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REGULAR MEETING MINUTES WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 6, 2010 NOELANI ELEMENTARY SCHOOL CAFETORIUM

CALL TO ORDER: Chair Kaleo Gagne called the meeting to order at 7:01 p.m. **with a quorum of 12 members present.** Note – this 17-member Board requires nine (9) members for a quorum and to conduct any official Board business.

Members Present: John Kim, George Simson, Sheri St. Germain, Rodney Chun, Kendall Amazaki (Arrived 7:11 p.m.), Eric Eads, Dwight Jackson, Nadine Nishioka, Kimberly S. Case, Kaleo Gagne, Robert Whitaker, Tom Heinrich, Martin Eby, and Sarita Corn (Newly Appointed).

Members Absent: Gary K. Andersen, Andrew Garrett, and Milton Ragsdale (Resigned).

Vacancies: There are two vacancies: Sub District 1 (Woodlawn) and Sub District 3 (Central Manoa).

Guests – State Senator Brian Taniguchi, Kit Grant (American Civil Liberties Union), Hubert Minn (Mayor's Representative), Elmer Kaai, Jr. (University of Hawaii-Manoa), Rod Maile (Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs), Capt. At this time, Chair Gagne announced that New Business item 5.5 Adding Signs to Manoa Falls and at the traffic light to Safeway/Starbucks Corner was deferred to next months Board meeting.

PUBLIC SAFETY REPORTS:

Honolulu Fire Department (HFD) – Capt. Robert Sarae reported the following:

- Statistics for September 2010 – Included 1 structure and 1 vehicle fire. There were 30 medical emergencies, 1 search and rescue, and 6 miscellaneous calls. No major or unusual incidents reported.
- Fire Safety Tip – Plan ahead for a fire-safe Halloween. Buy only costumes, wigs, and props labeled flame-resistant or flame-retardant. If you are making your own costume, choose material that will not easily burn. Avoid using costumes with billowing or long-trailing features. Ensure the “eye” holes are large enough so child's vision is not obscured. Provide children with lightweight flashlights to carry. Dried flowers, cornstalks, and crepe paper are highly flammable. Keep these and other decorations away from open flames and/or heat-generating sources, including light bulbs and heaters. Also, use simulated candles with battery-powered lights.
- Response Time Inquiry – Heinrich inquired whether HFD experienced any changes in response time heading Mauka between Maile Way and Oahu Avenue. An evaluation of the response time was appreciated.

Honolulu Police Department (HPD) – Lt. Calvin Tong and Sgt. Tony Kahapea reported the following:

- Statistics for September 2010 – Included 11 burglaries, 17 thefts, and 19 unauthorized entries of a motor vehicle. For more information, visit website as www.honolulu.org/patrol/d7.
- Tips for Trick-or-Treaters – Plan costumes that are bright and reflective. Make sure that shoes fit well and costumes are short enough to prevent tripping or entanglement. Adding reflective tape or striping to costumes and trick-or-treat bags for greater visibility. Think twice before using simulated knives, guns or



swords. If such props must be used, be certain they do not appear authentic and are soft and flexible to prevent injury. Plan a safe route, Never enter a stranger's home or car for a treat. No treats eaten until inspected by an adult. Notify HPD immediately of any suspicious or unlawful activity.

- Tips for Parents – Plan a good meal for children before parties or trick-or-treating. Plan and review route with children. Know where children will be, set a time to return home. Know who your children will be with and have other parents contact numbers. Tell children to bring candy home to be inspected before consuming anything. Check all candy wrappers and toss out anything that seems tampered with.
- Tips for Homeowners – Take extra effort to eliminate tripping hazards on porch and walkway; such as low tree limbs, flower pots, garden hoses. Secure pets from accidental biting as pets are easily frightened.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed:

1. Crime Comparison Report – As requested by Case, Tong will get check with ITD Division for a comparison report of 2009 and 2010 crime figures.
2. Burglaries Reported – The three burglaries occurred in the same vicinity of Manoa Road, it was reported at different days and times; and was not labeled as a “series of burglaries”. Tong reminded residents to inform your neighbor when going on a vacation to cancel newspaper and mail deliveries. To schedule an informational lecture, contact the HPD team.

At 7:11 p.m., Amazaki arrived; **13 members present.**

3. TAG Team against Graffiti – More than 600 volunteers, many were HPD n a community-wide clean up and paint over graffiti Saturday, October 2, 2010 from 8:00 a.m. to noon at Prince Kuhio Elementary School. Heinrich noted that along with the Board's regular District 7 community policing team with Sgts. Chris Park and Tony Kahapea, and Officer Mark Mitchell, other HPD districts staff and family; an island wide effort – A commendable outstanding partnership between HPD and the community.

FILLING OF VACANT BOARD SEATS: Chair Gagne announced that Milton Ragsdale has resigned and created another vacancy in Subdistrict 4. Ragsdale was the longest running Board member.

- Vacancy in Subdistrict 3 (Central Manoa) – Resident Zach Thomson announced his interest as a member of the Manoa Neighborhood Board; Neighborhood Assistant Gloria Gaines verified that Zach Thomson resided in Subdistrict 3; and provided background information of himself. Some interests include being a den leader with the Boy Scouts, attended Utah University, missionary work in Argentina, own an international film company, and have made Manoa his home for the past three years.

A question and answer session noted that Thomson attended Neighborhood Board meetings when working during the legislative session; would have no problem attending the monthly Board meetings; and apologized for not mentioning that he is currently a candidate for the State House District 24 was unaware of whether it was a conflict. A lengthy discussion followed about Thomson's candidacy.

Jackson moved and Case seconded the nomination of Zach Thomson to fill the vacancy in Subdistrict 3. A discussion followed. Members explained their reasoning for voting either for or against the nomination. **The MOTION FAILED, 8-3-2 (AYES:** Kim, St. Germain, Chun, Amazaki, Eads, Jackson, Nishioka, and Case; **NO:** Whitaker, Heinrich, and Eby; **ABSTENTIONS:** Simson and Gagne). Board members heard a final comment by Thomson. Thomson was encouraged to return next month and try again.

At 7:35 p.m., Case left the meeting; **12 members remain.**

- Vacancy in Subdistrict 4 (Lower Manoa) – Resident Sarita Corn announced her interest as a member of the Manoa Neighborhood Board; Neighborhood Assistant Gloria Gaines verified that Ms. Corn resided in Subdistrict 4; and provided background information of herself. Some interests include being a graduate from John Hopkins University, has worked embassy of France and Washing D.C., has been a teacher in public and private schools, and is currently a small business owner and president of American Business

Women Association (ABWA) Ulupono Charter Chapter, and been involved in non-profit agencies such as “HI-5 Walk the Talk” helping to eradicate homelessness in Hawaii.

A question and answer session noted that Corn has attended Manoa Neighborhood Board meetings in the past; is committed to attend the monthly Board meetings; worked with several non profit organizations; and double-majored in English literary theory and criticism, creative writing, and French literature and culture.

Whitaker moved and Jackson seconded the nomination of Sarita Corn to fill the vacancy in Subdistrict 4. The motion WAS ADOPTED, 11-0-1 (AYES: Kim, St. Germain, Chun, Amazaki, Eads, Jackson, Nishioka, Whitaker, Heinrich, Eby, and Simson; NO: None; ABSTENTION: Gagne). A short recess was called to administer the oath-of-office by Neighborhood Assistant Gaines. The meeting resumed; **13 members present.**

COMMUNITY REPORTS AND INPUT:

University of Hawaii at Manoa (UHM) Representative – Elmer Kaai, Jr. expressed UHM’s appreciation for hosting the September 1st joint Board meeting with the McCully-Mo`ili`ili Board; and the concerns raised at the meeting will be presented next month by Eric Crispin. Kaai reported on the following:

- UHM, Planning and Security Issues – Contact Kaai for an updated report of UHM’s planning and security issues.
- Graffiti Removal Project – Graffiti is reported immediately by contacting either Kaai or the campus security office. Facilities management addresses the graffiti within the day reported. Residents were also encouraged to call in graffiti.
- Kennedy Theater Renovation – Parking to be expanded within the theater building; a foyer on the top; and several studios to lent out to the community to do projects. UHM requested that there is a need for additional funding. The monies funded the design of the project and need more funding to do the construction project.
- Activities for the Month – Residents were forewarned of activities for the month and to expect some traffic. Homecoming function at Bachman Hall.
- Buses for Games – UHM provides free bus transportation for students to attend the football games.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed:

1. Comment to UHM September Meeting – Simson commented on the positive relationship between UH and the community. However, after reading the minutes, it seemed that UHM was heavily concerned about cars running over bicycles than education.
2. Lions Club – Nishioka expressed appreciation for helping organize the first Lions Club on UHM campus; and welcomed UHM students, alumni, or staff. Contact Nishioka to becoming a member of the Lions Club.
3. Conference Center – Simson suggested that UHM consider a conference center, providing access for community meetings. UHM is working on providing more access for community meetings.
4. September Meeting Minutes – R. Lockwood noted he was the recorder of the Wednesday, September 1, 2010 special meeting minutes.
5. Homecoming Event – Last year’s homecoming event resulted in noise complaints by residents. It was suggested the UHM band make a 180 degree turn and face towards the mountain to minimize the sound. Kaai agreed that last year was loud and received many complaints. UHM student band will turn it down this year.

Honolulu City Councilmember Ann Kobayashi – Councilmember Kobayashi reported on the following:

- Fireworks Ban – On September 22, 2010 City Council passed the fireworks ban effective January 2, 2011. The stores will be able to sell their inventory of fireworks. With a permit there would be a 5,000 firecracker limit; allowing religious groups to exercise their culture traditions.
- Sidewalk Bill – The sidewalk bill allows pedestrians and wheel chair accessibility safe zones on sidewalks from 5:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m.
- Aloha Aina Event – A recycling event at Kaimuki High School.

- Homeowner Tax Category – Eby thanked Councilmember Kobayashi for reviewing the homeowner tax category situation and making it more efficient rather than a burden to homeowners.

Mayor's Representative – Hubert Minn reported the following:

- Slumping of Pavement – The slumping of pavement fronting the Manoa Fire Station was repaired on Wednesday, August 25, 2010.
- Right Turn Only Pavement Markings – The contractor has not completed the pavement markings because of the shortage of thermoplastic material. The material shortage is nationwide.
- Text Tag – An Emergency Alert System messages typically are issued statewide. It would be difficult to be county-specific.
- Public Campaign for Texted Notice – The City continues to advertise Nixle texted message service through the City website and through ongoing publicity.
- Graffiti Repellent Signs – The cost for the Write Off aerosol can is \$29.00 per 14 ounce can. One can coats one to three signs depending on the size of the sign. The cost of the graffiti protection is not budgeted for the coming fiscal year, but will be in 2010. Signs still need to be replaced, and cost savings have not yet been realized.
- Field Lights for Manoa Park – The field lights were removed from the pinto field at Manoa Park. The City's Department of Design and Construction (DDC) has determined that the 40-year old system is at the end of its service life and warrants replacement of the entire system. Replacement of the entire system will be submitted for future capital improvement project funding requested and is estimated at \$1,250,000 for planning, design, and construction.
- 2727 Woodlawn Drive – A call was made to the United States Department of Agriculture and found that the property at 2727 Woodlawn Drive was leased from the UHM, is currently state property, and was referred to Ed Kaai, UHM representative.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed:

1. UHM Student Bus Riders – Eby inquired the number of UHM students ride the City Bus and whether the City would have the number of UHM student bus passes issued to calculate the cost per ride. Minn will check with the City's Department of Transportation Services (DTS).
2. Minn's Announcement – Minn announced that Friday, October 8, 2010 is his last day with the City and noted that it was a pleasure helping the Manoa Neighborhood Board.

Initiative for a Public Transit Authority – Pat Lee, Rail Transit Project, informed that voters will be asked to vote yes or no at the November 2010 Election on an initiative establishing a semi-autonomous public transit authority to create a more efficient system for the building, operation, and maintaining the City's Honolulu Rail project.

- Rail Project – Currently, DTS oversees the rail project as well as the City bus operations, new and existing roadways, traffic signals, parking facilities, etc.
- Transit Authority – The transit authority for the rail project will be responsible entity and with a single focus will be able to make decisions expeditiously, focusing only on the rail.
- Board of Directors – The transit authority will include an appointed Board of Directors of ten members with three members appointed selected by the Mayor, three selected by the City Council; two ex-officio members to be the State Director of Transportation and the City's Director DTS; one ex-officio non-voting member to be the Director of City's Planning and Permitting, and the tenth to be of majority vote of the six official voting members.
- Proposed Charter Amendments – Heinrich emphasized that the text of the proposed amendments to the Revised City Charter is lengthy and is available at the Office of Elections and City Clerk website. Also, this is one of the six questions related to the City charter. The text is Resolution 09-252 CD-1 was passed December 2009 by City Council explains the aspect of the transit authority.

Governor's Representative – Rod Maile reported on the following:

- State Automated Phone Directory – The State automated phone directory number is 586-2211 went into effect October 1, 2010. The most frequency dialed agency is the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs (DCCA).
- State Wide Award for State Departments – Manager of the Year and Department Team of the Year Awards ceremony on Thursday, October 7, 2010. DDCA team was responsible for medical malpractice

disciplinary actions which moved them up the rank from 51st in 2003 to 10th in the nation in 2009; insuring medical practitioners comply with the law. Hawaii ranked in the top five states with significant improvements.

- License Renewals – Recently renewed approximately 10,000 contractor's licenses that ended September 30, 2010. For real estate license renewal there will be a \$40.00 reduction in the licensing fee as a result of the real estate education fund assessment this year. There will also be a substantial reduction if registering real estate license renewals online.

State Representative Isaac Choy – A report was submitted. A representative was not available.

State Senator Brian Taniguchi – Senator Taniguchi provided members with a report and was available for questions.

Residents and Others for Matters Not on the Agenda –

- Davis Levin First Amendment Conference – Kit Grant, American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU), announced the Davis Levin First Amendment Conference on Saturday, November 13, 2010 at the Hilton Hawaiian Village, Coral Ballroom 3, 2005 Kalia Road, Waikiki, from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m., and a \$5.00 admission. The conference features Daniel Ellsberg, "The Most Dangerous Man in America". For more information, contact ACLU at www.acluhawaii.org/fac or phone 808-522-5906.
- Noise from Speed Bump and Recycle Bin at Parking Lot – Neighbor of Noelani Elementary School stated that trucks entering the parking lot hit the speed bump and is disturbed by the noise and requested the speed bump be removed. Also, residents visit the recycle bin late at night and crash the bottles in the recycle bin and also requested that the bin be relocated closer towards the school. Heinrich noted that concerns will be passed on to staff M. Mahoe of the school.
- Request for a Candidate Forum – Eric Marshall is a candidate for a State Senate seat and offered to help organize a candidate forum by funding and co-sponsoring the event before the November election. Although on the agenda, Eads clarified the candidate forum was for the primary election. Heinrich appreciated the offer, informed of process regarding gifts to the City, that the Board has taken action for a candidate forum during this election cycle, would support a candidate forum, and would be a decision of the Permitted Interaction Group (PIG) committee. Marshall will work with the board to make the accommodations, researching on his own time, and will communicate with the Board.
- Bank for Education – Program offered by American Savings to help favorite school receive a share of ASB (ASB) giveaway totaling up to \$500,000. Open either a new checking account with direct deposit, new checking account with a check card, or a new equity express home equity line of credit. Then choose a school to receive \$25.00 from ASB (all Hawaii schools from kindergarten through high school are eligible, public or private). The school with the most designations overall will receive \$1,000.00. Four awards of \$10,000 each to the schools with the most designations from each of the four counties. Brochures were made available to residents. Promotion ends the day after Thanksgiving in November 2010.

Nishioka mentioned the staff at ASB Manoa are friendly and emphasized donations go directly to the private or public school of your choice and not to the State Department of Education.

Input Received by Board Members from Community Members Via E-mail, Mail, or Telephone – None.

NEW BUSINESS:

Hawaii Children's First – Mark Aoki informed that on November 2, 2010 election, voters will be asked to vote yes or no for the Governor to appoint the members of the State Board of Education (BOE) and making the Governor accountable for actions taken up by the BOE. Aligning BOE with qualified policy makers will improve the quality of Hawaii's public school education. The opportunity for comments will be at the public hearing, subject to senate confirmation. A blank vote is a no vote. Residents were urged to vote yes for a Governor appointed BOE.

Foreclosures and How People can Save their Homes – Avis Getting and Sandy Oguma of Hui Lanakila provided residents with a different colored map indicating the number of foreclosures on Oahu; the darker the purple the worst the situation; the lighter the color the better off it is in that zip coded area.

- Hui Lanakila – The Hui Lanakila is a group of professionals (real estate, banking, credit, mortgage, notary, and law) gathered together to make known consumer rights as it pertains to mortgage fraud, predatory lending, and foreclosure.
- Mortgage Fraud – In 2008, the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) stated that Mortgage Electronic Registration System (MERS) was appointed as trustee/nominee for many of the nation's largest mortgage bankers and servicers to 65 million loans nationwide; 87 percent of those loans are fraudulent and are under investigation
- Services Offered – The Hui Lanakila can investigate the homeowners' lender to find out if there is fraud and teach the homeowners how to save their homes. Most homeowners do not understand and have no knowledge of what kind of mortgage they currently have. Consideration of the Manoa Neighborhood Meeting Schedule, Possible Recess Dates, and Locations for the 2010-2011 Year (Noelani Cafetorium Not Available in November 2010) – Heinrich noted that it is likely the Board will meet at Noelani Cafetorium. As Noelani School campus wide renovation progresses the cafetorium will be used as temporary classrooms. There are only eight (8) regular meetings remain for the 2010 Board term.

- Recess Date – After discussion, **Eads moved and Kim seconded that the Board recess January 5, 2011**, followed by more discussion. **The motion was ADOPTED 11-1-0 (AYES: Kim, St. Germain, Chun, Amazaki, Eads, Gagne, Jackson, Nishioka, Whitaker, Eby, and Simson; NO: Heinrich; ABSTENTION: None).**
- Alternate Meeting Locations – Manoa Elementary School; rental rate at \$4.55 per hour. Heinrich mentioned the possibility of a combined meeting with either the McCully or Makiki Neighborhood Boards, or hold meetings in different areas of the Board, such as Maryknoll School. **Heinrich moved that Chair Gagne work with Manoa Elementary School to reserve dates December 2010 through May 2011 for Manoa to meet. The motion was ADOPTED UNANIMOUSLY (AYES: Kim, St. Germain, Chun, Amazaki, Eads, Gagne, Heinrich, Jackson, Nishioka, Whitaker, Eby, and Simson).**

Brief Update on Matters Relating to Pacific Bioscience Research Center (PBRC) at UHM – Heinrich received a call from Professor Ken Kaneshiro and reviewed that the Board adopted a motion in opposition to abolish the Pacific Bioscience Research Center. The issue was on the September agenda of the UHM Board and Regents and was deferred. It is anticipated that the issue will be on the October agenda of UHM Board of Regents. A letter and petition made of State Legislators also opposed abolishment of the research center. A copy of the resolution was forwarded to the Board of Regents. Heinrich encouraged residents to share their comments at the next meeting of the Board of Regents.

Adding Signs to Inform Visitors of Manoa Falls, and Moving the Traffic Light from Manoa Consulting to the Safeway/Starbucks Corner – Deferred.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS:

Discussion and Prioritization of Possible Capital Improvement Program (CIP) Projects for the Manoa Neighborhood Board District and Adjacent Areas; Consideration of Proposed Resolutions –

- Mauka Portion of University Avenue – Heinrich proposed for the November agenda as a new business item a specific proposal to request to Honolulu City Council to consider the inclusion of planning and design monies in the budget FY 2012 for the Mauka portion of University Avenue.
- Pedestrian and Bicycle Path – Jackson proposed to renovate the bridge at the end of Puowaina. Heinrich requested the Board update its reference list of projects.

BOARD ADMINISTRATION AND PLANNING:

Approval of the August 4, 2010 Regular Meeting and September 1, 2010 Special Joint Meeting Minutes with McCully/Mo'ili'ili – **Jackson moved and St. Germain seconded to approve the August 4, 2010 Regular Meeting and September 1, 2010 Special Joint Meeting Minutes. The motion was ADOPTED with the following corrections.**

August 4, 2010 Regular Meeting Minutes –

- On Page 1, Members Absent, add “**Martin Eads and Rodney Chun**”.
- On Page 3, delete “**At 8:30 p.m. Nadine Nishioka arrived...**”
- On Page 4, under Mayor’s Representative, Farmer’s Market at Manoa Valley Park, delete “Kaaipu Avenue” and replace with “**Manoa Road**”; and under Emergency Text Notice, the sentence should read, “**Whitaker suggested where a note or banner can be added during the televised emergency broadcast, indicating citizens that an emergency is happening in their area and what type of emergency is occurring.**”

September 1, 2010 Special Joint Meeting Minutes –

- On Page 1, Members Present N.B. #8 delete “Judy DeVilbiss”, who resigned two months ago.
- On Page 2, UH – Manoa item #2 should be “Hemenway Hall”, not “Hemingway Hall”.
- On Page 3, item #10 should be “Warnings” not “Wanings”.
- On Page 4, item #21 should be “**Lokahi Project**”, not “Ilokahi project”.

Treasurer’s Report – Whitaker reported for the month of September a previous balance of \$4,047.59; current expenses of \$60.17 for printing and postage of agenda and minutes; and a balance of \$3,987.42. The report was filed.

Reports from Board Officers and/or Board Members – Heinrich reported that Gloria Gaines will remain to be the Board’s Neighborhood Assistant; and unfortunate that Rae Gee was not retained as Executive Secretary (ES). Monday, October 11, 2010 is her last day. Heinrich also noted that the Commissioners at its last meeting passed a motion supporting Rae Gee’s reappointment as Executive Secretary.

Planning of Future Meeting Presentations and Topics – Simson suggested that the order of items on the Board agenda be adjusted to here community concerns first, before the elected officials.

Discussion of the Manoa NB No. 7 Budget Regarding Cost of Locations and Taping of the Meetings – Heinrich stated the main point was the process of what the budget formulation is for each Board, the NCO, and the Neighborhood Board System all together controls approximately \$930,000.00 in this years budget. Being the bulk of the funds goes to the NCO and not to the Boards; as it relates to the videotaping of each Board, no Neighborhood Board was asked for input by evaluating the prior videographers. The chair was encouraged to discuss this issue with other board chairs, by convening a conference of chairs, and what might be presented to the new mayor.

COMMITTEE, PERMITTED INTERACTION GROUP (PIG), & DELEGATE REPORTS:

Candidate Forum – Previously reported.

Planning, Transportation, & Public Safety Committee – None.

Sub District Boundaries & Membership – Pending census report. Heinrich noted that the Neighborhood Commission is considering an overall review of all the Neighborhood Boards as soon as the census report is completed. Reapportionment is not required of the neighborhood Boards.

Oahu Metropolitan Planning Organization (OMPO) Citizen Advisory Committee Delegates – Heinrich acknowledge Whitaker missed only one meeting. Heinrich encouraged residents to visit the website at www.oahumpo.org and take a look at the overall work program for Oahu for the next three years and the Oahu Regional Transportation Plan (ORTP) includes a lot of detail; including the accessing of federal funding.

ANNOUNCEMENTS AND CORRESPONDENCE:

- General Election – The General Election will be held on Tuesday, November 2, 2010.
