at the sandbar. Also Department of Land and Natural Resources Director, Laura Thielen and her staff will be requesting more funding.

The agenda order resumed.

APPROVAL OF DECEMBER 20, 2007 REGULAR MEETING MINUTES – DeRego moved, seconded by Morris to accept the regular meeting minutes of December 20, 2007 as written. The motion carried unanimously, 14-0-0.

APPROVAL OF JANUARY AGENDA PLANNING AND COMMITTEES' MEETING MINUTES - Deferred

TREASURER'S REPORT – Treasurer Beatty reported for the month of December current expenses in the Operating Account were \$33.94, leaving a balance of \$1,295.43.

Without objections, the agenda was taken out of order to Elected Officials, Governor's Representative.

PUBLIC SAFETY AND MILITARY REPORT:

Honolulu Fire Department: Captain Paul Kato reported:

1. Statistics for the month of December included Fires 4 structure and 1 rubbish; 120 medical. 11 search/rescue, and 53 response calls.
2. Unusual Incidents – On December 4, 5, and 6 high southerly winds caused multiple blown roofs, downed trees, and downed power lines

Fire Safety Tip:

Ensure that your smoke alarms are functioning properly by testing them regularly in the presence of all household members. Practice your escape plan together.

As a result of a smoke alarm and a parent's quick response, a child's life was saved. The child was unable to escape from the room where the fire originated; however, the parent told Fire Investigators that upon hearing the smoke alarm, she went to the room to investigate and was able to save her child.

Questions, answers and comments: Chair Yanagihara recommended changing smoke alarm batteries during the Christmas season.

Honolulu Police Department – Lt. Vines reported:

Statistics for the month of December included simple assault 9, burglary 23, drugs/narcotics 3, DUI 11, family offense/neglect 8, family argument 30, graffiti 11, identification theft 4, motor vehicle theft 10, property damage 20, motor vehicle collisions 145, theft 51, threatening 9, and unauthorized entry into motor vehicle 23. (Copies of the statistics report were available for interested persons to review).

Highlights:

- December 17, 10 p.m., robbery at P & L Market, 2 male suspects arrested; bad drug deal.

- December 17, 10 a.m., 1400 block of Malia Place, suspect with a gun approached homeowner in his garage, went into the home looking for money, and stole jewelry; possible drug related.
- December 17, 10:40 p.m., pedestrian hit on Kamehameha Highway (critical condition).
- November 9 to December 13, crew surveillance near Longs Drug Store Kaneohe, unauthorized entry into motor vehicles, auto thefts attempt, arrests were made.
- December 12, Narcotics and warrants arrests.
- December 11, Kualoa Park, 11:45 a.m., breaking into vehicles, suspect in stolen vehicle headed Kaneohe bound pulled along side Kahekili Highway by officers, suspect then rammed a police car three times and was arrested for attempted murder.
- December 16, ex-girl friend murdered in Kailua, suspect caught in Kaneohe

Questions, answers, comments:

1. The incident in Kailua was domestic.
2. Kanemori commented about the time that is spent painting over graffiti, and reported graffiti at that the storage facility across from Koa Pancake House. A graffiti statistic's report was requested. In response, the public is relied on to report graffiti. The crew and Citizens Patrol Teams would have statistics on arrests. Unfortunately, there is far more tagging than arrests.
3. Regarding the H-1 problem today causing the closure of the freeway for about 3-4 hours, where a mentally deranged person took a child and threw him over the Miller Street pedestrian overpass. The Homicide and Traffic Divisions must do thoroughly investigate the case. Lots of investigative equipment takes time to set up. However, the chief's priority is to clear lanes as soon as possible.
4. Regarding helping with graffiti removal, Beatty asked if security cameras are installed at the facility mentioned above and encouraged that they be used. In answer, video tapes could be used as evidence.
5. Beatty asked about the bystander injured when trying to help the murdered person. In reply, that would be a hard call to make and one should their best judgment and their safety if trying to intervene.
6. With the recent murder, Beatty encouraged people to get a gun permit. In answer, it was explained that Texas has different laws where citizens are allowed to bear arms. Everyone was reminded to be careful of what is happening before intervening when someone is using excessive force. It is best to call 911 and observe. Chair Yanagihara added a previous incident on the North Shore where a farmer, protecting his property took the law into his own hands and shoot a trespasser, killing him. He does not recommend the course of action of bearing arms for Hawaii.
7. Kanemori reiterated a concern from last month relating to cars with illegal loud car mufflers and loud motorcycles. He stated that law requirements for reconstruction permits are being enforced, and owners not going through the process to get one. Lt. Vines said that the issue is an ongoing battle.
8. Ditch asked what is the HPD policy regarding the homeless social problems near Longs. In response, HPD has limited enforcement on private property; the property owner must call HPD to have the issue a trespass. However, HPD cannot enforce illegal camping laws due to a ruling by the State Supreme Court, and must be addressed by the State as a whole. Chair Yanagihara noted there was supposed to be a presentation on the homeless tonight, but speakers were unable to attend the meeting.

PUBLIC INPUT & RESIDENTS' CONCERNS: Chair Yanagihara referenced the concern raised earlier about graffiti.

Malama 96744 – Jerry Jardin circulated flyers, and announced Malama 96744 Care for the Community Campaign is sponsoring its first graffiti paint-out of the year at 7:30 a.m. January 26 starting at Kane'ohe District Park. Scott Sunaoka, from Hope Chapel said the church's junior group would be participating in the paint out. Jardin added that more community participation is needed to keep Kaneohe beautiful.

Questions, answers, comments: Weather permitting, the paint out should be from 7:30 to 11:30 a.m.

ELECTED OFFICIALS' REPORTS:

Mayor's Representative – Rae Gee, representing Mayor Hannemann reported:

1. Mayor Hannemann wishes everyone a Happy New Year.
2. City and County of Honolulu's month in China Town 2008, Chinese New Year of the Rat festivities:
 - Chinese New Year Festival, Friday & Saturday, January 18 & 19, 25 & 26, 10 a.m. to 10 p.m., Chinatown Cultural Plaza, open to public, free.
 - China's Best Children's Music & Dancing Variety Show – Sunday, January 27, 3 p.m., Pearl City High School auditorium.
 - 59th Annual Narcissus Festival, Friday, February 1, Chinatown, open to public, free.
 - "Chinatown HI", Friday, February 1, 5-11 p.m., free.
 - Chinatown Open House, Friday, February 1, 5-11 p.m. & Saturday, February 2, 9 a.m.-11 p.m. Chinatown Cultural Plaza, open to public, free.

3. Three handouts were circulated: a) potholes; City pothole hotline 768-7777 and State pothole hotline 536-PUKA. b) Information from the State Department of Transportation regarding the pedestrian law. C) The Mayor's midterm report.

Questions, answers, comments:

1. Regarding pedestrian and car protocol at the King Intermediate School intersection, information is provided in the State's handout or on the "Walk Wise Hawaii" website. For City pedestrian information log on to www.honolulu.gov/dts.
2. All City agencies are currently going through the budget process.
3. For pedestrian crossings, Lum mentioned that in Las Vegas they have a crosswalk marker (moveable) where pedestrians must stop before crossing, and suggested it for the downtown area; he noted that this cone has been looked at by OMPO.
4. Follow up will done as to how many employees are tasked with patching potholes.
5. The City Department of Human Services will be holding a job fair on Wednesday, May 21, 2008 at the Neal Blaisedell Pikake Room. Job availability is current listed online.
6. Regarding potholes, Beatty mentioned they are usually caused by bad sub-grade and weather. Jefferies added roadways deteriorate over the years.
7. Chair Yanagihara thanked Gee for the informational handouts and reported traffic light sensors not working at the intersection of Kamehameha Highway and William Henry Road.

Council Chair Barbara Marshall – Venus Acoba distributed the written report and highlighted a letter of response to the Board regarding vacation rentals from Council Chair Marshall: Pending before the Planning Commission right now are two sets of potential bills. The Council in October 2005, after months of lengthy hearings, including three informational briefings around the Island, sent over Resolution 05-186 CD1, relating to proposing an amendment to

Chapter 21, revised ordinances of Honolulu 1990 (the land use ordinance), as amended, relating to the regulation of certain visitor accommodations and 187 CD1, relating to proposing an amendment to chapter 21, revised ordinances of Honolulu 1990 (the land use ordinance), as amended, relating to bed and breakfast homes.

1. The Department of Planning and Permitting (DPP) has sent its own versions of those bills to the Planning Commission, recommending that the Planning commission approve the DPP version and not recommend the Council version. Both versions of Resolution 186 give DPP another tool to enforce laws banning transient vacation units (TVU's) by making it illegal for a TVU to advertise without a permit number. Only legal TVU's have a Conditional Use Permit number-so any illegal TVU could be cited immediately. The Council version mandates immediate and hefty fines; the DPP version allows DPP flexibility in levying fines and gives them the authority to negotiate fines, as they now do. Resolution 187 deals with bed and breakfasts – legally defined as up to two bedrooms in a person's own home. The Council version places b&b's under the home occupation provisions of the Land Use Ordinance (LUO) but establishes a permit system (outside the LUO) where a homeowner could apply for a b&b permit after notifying neighbors within 500 feet – and getting their permission. If more than 50% of the neighbors oppose the b&b, no permit is issued. And, as with TUV's advertising without a permit is a violation in itself. The DPP version permits B&B's to apply for a conditional use permit- the process currently in effect for those few b&b's and TUV's which are legal. Because the Council version removes the B&B permitting from the LUO and places it in the ordinances, it provides a more efficient way to change the law should that be necessary. Amending the LUO, conversely, is an arduous process often taking years to accomplish.
2. A professional poll of 200 people was taken in 2004 on the issue, with 32% agreeing that the property owner should reside there.
3. Chair Yanagihara reminded anyone with concerns regarding this issue should call Council Chair Marshall's office at 768-5003.
4. Follow up will be done if current bills relating to B&B's/TUV's would automatically give a permit.
5. At this time there is no word relative to the proposed rail system panel.
6. The next 3 TALKS session is on Tuesday, February 13, 2008, Kaneohe Community & Senior Center at 7 p.m.

There were no questions from Board members or guests.

U.S. Representative Mazie Hirono – No representative was present.

Senator Jill Tokuda – Senator Tokuda circulated her Year in Review report and announced that she is the chair for the Agriculture and Hawaiian Cultural Affairs Committee.

Questions, answers, comments:

1. Follow up will be done regarding the Castle Hills project.
2. Chair Yanagihara commended Senator Tokuda for doing a good job with the legislative committee and the Bureau of Conveyance.
3. The annual Capital Improvement Project (CIP) proposals – school funding, Kawai Nui Marsh Advisory Council (community involvement), agriculture issues, Monk Seal Day, and education.
4. The Citizen Watch Advisory will be proposed again.
5. Sager said that at Le Jardin Celebration on February 2 would be a good time to officially announce the update title for Kawai Nui Marsh. In response, that would be a possibility and that phase 1 of the analysis has been completed.
6. Ditch mentioned regarding funding for schools, are teachers taking out of pocket money to be used for students. In answer, it is hard and various ways are being sought; she has tried to increase schools flexibility,

but if no funding how can a school be flexible. A possibility is a public/private effort and more community involvement in the schools.

Senator Clayton Hee – J. Personius reported:

1. The 2008 Legislative session opened yesterday.
2. HeE is the chair for the Water and Land Committee and vice-chair for the Education Committee.
3. 2008 is the Year of the Reef.
4. CIP priority request being accepted via email.
5. Some proposals for legislation are agriculture, world classification, land concerns, etc.

Questions, answers, comments:

1. The Board will be kept informed regarding agriculture land and the possible use for other purposes.
2. Follow up will be done if a similar bill relating to Ahu o Laka monument would be proposed this year.
3. Chair Yanagihara asked about protection of Kaneohe Bay and noted that the Kaneohe Bay Regional Council expressed concern that the bay be protected.
4. Follow up will be done regarding the Senator's position on proposed bills.

Representative Ken Ito – No representative was present.

Representative Pono Chong – Janine Tully announced that Representative Chong has been appointed House Speaker Vice-Chair, and that he assures all his constituents that the district will not be neglected.

1. Issues from last year include renewable energy, protecting agriculture lands, sustainability, affordable housing, etc.
2. He will continue to push for education and the upgrade of schools, such as the Castle High School cafeteria. The governor will be asked to release funding for road resurfacing; spoke with the State Department of Transportation design personnel and was told that the bid is going out.
3. There is a proposal to fully fund the Super Sucker Boat, which now is used once a week in Kaneohe Bay removing invasive algae, and could be put to better use on other islands as well. Ditch asked for more information about the Super Sucker. Tully replied the boat is a large raft with a large vacuum that removes invasive algae and must be barged to another island. Tully noted that public/private partnerships work well.

COMMUNITY GROUPS AND ORGANIZATIONS:

Hope Chapel – Scott Sunaoka reported that Hope Chapel co-sponsored the Kaneohe Christmas Parade and decorated the Kaneohe Police Station. It has been a church tradition to have a school drive, and he thanked all the teacher and students who sent thank you letters. The schools drive is done once a year, but the group will try to have two. They are also trying to get televisions and fans for the schools. This year the seventh and eighth graders will be participating in the graffiti paint out. Kapunahala Elementary has been adopted with after school's tutoring, etc. Background checks are done on all volunteers.

Chair Yanagihara thanked Hope Chapel for the Christmas display at the Kaneohe Police Station.

Hawaii Pacific University – No representative was present.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS:

Hawaiian Memorial Park Update – Kris DeRego, Standing Committee Chair, distributed copies of the Hawaiian Memorial Park Cemetery Expansion Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) preparation notice to Board members. The Standing Committee has been investigating the expansion regarding concerns expressed about native species plants, vegetation, etc. He asked if there were any conflict relative to this issue. Part of the EIS process is to have a hearing before the Land Use Commission (LUC), which will be held when the final EIS is accepted. Public comments are being

accepted at this time. DeRego asked Chair Yanagihara if the Standing Committee could submit the comments due to the deadline being before the next Board meeting. Chair Yanagihara replied that all comments must come before the full Board and he is quite sure that late comments would be accepted. It was noted that audience member Scott Ezer nodded to DeRego that late comments would be accepted.

Questions, answers, comments:

1. Per the EIS, Lum asked where the water retention basins are located. DeRego replied the basins are not part of the concept map now. Lum raised hydrology concerns and mentioned that the developer be asked that they be addressed on a regular basis.
2. Chair Yanagihara explained DeRego's role as Standing Committee Chair to new Board member Steele, noting that he is the liaison committee chair and stays knowledgeable on the project.
3. DeRego requested that comments be incorporated and voted on by the Standing Committee since the deadline for comments is before the next Board meeting. Chair Yanagihara replied that all comments must come before the full Board and he is quite sure that late comments would be accepted. It was noted that audience member Scott Ezer nodded to DeRego that late comments would be accepted.
4. Chair Yanagihara mentioned that individual comments may also be sent in. He stated that committee decisions must come before the Board for acceptance.

Kaneohe Neighborhood Board Weblog – Sager reported that all Board members should have received the test blog and invited those who have not to check it out. At this time the blog should give the Board direction, board approval from the Neighborhood Commission Office, and open for discussion.

Chair Yanagihara asked for a recap, noting would the approval form the Neighborhood Commission Office to comply with the Sunshine Law, considering the internet blog. Sager said this would allow many to participate in discussion and considered a useful tool for the Board. He asked to proceed with his resolution.

Sager moved, seconded by Morris to further work on the blog, approach the Neighborhood Commission Office and ask for official approval. The motion was adopted unanimously, 14-0-0.

NEW BUSINESS:

Hui Ku Maoli (Forest Stewardship Program) – Matt Shirman introduced Rick Barboza and presented the following: Hui Ku Maoli Ola, native plants, is located on a 63-acre plot leased from Kamehameha Schools back of Haiku Road. The goal is long term, but support and more funding is needed. Sherry Mann, with the Forest Stewardship Program, was introduced.

Questions, answers, and comments followed:

1. Kamehameha Schools gives the right to access back of Haiku valley.
2. The goal for the stewardship program (Haiku area) is to plant native Hawaiian plants such as java plum, and rubber. However, rose myrtle (invasive species) is a threat.
3. School groups, adults and community members are helping with planting the plants.
4. Basically one bus load of people come to Hui Ku Maoli Ola once a month.
5. Loi would be planted in a separate area from the stewardship program, but there are no formal plans yet. Archaeological sites will not be disturbed. 6) Main entry/exit is off of Kahekili Highway, up Haiku Road and right onto the property.
6. The company is already operating as an agriculture business, primarily as a wholesale nursery. The public is invited to the nursery.

7. Regarding truck traffic, deliveries to the nursery are made every couple of days and deliveries to stores three times a week.
8. Currently there are nine employees and traffic impact is minimal.
9. Pesticides are used at a minimum and the berm is located thirty-feet away.
10. Plant samples are kalo for the loi (plan to restore), ohia Lehua, white hibiscus (native to the Koolau's), palapalai fern, maile, Hawaiian sandalwood, lolu Hawaiian palm and na`u (Hawaiian gardenia).
11. Student classes were held over the holidays and nursery productions have a broad range of plants.
12. Regarding wild pig problems, pig hunters trespass on the property to go pig hunting.
13. Planting of the sandalwood trees has been successful.
14. Mann relayed that information provided by the stewardship program tries to encourage private landowners to get involved with the community at least ten years or as long as possible.
15. In response if they are looking for letters of support, Shirman replied that both positive and negative letters are always welcome.
16. Chair Yanagihara asked Sager to prepare a letter of support, although there are no Haiku residents are in attendance. There were no objections to the letter.

World Wetlands Day (Kawai Nui Marsh) – Chuck Burrows reported the Kawainui and Hamakua Marsh Complex was designated a Ramsar Wetlands of International Importance in 2005, announced World Wetlands Day 2008, Saturday, February 2, 2008 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., Le Jardin Academy (Kapa'a Quarry Road & Kalaniana'ole Highway, Kailua. Keynote Speaker from the Ramsar Program, exhibits, Tours of Kawainui & Hamakua Marsh, entertainment, and food to purchase. All events are free and open to the public.

Windward Homeless Coalition – No representative was present.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Environmental Committee – Chair Sager read a Kaneohe Bay Regional Council meeting report held on January 2, 2008 and highlighted:

- It was reported The Nature Conservancy (TNC) has expanded its program from strictly a terrestrial point of view to include ocean habitat. Kaneohe Bay was designated as an area of critical concern and TNC is developing a strategic plan to address those concerns. TNC assured the Council that the plan will be consistent with the Kaneohe Bay master Plan,
- The recreational boating representatives reported that there were many boats at the sandbar during the Blue Angel demonstration and coordinated enforcement effort by several agencies was superb. There were no incidents during the two day event.
- John Morgan announced his term will be ending in June and that commercial operators in the Bay recommended Joe Pickard as his replacement.
- Dry dock operations at Heeia-kea were discussed due to a resident's complaint about trash, largely a result of illegal dumping. The harbor master is working with Hawaii Metal Recycling and local nonprofit organizations and schools to get the area cleaned up.
- The new Kaneohe Bay regulations are being proposed by the State Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) were discussed. Concerns were expressed regarding the implementation of the rule regarding touching, walking on or sitting on live coral. It was pointed out that "live coral" was poorly defined.
- Sager expressed his opinion that the Division of Conservation and Resource Enforcement (DOCARE) is responsible for enforcing regulations related to natural resource management and is not responsible for behavioral problems at the sandbar. Furthermore, the basic problem is not rowdy behavior at the sandbar, but the lack of enforcement of drunken driving rules for boats operated in the Bay.

Questions, answers and comments followed: 1) The new Kaneohe Bay regulations are probably 30 pages, complex, based on the KBRC. It was indicated that most problems are due to drunkenness.

Windward Civilian/Military Committee – Chair Flanigan thanked the Board for honoring the military at the last meeting.

OMPO Citizen Advisory Committee (CAC) – Chair Lum reported at the last meeting the CAC discussed public/private highway construction, which the Board opposed.

Neighborhood Board Website Contact Committee – Chair Beatty reported he is working on the infrastructure and logistics.

Hawaii Memorial Park Committee – Reported earlier in the meeting.

ANNOUNCEMENTS:
