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DRAFT REGULAR MEETING MINUTES TUESDAY, JANUARY 18, 2011 NANAIAKAPONO ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

CALL TO ORDER: Chair Patty Teruya called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. **with a quorum of five (5) members present.** Note - This nine (9) member Board requires five (5) members to establish a quorum and take official Board action.

WELCOME/PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE: Chair Teruya welcomed everyone for attending tonight's meeting. Roberta Searle offered the pule followed by Waiamau-Nunuha leading in Hawaii Pono'i and Avilla III in the Pledge of Allegiance.

CITY MONTHLY REPORTS:

Honolulu Fire Department (HFD): Fire Fighter Kaneshiro reported;

- **Fire Statistics for December 2010:** Included 1 structure fire, 4 rubbish fires, 56 medical emergencies, 11 hazardous conditions, 17 good intent and 6 false alarms.
- **Fire Safety Tip:** Fire, building, and U.S. postal codes and City ordinances state that property owners shall place their house number so that it is visible from the street, which will assist first responders in locating houses quicker and more efficiently.
- **City Fireworks Regulations:** Starting January 2, 2011, consumers may only purchase firecrackers. Consumers must apply for a permit to set off firecrackers no less than ten days prior to the event. Residents may contact the Fire Prevention Bureau at 723-7162 for any related questions.

Honolulu Police Department (HPD): Lieutenant Tsuchida reported;

Board member Cynthia Rezendes arrived at 7:10 p.m.; **a quorum of six (6) members present.**

- **Crime Statistics for December 2010:** Included a total of 531 arrests in District-8; of which 401 were adult arrests and 130 were juvenile, and a total of 6,736 calls for service in the entire district.



- Safety Tip of the Month: The Neighborhood Security Watch (NSW) is sponsored by HPD and involves both police and citizen participation. NSW programs are an effective way to decrease crime in the neighborhood. If residents desire to start an NSW, contact Officer Mike Dela Cruz at 723-8408.

Questions, comments and concerns followed:

1. Community Organization Updates: Concerns were raised regarding the Nanakuli High and Intermediate School's Walk and Watch Program not receiving HPD updates. It was suggested HPD keep programs updated with current information of what is happening in the community.
2. Special Waianae Coast Board Meeting: The Waianae Coast Neighborhood Board No. 24 will be holding a special meeting to hear a presentation by HPD regarding the Waianae Substation upgrades and improvements project. Although the Nanakuli-Mailii Board was not invited, the meeting is open to everyone.

Mayor's Representative: Richard Haru, Deputy Director of the Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR), introduced his replacement Albert Tufono and reported;

- Night Time Fishing Parking: Several meetings have been held with DPR and the HPD in regards to overnight fisherman and their parking in parks. HPD is not restricting fisherman from accessing the beach, however they are not allowing awnings, tents or large coolers. Haru did speak with DPR Acting Director Gary Cabato in possibly allowing parking, and briefed him on the subject.
- Park Committee Recommendations: Regarding committee recommendations that were passed last month, DPR will prepare a response and action upon receipt of those letters.
- HPD Parks Detail: Regarding a recommendation to send a letter to HPD, requesting they enforce park rules and regulations; HPD did note that they will continue to enforce the rules and citations have been made. It was noted the parks detail officers have been reduced from six to four.
- New Deputy Director: Haru introduced Albert 'Al' Tufono, who is to become the new Deputy Director of DPR, upon Haru's departure. Tufono comes with previous political experience and is eager to work with the community, department and the administration.

Questions, comments and concerns followed:

1. Suggested Street Lights: A community member requested street lights be placed on Paakea Road.
2. Fishing at Night: It was noted that residents are exercising their native Hawaiian rights of gathering, and should be treated with leniency in allowing them to park while fishing. It was suggested a parking placard be implemented. A board member noted that they would not like to re-visit the park closures.
3. Community Benefits Package: Several community organizations and non-profits are waiting for their Community Benefits Advisory Committee (CBAC) awards to be released. Concerns were also raised with the need to audit the CBAC funds.
4. Agricultural Development Taskforce: A community member requested more information on the City's Agricultural Development Taskforce. It was noted that agendas may be found online, but the community would like to know what the taskforce does and how to get involved.
5. Puuhulu Street Sidewalk: A community member questioned the status of the sidewalk on Puuhulu Street.
6. Mailii Beach Park Parking Lot: A community member questioned the status of the Mailii Beach Parking lot.
7. Medical Waste in Oceans: Concerns were raised regarding the pollution of medical waste along the coastline. It was questioned what the City intends to do to address the pollution and what is being done to ensure it doesn't happen in the future.
8. Flooding in the Area: Community members raised concerns with the recent flooding on Paakea and

Hakimo roads. It was noted the streets are maintained by the City and now requires pumping.

City Council District One: Chair Teruya introduced Councilmember-elect Tom Berg, and congratulated him on his recent City Council District One campaign win. Berg will be sworn into his Council seat tomorrow, Wednesday, January 19, 2011.

Board of Water Supply (BWS): Sandy Nahoopii-Soong reported;

- Main Breaks: There was one water main break on December 15, 2010 at 92-301 Farrington Highway on a 24-inch water main; the main was repaired.
- General Water Announcement: Last month, an environmental group released a report about the presence of Chromium VI in water supplies around the country. BWS is committed to protecting public health and takes this issue very seriously. A Chromium VI Frequently Asked Question (FAQ) sheet was made available and may be copied at www.boardofwatersupply.com or by contacting 748-5041.
- Construction Work Update: The Farrington Highway water system improvement project continues. The contractor had some weather related issues during the holiday season and was unable to work. The project has since resumed work. The project is originally scheduled to be completed by March 2011.

Question, comments and concerns followed:

1. Matrix for Testing: It was questioned and clarified that a matrix has not yet been created for testing of Chromium VI. The BWS does test for Chromium and is waiting for the State Department of Health (DOH) to determine what a safe level of Chromium VI is.
2. March Completion Date: Concerns were raised with the March 2011 completion date for the Farrington Highway Improvements Project. It was noted that the project still requires a stream crossing permit and will need to complete a beautification project of the current staging area of Pohakunui Avenue.
3. Payment Accessibility: A community member suggested the BWS look into payment accessibility possibilities at shopping centers and grocery stores such as Sack 'N' Save, similar to what the Hawaiian Electric Company (HECO) does.

Board of Education (BOE): No report or representative available at this time.

Military Representatives: U.S. Army 25th Infantry: Kayla Overton of the U.S. Army Garrison Hawaii Public Office introduced herself and reported;

- Kolekole Pass Closure Dates: Kolekole Pass, which is regularly opened Monday through Friday 7:00 a.m.-11:45 a.m. (Schofield Bound) and 12:00 p.m.-5:00 p.m. (Waianae Bound), will be closed on January 20, 21, 27 and 28, 2011 due to training in the area.
- Hawaii Army Weekly Newsletter: Residents can now be kept up-to-date on the latest military news online at ww.hawaiiarmyweekly.com.
- Alternative Access Routes: Upon reviewing the November regular meeting minutes, Overton will follow-up on the discussion regarding alternative access routes by the military in the area.

Questions, comments and concerns followed:

1. Stored Munitions in Community: Questions were raised as to why the military is storing munitions at Lualualei, noting that there is no community give-back. Overton explained that Lualualei is operated by the U.S. Navy, but will follow-up with their base.
2. Flooding of Paakea and Hakimo Roads: Concerns were raised with the recent flooding on Paakea and Hakimo roads, due to the heavy rains which are funneled from the military base and exits on those streets. Overton again noted that the base is Navy operated, but will follow-up.

Board member Waiamau-Nunuha retired from the meeting at 7:55 p.m. **A quorum of five (5) members present.**

RESIDENTS'/COMMUNITY CONCERNS: Several concerns were voiced at this time;

Military in Makua Valley: Concerns were raised regarding military training in Makua Valley. It was noted the community has gotten the Army to stop live fire training; however the Navy and Marines actively train in the valley, with no give-back or community benefit.

Agenda Modifications: A Board member suggested that the regular meeting agenda be modified to accommodate the committee reports and to include reports from the State Department of Health (DOH) and the City Department of Environmental Services (ENV).

Dump Site Retaining Walls: Concerns were raised with the lack of water retaining walls at dump site locations such as Waimanalo Gulch and PVT Landfill. It was noted that DOH was negligent in not requiring proper retaining walls.

Chair Correspondence: Chair Teruya provided Board members with copies of correspondences that have been mailed to her. Residents may also receive a copy from her if they would like one.

Speeding in School Districts: A community member raised concerns regarding speeding vehicles near school zones in the morning and afternoon, which causes a safety hazard for all children. It was suggested the State Department of Education (DOE) be included on the agenda as well.

Bullying in Schools: A community member raised issue with children bullying different children in schools. Concerns were raised with the lack of enforcement and corrective action the schools are taking.

Universal Play Apparatuses: A community member reiterated a concern that she raised several months ago regarding the lack of universal play apparatuses in City parks, which can accommodate the needs of special needs children. The concern was also raised at the Waianae Coast Neighborhood Board meeting.

Likiloa Valley Flooding: Several community members, farm and home owners raise major concerns with the recent flooding of Likiloa Valley which included the flooding of Paakea and Hakimo roads. Flooding has occurred over the years due to a storm drain which flows from the military base and exits on the street. Farm owners in the area lost 100% of crops as well as livestock and caged animals. The community members explained that the area has been flooded before, again due to the exiting of water, and nothing has been done.

Emergency Access Road: Concerns were raised regarding the access road being locked during natural disasters, such as the flooding in Likiloa Valley. It was unknown who has a key, but the gates were opened several hours after the flooding had occurred.

Waianae Community Outreach (WCO): A community outreach worker thanked Richard Haru for his work in the community. Concerns were raised regarding the Keeau Beach Park cleaning and closure scheduled for March 6, 2011, which would leave the homeless with nowhere to go.

Onelauena Center in Kalaeloa: It was also noted that WCO operated the Onelauena homeless shelter in Kalaeloa and has available space for families as well as single men and women.

Semi-Truck Speeding: A community member raised concern with large tractor trailers and semi-trucks speeding and cutting in and out of traffic on their way to PVT Landfill. It was urged that legislators look at possible measures that would require the large vehicles to stay in the right-lane when traversing Farrington Highway.

Largest Polluter: A community member raised concern with the Hawaiian Electric Company (HECO), noting that they are the largest polluter on the coastline.

Immediate Road Drainage: The community members that have been affected by the flooding in Likiloa Valley strongly requested immediate drainage of the road, with assistance from any State, City or Military agency. It was noted that both Army and Navy will collaborate, and DOH should be contacted immediately as well.

Tropic Land LLC: Roberta Searle, Community Liaison and Cultural Analyst for Tropic Land LLC, provided data and an information brochure to Board and community members. Data shared was collected through a community survey conducted. Community members were welcomed to talk with Searle following the meeting.

Leeward Kai Canoe Club: A canoe club member raised concerns with the recent pollutions of medical waste off the coastline. It was noted that families with children were swimming in the ocean during the release of medical waste.

Clogged/ Polluted Streams: A community member explained that in the past heavy rains, he had found that flooding was caused by clogged streams due to illegally dumped materials.

Civil Defense Training: Community members were encouraged to attend a Civil Defense training exercise on Thursday, February 24, 2011 from 6:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. at Nanakuli High School.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES/AGENDA:

Approval of November 16, 2010 Regular Meeting Minutes: **Kelii moved and Avilla, III seconded the approval of the November 16, 2010 regular meeting minutes as published. The motion was ADOPTED UNANIMOUSLY, 5-0-0, (Aye: Avilla III, Kelii, Manaku Sr., Rezentes and Teruya.)**

Approval of January 18, 2011 Regular Meeting Agenda: **Kelii moved and Manaku Sr. seconded the approval of the January 18, 2011 regular meeting agenda. The motion was ADOPTED UNANIMOUSLY, 5-0-0, (Aye: Avilla III, Kelii, Manaku Sr., Rezentes and Teruya.)**

Board member Kelii requested that the Board look at re-organizing the agenda template and provided members with a suggested template to be discussed in February. It was noted that the Neighborhood Commission Office (NCO) did have a standard template that was used; however Boards may now choose their own template.

BOARD BUSINESS:

Kalaeloa Advisory Team (KAT): Kelii announced that completion of the Draft Kalaeloa Administrative Rules, that will govern future development in the Kalaeloa area, has been extended until January 21, 2011. The next KAT meeting is scheduled for Monday, January 24, 2011 at 5:30 p.m. at the Kalaeloa Office.

Unfinished Business: None.

New Business:

Leeward Housing Coalition 2011 Legislative Report: Rezentes along with Kanani Bulawan provided members a copy of the 2011 Legislative Report and explained that the plan identifies community, agency and funding resources serving the homeless and the at-risk population; develops a continuum of care for Waianae Coast individuals and families; develops a case management system; provides recommendations for single point of access systems and recommends changes in the physical and appropriations infrastructure. A summary of recommendations and a 2011 Waianae Coast Resource Directory were also highlighted in the plan. Informational data collected linked 30%-35% of homeless individuals came from outside of the Waianae Coast, and another 30%-35% of homeless individuals do not want to stay here. The plan has been submitted to the legislature.

Questions, comments and concerns followed:

1. Commend for Work Done: Several board members commended Rezentes and the Leeward Housing Coalition members for their hard work and for printing their reports.
2. Board Support Report: **Kelii moved and Manaku Sr. seconded to support the Leeward Housing Coalition 2011 Legislative Report and commend Board member Rezentes' work on the project. The motion was ADOPTED UNANIMOUSLY, 5-0-0, (Aye: Avilla III, Kelii, Manaku Sr., Rezentes and Teruya.)**

Variance Application for DR Horton-Hawaii Division: Chair Teruya was in receipt of correspondence regarding Variance Application No. 2010/VAR-43 from applicant DR Horton-Hawaii Division located at 87-1546 Kuaha Street in Maili. A hearing is scheduled for Thursday, January 27, 2011 at 1:30 p.m. at the Frank F. Fasi Municipal Building, 10th Floor Conference Room, in Honolulu.

Discussion to Declare Board Member Rose Woods' Seat Vacant: Chair Teruya explained that according to Section 2-14-106 of the Neighborhood Plan, the Board may discuss and declare Board member Wood's seat due to her accumulated three absences. It was noted that a letter was sent via the NCO, with no response from Woods.

Kelii moved and Avilla III seconded to declare Board member Wood's seat vacant, and to take up filling of that seat in February. The motion was ADOPTED UNANIMOUSLY, 5-0-0, (Aye: Avilla III, Kelii, Manaku Sr., Rezentes and Teruya.)

Chair Teruya also noted that Board member John Kaopua III has accumulated three absences as of tonight. With only five (5) members present the Board was unable to authorize sending of the three absence letter by the NCO. Chair Teruya will send a letter notifying Kaopua III of his absences.

Parks and Recreation Committee request to write a 'Letter of Inquiry' as to the status of the two (2) Park Attendant Positions that were earmarked for the Waianae Coast. Kelii, on behalf of the Parks and Recreation Committee, moved that the Nanakuli-Maili Neighborhood Board write a 'Letter of Inquiry' as to the status of the two (2) Parks Attendant positions that were earmarked for the Waianae Coast Parks that were approved and confirmed through CBAC Funds in 2009-2010. This letter is to be sent to the City's Mayor Peter Carlisle, the Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR) Director Gary Cabato and the Leeward District Park (LDP) Director Dexter Liu.

Discussion followed:

1. Committee Minutes: Kelii apologized for not having the committee minutes in the mail out, copies were provided to members tonight, which reflects the discussion on this request.
2. Community Member Inquire: It was noted that community member and Park Coordinator Jackie Spencer also wanted to inquire on the status of the positions, noting that funding was released.

The motion, moved by Kelii on behalf of the Parks and Recreation Committee (and therefore not needing a second), was ADOPTED UNANIMOUSLY, 5-0-0, (Aye: Avilla III, Kelii, Manaku Sr., Rezentes and Teruya.)

Parks and Recreation Committee request to write a 'Letter of Support' with approving Capital Improvement Project (CIP) 2011 Priority List for Nanakuli Beach Park Facilities: Kelii, on behalf of the Parks and Recreation Committee, moved that the Nanakuli-Maili Neighborhood Board write a 'Letter of Support' with approving the following Capital Improvement Project (CIP) 2011 priority list for Nanakuli Beach Park Facilities:

- **Construction of restroom inside of Nanakuli Beach Park Multi-purpose Room/ Pavilion.**
- **Renovation of Nanakuli Beach Park office restroom, kitchen and small storage unit.**
- **Construction of large storage room (mauka of the Nanakuli Beach Park office building).**

Discussion followed:

Kupuna Program: Concerns were raised in committee with the restrooms being located outside of the multi-purpose room, which created a difficulty for elder residents attending the kupuna programs.

The motion, moved by Kelii on behalf of the Parks and Recreation Committee (and therefore not needing a second), was ADOPTED UNANIMOUSLY, 5-0-0, (Aye: Avilla III, Kelii, Manaku Sr., Rezentes and Teruya.)

Parks and Recreation Committee request to write a 'Letter of Opposition' to Bill 60 (2010) – Relating to fees and charges for use of parks and recreation facilities: Kelii, on behalf of the Parks and Recreation Committee, moved that the Nanakuli-Maili Neighborhood Board write a 'Letter of Opposition' to Bill 60 (2010) – relating to fees and charges for use of parks and recreation facilities for the following reasons: Although the Parks and Recreation Committee supports the Bill's intent with establishing camping fees, the committee members are adamantly opposed to the Bill's fee assessment cost and would like to recommend the following camping fee scale for Council's consideration:

- **\$10.00 per day; 3-day minimum (Friday through Sunday); 10 people maximum.**
- **\$25.00 per day; 3-day minimum (Friday through Sunday); 60 people maximum.**
- **\$50.00 per day; 3-day minimum (Friday through Sunday); 100 people maximum.**
- **\$75.00 per day; 3-day minimum (Friday through Sunday); 250 people maximum.**

Discussion followed:

1. Amount and General Funds: Concerns were raised regarding the suggested costs being too high for community members. Concerns were also raised regarding the funds going to the City's General Fund and not maintaining or beautifying the park sites.
2. Wording of Motion: A Board member noted that they are not opposed to the motion, but raised concern with the current wording, noting that the Board should oppose Bill 60 (2010) in its current form and offer the following recommendations.
3. Limited Campsites: Concerns were raised with the lack of campsites on the coastline, noting that community members already find difficult in obtaining permits, and too add the issue of cost, would create more of a burden to the community.
4. Original Bill 60 (2010): It was noted that the committee recommendations are lower than what the original bill intends. The original bill has a minimum 5-day requirement, whereas the committee requires only three. The proposed fees are also higher in the original bill.
5. Big Island Ordinance: A community member explained that the Big Island has a similar fee program in place, charging \$5.00 per campsite. It was found that the fee did not hinder residents from acquiring permits.
6. Separate Funds: It was further explained that the City Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR) is in favor of having a separate fund for the proposed fees. The department is looking to go online in acquiring permits, which will accrue further costs.
7. Oppose Bill 60: It was suggested the Board completely oppose Bill 60 (2010), for several reasons that would be explained in a letter. Kelii agreed, noting he has no objections to full opposition.
8. Duo-Reference Bill: It was questioned and clarified that the bill was referred to the Council Budget Committee, and is scheduled to be re-heard on Wednesday, January 26, 2011. Councilmember-elect noted that, although unsure for certain, the bill will be heard in the Council Parks Committee as well.

The original motion was amended to read; Kelii, moved on behalf of the Parks and Recreation Committee (and therefore not needing a second), that the Nanakuli-Maili Neighborhood Board oppose Council Bill 60 (2010) in its entirety due to reasons pertaining to fee prices, money going into the general fund and lack of campsites on the coastline. The motion was ADOPTED UNANIMOUSLY, 5-0-0, (Aye: Avilla III, Kelii, Manaku Sr., Rezentes and Teruya.)

Education committee request to write a 'Letter of Opposition' as to the disposition or status report regarding the work conducted and performed by the Consultant hired by the Department of Education Nanakuli Complex Superintendent, Lisa Delong: Committee Chair Kelii requested that this item be deferred at this time. Without objection, the item was deferred.

REPORTS:

Treasurer's Report: Rezentes read the December 2010 Treasurer's Report highlighting a current expense of \$55.29 due to printing and postage of minutes and agendas, leaving a current balance of \$3,422.13. The report was filed.

Committees: Planning & Zoning and Health, Human Services: No report at this time.

Transportation/Oahu Metropolitan Planning Organization (OMPO): Manaku Sr. announced he will be attending the next OMPO meeting tomorrow, Wednesday, January 19, 2011.

Education: Kelii, in the interest of time deferred his report. It was noted that the next committee meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, February 2, 2011 at 7:00 p.m. at the Nanakuli Beach Park arts & Crafts Room.

Parks and Recreation/Parks Beautification: Kelii, in the interest of time deferred his report. It was noted that the next committee meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, February 2, 2011 at 5:30 p.m. at the Nanakuli Beach Park arts & Crafts Room (preceding the Education Committee).

Housing: Rezendes stood on her earlier presentation of the Leeward Housing Coalition 2011 Legislative Report. It was announced that the next committee meeting is scheduled for Thursday, January 27, 2011 at 7:00 p.m. at the St. Phillips Episcopal Church Meeting Hall.

Elected Officials:

Office of United States Representative Mazie Hirono: No report or representative available at this time.

Senator Maile Shimabukuro: Senator Shimabukuro highlighted several bills of interest;

- Flood Zones/Insurance Purposes: The bill would require establishment of 'flood zones' for insurance purposes in areas that are prone to flooding even when caused by unnatural elements, as long as the resident is not at fault.
- Environmental Rights to Residents: The bill proposes a constitutional amendment relating to Environmental rights to assist residents living near landfills and other environmental hazards.
- Mobile Home Parks: The measure will propose legalization of mobile home parks with clear nexus to removal of homeless from public areas.
- Capital Improvements: Projects being considered include the Nanakuli High and Intermediate School, \$12 million power upgrade and air conditioning project; \$4 million air conditioning project at Waianae Intermediate School and an \$8 million Pet-Friendly and Former Foster Youth shelter project.
- Resolution on Oahu Landfills: A resolution of interest would ban all Oahu landfills from accepting municipal solid waste effective July 2012, to reflect the intention of the Land Use Commission in its ruling in the Waimanalo Gulch contested race.

Questions, comments and concerns followed:

1. Public Hearings/Private Landfills: A Board member requested legislation or aide to address the issue of private landfills, such as the PVT Landfill, not being required to hold public hearings before renewing or applying for new permits.
2. Trailers and Semi-Trucks: A community member suggested legislation be drafted that would mandate tractor trailers and semi-trucks to stay in the right lane as they enter Nanakuli. Concerns were raised with the vehicles speeding through and cutting in and out of traffic, which creates a safety hazard to motorists.
3. Blue Ribbon Panel Selected: Chair Teruya again noted that even with the proposed resolution on Oahu landfills, a 12-member blue ribbon panel has been chosen to select alternative sites.

Neighborhood Assistant Ribac retired from the meeting at 10:00 p.m. Chair Teruya continued the minutes.
