THURSDAY, JUNE 3, 2010  
WASHINGTON MIDDLE SCHOOL CAFETERIA

**CALL TO ORDER:** Chair Ron Lockwood called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m.; **a quorum was present with 10 members.** Note: This 15-member Board requires eight (8) members to establish a quorum and to take official Board actions. Housekeeping announcements included silencing cell phones, restroom locations, and the rules and time limits when addressing the Board.

### PUBLIC SAFETY & COMMUNITY LIAISON:

Honolulu Fire Department (HFD) – Capt. Bert Nakamura of McCully Mo’ili’ili Fire Station reported the following:

1. May 2010 Statistics – Included 1 structure, 1 rubbish, 1 vehicle fire; 31 emergencies and 29 miscellaneous calls.
2. Fire Safety Tip – Summer is upon us, and the island will be a higher risk for fires due to dry vegetation and hot weather. Please use caution when utilizing flame producing devices, such as fireworks, matches, and/or lighters, around wildland vegetation; the smallest spark and/or flame can ignite the dry vegetation. As a reminder, the law states that children under the age of 18 shall not possess or have access to fireworks, matches, and/or lighters, except under adult supervision. Flame producing devices are not safe for young children. Sparklers burn at 1200°F. At this intensity, a burning sparkler can cause third-degree burns. Always follow the manufacturer’s directions on the label. As Independence Day nears, consider leaving fireworks displays to pyrotechnic professionals and enjoy one of the several public fireworks displays offered by communities. Individuals who may suffer from respiratory difficulties, such as asthma, should consider staying indoors.

6:32 p.m. Serena Kyi – Yim arrived; **11 members.**

Honolulu Police Department (HPD) – Officers in attendance included Sgt. Eric Ochoa, Brian Carnate, Lt. Gary Lum Lee (District 1); Sgt. Guy Perreira, and Officer Anthony Kahapea (District 7).

- District 1, Honolulu – The May 2010 Statistics for Beat 178 included 4 assaults, 2 DUI (driving under the influence), 3 family offenses, 24 MVC (motor vehicle collisions), 3 motor vehicle thefts, 4 property damage, 3 robberies, and 6 UEMV (unauthorized entry into a motor vehicle).



- District 7, East Honolulu – The monthly packet included the area statistics, safety tips relating to home security, the District 7 web site is [www.honolulu.gov/patrol/d7](http://www.honolulu.gov/patrol/d7), and contact information of the Community Policing Team and Neighborhood Security Watch.

Questions, comments and concerns followed:

1. Electric Bike – There is no law at this time pertaining to electric bikes. Riders should be aware and follow the bicycle laws.
2. Moped Laws – Moped laws are enforced; call 911 if modified mopeds are witnessed. This area is monitored and citations are issued to violators.
3. Homeless Gathering on the McCully Library Property – A) According to the American Disabilities Act (ADA), 36 inches is required for a wheel chair to pass on a sidewalk. The area is checked making sure that the property is clean. The homeless have not harassed each other or passersby; there is no law against homelessness. B) Concerns raised also regarded homeless across the street from the library- State Farm bldg.

University of Hawaii Manoa (UHM) – Elmer Kaai distributed the follow – up report and highlighted the following:

1. UPass Report – A) As required by the Memorandum, the University remitted to the City Department of Transportation Services (DTS) a check in the amount of \$350,340 (March 2010), representing 17,517 enrolled students who paid the \$20 fee as of February 2010. B) Some of the results of the satisfaction survey taken the end of spring resulted in 94% of the spring 2010 passes picked up, 84 % have used the passes on the bus, 73% taking more than five rides, and 88% believe that the UPASS is a beneficial service. C) Comments in The U – PASS benefits society, as well as individuals; keep the program running; riding the bus is convenient; pass cost is minimal; and the best use of student fees and services. E) Less positive comments include it should not be mandatory; it does not make sense since people are already paying for parking.
2. Legislative Action – The legislators have provided \$62 million to address the deferred maintenance needs.
3. Signs of Progress – Campus projects to be completed over the summer include the renovation of the Hale Aloha residence towers. A rededication ceremony is scheduled for Thursday, August 5, 2010; invitations are forthcoming and the Center for Microbial Oceanography Research and Education, providing a cutting – edge scientific facility for the world – class oceanographic research on marine microbes and simultaneously providing a much needed additional laboratory space.
4. Sharing Our Success – A) Renovation of the music complex completed. B) A series of television advertisements were produced. C) The Western Association of Schools and Colleges' March report commended UH Manoa for significant positive changes and "a great deal of excitement and pride about the unique place of Hawaiian Learning and an opportunity to highlight Hawaiian Knowledge."
5. Productive Partnerships – A) Twenty public school teachers are using furlough Fridays to learn the latest scientific techniques in laboratories at the UH Manoa's John A. Burns School of Medicine (JABSOM).
  - Repairing Facilities – The Legislature has appropriated \$92 million last year for campus renewal, soon to be completed are the Hamilton Library reconstruction project, and later this year, the opening of the \$22.4 million Center for Microbial Oceanography Research and Education (C-MORE) facility at the Biomedical Building.
  - Additional Announcement – Eric Crispen, Director for Capital Improvement Projects and the Long Range Development Plan, was held at the Manoa Neighborhood Board meeting on Wednesday, April 7, 2010, 7:00 p.m. at Noelani School. The City Council has approved the Plan Review Use Permit for UH Manoa.

Questions, comments and concerns followed:

1. Lower Campus Darkened Areas – Follow up will be done regarding safety concerns about dark areas at the lower campus in back of the buildings by Varsity/Mo'ili'ili Gate.
2. Message Board – Ideas and support for a permanent message board to be located at the lower Dole Street or other intersections near the campus was suggested.
3. Special Olympics – The University was thanked for hosting the Special Olympics.
4. Student Housing – The student housing is at capacity and always in demand. Plans are to improve Johnson Hall, after Hale Aloha renovations are completed.

Kamehameha Schools (KS) – Susan Todani reported the following:

1. Teddy's Bigger Burgers – Teddy's Bigger Burgers, located at the corner of Isenberg Street and S. Beretania Street (Rainbow Vista Apts.), opened on Monday. Parking is free at the side open lot. Teddy's Bigger Burgers is offering a 10% discount with a Malama Discount Card.
2. New Farmers Market at Varsity Theater – The Farmers Market has been open for two weeks with music, 20 vendors, products reasonably priced, and free parking.

Questions, comments, and concerns:

1. Farmers Market – The farmers market is run by Mahiko Farms and is open Monday's from 3:00 to 7:00 p.m. (flyers were available).
2. Property Located on Isenberg Street between Coolidge Street, Date Street, and S. King Street – There are no current plans for this property across the former Bowl – O – Drome. However, any comments would be forwarded to Kamehameha Schools. A Board member noted that the property is leased with the apartment building.
3. New Japanese Restaurant – It was announced that a Japanese restaurant would be opening next to Teddy's Bigger Burgers in July. More details in July.

Mayor's Representative – Mark Oto reported the following:

1. Homeless Issues – a) City Parks – The City addressed the issue of homeless living in city parks by scheduling major park maintenance for several days, shorter park usage hours, and night park closures. However, the homeless decided to sleep during the day and stay up at night. Social agencies are contacted to service the homeless. b) Sidewalks – A meeting has been held with attorneys trying to address this issue. Sidewalks have been inspected and the matter of homeless congregating on sidewalks is under investigation. c) Social Problem – Homelessness is a social problem.
2. Shopping Carts – The City Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR) is actively policing park properties for shopping carts. The carts brought up last month were removed on May 21, 2010.
3. Overgrown Kiawe Tree – The kiawe tree was inspected by a supervisor from the Department of Urban Forestry (DUF) at the Ala Wai Promenade, and found that the tree is sufficiently maintained, not requiring immediate pruning. Although the canopy overhangs onto the adjacent property, the canopy is high enough with a twenty foot clearance and no branches posing immediate public safety concerns. There is ample space for safe passage of pedestrians and vehicular traffic.
4. Previously Reported, Hole in Ala Wai Community Park – The hole at the Ala Wai Community Park, will again be recovered by Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR) staff; anticipated completion by June 1, 2010. Park users are encourage to utilize the provided appropriated walking and biking paths as they have reinforced surfaces designed for walking and biking.
5. Ala Wai Community Park – Regarding a suggestion to reverse the ingress and egress for paddlers entering the park, the City does not agree with the suggestion and it would not be advised because a bus parked at the existing bus stop adjacent to the exit blocks visibility for Diamond Head bound traffic. Pedestrians walking on the sidewalk and crossing the exit cannot be seen by oncoming traffic Diamond Head bound.

while a bus is at the bus stop. Should the exit be turned into an entrance vehicles attempting to enter the park (often in a hurry to get out, race the bus) would be unable to see pedestrians. Beyond the safety issue, additional resources beyond the current budget would be required to change the ingress, egress, and repaint the directional parking stalls.

6. City Policy on Streets – 1) Mahiai Street is programmed to be resurfaced by contract, Rehabilitation of Localized Streets Phase 6, being administered by the Department of Design and Construction (DDC). Numerous roadways in the McCully, Mo'ili'ili and Makiki areas will be resurfaced as part of this project. The actual start date for Mahiai Street has not been determined at this time. The project is presently in the design stage. 2) The Division of Road Maintenance (DRM) routinely inspects all city owned and maintained roadways island wide to determine pavement conditions. All roadways found to be in need of rehabilitation will be programmed for contract resurfacing or rehabilitation. 3) Contract resurfacing and rehabilitation priorities are determined by availability of funds, roadway condition, clearances for possible conflicts with planned underground utility projects, and roadway classification. 4) DRM crews provide pothole patching and minor pavement repairs, as needed, until the roadway can be resurfaced. 5) Young Street is scheduled to be repaved.

Questions, comments and concerns followed:

1. Bulky Item Pick Up – Councilmember Kobayashi said that revenue is being collected for violators of bulky item pick up policy.
2. Homeless – Concern, by a neighbor, was raised regarding the homeless sitting in front of condominium buildings, and noted that a park is preferred for the homeless. A suggestion for the legislators was to build more affordable rentals. Major cleanups are not a solution resulting with more homeless hiding in the parks.
3. River Street City Project – The project is an initiative of the City to reduce homelessness in Chinatown and Downtown Honolulu. However there is opposition to this project not wanting the homeless there even if they are housed. . The matter is getting the homeless in homes and acceptance by the community.
4. Comments – a) Since there seems to be hostility towards the homeless a study of present homeless was suggested. b) A study was just completed in January, resulting in a small population from the mainland and more from Micronesia. c) In some areas there are two to three families occupying a single unit.
5. Repaving of Young Street – Reported earlier in the Mayor's report.
6. Date Street – The summer sewer project has been pushed back another year, so there is no need to repave until that project is completed.
7. S. Beretania Street Widening (fronting Central Union Church) – Follow up will be done if the work would be completed by 2010.
8. New Parking Meters Along S. King Street – Follow – up will be done as to project start date.
9. Hauoli and S. King Streets Pedestrian Activated Crosswalk – Follow up will be done,

Governor's Representative – The Board will no longer have a governor's representative attend this meeting. Chair Lockwood did note for this neighborhood board area, that classroom. Email state concerns/issues to the Governor's Office at (808) 586-0034.

Board of Water Supply (BWS) – Kurt Tsue reported the following:

1. Water Main Breaks – There were no water main breaks reported for April and May 2010.
2. Summer Conservation:
  - ◇ As we head into the warmer summer months, Oahu customers are always reminded to use water they need, but not to waste.

- ◇ According to the United States Environmental Protection Agency, the average American home can waste more than 10,000 gallons of water every year from running toilets, dripping faucets, and other household leaks. To detect leaks, turn off all water fixture, and check to see if the property's water meter (red arrow or black triangle) is moving. If it is, there is a leak.
  - ◇ The most common household leaks are in toilets. Leak detection tablets for toilets were distributed. Drop a table into the toilet tank and if there is a leak the color should appear in the bowl within 15 – 30 minutes time.
3. Water Quality – The BWS conducts thousands of tests on the water source and distribution system each year to ensure that the water served to customers meets or exceeds all federal and state safe drinking water standards. The test results will be shared with BWS customers in the annual water quality report, currently being mailed. The reports should be received by July 1, 2010. Visit [www.boardofwatersupply.com](http://www.boardofwatersupply.com) to get a water quality report or more information. A short handout was provided to Board members and the community.

Questions, comment and concerns followed:

1. Fundraiser Car Washes at the 76 Gas Station – The Board of Water Supply (BWS) does not monitor fundraiser carwashes if the group is paying for the water; (cannot be stopped unless absolutely necessary such as mandatory conservation). Call the hotline at 748 – 7041 for more information.
2. Future Water Problems in Hawaii – Water usage in Hawaii has been consistent for the past 20 years. The toilet retrofit program helped to decrease water consumption.
3. Private Owners Water Usage – To report water waste due to broken sprinklers (wasting water, etc.) on private property call 748 – 7041 and BWS will follow up.
4. Sewer Line Breakage – Sewer lines comes under the City Department of Environmental Services, not BWS

#### RESIDENTS' CONCERNS:

- Hanauma Bay – Concern was raised about the effects that the soon to start City furloughs will have on Hanauma Bay. The Thursday evening education program will be lost. New hours will be from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Although the bay has it own funding, it is being forced into the furloughs by the unions. Workers should then have the two day a month furlough like other City workers rather than changing hours and no programs on certain nights. It was stated why residents and visitors should be penalized. Mayor's Representative Oto said that the matter is still under negotiation.
- Homeless at the Library – Comments – 1) The homeless at the library site has quadrupled in the last three weeks. 2) Many of the homeless individuals prefer living in the park; and concern was raised that some illegal activity occurs on in the parks. 3) The park is more humane with comfort station facilities. 4) Library users are intimidated by some of the homeless. 5) Some residents plan to move out of the area. 6) A temporary shelter was suggested to be located back of the park area near the restrooms. 7) Laws are being broken such as using the bathroom on the sidewalks. 8) Resident Coleman offered to help find a solution.

#### ELECTED OFFICIALS:

Councilmember Kobayashi – Councilmember Kobayashi circulated her report and highlighted the following:

1. Early – Morning Noise Workshop – On May 14, 21010, along with several legislators an Early – Morning Noise Workshop was held at Christ Methodist Church. In attendance were neighborhood board members, community leaders, and representatives from Honolulu Disposal, Rolloffs Hawaii and Kings Disposal Members of the community were given an opportunity to discuss concerns regarding early morning trash pickup and other noise pollution concerns. Effective dialogue between the represented and community members resulted in many new suggestions such as decibel restrictions for motorbikes, use of reflectors for refuse containers and investment in sound – dampening technology on private trash pickup vehicles.
2. Bulky Items – Ideas are welcome for new legislation being worked on regarding this matter.

3. Graffiti Bill – The graffiti bill passed and awaits Governor action.
4. Bowl-O-Drome Site – Resolution 10-82 urging the City Administration to resume negotiations to exchange City owned land for the Stadium Bowl – O – Drome property in McCully Mo'ili'ili was adopted by the City Council on March 31, 2010.
5. River Street Project – Many hearings have been held regarding this project. The Downtown Neighborhood Board No. 13 voted against the project for the community.

Questions, comments and concerns followed:

1. Replacement of Councilmember Charles Djou's Seat – There are 27 applicants for the position and the City Council has narrowed the list to five or six. The final decision will be voted on June 9, 2010.
2. Bowl – O – Drome Issue – A) A comment made was that there is need for more parks in other areas of the neighborhood.\ or possibly housing. B) Councilmember Kobayashi noted that the site would be an ideal place for affordable housing or another facility with housing above. However, until the sewer lines are redone a medical facility could not be built. She does not want the property be lost for commercial use. C) Seattle renovates old buildings into permanent housing.
3. McCully Recreation Center Update – The pool is still being worked on, therefore no Summer Fun Program for the sixth year.

Representative Isaac Choy – A representative was not present; a written report was provided.

Representative Scott Nishimoto – A representative was not present; a written report was provided.

Representative Scott Saiki – Rep. Scott Saiki circulated his written report and highlighted the following:

1. Town Meeting – A Town Meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, July 8, 2010, at the McCully Public Library at 6:00 p.m., to discuss homeless issues and statistics such as origin and profile. Many homeless do not want to be placed in shelters.
2. Legislative Focus – One of the legislative focuses is the Micronesian population and impacts on services.

Questions, comments and concerns:

1. Follow Up for Homeless – If one witnesses a homeless person in need of medical care, etc. call the Institution for Human Services and with a description of the person and location, follow-up will be done. The Waikiki Health Center's Care-A-Van located on Waiialae Avenue will also assist. Rep. Saiki mentioned that the state focus is to increase shelter space. From 2007 – 2010 an additional 11,000 homeless were helped, many numerous times.
2. Current Laws Relating to Sleeping on the Sidewalk, but not Allowed in Parks – A City ordinance allows sleeping on the median strips. Ten years ago this Board voted for park closures from 10:00 p.m. to 5:00 a.m. It was suggested, by a neighbor, that the Board repeal this action to keep the parks open.

Senator Carol Fukunaga – Senator Fukunaga distributed her monthly report and highlighted the following:

- Senate Concurrent Resolution 183 S.D. 1 H.D.1 – A legislative noise pollution task force will convene to review best practices from other states in reducing urban noise pollution. The Task Force will consist of representatives from various state and county department and agencies involved in the regulation of enforcement of noise laws., and McCully/Mo'ili'ili area legislators, and members of Oahu Neighborhood Boards (McCully – Mo'ili'ili No.8, Waikiki No. 9, Makiki/Lower Punchbowl/Tantalus No.10, Ala Moana Kakaako No. 11, Nuuanu/Punchbowl No. 12, Downtown No. 13, Liliha/Puunui/Alewa/Kamehameha Heights No. 14, and Kalihi – Palama No. 15).
- Funding for Library Premises – Funding has been appropriated for fencing around the library.

Questions, comments and concerns followed: Incentives for the Homeless – Comments expressed regarded what incentives are there for the homeless to move into shelters. Senator Fukunaga said suggestions/ideas could be solicited from area residents and she will continue to do so. The Alder Street Detention Center, now vacant, was suggested to be used as a shelter.

Senator Brian Taniguchi – Senator Taniguchi was present earlier in the meeting; a written report was provided.

FILLING OF VACANCIES: There were no nominations or volunteers to fill any of the four (4) vacancies. Chair Lockwood announced that Judy Devilbiss would be resigning from the Board effective after tonight's meeting.

PRESENTATION (S): None.

HOUSEKEEPING:

1. Report on Oahu Metropolitan Planning Organization (OMPO) Meeting of May 19, 2010 – Per the OMPO report, the deadline for a reply from the Board regarding the FY 2011 Overall Work Program is Wednesday, June 25, 2010. Chair Lockwood and Board members will provide comments.
2. Homeless Camp at Library – Discussed numerous times earlier in the meeting.
3. Moi'ili'ili In the News:
  - ◇ National Distinguished Principal – Washington Middle School principal Michael Hirano will represent Hawaii in Washington D.C. this October as he vies for the top honor in the U.S.A.
  - ◇ 2010 Social Worker of the Year for Hawaii – Board member Betty Lou Larson, Housing Programs Director for Catholic Charities, was selected for this honor.
  - ◇ Solar Panels for Kaimuki High School – As the roof is gym repaired solar panels will be installed saving over \$3,500 yearly in electrical costs while the company maintains ownership of the panels and maintenance for the next 20 years.
  - ◇ T.A.G. Clean Up – On April 17, 2010 over 250 volunteers and about 80 students from Kaimuki High's Inter Act Club cleaned the H-1 underpass by Market City with 15 gallons of State Department of Transportation (DOT) paint.
  - ◇ Terroristic Threatening – A McCully man was arrested on May 2, 2010 for threatening to kill 3 men, one woman, and a 15 year old boy.
  - ◇ Burglars in the Farrington/S. Beretania Street Area – Neighbors assisted HPD by tracking down 3 alleged burglars in this area; job well done.
4. Pride in Moi'ili'ili Street No. 4 – Pride in Moi'ili'ili No. 4 will take place on Saturday, June 5, 2010, Coolidge Street at 8:00 a.m. In three Saturdays, 2.5 tons of silt has been cleared.
5. Bulky Item Pick Up – The next bulky item pick-up is scheduled for Monday, June 21, 2010. Put all opala out on the curbside Sunday, June 20, 2010 for pick-up on Monday, June 21, 2010.
6. Citizen Patrol with Chief Louis Kealoha – This event will take place on Monday, June 14, 2010 with Police Chief Louis Kealoha and the Sheridan, Downtown, Manoa, and Nuuanu Citizen patrols.
7. Census Update – For the McCully/Moi'ili'ili area the census is about 98% complete. Follow-up is being done for people who were on vacation, have odd work schedules, etc.; and should be completed by tomorrow.
8. Liquor License Notices Received – A) Beretania Booze Mini Mart, May 20, 2010; B) Waiialae Avenue at Kapahulu Restaurant, May 27, 2007.

NEW BUSINESS:

Annual Newsletter – Copies of the annual newsletter were distributed to Board members for final review. Chair Lockwood will send the final copy to the Neighborhood Commission Office for printing and distribution. **Kyi-Yim moved and Devilbiss seconded accepting the annual newsletter as corrected by UNANIMOUS CONSENT, 11-0-0 (AYE: Cuadra, Devilbiss, Hata, Kondratovich, Kato, Kyi-Yim, Larson, Lockwood, Tabor, Takamura, Wilk).**

Resolution 10 – 82 Bowl-O-Drome – Resolution 10-82 urging the City Administration to resume negotiations to exchange City owned land for the Stadium Bowl – O – Drome property in McCully Mo'ili'ili was adopted by the City Council on March 31, 2010.

Discussion followed: 1) The property would be beneficial as a community park. 2) In 1998 the issue was discussed by the Vision Team. 3) Discussion with the City, State and Hawaiian Home Lands was recommended. 4) An update report to the Board was requested. 5) It was asked that this item be kept on the agenda. 6) Comment – Councilmember's original idea was to expand the park noting that the McCully Recreation Center's pool will fail (yet to be reopened). 7) Other suggestions for this site were an orthopedic pool with a roof, meeting room, and affordable housing on top of the structure. 8) Noise relates to parks. A combination with affordable housing was supported. 9) The soil may contain asbestos, lead paint, etc. when previously used as a pit stop for drag racers.
