### **DRAFT REGULAR MEETING MINUTES MONDAY, APRIL 11, 2016 298 REGIMENT MFTU RTI AUDITORIUM**

CALL TO ORDER – Chair Wilson Kekoa Ho called the meeting to order at 7:34 p.m. **Quorum was established with seven (7) members present.** (Note – This 13-member Board requires seven (7) members to establish a quorum and to take official Board action.) Chair Ho welcomed everyone to the April 2016 meeting of the Waimanalo Neighborhood Board No. 32.

Vacancies – There were three (3) vacancies – one (1) vacancy in Subdistrict 2 (Core Homes), one (1) vacancy in Subdistrict 5 (Village Area), and one (1) vacancy in Subdistrict 11 (Hale Aupuni).

OPENING PULE – Chair Ho noted that the meetings begin with an opening prayer. Those not wishing to participate were allowed to remove themselves. Pastor Bud Stonebraker gave the pule.

Chair Ho changed the order of the agenda.

Mālama Honua Public Charter School – Four (4) young children gave a brief message about what they are learning and invited everyone to the Hoolaulea from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. on Saturday, April 23, 2016 for the Earth Day weekend.

Chair Ho restored the order of the agenda.

### CITY MONTHLY REPORTS

Honolulu Fire Department (HFD) Report – There was no representative present and no report available.

Honolulu Police Department (HPD) Report, District 4 covers from Waimanalo to Kahuku – Major Gordon Gomes introduced himself as the new Commander for the district and Lieutenant John Asing reported the following:

- March 2016/February 2016 Crime Statistics – There were 2/4 motor vehicle thefts, 2/5 burglaries, 11/15 thefts, and 22/26 unauthorized entries into motor vehicles (UEMV).
- Crime Safety Tip – Cell Phone/Mobile Devices Enforcement of Violations – HPD will be focusing on enforcement and warned the public not to hold the mobile devices in the hand. Use a hands-free (Bluetooth-type) device.

Alivado and Ralston arrived at 7:45 p.m.; **nine (9) members present.**

Comments followed:

1. Fines – A Board member asked what the fine was. Lieutenant Asing noted that fines ranged from the high \$200s to the high \$300s in a school zone.
2. On the Seat – A community member asked if the speaker was on the seat. Lieutenant Asing responded as long as it is not in the hand.
3. Insurance Companies – Albinio mentioned that the insurance companies look first if a cell phone was in use. Although the fine is large, a split second could cost a life. Albinio added do not use it with kids in the car. Lieutenant Asing has seen accidents and noted safety first.
4. Painting the Median – Jamila asked about painting the median at Keolu Drive and Kalaniana'ole Highway. Chair Ho already talked to HPD and will ask Mayor's Representative Jun Yang when his report comes up.

Board of Water Supply (BWS) – Danielle Ornellas reported the following:

- Telephone Scam Warning – The Board of Water Supply (BWS) would like to warn the community of a telephone scam where BWS customers are being targeted in an attempt to fraudulently collect money. BWS has received several reports of customers being contacted by a person claiming to be a BWS employee and being told they owe a large sum of money. They were threatened that the bill amount must be paid immediately to avoid water service shut off. Anyone who receives unexpected and/or aggressive phone calls in reference to a past due bill are encouraged to call the BWS for verification. Do not give any information to the caller.
  - Call BWS customer service staff at 748-5030 or sign up for online billing services for accurate information about your account.
  - BWS does not call customers outside its business hours of Monday-Friday, 7:45 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., to request for payment.
  - BWS does not call customers, demand payment, and collect payment all in the same phone call.
  - If a customer is contacted for overdue payment, he or she will be asked to call 748-5030 to make credit card payment.
  - Hang up on suspicious callers. If you feel pressured for immediate payment or personal information, hang up the phone and call BWS customer service at 748-5030. This will ensure you are speaking to a real representative.
  - Residents are encouraged to call the Honolulu Police Department at 911 if they encounter any suspicious activity. The community may also call the BWS at 748-5000.
- Main Break Report – There were three (3) water main breaks, two (2) near Sea Life Park and Rocky Road. There was lots of rubbish, which was cleared and the road is still bumpy. BWS plans to flatten it.

Comments followed: Bumpy Roads – Two (2) community members mentioned road repairs. Chair Ho asked Ornellas to follow up.

THREE (3) ABSENCES LETTER FOR JOE ALBINIO – Chair Ho explained that last month the Board could not take action, due to lack of a quorum. Chair Ho added that the Board member, who misses three (3) meetings, has an opportunity to explain his absences and the Board may take action to vacate the seat or not. For the three (3) absences by Joe Albinio, no action was taken.

FILLING OF THREE (3) VACANCIES ON BOARD – One (1) in Subdistrict 2 (Core Homes), one (1) in Subdistrict 5 (Village Area), and one (1) in Subdistrict 11 (Hale Aupuni) – As there were no nominations or interested candidates, Chair Ho deferred this agenda item to the next meeting. Buck asked if the Neighborhood Commission (NC) could change a few of the vacant seats to At Large seats. Chair Ho had already addressed this concern with the Neighborhood Commission.

## ELECTED OFFICIALS

Mayor Kirk Caldwell's Representative – Executive Director Jun Yang, Mayor's Office of Housing, reported the following:

- April is Earth Month – The Storm Water Quality Branch of the Department of Facility Maintenance (DFM) has a poster to promote actions to minimize polluted runoff by providing volunteer opportunities to participate in cleanups and promoting simple pollution prevention actions that can be done at home. The free 9th Annual Mauka to Makai Environmental Expo "Come and Celebrate!" will be on Saturday, April 23, 2016, from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. at the Waikiki Aquarium. There will be a puppet show and other activities. There will be other events scheduled for April 2016, for example, on Saturday, April 23, 2016 there will be

Adopt-A-Stream Clean Up at Kahawai Stream. Yang left a poster at the table at the front door and another poster for Chair Ho.

- Park Play Equipment – Chair Ho saw on the TV the Mayor commenting on the improvements to the City Parks. Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR) thanked the Board for the comments and responded under the Mayor's Year of the Park program, DPR continues to work on refurbishing and replacing existing play apparatuses at City parks. The play apparatus at Waimanalo Beach Park was replaced twice within the last ten years due to it deteriorating prematurely from the salt air. It was then replaced with the climbing wall. DPR will take the suggestion into consideration as DPR continues to evaluate play apparatuses at all City parks island-wide. Chair Ho noted that the "climbing wall" is only five (5) feet high. Executive Director Yang will follow up.
- Skate Park – A resident, Kekai Seabury, has worked to organize donations and in-kind services to build a skate park. DPR responded to have Seabury contact Miles Hazama, Windward Oahu District Manager, at 233-7300, to discuss the process in building a skate park in the Waimanalo area. Executive Director Yang will follow up with Seabury.
- Beautification of Waimanalo Beach Park (WBP) – Todd Hugo and Scotty Reis-Moniz want to meet with DPR Director Michelle Nekota, Mayor's Representative Jun Yang, and Councilmember Ikaika Anderson on the Beautification of Waimanalo Beach Park (WBP). DPR thanked Hugo and Reis-Moniz for the project proposal. Prepare and submit the proposal for a beautification project to:

Executive Director Yang will follow up with Hugo and Reis-Moniz.
- Police Substation – Board member Andy Jamila has worked with Time/Warner for the use of a portion of their property (old Chevron gas station) for use as a possible HPD substation for the Waimanalo community. Captain Jeffrey Richards of the Honolulu Police Department's District 4, Regional Patrol Bureau, thanked Mr. Jamila for the offer. Captain Richards explained that the department prefers to have the officers on the road and in the community. Officers are able to do reports on the computers in their vehicles. Jamila will be working with Councilmember Ikaika Anderson on a resolution to gift the Police substation to the City. After the two (2) public hearings, the resolution will go to Mayor Kirk Caldwell. Jamila offered to donate the cost of \$1.00/year for the first year.
- No Warning Signs – Resident Seabury reported people are driving on the shoulder of Kakaina Street from Hihimanu Street and there is no notice of the shoulder ending. There have been accidents. Department of Transportation Services (DTS) responded that this is a State Department of Hawaiian Home Lands (DHHL) project. Please refer to: Darrell Ing (620-9276). The DHHL contractor is performing roadway construction and is responsible for maintaining the construction area roadway. Department of Facility Maintenance (DFM) will assist with activities within its maintenance capabilities, pending DTS' evaluation and determination of appropriate improvements. Executive Director Yang will follow up with Seabury.
- Painting White Lines – Regarding the painting of the white lines for the Keolu Drive right turn from Kalaniana'ole Highway from Waimanalo, the DTS responded that the intersection of the Kalaniana'ole Highway and Keolu Drive is under the jurisdiction of the Hawaii Department of Transportation (HDOT) Department of Transportation. Executive Director Yang contacted DTS to find the owner of the median on Keolu Drive and if it is HDOT or City DTS responsibility. Chair Ho wanted to know who authorized the painting of the white lines.

Comments followed: Playground Equipment – A resident liked the playground equipment, located in Kailua at the Castle junction, and suggested equipment for younger children, including a swing set or slide.

City Councilmember J. Ikaika Anderson – Don Aweau apologized for having no newsletter tonight and reported the following:

- Capital Improvement Projects (CIP) – There will be \$2 million and other funds for the Waimanalo Beach Park (WBP) Master Plan, which was initiated under former Councilmember Barbara Marshall.
- City Council Resolution – Councilmember Anderson's Office is working with Board member Jamila on a resolution for the City to receive a gift of the Waimanalo police substation at the Oceanic Cable property. Actual dollar amounts are needed for the land, the building, and the utilities gifted. After the resolution is passed, the Council will work with the Mayor to accept the gift.
- Play Apparatus – Back when former Councilmember Barbara Marshall was in office, there was a slide, jungle gym, and other apparatuses. They were replaced a few times and finally removed, as they rusted

out, due to the salt air. There are two (2) parks that have the problem of rusting out, at Waimanalo Beach Park (WBP) and one (1) on the North Shore. The City is trying to find non-rusting equipment.

Comments followed:

1. Waimanalo Beach Park (WBP) Master Plan – Ralston asked for online and in print information. Aweau will follow up. Ralston asked if it will conflict with Reis-Moniz's and Hugo's proposal. Aweau did not think so. The Master Plan would cost about \$30 million for ball parks, other facilities, and parking lots, including Sherwood Forest.
2. Bill 8, Banning Commercial Activities – Councilmember Anderson wanted to have one (1) more community meeting before going to the Zoning Committee and to the full Council for third and final reading. There are still issues about illegal tour buses, illegal activities, and limiting certain number of permits. Chair Ho asked about overnight accommodations. Councilmember Anderson responded that Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR) Director Michele Nekota is reviewing overnight accommodations.
3. Playground Equipment – A resident asked if the equipment could be moved to by the Waimanalo gym. Chair Ho added that there was more access at the Waimanalo Beach Park (WBP).
4. Thank You – Julie Dugan from the Hawaii Job Corps (HJC) thanked Councilmember Anderson. One (1) of the students went to the City Council and Councilmember Ikaika Anderson was host.
5. Waimanalo Beach Park (WBP) – Another resident, Robert Ebanes, wanted to get involved with the WBP. A women resident thanked the community for the basketball rims.
6. Bill 8 – Kukana Kama-Toth has been meeting with Councilmember Ikaika Anderson on the community meeting. She supports no commercial activity at Sherwood. Some of the locations are under the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands (DHHL), which allows no commercial activities.

Governor David Ige's Representative – Deputy Director Mary Alice Evans, Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism reported the following:

- April is Earth Month – Deputy Director Evans announced that April is Earth Month!
- Dengue Fever – The State Department of Health (DOH) thanked everyone for controlling mosquitoes and breeding grounds in Waimanalo.
- Rapid Ohia Death (ROD) on the Big Island – The Hawaii Department of Agriculture (HDOA) thanked everyone for preventing the spread ROD, especially during the Merrie Monarch. Ohia forests are essential for maintaining watershed areas.
- Redemption Centers – The State Department of Health (DOH) noted that the Redemption Centers decide where to open or close the HI-5 centers. The DOH will follow up on the Waimanalo closure and report back.
- Dangerous Mango Tree – Deputy Director Evans suggested calling Daryl Ing at the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands (DHHL). Chair Ho called and there was no response. Deputy Director Evans will follow up again.

Comments followed:

1. Agriculture Land with a Pottery Store – Chair Ho received calls about a pottery store on agriculture land. The State land was leased on Kakina Street near Mahilua Street. The store is selling clay pots, which may be agriculture/nursery products. Community members want to set up business, too. Alivado questioned the motive for the inquiry and will get an address to Deputy Director Evans.
2. Median – Alivado asked Deputy Director Evans to also follow up on Mayor's Representative Jun Yang's inquiry with Hawaii Department of Transportation (HDOT). Kama-Toth added that she was ticketed two (2) times for taking a right turn to Kailua High School. She commented about long-time and short-time residents and the right turn at Keolu Drive. Chair Ho will keep this item on the agenda.

Chair Ho reported that Senator Thielen could not attend tonight, due to a family matter.

Senator Laura Thielen – Jennifer Barra reported the following:

- Voting on House Bills – Tomorrow, the Senate will be voting on the House bills that crossed over and then they go to conference committees.
- Talk Story – On Wednesday, April 13, 2016 there will be a Talk Story with Senator Thielen, Representative Chris Lee, and Councilmember Ikaika Anderson at the Waimanalo Elementary and Intermediate School (WEIS) cafeteria from 6:30 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. Discussion will be on legislation. Last month about 200 people showed up in Kailua. Everyone is invited.

Representative Chris Lee – Representative Lee reported the following:

- Access to Kailua High School – The land behind the neighborhood can be used for an access road. This will cost a lot of money, but can be discussed. The Talk Story community meeting will be on Wednesday night, April 13, 2016 and \$8 million has been funded.
- Other Funding – The Legislature provided \$500,000 for the Waimanalo Health Center (WHC) building, funding for safer access to Waimanalo Beach Park (WBP), services to the homeless and jobs. For the Cool Schools project, \$100 to \$130 million was added. Kailua High School, with 50% of the students coming from Waimanalo, just dedicated an \$8 million project with college-level science classes.
- Two (2) Shout-outs – The Legislature had two (2) presentations to honor Waimanalo residents. The first presentation was to Kalani and Kari Kalima for their fundraising effort to preserve the Ka Iwi Coast. The second presentation was to Abenel "Tiger" Wong, Sr., who in his 90s, has served his country, his state, and his community. Representative Lee presented the Official Certificate to Jamila to give to Abenel "Tiger" Wong, Sr. and his family. Jamila added that Tiger Wong is 97 years and still rides his Harley motorcycle.

Comments followed: Bridge – Chair Ho asked about the status of the bridge at Bellows. Representative Lee mentioned that the bridge work will start again and will hopefully be included in the other HDOT improvements.

U.S. Senator Brian Schatz – Kathy Bryant was not present and no report was available.

### RESIDENTS'/COMMUNITY CONCERNS

Change in Conditional Use Permit (CUP) at 41-539 Makakalo Street – Pastor Bud Stonebraker is a Waimanalo resident now and was born in Wahiawa. Pastor Stonebraker's church, South Shore Christian Fellowship (SSCF), has been meeting for 11 years and leasing at the Koko Marina for nine (9) years. The church would like to purchase the Circle Z horse-boarding ranch with eight (8) acres in the back for church meetings. The Conditional Use Permit (CUP) minor on AG 2 zoning will allow for meetings. SSCF will continue the horse boarding part, plan no new buildings, and fix up the two (2) buildings there now. They are informing the neighbors of a possible purchase.

Comments followed:

1. Public Hearings – Alivado asked if there would be public hearings. Pastor Stonebraker responded that no public hearings are required for a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) minor.
2. Residences – Jamila asked about live-ins. Pastor Stonebraker responded that there are two (2) residences and it is hoped that they will remain.
3. More Information – Alivado mentioned that this item was not on the agenda and requested more information. Pastor Stonebraker responded that there is information online. SSCF is affiliated with non-denomination Calvary Chapel and has about 150 to 200 members, mostly families from East O'ahu with many from Waimanalo, Enchanted Lakes, and Kailua. Alivado was concerned about loud services and traffic and wanted SSCF to reach out to the neighbors. Pastor Stonebraker agreed. Alivado wanted SSCF to meet with the Waimanalo Agriculture Association and she will provide the information. Chair Ho mentioned that they just had a meeting and will meet again in June 2016.
4. Concerns – Robert Ebanes was concerned about land in Hawai'i and how a Neighborhood Board listens to a community concern and decide what is to be done. Chair Ho explained that the Neighborhood Board has no administrative power, but can listen to the concerns. Pastor Stonebraker responded that he was raised in Hawai'i and is raising a family in Waimanalo to worship God.

Kalaniana'ole Highway Improvements – Kama-Toth wanted to speak her concerns about Phase 2 and Phase 3. Chair Ho explained that the presentation was last month. There will two (2) lanes with a left turn lane. Kama-Toth continued that the bike lanes would take away land and would not be for the residents, but for the visitors. Kama-Toth feared that the road was being prepared for a 55 miles per hour (mph) road. Jamila and Representative Lee added that there will be no four (4)-lane highway. Both would fight against it. Safety is first. For Phase 2 and 3, there will be more community meetings. Kama-Toth was concerned about the commercialization of Waimanalo and wants to keep Waimanalo rural.

### Other Concerns

Traffic and Culture – Resident Robert Ebanes lives in Waimanalo Village and cannot exit, because of heavy traffic. Chair Ho mentioned that there is a Waimanalo culture of mutual respect and courtesy. Ebanes thought that 60% of the people were culturally unaware and wanted volunteers to teach visitors. Chair Ho asked who will be qualified to teach and what will they teach. Chair Ho noted that Waimanalo residents have lives to live. Ebanes offered his suggestions and Chair Ho gave his thoughts.

Albinio departed; **eight (8) members present.**

APPROVAL OF MARCH 14, 2016 REGULAR MEETING MINUTES – Chair Ho asked for a motion to approve the minutes. **Laughlin moved and Galea'i seconded that the Waimanalo Neighborhood Board No. 32 approve the March 14, 2016 regular meeting minutes as circulated. As there were no objections and no corrections, the motion was ADOPTED by UNANIMOUS CONSENT, 8-0-0 (AYE: Alivado, Buck, Galea'i, Ho, Jamila, Laughlin, Nakamura, and Ralston; NAY: None; ABSTAIN: None).**

#### BOARD BUSINESS

Waimanalo Health Center Financial Status – Piilani Kai updated the Waimanalo Health Center (WHC)'s Capital Campaign that has a goal of \$13 million, of which, \$6.8 million has been raised. The WHC has submitted a Grant-In-Aid request to the State and will not announce it until it is awarded. The public may donate on-line at the WHC website. A donors list will be added to acknowledge donors.

Department of Hawaiian Home Lands (DHHL) Kakaina Lots – Chair Ho mentioned that there was car stripping on the property and that HPD was notified.

Gibson's Curve – Chair Ho noted that the area looked like it was "bulldozed" for a condo development, but there is no information or status.

Bill 8, Relating to Commercial Activities Ban Progress – Jamila pointed out that the agenda item on commercial tents at Sherwood by Kai Logan was overlooked and Jamila asked if anyone was present to speak to this issue. Before Kalani Kalima spoke on this agenda item, he mentioned that he was happy to receive the honor for the Ka Iki Coastline preservation and wanted to acknowledge other groups and individuals. It was three (3) communities of Hawaii Kai, Waimanalo, and Kailua coming to preserve Ka Iwi in perpetuity. As to this agenda item, on the website there are 50 campsites at Bellows and all of them are assigned, 10 campsites at Sherwood and all of them are assigned, and 19 campsites at Waimanalo Beach Park (WBP) with two (2) assigned. On public lands Kalima is against all commercial activity and does not like the National Football League (NFL) getting a license to serve alcohol on a public beach, when others cannot. Kalima thanked Chair Ho and others for bringing public awareness to this issue.

Commercial Tents at Sherwood by Kai Logan (Air B & B) – Leimomi KeKina publicized the commercial campsites on the social media and Kai Logan "pulled" his Internet site. Logan no longer advertises the commercial tents at Sherwood and at Waimanalo Beach Park (WBP). Complaints are from all over the island. KeKina agreed with Kalima that no one should profit from public lands or be given special privileges. KeKina filed a complaint in Councilmember Ikaika Anderson's Office. Donald Aweau mentioned that his office will be investigating the matter and he will report back. KeKina will share the responses with Kalima and Kama-Toth.

Dangerous Mango Tree on Department of Hawaiian Home Lands (DHHL) Lot – This agenda item was previously discussed.

Beautification of Waimanalo Beach Park (WBP) Progress – Todd Hugo was not present and no report was available.

#### COMMUNITY REPORTS

Blue Zones Project – Grace Sato read the following:

"Aloha, my name is Grace Sato and I am an intern with Blue Zones Project Koolaupoko! As you may know, Blue Zones Project is a well-being initiative aimed at making the Healthy choice the easy choice. We work with the community, grocery stores, restaurants, worksites, schools and faith-based organizations. Koolaupoko is one (1) of three (3) communities chosen to become Blue Zones Project-Approved, and the only community on Oahu.

Last week Friday, we congratulated our first Walking Moai participants. Each participant received a certificate and Blue Zones Project gear!

We will also be hosting a cooking demo in partnership with KEY Project on Tuesday, April 26, 2016 6:00 p.m. – 7:30 p.m.

We will also be at the "I Love Kailua" town party on Sunday, April 24, 2016 Blue Zones Project will be partnering with Kailua Urban Design Task Force (KUDTF) by sharing a booth with them. So, we hope to see you there!

Marine Corps Base Hawaii (MCBH) – Tiffany Patrick was not present and no report was available.

Bellows Air Force Station (BAFS) – Craig Gorsuch, Environmental Program Manager, reported the following:
