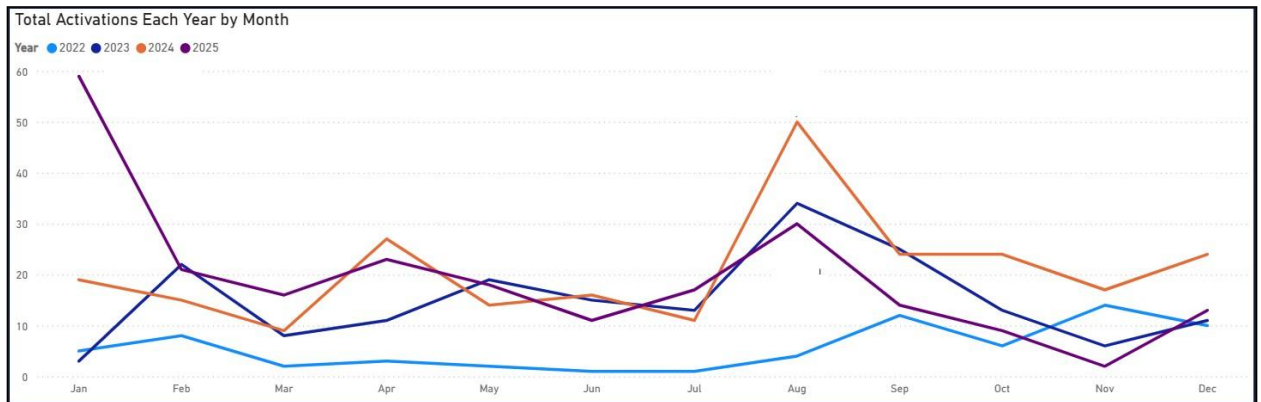
Report from the Fire Chief December 2025

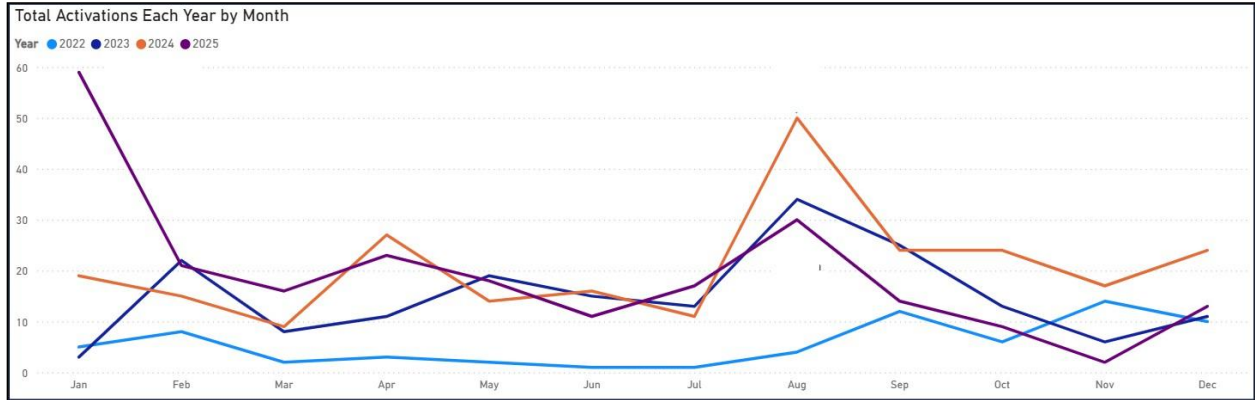
A. Workforce

119th FFR I Class

- a. Currently has 31 FFRs
- b. Group A is currently in the fire fighting portion of the recruit training program.
- c. Group B is currently in the medical portion of the recruit training program.

5. Training

a. Certification Section

- Presented the International Fire Service Accreditation Congress (IFSAC) testing procedures to the 119th FFR Class, Group A, on December 24, 2025, in preparation for their IFSAC FF I knowledge and skills testing
- Administered the IFSAC FF I certification knowledge test on December 29, 2025, and the skills testing on December 30-31, 2025, for the 119th FFR Class - Group A. Results will be furnished on the February 2026 Staff Meeting Report.

b. Fire Operations Section

- Conducted four auto extrication drills for five companies, a high-rise drill for two companies, and one forcible entry and ground ladder drill for one company
- Assisted the Recruit Training section with the 119th FFR Class - Group A with truck operations, auto extrication, commercial forcible entry, large area search, and hose-handling
- Conducted fire operations and logistical coordination for the acquired structure training at 1515 Dillingham Boulevard, including demolition and salvage of mock single-family residence structures. Completed Fire Ground Survival/Rapid Intervention Training Instructor refresher training. Coordinated prop mobilization to Station 43 and provided logistical support for upcoming Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus Competency training. Contributed to curriculum development for an upcoming Departmentwide training rollout
- Managed the Live Fire Program, including delivery of Departmentwide Live Fire Training, along with ongoing logistics, site maintenance, and preparation
- Assisted the Training and Research Bureau's (TRB) Administrative section with demolition of the training tower's interior in preparation for upcoming refurbishing

- Assisted the TRB's Certification section with site set up and logistics for the upcoming physical ability test at the Charles H. Thurston Fire Training Center
- The forcible entry mobile prop is available and may be requested via the link on the Vector Solutions homepage bulletin board. The forcible entry mobile prop was distributed to all battalions for several days in July.
- The Auto Extrication program has launched the Quarterly Auto Extrication Training Reservation application (app). This app is designed to assist BCs in ensuring companies under their command receive annual auto extrication training. c. Medical Section

- Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR)/Automated External Defibrillator (AED)
 - From November 25 to December 24, 2025, the HFD performed 50 AED applications.
 - The survival statistics for December 2025 reflect cases where the HFD arrived first on scene and our AED was attached - 50 AED applications with 11 total returns of spontaneous circulation (ROSC) and no confirmed saves; 13 patients have unknown dispositions.
 - The LUCAS 3 device (LUCAS) performance from November 25 to December 24, 2025, usage was closely monitored and their contribution to patient outcomes has been significant.
 - Total ROSC Incidents: 12
 - ROSC Incidents with LUCAS Device: 7
 - Total LUCAS applications: 23 of the 50 CPR cases with 11 unconfirmed cases
 - Confirmed save with the LUCAS device: 0

d. Special Operations Section

- Five hazardous materials (HM) personnel participated in the Honolulu Marathon HM screening and response team on December 14, 2025. The team also included representatives from the Honolulu Police Department, the State of Hawai'i Department of Law Enforcement's Sheriff Division, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and the Hawai'i Air National Guard's 93rd Civil Support Team.
- TRB HM personnel hosted a Tactical Chemistry Class conducted by Mr. Chris Weber of Dr. Hazmat, Inc., on December 15-17, 2025, at the East Kapolei Fire Station. This three-day training allowed each HM company to attend while on duty. Members from the Honolulu Emergency Services Department's Emergency Medical Services (EMS) branch and the Federal Fire Department also participated.

6. Injuries - Report of Industrial Injury or Illness for December 2025

The Occupational Safety and Health Office (OSHO) is actively researching and addressing lifting and carrying injuries that occur during medical calls. To mitigate these risks, the OSHO is evaluating enhanced training in safe lifting techniques, exploring new patient-handling equipment, and integrating wellness and fitness initiatives to strengthen FFs' physical readiness. Additionally, the office is developing technical advisories, producing educational videos, and reinforcing best practices in body mechanics and team coordination during patient transport. These initiatives aim to reduce injury rates, improve safety, and support HFD personnel's long-term health and performance.

B. Facilities

1. The HFD Headquarters lobby mural artwork was installed and completed.
2. The Aikahi Fire Station apparatus bay roof improvement project is progressing well with completion projected in mid-January 2026.
3. Installation of a large-capacity water filtration system for the Hangar 111 facility has been completed.
4. Remodeling of the Administrative Services Officer's (ASO) office has been completed.

C. Equipment

1. The final inspection and acceptance of Quint 31 is complete. Apparatus training for personnel assigned to Quint 31 is scheduled on January 14-16, 2026, for the respective platoons.
2. Discrepancies for the TRB's Ford 550 flatbed stake truck have been corrected, and the HFD accepted the vehicle. The vehicle will be placed in service in mid-January.
3. Three Ford Interceptors completed their final inspection and were accepted by the HFD. The vehicles will be placed in service in mid-January and assigned to Fire Chief Sheldon Hao, Deputy Fire Chief Jason Samala, and AC Christopher Cabasa.
4. The Fiscal Year (FY) 2026 Quint solicitation will begin in early January, and a buyer from purchasing has been assigned to this procurement. This apparatus will be assigned to the Hawai'i Kai Fire Station.

D. Budget

1. The HFD is executing its FY 2026 budget as planned.
2. The HFD, the Department of Budget and Fiscal Services (BFS), the Managing Director (MD), and the Deputy Managing Director met on December 19, 2025, to discuss the FY 2027 Operating Budget Review.

E. Contracts

The Medical Director's 180-day extension contract was executed on December 19, 2025. The new five-year contract is in progress and will be put out for solicitation soon.

F. Hawai'i Fire Fighters Association (HFFA)

AC Cabasa and ASO Sarah-Ann Ulep attended the Bargaining Unit 11 arbitration meetings held on December 8-11, 2025.

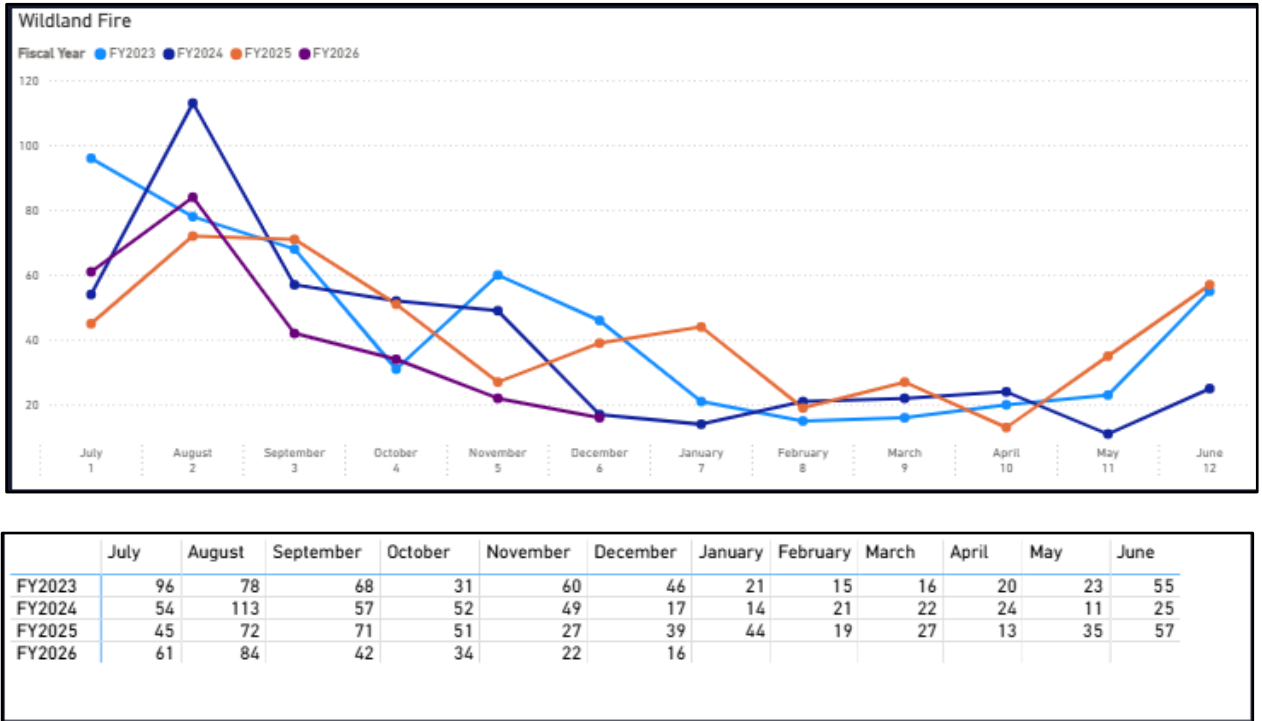

The incidents below include structure fires in which first and second alarm companies reached the scene and performed actions; wildland fires involving evacuations of areas; and any fire in which the Fire Investigator conducted an investigation.

- a. On December 3, 2025, the HFD received a call at 12:46 p.m. for a building fire at 98-402 Kōāuka Loop in 'Aiea and responded with 5 units staffed with 22 personnel. The first unit arrived on scene at 12:54 p.m. to find smoke emanating from a 12th floor unit of a high-rise residential structure.

FFs secured a water supply and initiated an offensive fire attack. The fire was brought under control at 1:28 p.m. and fully extinguished at 1:29 p.m. FFs conducted a search of the unit to ensure no one was inside at the time of the fire.

The Fire Investigator classified the cause of the fire as accidental. The fire originated from a propane torch utilized by a plumber to heat a frozen nut and inadvertently ignited insulation material in the wall space which progressed to a smoldering fire. Damages were estimated at \$10,000 to the structure.

- b. On December 17, 2025, the HFD received a call at 9:42 a.m. and responded to a building fire at 99-901 Lālāwai Drive in 'Aiea with 7 units staffed with 26 personnel. The first unit arrived on scene at 9:49 a.m. to find a two-story, single-family residence with no signs of smoke or fire.

FFs secured a water supply, extinguished a small fire in a closet, and completed a search to confirm no occupants were inside the residence. The fire was fully extinguished at 10:36 a.m.

The fire's origin and cause remain under investigation.

- c. On December 18, 2025, the HFD received a call at 7:23 p.m. and responded to a building fire near 94-863 Lumikuke Loop in Waipi'o with 10 units staffed with 35 personnel. The first unit arrived on scene at 7:27 p.m. to find a working fire in a single-family residence.

FFs secured a water supply, initiated an offensive fire attack, and completed a search to confirm no occupants were inside the residence. The fire was declared under control at 7:51 p.m. and fully extinguished at 9:15 p.m.

The American Red Cross (ARC) was notified to assist the displaced occupant.

The Fire Investigator classified the cause of the fire as accidental. The fire originated in a partially enclosed patio and was caused by the electrical failure of a light. Damages were estimated at \$968,000 to the structure and its contents.

- d. On December 22, 2025, the HFD received a call at 12 a.m. and responded to a building fire at 1507 South King Street in Honolulu with 10 units staffed with 38 personnel. The first unit arrived on scene at 12:09 a.m. to find light smoke showing from a fourth floor unit of a four-story building.

FFs secured a water supply, initiated an offensive fire attack, and completed a search to confirm no occupants were inside the residence. The fire was declared fully extinguished at 12:35 a.m.

The ARC was notified to assist nine displaced occupants.

The Fire Investigator classified the cause of the fire as accidental. The fire originated in the living room and was caused by a runaway chemical reaction

of a lithium-ion battery for a portable speaker. Damages were estimated at \$905,000 to the structure and its contents.

- e. On December 30, 2025, the HFD received a call at 2 a.m. and responded to a building fire at 45-517 Waikalua Place in Kāneʻohe with 9 units staffed with 34 personnel. The first unit arrived on scene at 2:06 a.m. to find a two-story, single-family home fully involved in fire.

FFs secured a water supply, initiated a defensive fire attack, and protected surrounding homes. All occupants were able to evacuate their homes safely. Flames spread to two nearby homes, which were brought under control at 2:20 a.m. The main structure was brought under control at 2:35 a.m. and extinguished at 4:44 a.m.

The ARC was notified to assist two displaced occupants.

The fire's origin and cause remain under investigation.

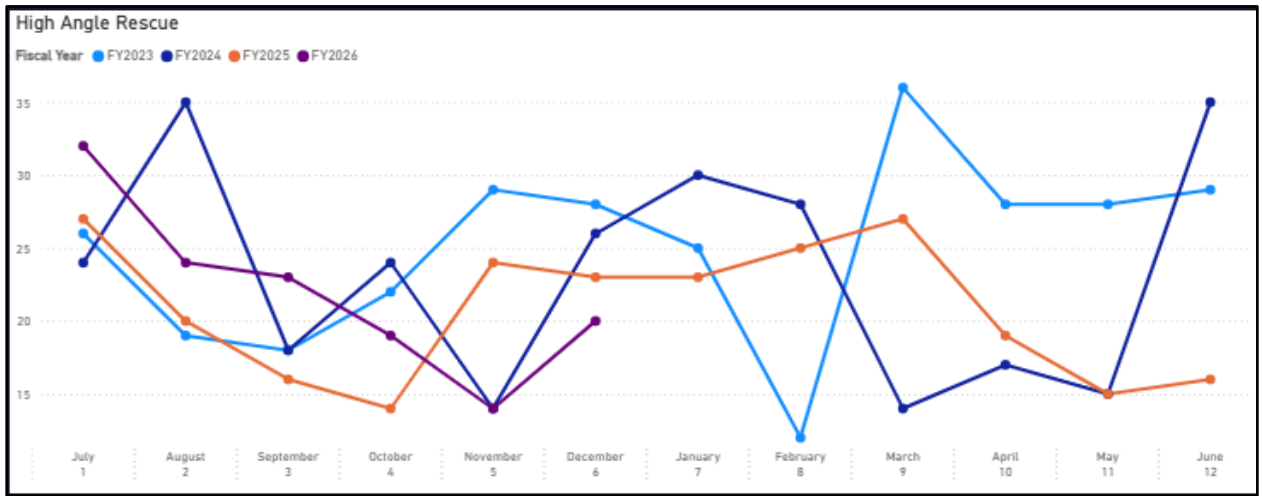
- f. On December 31, 2025, the HFD received a call at 6:58 p.m. for a building fire at 91-1479 Maipuhi Street in 'Ewa Beach and responded with 10 units staffed with 35 personnel. The first unit arrived at 7:05 p.m. to find smoke emanating from the garage of a small single-story, residential home.

FFs secured a water supply, initiated an offensive fire attack, and completed a search to confirm no occupants were inside the residence. The fire was declared fully extinguished at 7:31 p.m.

The fire's origin and cause remain under investigation.

The incidents below include rescues for hikers in distress, who were injured and/or lost, in which a rescue company and an HFD helicopter were deployed and performed actions.

- a. On December 4, 2025, the HFD received a call at 5:28 p.m. and responded to lost hikers off of the Mā'ili Pillbox Trail with 6 units staffed with 14 personnel. The first unit arrived on scene at 5:48 p.m. and deployed a drone to search for the hiking group and determine the best way to access them. FFs also ascended the trail on foot. An additional unit secured a nearby landing zone to prepare for air operations.

It was reported three teenage females were hiking for two hours and became lost after going off of the trail. Air 1 located the hikers at 5:55 p.m. and lowered a rescue personnel nearby. Rescue personnel arrived at the hikers' location, performed a medical assessment to ensure they had no injuries, and prepared them for extraction. After hoisting the three hikers safely onboard, Air 1 transported them to the nearby landing zone at 6:16 p.m.

- b. On December 6, 2025, the HFD received a call at 5:07 p.m. and responded to an injured hiker on the Olomana Trail in Kailua with 6 units staffed with 18 personnel. The first unit arrived on scene at 5:14 p.m., established command, and ascended the trail on foot. The second-arriving unit secured a nearby landing zone to prepare for air operations.

It was reported a female hiker in her 20s slid off of the trail and was injured and stuck in a precarious position. HFD personnel arrived at the hiker's location, where they conducted a medical assessment and provided basic life support. Air 1 then safely airlifted the injured hiker and her two hiking companions to the landing zone, where medical care was transferred to the EMS.

- c. On December 8, 2025, the HFD received a call at 2:18 p.m. and responded to an injured paraglider in the Makapu'u Ridge area in Waimānalo with 5 units staffed with 14 personnel. The first unit arrived at 2:30 p.m., established command, and ascended the mountain above Kalaniana'ole Highway.

It was reported that a 68-year-old male was paragliding in the area and crashed into the mountain near the paraglider launch site before rolling down approximately 20 feet from the impact site. HFD personnel arrived at the paraglider's location, which was approximately 150 feet above the road, and conducted a medical assessment. The paraglider was pulseless, apneic, and unresponsive. Air 1 then safely airlifted the paraglider to the nearby landing zone at Sandy Beach. Medical care was transferred to the EMS at 3:29 p.m.

- d. On December 12, 2025, the HFD received a call at 4:37 p.m. and responded to a hiker in distress on the Mānana Trail with 6 units staffed with 20 personnel. The first unit arrived on scene at 4:56 p.m. and established a landing zone at the Waiau District Park. The second-arriving unit proceeded to the trailhead.

It was reported that a male hiker in his 20s was in distress and unable to descend the trail on his own. Air 1 arrived at the hiker's location, where they hoisted him into the aircraft and safely airlifted him to the nearby landing zone. Medical care was transferred to the EMS at 5:22 p.m.

- e. On December 15, 2025, the HFD received a call at 5:26 p.m. and responded to an injured hiker on the Kuli'ou'ou Ridge Trail in 'Āina Haina with 6 units staffed with 19 personnel. The first unit arrived on scene at 5:41 p.m., established command, and secured the landing zone to prepare for air operations.

It was reported that a 29-year-old female fell approximately 30 feet from the Ko'olau Summit Trail, above the Kuli'ou'ou Ridge Trail, suffered an injury, and was unable to descend the trail on her own. Her hiking companion, a 30-year-old male, was able to make his way to her location, where they waited for assistance. Air 1 attempted to insert rescue personnel at the hikers' location, but the terrain, weather, and darkness made it unsafe to do so. Rescue operations continued by foot until 1:16 a.m. Due to dangerous terrain and weather conditions, operations were halted and resumed at first light the next morning.

HFD personnel on foot arrived at the hiker's location at 10:56 a.m., where they conducted a medical assessment and performed basic life support treatment. The hiker was then lowered via multiple rope systems to an area free of tree canopy and below the cloud cover where Air 1 hoisted her into the aircraft and transported her to the nearby landing zone. Medical care was transferred to the EMS at 1:15 p.m.

- f. On December 23, 2025, the HFD received a call at 8:54 a.m. and responded to an injured hiker on the Koko Head Crater Trail with 6 units staffed with 18 personnel. The first unit arrived on scene at 9:02 a.m. and ascended the trail on foot. The second-arriving unit secured a nearby landing zone to prepare for air operations.

It was reported a female hiker in her 20s suffered an injury and was unable to descend the trail on her own. HFD personnel on foot arrived at the hiker's location, conducted a medical assessment, and provided basic life support. The hiker was then hoisted onto the aircraft and safely transported to the nearby landing zone. Medical care was transferred to the EMS at 9:55 a.m.

- g. On December 25, 2025, the HFD received a call at 10:08 a.m. and responded to an injured hiker on the Koko Head Crater Trail with 6 units staffed with 18 personnel. The first unit arrived on scene at 10:18 a.m. and ascended the trail on foot. The second-arriving unit secured a nearby landing zone to prepare for air operations.

It was reported a female hiker in her 40s suffered an injury and was unable to descend the trail on her own. HFD personnel on foot arrived at the hiker's location where they conducted a medical assessment and provided basic life support. The hiker was then hoisted into the aircraft and safely transported to the nearby landing zone. Medical care was transferred to the EMS at 11:12 a.m.

- h. On December 28, 2025, the HFD received a call at 8:02 a.m. and responded to an injured hiker on the Lanikai Pillbox Trail in Kailua with 6 units staffed with 17 personnel. The first unit arrived on scene at 8:11 a.m. and ascended the trail on foot to begin the search by ground. The next-arriving unit secured a landing zone to prepare for air operations.

It was reported a female in her 20s was hiking with a partner and sustained an injury and could not continue on her own. Rescue personnel on foot arrived at her side at 8:23 a.m., performed an initial medical assessment, and provided basic life support treatment. Air 1 located them, inserted rescue personnel near the hiker's location, and prepared her for extraction. Air 1 transported the hiker to the nearby landing zone where medical care was transferred to the EMS at 9:01 a.m.

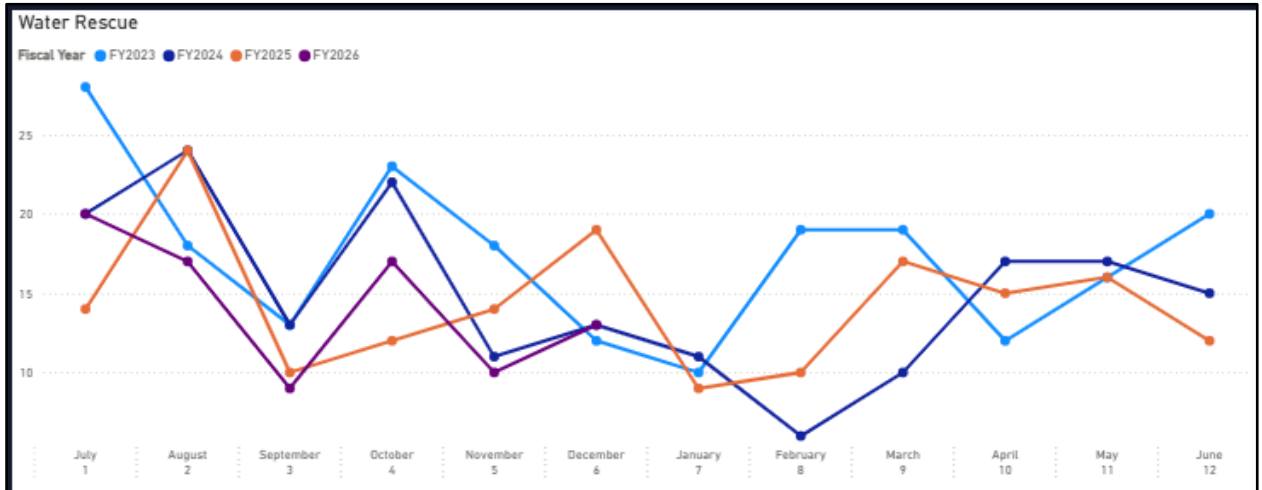
- i. On December 28, 2025, the HFD received a call at 4:27 p.m. and responded to an injured hiker on the mountain summit above the Ka'au Crater Trail in Pālolo with 5 units staffed with 13 personnel. The first unit arrived on scene at 4:34 p.m. and secured a nearby landing zone to prepare for air operations.

It was reported a male in his 20s was hiking with two others for approximately five hours, became weak, and could not continue on his own. Air 1 located the hikers near the summit and lowered rescue personnel nearby. They arrived at the injured hiker's side at 5:07 p.m., performed an initial medical assessment, and provided basic life support treatment. Rescue personnel assisted the injured hiker to an open area and prepared him to be hoisted into Air 1. Air 1 then transported the hiker to the nearby landing zone, where medical care was transferred to the EMS at 5:31 p.m.

- j. On December 29, 2025, the HFD received a call at 4:25 p.m. and responded to an injured hiker on the Ka'au Crater Trail in Pālolo with 5 units staffed with 15 personnel. The first unit arrived on scene at 4:39 p.m. and secured a nearby landing zone to prepare for air operations while additional units ascended the trail on foot.

It was reported a male and female in their 30s were hiking for approximately nine hours when the male experienced a medical emergency and could not continue on his own. Air 1 located the hikers and lowered rescue personnel nearby. They arrived at the hikers' location at 5:06 p.m., performed an initial medical assessment, and provided basic life support treatment. Air 1 then transported the hikers to the nearby landing zone where medical care was transferred to the EMS at 5:27 p.m.

While addressing the two hikers, personnel encountered two additional hikers making their way down the trail without lights. Due to the limited amount of sunlight left and the distance from the trailhead, the two hikers were also airlifted to the landing zone.

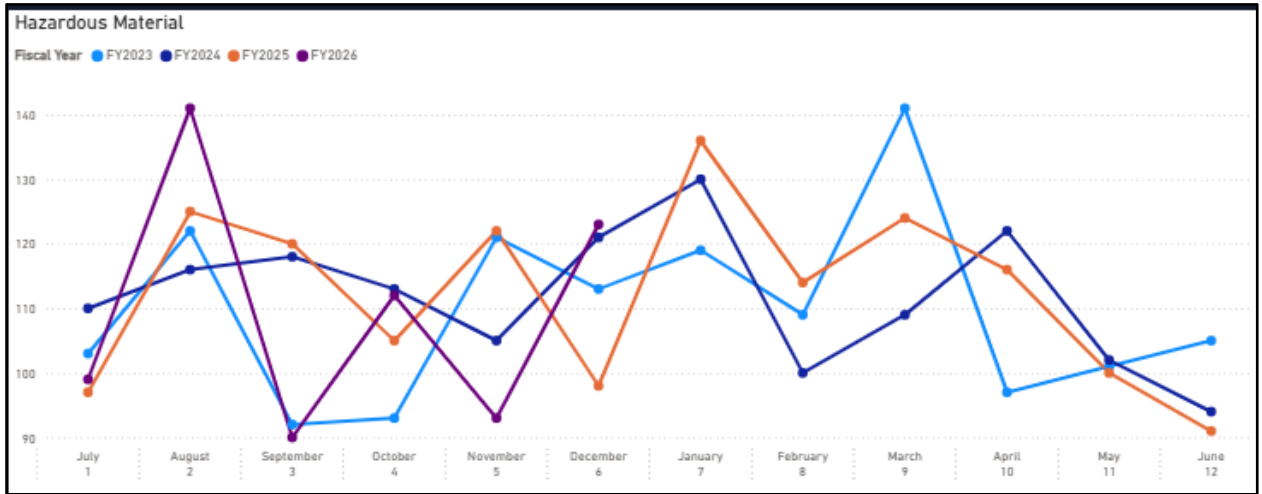
Water rescues include ocean and swift water rescues and boaters in distress in which a rescue company and an HFD helicopter were deployed and performed actions.

On December 27, 2025, the HFD received a call at 5:57 p.m. and responded to a boater in distress offshore of Waikīkī with 5 units staffed with 15 personnel. The first unit arrived on scene at 6:02 p.m. to investigate.

It was reported a 35-foot sailboat with four individuals on board encountered engine problems and was adrift approximately one mile offshore. An HFD rescue boat arrived on scene and made contact with the vessel at 6:28 p.m. Rescue personnel boarded and confirmed there were no injuries and rigged the disabled vessel for towing. The HFD's rescue boat safely towed the vessel to the Ala Wai Boat Harbor at 7:13 p.m.
