DRAFT REGULAR MEETING MINUTES TUESDAY, AUGUST 13, 2013 WAIKIKI COMMUNITY CENTER

CALL TO ORDER: Chair Robert Finley called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. **with a quorum of 14 members present.** Note: This 17-member Board requires nine (9) members to establish a quorum and to take official Board action.

OATH OF OFFICE: Board members Michael Peters, Roy Wytenbach II, and Liz Larson were administered the oath of office before the start of the meeting; all members sworn in.

CITY MONTHLY REPORTS:

Honolulu Fire Department (HFD) – Acting Captain Abraham Farakish reported the following:

- **July 2013 Fire Statistics** – Included 6 structure fires, 3 rubbish fires, 4 vehicle fires, 167 medical calls, 5 search/rescues, and 6 miscellaneous calls for service.
- **Electrical Fire Safety Tip** – Have electrical work done by a qualified electrician. Before you buy or remodel a home, have it inspected by a qualified electrician. Plug only one heat-producing appliance into a receptacle outlet at a time. Plug major appliances directly into a wall receptacle outlet. Extension cords and plug strips should not be used. Check electrical cords to ensure they are not placed across doorways or under carpets. Extension cords are intended for temporary use. Have a qualified electrician add more receptacle outlets so you do not have to use extension cords. Use light bulbs that match the recommended wattage for the lamp or fixture. A sticker that indicates the maximum wattage light bulb to use should be affixed to the lamp or fixture.

Honolulu Police Department (HPD) – Lieutenant Harrison Kim Hahn reported the following:

- **July 2013 Crime Statistics** – Included 11 sex offenses, 11 robberies, 38 burglaries, 272 thefts, 45 unauthorized entries into a motor vehicle (UEMV), 10 motor vehicle thefts, 43 assaults, 41 harassments, 34 property damages, 24 drugs/narcotics, 12 family offenses, 35 driving under the influence (DUI), 19 liquor law, 159 miscellaneous public cases, 165 vehicle tows, 189 motor vehicle accidents, 27 arguments, 298 nuisance complaints, 259 parking violations, 160 suspicious circumstance/person/vehicle, and 460 miscellaneous calls for service.
- **Pedestrian Safety Tip** – Kim Hahn noted that this is Pedestrian Safety Month and enforcements have stepped up. Safety tips include looking at the oncoming vehicle, make eye contact/wave at the driver. Roads with multi lanes wave at oncoming traffic before stepping out into the crosswalk. Be aware of cars in



the other lanes. Advice for drivers is to check both sides of a crosswalk for pedestrians, especially mid-block crosswalks. If other cars in other lanes stop, you should do the same.

- Loud Mufflers – In the last month citations issued have doubled.

Questions, comments, concerns:

1. Park Closure Statistics – Dew asked and Kim Hahn noted that the statistics relating to park closures was not available this evening.
2. Crossing Count Down Times – Smith asked if there are any plans to educate the people regarding crosswalk count down times. It was noted that people crossing near the expiration time hinders drivers from making right or left turns. Kim Hahn responded that this month pedestrian citations are high for all types of violations.
3. Sirens – Erteschik noted that it seems every five to ten minutes sirens are heard and assumes it is a serious emergency. In response, sirens are used for priority one emergencies. For HPD a priority one is a big injury, an injury in progress or crime especially at night. Wytenbach asked and it was noted that first responder sirens have level with different tones.
4. Buses at Bus Stops – Apaka reported the rear of buses at bus stops sticking out into the other lane of traffic.
5. Mauka/Makai Streets – Apaka reported drivers failing to heed the “no left on red” signs especially on Paoakalani Avenue and Ala Wai Boulevard.
6. Parking Along the Ala Wai Boulevard – Apaka mentioned that parking is scarce and drivers looking for parking spaces do not use their signals, causing other drivers to suddenly stop. This concern will be relayed to the officers.
7. Mahalo – Apaka thanked HPD providing officers on foot patrol.
8. Pedestrians on Cell Phones – Carroll expressed concern about pedestrians on cell phones, texting and not paying attention to traffic. In answer, currently there is no law regarding this issue.
9. Legal Alcohol Limit – A member of the public asked and it was noted that it was unknown if any Hawaii studies alcohol related deaths were done.
10. Noise – Larson asked what the ordinance says regarding loud sound levels from outdoor concerts, hotel parties, etc. Kim Han recommended calling 911 regarding loud noise. If the call is anonymous the responding officer would go to the establishment and asked that the noise levels be turned down. Or the caller could meet an officer and provide more details. According to the prosecutor, two (2) civilian complaints are needed to testify regarding noise. A citation would first be issued, and possibly followed by an arrest.
11. Grassy Areas Along the Beach – A member of the public reported that two (2) years ago the Urban Forest Division put new grass in and trying to rest the area so the grass can grow. However, people are sleeping in tents surrounded by yellow cord near Kapiolani Park. It was asked why more community members are not deputized to patrol the area. Kim Hahn replied HPD is working with DPR and recommending calling 911 if people refuse to move.
12. Bicycles on Sidewalks – C. Francis Chun reported speeding on sidewalks by bicyclists between 7:15 a.m.-8:30 a.m. fronting the golf store endangering the safety of people boarding the bus. Kim Hahn noted that ticketing bicyclist on sidewalks have been stepped up.
13. Mopeds/Motorcycles – A member of the public asked and it was noted that mopeds are prohibited from sidewalks unless noted. It was also asked and noted that it is illegal to park motorcycles between two cars. Motorcycles should be parked in every other stall. Follow-up will be done as to how many motorcycles are allowed to park in one stall. Disappointment was also expressed regarding HPD officers allowing motorcyclists to move their bikes across the street and illegally park. It was recommended to call 911 and request to speak to the Sergeant on duty not satisfied with a decision made by a responding officer(s).

Board of Water Supply (BWS) – Dominic Dias reported the following:

- Water Main Breaks – No water main breaks or construction activity. A list of work outside of the Waikiki boundary was highlighted.
- Estimated Readings and Reconciled Bills – The BWS recently discovered that since the department moved to monthly billing, some of the customers has received estimated bills for several months in a row. The standard BWS practice is to bill its customers for water usage based on actual meter readings collected from the meter at their property. However, environmental factors, physical obstructions, and malfunction meter reading equipment, as well as other factors related to the billing process, are some of the reasons why a meter reading was not secured and a billing estimate was generated. A frequently asked questions

list has been posted on www.boardofwatersupply.com to provide more information about estimated readings and what the BWS is doing to reconcile bills. Questions, comments and concerns:

1. Use of Ocean Water – Public member Gruntz asked and it was noted that the process of utilizing ocean water must be analyzed before planned. Public testimony is always welcome. The State Commission of Water Resource Management approves water usage.
2. Proposed City Council Control of BWS – Erteschik asked and Dias noted that the resolution proposed by Councilmember Ikaika Anderson has been postponed until September. It was noted that it is best that the BWS remains semi-autonomous.
3. Water Shortage – Larson commented that in 10 years a critical water shortage will occur and asked if BWS is looking into other options such as water catchment systems. Dias noted that golf courses and parks use recycled water. It was recommended to check for leaks daily. However, public water use is down.
4. Sewer Department – Wyttenbach asked and it was clarified that BWS and sewer are two separate departments; sewer is under the jurisdiction of the City Department of Environmental Services (ENV) and reiterated that BWS is semi-autonomous.
5. Briefing Tours – Poole asked and it was clarified that pump station tours were previously conducted in Kalihi, Halawa and the Halawa Xeriscape Garden, but have since been discontinued. Dias will follow up.
6. Beretania Street Pump Station Open House – It was noted that the open house was well attended and informational. The pump station was recently listed as an historic site.

RESIDENTS'/COMMUNITY CONCERNS:

1. Kapiolani Park Parking – Concern was raised that parking is limited to 30 spaces and cars were recently towed. Chair Finley noted that concern is in the Diamond Head/Kapahulu/St. Louis Heights Neighborhood Board No. 5 boundary and referred the matter to Mayor's representative Robinson.
2. Outdoor Showers – At the May Board meeting it was reported that the Kuhio Beach outdoor showers are overflowing with sand trapped in the drain. The situation continues to exist.
3. Plants Across the McCully Bridge – It was asked and noted that according to the BWS the sprinklers are broken. Also reported bikers and joggers going through the plants.

ELECTED OFFICIALS AND OTHERS:

Mayor Kirk Caldwell's Representative – Director Toni Robinson reported the following:

- Duke's Ocean Fest – Events will start this Friday with a lei ceremony on August 24, 2013. A Slack Key Festival is scheduled at the Waikiki Shell this Saturday, August 17, 2013.
- Okinawan Festival – The 31st Annual Okinawan Festival will take place on Saturday, August 31 to Sunday, September 1, 2013 at Kapiolani Park.
- Waikiki Rough Water Swim – The 44th Annual Waikiki Rough Water Swim a 2.4 mile race will take place on Monday, September 2, 2013.
- Kuhio Beach Bathrooms – The City Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR) staff is maintaining the Kuhio Beach Park bathrooms 16 hours a day seven days a week and on average servicing every 90 minutes with spot checking in between. DPR is looking at other shower towers with more self contained shower heads to prevent theft and vandalism. Also researching shower heads requiring less use of water to help prevent run off from the showers to the sand and ocean.
- Homeless Sleeping Next to Surfboard Locker – DPR is unable to keep the Kuhio Beach Park and the other Waikiki Beach restroom open 24 hours a day due to budgetary constraints controlling staffing, equipment and resources. DPR has no control where homeless or other individuals go to use the bathroom. Any sightings of the nature should be reported to HPD.

Questions, comments and concerns:

1. Fishermen Along the Ala Wai Canal – Dew asked if the condition of the water in the Ala Wai Canal is healthy and is there any restriction or testing done. Robinson noted that the waterway is under State jurisdiction. In the last 50 years there have been no restrictions for fishing and crabbing. Dew added that the pollution sign from the 50's is gone.

2. Military – Wyttenbach noted that the military has no money to staff the public restrooms. Five (5) restrooms with security were suggested, which may stop the homeless from defecating on the sidewalks.
3. Department of Parks and Recreation Priority – Smith asked and Robinson clarified that the number one complaint is trees fronting resident houses. Owners do not like the trees planted by the City, want the trees removed, and refuse to maintain the area. Owners prefer to plant something to match their landscaping.
4. Public Restrooms – Erteschik asked if monies were available would it be considered to keep the restrooms open. Due to vandalism the restroom are closed at night. Robinson replied in other areas the toilets are blown up. If money is an issue Erteschik suggested contacting the Waikiki Business Association or other agencies. People are willing to volunteer when they can. Larson noted that other states require retail store to have restroom available to the public. It was noted that there are two (2) sets of odd shifts of City staff taking care of the restroom approximately every 30 minutes. However, surfers arrive between 5:00 a.m. to 6:00 a.m. Another suggestion was to have HPD spot check the restroom located near the station. It was stated that there are no public restrooms and public hotel restrooms are locked. A comment was that lunch wagons are exempt from having public restrooms. The ordinance needs to be changed. A public member noted that money cannot run restroom 24-hours a day; and disagreed that hotels and restaurants in Waikiki restrict restrooms during the night hours. Robinson noted that the Diamond Head area of Waikiki has the only restrooms available. It was suggested to keep the restrooms open, but not burden HPD. Dew stated that this is a management problem. A question posed why Kapiolani Park run by its own security.
5. Aloha Drive Park – Wyttenbach asked and Robinson clarified that the park is currently used as a base yard until the sewer work is completed before the end of the year. Chair Finley noted a letter from Mayor Caldwell noting that money for the design has been put in the budget. It was asked that the fence be kept up until it happens.

Governor Neil Abercrombie's Representative – Lynn Fallin introduced Carty Chang

Department of Land and Natural Resources – Carty Chang, Chief Engineer of the State Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) circulated copies of the DLNR questions and answers trash cleanup in the Ala Wai Canal and highlighted the following:

- DLNR is the agency which has jurisdiction over the Ala Wai Canal aquatic resources, ocean recreation uses, maintenance as a drainage canal, and removal of trash in the Ala Wai Small Boat Harbor debris trap. Although trash originates from communities upstream, unfortunately the expense of cleaning out the debris trap falls to the state Division of Boating and Ocean Recreation (DOBOR), which is funded by boater's fees, not public funds. Cost for emptying the debris trap is \$10,000 per cleaning it is more cost efficient to clean the tray when it is not full. To report large items in the canal contact the DOBOR district office at 832-3520. Occasionally, crews from Oahu Community Correction Center (OCCC) may assist with cleanup at the harbor. DLNR is interested in working with community volunteer cleanup groups, County and the Visitor Industry partners to support canal trash cleanup and implementation of various debris removal traps in upstream areas in preventing trash in the canal and beautifying the Waikiki area. DLNR is working with the Army regarding flood control.
 - Watershed Association – The Waikiki Watershed Association has begun working with upland communities to reduce dumping of green waste and garbage into streams, and the City and County of Honolulu Department of Environmental Management Division (ENV) sponsors year-round stream cleanups with community volunteers. Some action has been taken to address storm runoff from streams coming into the canal and out to the ocean.

Questions, comments and concerns:

1. Trash in the Watershed – Apaka asked what can be done to stop illegal dumping of debris into the canal.
2. Future Plans – Peters asked if there were any future master plans. Chang noted that the public must be educated. It was added that stream maintenance is the owners' responsibility.
3. Pollution Free – Peter commented if money is not an issue with DLNR is plans in place to make the canal pollution free. In response, answers would be needed from multiple agencies. The roll of DLNR is

navigability and flood capacity of the canal. Peters noted that it is a shame that this beautiful canal is unusable except by paddlers.

4. Eyesores – Wyttenbach pointed out that the Waikiki Natatorium and Ala Wai Canal are eyesores due to mismanagement. The Ala Wai could be world class and beautiful.
5. Illegal Discharge Hotline – Nigro noted to call the ENV hotline at 768-3300 to report illegal discharge into streams. A letter would be sent and/or citation issued.
6. Historic Site – Peters noted that it was pointed out several years ago that the canal falls under historic preservation. Chang replied if it is 50 years or older the canal could be eligible. Smith added in 1927 three (3) streams flowed into the Canal creating Waikiki.
7. Harbor Trap – A public member relayed that there is an enormous amount of trash in the harbor trap for the last five (5) years and yet to be cleaned out. It was suggested to have automatic trash removal funded by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA); which was opposed by former Governor Linda Lingle. It was suggested that the matter be put forward again by Governor Neil Abercrombie.
8. Wedding Chapels – Follow up will be done regarding wedding chapels in the area of the trap, which would make it difficult to clean.
9. Hole in the Stairs at Ala Wai Boulevard and Niu Street – A public member reported that this concern was brought up a year ago and to date has yet to be addressed. The only repair done was putting a board over the hole topped with an orange cone. This is a hazardous situation where someone might fall into the deep water. The constituent offered to do a permanent fix for \$500. Follow up will be done.
10. Follow Up: Fallin reported the following:
 - ◇ Water Pollution and Drinking Water – This concern will be forward to Deputy Director Gary Gill of the Department of Health (DOH).
 - ◇ Noise – The ENV is specific to construction noise. Hours of construction are Monday - Friday 7:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. Piling, hole ramming and jack hammering are 9:00 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Monday-Friday. Follow up will be done.
 - ◇ Rats in the Ala Wai Canal – The State Vector Division shifted several years ago and is no longer under state jurisdiction.
 - ◇ Restroom Comment – Flood noted that Denny's Restaurant is open 24 hours with signage that restroom use is for patron only. Fallin noted that Denny's Restaurant must have some statutory provision.

Councilmember Stanley Chang – Micah Munekata distributed a report and highlighted the following:

- Parades in Waikiki – Councilmember Chang is still waiting for a response regarding the number of parades held in Waikiki yearly.
- 2121 Kuhio Towers – The Department of Planning and Permitting (DPP) has not received an application for the second tower, which requires an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) and Special District permit. No permits for grading, construction or building has been issued as of July 2013.
- Increase Property Ordinance Removal – In July the process for property removal was stepped up along the Ala Wai promenade. Kalakaua Avenue to Monsarrat Avenue is next due to people obstructing the sidewalks.

Questions, comments and concerns:

1. Hygiene Sites – Larson asked if individual stall would be provided at the proposed hygiene sites.
2. Homeless Complaint – One of the main complaints from residents regarding the homeless is that the homeless walk a thin line due to their civil rights.
3. Tents/Dogs on the Beach at Fort DeRussy – Flood reported noticing a tent at Fort DeRussy and called HPD who responded with loud sirens and flashing lights around midnight; however, the person left. Flood also noted six (6) groups of people on the beach with two (2) large dogs who did their business on the sand. Flood added that in Australia fines for a dog on the beach is \$5,000 and asked why not here. Munekata noted due to liability HPD cannot remove tents/items left on the beach. To allow HPD to remove items the ordinance must be changed.
4. Homeless Bills Update – Munekata noted he understands the community's frustration and one major resident complaint is that when they are asked to move on the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) steps in due to civil rights. Smith mentioned that there are different ways at looking of the homeless issue. Waikiki is special and impression on the tourists is important. Smith asked if Waikiki has a homeless task force. Chair Finley noted that Senator Galuteria has put a task force together.

5. Beach Sand Quality – Wytenbach asked and follow up will be done regarding extending the cleaning of the sand contract.
6. Beach Construction – Poole raised concern that during the second construction the beach was not filled with new sand. Chair Finley noted the contract was not very good.
7. Housing First Bill – Larson opposed the bill.

Senator Brickwood Galuteria – Tommie Suganuma reported the following:

- Homeless Task Group – Suganuma noted that Senator Galuteria is a member of the Hawaii Interagency Council on the Homeless. The next meeting is scheduled for September.
- Restrooms Next to HPD – It was noted that Mayor Caldwell will contact HPD regarding spot checks of the restrooms. A response has not been received from the Mayor.

Questions, comments and concerns:

1. Homelessness – Smith noted that Senator Galuteria is the key person. Follow up will be done regarding providing updates to the Board.
2. Tourists – Flood pointed out that there are about 10,000 tourists weekly in Waikiki and not one restroom is provided. Chair Finley suggested utilizing people on community service be provided with a key to monitor would require judiciary legislation action.
3. Going Home Program – Public member Gruntz noted that a bill proposed would cost \$100,000 to send the homeless back to where they came from. Suganuma noted that the Institute for Humane Services (IHS) and Department of Human Services (DHS) refused to accept the program. It was noted options given in other states is jail or an airline seat to Hawaii. The refusal by DHS is fear that a person given a one way ticket back might expect to fly back to Hawaii.

Representative Tom Brower – Representative Brower was present earlier in the meeting; written report provided.

Waikiki Improvement Association (WIA) – Rick Egged reported the following:

- Duty Free Shoppers (DFS) Galleria Event – Saturday, September 7, 2013, Unveiling Event starting at 7:00 p.m.-10:00 p.m.
- Aloha Festival Events – Circulated flyers and highlighted the September 2013 Aloha Festivals schedule of events. Ribbons for purchase will be available at the ABC Stores and check the website for other locations.
- Sunset on the Beach – On Thursday, September 26, 2013, Queen's Beach, Waikiki CBS's Hawaii Five-O Season 4 Premiere.

Questions, comments and concerns: Bill 7, Relating to the Homeless – It was asked and Egged noted that two (2) arrests were made and material items were removed this morning.

APPROVAL OF THE JULY 9, 2013 REGULAR MEETING MINUTES: Without objection the July 9, 2013 regular meeting minutes were ADOPTED UNANIMOUSLY, 15-0-0 (Aye: Adams, Apaka, Carroll, Dew, Erteschik, Finley, Flood, Larson, Lofquist, Nigro, Peters, Poole, Smith, Simpson, and Wytenbach) as amended:

- Page 1, Sub district 3 should read Board members **Flood** and **Larson**.

9:15 p.m., Board member Apaka Departed the meeting; **14 members present**.

Due to time constraints Peters moved to adjourn the meeting. There was no second to the motion. Chair Finley announced that the meeting would adjourn in five (5) minutes. **Peters withdrew the motion.**

BOARD BUSINESS:

Duty Free Shoppers (DFS) Block Party – Peter Young reported that the DFS event the Journey Continues, will be held on Saturday, September 7, 2013 unveiling event of the Duty Free Shoppers Galleria (at the corner of Kalakaua and Royal Hawaiian Avenues), from 7:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m.

REPORTS:

- Treasurer's Report – Treasurer Adams reported expenditures of \$75.24 leaving a balance of \$992; the report was filed.
- Permitted Interaction Group (PIG) – Adams reported that the PIG is making progress.
- District 1 Report – No report.
- District 2 Report – Flood thanked Smith for taking the Board's pictures. Flood reported fencing around the 2121 Kuhio project towers were tagged with graffiti within minutes after being completed. Flood spoke with a supervisor and suggested the fence be painted with a combination of colored squares. If anyone witnesses taggers, it is advised to call 911 as soon as possible.
- District 3 Report – Larson reported the first day of the Open Market at Jefferson Elementary School happened last week. Open Market hours are from 8:00 a.m. – 1:00 p.m. Noise complaints were received due to pool level concerts at the Queen Kapiolani Hotel. Chair Finley recommended calling the Liquor Commission if the noise occurs past 10:00 p.m.

The agenda was taken out of order to item VIA Susan B. Komen Run for the Cure Briefing.
