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### **DRAFT MINUTES OF REGULAR MEETING THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 4, 2010 WASHINGTON MIDDLE SCHOOL CAFETERIA**

**CALL TO ORDER:** Chair Ron Lockwood called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. **with a quorum of eleven (11) members present.** This 15 member Board requires eight (8) members to establish a quorum and take official Board action.

#### PUBLIC SAFETY & COMMUNITY LIAISON:

Honolulu Fire Department (HFD) – Capt. Villa reported the following:

- October 2010 Statistics – Included 2 structure, 71 medical, and 50 miscellaneous calls.
- Fire Safety Tip – A) Consider a fire-resistant, artificial Christmas tree. If purchasing a real tree choose one as fresh as possible, keep it hydrated, and away from heat sources. Use noncombustible materials for decorations and choose only Underwriter's Laboratory-approved electrical decorations. and following the manufacturer's instructions for installation and usage. Do not overload extension cords. B) If you must leave the stove, even for a few minutes, turn it off. Unattended cooking is the number one cause of home fires. Have a metal lid ready to cover grease fires in pans. Never wear long, loose-sleeved clothing while cooking. Turn the handles on pots and pans inward to prevent accidents. Keep children away from cooking areas. C) Turkey fryers can be very dangerous. The national Fire Protection Association (NFPA) discourages the use of outdoor gas-fueled turkey fryers that immerse the poultry in hot oil. D) If you are hosting overnight guests, share your home escape plan with them, including the designated meeting place outside the home.

Questions, comments and concerns:

1. Structure Fires – Most structure fires are caused by unattended cooking. There were no specifics regarding tonight's report.
2. Holiday Season – HFD is prepared for the holidays; and for the past two years, extra manpower was on duty.

Honolulu Police Department (HPD):

District 1, Honolulu – Lt. Ozeki reported the following:

- October 2010 Statistics – Included 8 assaults, 2 burglaries, 4 DUI (driving under the influence), 2 drug offense, 2 family offense, 0 graffiti, 25 MVC (motor vehicle collisions), 1 motor vehicle theft, 4 property damage, 0 robbery, 3 sex assaults, and 2 UEMV (unauthorized entry into a motor vehicle).



Questions, comments and concerns:

1. Family Offense – Family offenses are usually domestic violence.
2. DUI Cases – All DUI's are arrest cases.
3. Moi'ili'ili Clean-Up – HPD was asked to check Hauoli Street to make sure that cars are not parked between the barriers for this weeks clean-up.
4. Assault Cases Reported – Assault cases reported covers the entire Beat 178. Majority of the assaults involves juveniles.
5. Traffic Accident Cases – These cases are assigned to the Traffic Division.
6. Request – Chair Lockwood asked if noise citations could be incorporated with the monthly statistics report.
7. Suspected Drug Activity – Report suspicious drug activity to HPD's Narco/Vice Division or online. All reports are kept anonymous.

District 7, East Honolulu: Lt. Lum Lee circulated the monthly statistics packet which includes a summary of crimes, Identity Theft Safety Tips, and District 7 contact information.

Questions, comments and concerns followed:

1. Speeding on King and McCully Streets – Due to the heavy traffic on McCully Street at all times (cars backed up), cars do not normally speed.
2. Mahalo – District 7 was thanked for monitoring the intersection of Kapiolani Boulevard and University Avenue.
3. Homeless – A community of families were reported living along the promenade, HPD can ask the people to move but cannot remove anyone's belongings. The City will be called and the items left picked up the next morning.
4. Unmarked Parking Stalls – Cars parked in unmarked parking stalls must be four (4) feet from any driveway; and no blocking of sidewalks.

University of Hawaii Manoa (UHM) – Elmer Kaai reported the following:

- UH West Oahu (UHWO) Update – Approximately 40,000 individuals were notified that their personal information may have been compromised. Individuals potentially affected are students who attended UH Manoa from 1990 – 1998 and during 2001. In addition, students who attended UHWO during fall of 1994 or graduated from 1988 – 1993 may also be affected. The University is in the process of contacting the affected individuals by postal mail and email. Anyone with questions may call (808) 956-5000 on weekdays between 8:00 a.m. – 4:30 p.m.
- Follow-up on the Joint Manoa and McCully-Mo'ili'ili Neighborhood Board Presentation – No details have been released about the Pre-APEC meeting in December at the East West Center. UH Manoa does not expect any traffic impact because there are about 150 – 200 participants who will be bused in, and the meetings are not open to the public or news. Eric Crispin is available to make a presentation on Rail Terminus & Connectivity, Drainage Plan for UH Manoa, and Plan Review Use and Long Range Development Plan.
- Tokai University to Move to Kapolei in 2013 – Construction on the new Hawaii Tokai International College located next to the UH West Oahu campus is set to begin in the summer of 2011.
- Homecoming – Homecoming was held last week with over 1,000 attendees.
- New Oceanography and Laboratory Building – This new building was recently opened.

Questions, comments and concerns followed:

1. Tokai University Current Campus – It is unsure if UH Manoa and the property owners of the current campus have discussed using the buildings for dormitories.
2. Lower Campus Entrance – Details are being worked out with the surrounding neighbors about lowering the sign. It makes no sense if the signs on Dole Street are not visible.

Kamehameha Schools (KS) – Susan Todai reported the following:

- Grant – Kamehameha Schools sponsored an education grant with the UH School of Architecture and retained a graduate class.
- East West Building Improvements – The two-story commercial building on S. Beretania Street near Jiffy Lube is being improved.

Questions, comments, and concerns:

1. Pucks Alley – There are no definite plans for improvements at Puck's Alley.
2. Recycling Day at Kaimuki High School – Susan Todani and Kamehameha Schools were thanked for participating in this community event.
3. Demolition of Varsity Theater – It was mentioned that a request was to save the marquee and to be recreated at an appropriate time. However, the materials were deteriorated.

Mayor Peter Carlisle's Representative – A representative to the Board will be assigned soon.

Governor's Representative – The Board no longer has a governor's representative attending this meeting; state concerns/issues can be forwarded to the Governor's Office at (808) 586-0034.

Board of Water Supply (BWS) – Kurt Tsue circulated the Xeriscape Garden Workshop schedule, and highlighted the following:

- Water Main Breaks – There October water main breaks were two (2) 12-inch water main breaks at 2488 Kapiolani Boulevard on October 9th and 10th. The contra-flowed area was repaved by 8:00 a.m. the next morning.
- 2010-2011 Halawa Xeriscape Garden Workshop Schedule – These fun and educational workshops held by BWS, focus on the concept of xeriscaping, an innovative means of conserving water through efficient landscaping and other means of saving water outdoors. A holiday wreath workshop is scheduled for November 27, 2010. The popular rain barrel catchment workshops will be coming up in February and May 2011. - Water Meters – BWS is responsible for the maintenance of water meters and it's important that you keep the meter box clear of grass and debris so that BWS crews can easily access it if needed. If a water meter leak is notice or need to shut off water service for any reason, please do not attempt any repairs or maintenance to the meter box; call 748-5000. More information about water meter maintenance may be found in the rules and regulations section of the BWS website.

Questions, comments and concerns:

1. October 2010 Water Main Breaks – The October water main breaks occurred on Date Street.
2. Repaving of Area Side Roads – BWS contractor repaves areas where repair work was done to the original condition.

#### RESIDENTS' CONCERNS:

Comment – A member of the audience stated that the capacity of Neighborhood Boards is advisory and that transparency also refers to Neighborhood Boards. Concern was raised that the agenda listed resolutions, but copies were not provided to the guests. Board members received copies via postal mail with their agendas. Chair Lockwood reiterated that no extra copies of the resolutions were available this evening. It was requested that tonight's resolutions be deferred and that the Board limit the number of resolutions per meeting for discussion.

#### ELECTED OFFICIALS:

Councilmember Ann Kobayashi – Councilmember Ann Kobayashi reported the following:

- Aloha Aina Day at Kaimuki High School – All volunteers was thanked for participating in this successful event.
- Bulky Item Rules – The rules are not available yet, but will not include daily fines. In many areas, items are brought from other areas and dumped.
- New City Council – New members have been elected to the City Council.
- Sidewalk Bill – Work is still being completed on this bill. In two days the McCully Public Library 300 signatures were collected regarding the side walk bill. Councilmember Kobayashi reiterated that there is a 60 – day education period prior to the bill taking effect.

Questions, comments and concerns:

1. Homeless – A) There are less homeless by the McCully Public Library because they seem to be moving further down on to S. King Street. It was reiterated that the sidewalk bill will not take effect for 60 – days. B) Meetings are held monthly to discuss homeless issues and options. Many homeless who work need transportation to the job site. C) Homeless utilizing the sidewalks may cause people passing with strollers, wheelchairs, etc., sometimes trip over items belonging to the homeless.
2. Bowl-o-Drome Negotiations – A) Mayor Carlisle has not had the opportunity to review all the records. B) A suggestion was that a portion of the property be set aside for the homeless. Councilmember Kobayashi asked if the Board would like to survey the surrounding neighbors on the matter. Chair Lockwood said that the Board would like to, but there is not enough funding in the budget. This property is currently leased to a tow truck company for truck storage. The building is unutilized and empty.

PRESENTATION: None.

Vacancies: Chair Lockwood announced that Board member Betty Lou Larsen has resigned from the Board; the Board has three (3) at-large vacancies. He asked if there were any interested persons present to fill the vacancy. Taryn Bazzano volunteered to fill a vacancy.

7:25 – 7:30 p.m. Recess to verify residency. Bazzano did not have her address verification with her this evening; verification will be provided at next month's meeting.

NEW BUSINESS:

7:40 p.m. Kato arrived; **13 members present.**

Election of new Treasurer for Board due to Betty Lou Larson resignation – Kyi-Yim moved, Kondratovich seconded, nominating Marijane Carlos for Treasurer. By UNANIMOUS CONSENT, Marijane Carlos was nominated Board Treasurer, 13-0-0 (AYE: Carlos, Cuadra, Hata, Jensen, Kato, Kondratovich, Kyi-Yim, Lockwood, Marshall, Ragsdale, Tabor, Takamura, Tomy).

Resolution # 1, State Legislator Residency – Carlos moved, Marshall seconded that the McCully - Mo'ili'ili Neighborhood Board No. 8 supports the principle that elected representatives shall be domiciled at the time of filing for election and registered to vote in the district which they are filing to represent; urges the Hawai'i State Legislature to amend the state law to clarify that 'residence' as defined for election purposes means a domicile; and also request that the Hawai'i State Legislature amend the state law to eliminate "intent to return" as a defense for not living in a district.

Discussion followed:

1. It was asked why the federal is not included in the resolution.
2. An audience member questioned why there are no copies for the audience. Chair Lockwood said that copies were mailed to Board members a week before this meeting. He added that due to budget cuts funding is limited and the Board is doing the best they can. Chair Lockwood suggested that she file a complaint with the Neighborhood Commission Office (NCO) and he would speak with her after the meeting.

Resolution # 2, Transparency in Government – Carlos moved, Tabor seconded that the McCully – Mo'ili'ili Neighborhood Board No. 8 accept the resolution urging the legislature to pass legislation requiring a roll call vote for all votes affecting the status of legislation; and that the Board requests the State Legislature to take necessary steps to webcast all legislative proceedings in audio and video format.

Discussion followed:

1. An audience member questioned why copies of the resolution were not provided for the audience. Chair Lockwood said that copies were mailed to Board members a week before this meeting. He added that due to budget cuts funding is limited and the Board is doing the best they can. Chair Lockwood suggested that she file a complaint with the Neighborhood Commission Office (NCO) and he would speak with her after the meeting.
2. It is unsure if the webcast would be specific to `Olelo broadcasting.
3. Requiring a roll call votes us currently unseeingly. There may be some inconsistencies and distrust.
4. The resolution does compel the legislature to get a roll call vote; there are a lot of options.

**The resolution transparency in government was ADOPTED, 12-0-1 (AYE: Carlos, Cuadra, Hata, Kondratovich, Kyi-Yim, Jensen, Lockwood, Marshall, Ragsdale, Tabor, Takamura, Tomy); ABSTAIN: Kato).**

Resolution # 3, Providing Public Notice, Participation, Discussion, Deliberation, and Transparency to the Legislative Process – Kyi-Yim moved, Carlos seconded to defer the resolution to work on the verbage. The motion to defer the resolution was ADOPTED, 12-0-1 (AYE: Carlos, Cuadra, Hata, Kondratovich, Kyi-Yim, Jensen, Lockwood, Kato, Ragsdale, Tabor, Takamura, Tomy); ABSTAIN: Marshall).

Resolution #4, Requesting the Legislature to Webcast all Legislative Proceedings in Audio & video Formats and to Archive these on the Web – Ragsdale moved, Takamura seconded that the McCully – Mo'ili'ili Neighborhood Board No. 8 requests the State Legislature to take the necessary steps to webcast all legislative proceedings in audio and video formats, and to have these archived for future availability on the web.

Discussion followed:

1. This resolution is redundant to the resolution just passed.
2. It was suggested to defer this resolution until the verbage for the discussion, deliberation, and transparency to the legislative process resolution is complete and consolidates both resolutions. A comment was that both resolutions are different. Another suggestion was to tie resolutions Two, three and four be consolidated.
3. Several board members agreed on the redundancy.

**The resolution, requesting the Legislature to Webcast all Legislative Proceedings in Audio & video Formats and to Archive these on the Web was *ADOPTED*, 11 – 2 – 0 (AYE: Carlos, Cuadra, Hata, Jenson, Kato, Kondratovich, Kyi-Yim, Lockwood, Marshall, Ragsdale, Takamura; NO: Tabor, Tomyl).**

**Resolution #5, Supporting Fair Island Access to Government Information, Services and Proceedings – Marshall moved Takamura seconded that the McCully – Mo`ili`ili Neighborhood Board No.8 supports the passage of legislation to ensure that neighbor island residents have fair access to government information, services and proceedings.**

Discussion followed:

1. Kondratovich amended the motion, second whereas, last sentence change islander to island. Marshall and Takamura agreed.
2. Comments: a) The technology needs updating. B) The resolution does not define the meaning of fair access.

**The resolution supporting fair island access to government information, services and proceedings was *ADOPTED*, 13 – 0 – 0, (AYE: Carlos, Cuadra, Hata, Kondratovich, Kyi-Yim, Jenson, Lockwood, Marshall, Ragsdale, Tabor, Tomyl; NO: Kato).**

All other resolutions were deferred.

#### **State Legislator Residency**

**WHEREAS**, its is important that all districts in Hawai'i be represented by individuals who live in those districts; and

**WHEREAS**, the current law defines eligibility to hold office based on residence rather than domicile; and

**WHEREAS**, a person can have more than one residence but only one domicile; and

**WHEREAS**, under current law a person can live in one district and declare residency in another, which undermines the purpose of the law to have all districts in Hawai'i be represented by individuals who live in those districts; now, therefore,

**RESOLVED**, that the McCully - Mo'ili'ili Neighborhood Board No. 8 supports the principle that elected representatives shall be domiciled at the time of filing for election and registered to vote in the district which they are filing to represent; and be it further

**RESOLVED**, that the McCully - Mo'ili'ili Neighborhood Board No. 8 urges the Hawai'i State Legislature to amend the state law to clarify that 'residence' as defined for election purposes means a domicile; and be it further

**RESOLVED**, that the McCully - Mo'ili'ili Neighborhood Board No. 8 also request that the Hawai'i State Legislature amend the state law to eliminate "intent to return" as a defense for not living in a district; be it finally

**RESOLVED**, that copies of this Resolution be transmitted to all members of the Hawai'i State Legislature, to all Neighborhood Boards and to the Governor.

#### Transparency in Government

**WHEREAS**, on January 29, 2010 the State House of Representatives took a voice vote to defer indefinitely the Civil Union Bill (HB444); and

**WHEREAS**, Representatives present at the session on January 29, 2010 failed to call for a roll call vote; and calls from the gallery on January 29, 2010, for a roll call vote were ignored; and

**WHEREAS**, those in attendance on January 29, 2010, did not hear 26 ayes cast in favor of the deferring the bill; and

**WHEREAS**, an investigative reporter individually polled the House Representatives and could not discover twenty-six (26) Representatives to admit that they cast ayes in favor of deferring the bill; and

**WHEREAS**, on February 19, 2010, there was a controversy surrounding a motion to recall HB2311, where a video session of the vote deferred with count taken by the House Clerk's office; and

**WHEREAS**, on April 27, 2010, there was a controversy when Representative Thielen called for a division of the House for HB2359; and

**WHEREAS**, the House of Representatives does not tape its sessions, hence there was no video record of the process; and now therefore

**BE IT RESOLVED**, that the McCully – Mo'ili'ili Neighborhood Board No. 8 hereby urges the legislature to pass legislation requiring a roll call vote for all votes affecting the status of legislation; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the McCully – Mo'ili'ili Neighborhood Board No. 8 requests the State Legislature to take necessary steps to webcast all legislative proceedings in audio and video formats; and

**BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED**, that copies of this Resolution be transmitted to all members of State Legislature and to the Governor.

ARCHIVE THESE ON THE WEB.

**WHEREAS**, the legislative committee hearing rooms in the state capitol are wired for sound and at least the audio of all proceedings conducted in these rooms, is accessible to capitol occupants on cable television channels dedicated for this purpose; and

**WHEREAS**, by using funds currently appropriated to the legislature, including funding for legislative broadcast program, hardware and software could be purchased to allow the audio and visual of legislative proceedings to be webcast over the internet; and

**WHEREAS**, while broadcasts of legislative proceeding on `Olelo cable channels are also webcast via [www.olelo.org](http://www.olelo.org), less than 20% of all proceedings are broadcast, some are taped for later broadcast, and virtually none of the hearings of the major house committees are broadcast, and

**WHEREAS**, a program of web casting all legislative proceedings would allow the legislature's activities to become transparent and instantly accessible to citizens across the state, including neighbor island residents who are greatly disadvantaged due to distance; and

**WHEREAS**, the pilot program that archived all broadcasted Senate proceedings has run successfully over the past two years making available to any interested party with web access the ability to instantly select and observe hearings and proceedings; now therefore

**BE IT RESOLVED**, that the McCully – Mo'ili'ili Neighborhood No. 8 requests the State Legislature to take the necessary steps to webcast all legislative proceedings in audio and video formats, and to have these archived for future availability on the web; and

**BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED**, that copies of this Resolution be transmitted to the Speaker of the House and President of the Senate and the Governor.

#### GOVERNMENT INFORMATION, SERVICES AND PROCEEDINGS

**WHEREAS**, the residents of Hawai'i, Maui, Moloka'i, Lana'i, Kaua'i, Niihau, and even some parts of rural O`ahu are disadvantaged in gaining access to government information, services and proceedings because of their distant locations away from the seat of government in Honolulu and the state capitol; and

**WHEREAS**, since the last study, over fifteen (15) years ago on ways to use technology to address fair access concerns of island, which resulted in neighborhood island toll-free phone numbers, technology has further advanced to significantly reduce physical distance as a factor limiting neighbor island access government information, personnel, and proceedings; and

**WHEREAS**, it should be the responsibility of the state, including the governor and legislature, to provide neighbor island residents with fair access to government information, services, and proceedings by conducting a study to review, evaluate, and make recommendations for improving the level of access by geographically disadvantaged residents; and

**WHEREAS**, a governor's statewide fair access commission, similar to one last convened in 1989, and a study on fair access to legislative proceedings and information conducted by the joint legislative access committee, a body created statutorily in 1996 with related duties, would help advance the cause of fair access for neighbor islanders and other geographically disadvantaged residents and should be supported; now therefore

**BE OT RESOLVED**, that the McCully – Mo'ili'ili Neighborhood Board No. 8 supports the passage of legislation to ensure that neighborhood island residents have fair access to government information, services and proceedings; and

**BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED**, that copies of this Resolution be transmitted to the Speaker of the House, the Senate President, and the Governor.
