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aREGULAR MEETING MINUTES TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 23, 2016 HAHAIONE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL CAFETERIA

CALL TO ORDER – Chair Greg Knudsen called the meeting to order at 7:02 p.m. **A quorum was established with 12 members present.** Note: This 15-member Board requires 8 members to establish a quorum and to take official Board action.

INTRODUCTION OF BOARD MEMBERS – Board members introduced themselves.

CITY MONTHLY REPORTS

Honolulu Fire Department (HFD) – Captain Randall Lindsey distributed a handout and reported the following:

- **November 2015 Statistics:** There were 10 activated alarms, 84 medical emergencies, 5 motor vehicle collisions, and 3 ocean rescues.
- **December 2015 Statistics:** There were 2 cooking fires, 7 activated alarms, 78 medical emergencies, 1 motor vehicle/pedestrian collision, 2 motor vehicle collisions, 4 mountain rescues, 2 Koko Crater rescues, and 2 hazardous materials incidents.
- **January 2016 Statistics:** There were 1 brush fire, 7 activated alarms, 67 medical emergencies, 5 motor vehicle collisions, 10 mountain rescues, 6 Koko Crater rescues, 5 ocean rescues, and 1 hazardous materials incident.
- **Hiking Safety Tip:** Residents are urged to inform others of hiking plans and expected return. Carry a fully charged cell phone and stay on the hiking trails. More information is at <http://dlnr.hawaii.gov/recreation/>.

Honolulu Police Department (HPD) – Lieutenant Clinton Sukekane circulated a handout and reported the following:

- **January 2016 Statistics:** There were 4 motor vehicle thefts, 2 burglaries, 9 thefts, and 24 unauthorized entries into motor vehicles (JEMVs) with a total of 6,902 calls for service.
- **Active Shooter Handout:** Lt. Sukekane highlighted the progressive responses of “run, hide, fight” in regard to an active shooter.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed:

1. **Skate Park:** Garvin thanked HPD for continuing to monitor the Hawaii Kai Skate Park and noted flares have burned the surfaces of the park. Lt. Sukekane will follow up.
2. **Hawaii Kai Drive Ticketing:** Lt. Sukekane responded to Resident Tanya Hellum that increased monitoring of Hawaii Kai Drive resulted from speeding complaints. He clarified that speeding tickets are given in accordance with the posted limits and concerns regarding changes in speed limits should be directed to the City. HPD revisits areas of complaints to ensure no further problems. Chair Knudsen noted that 25 mph is the speed limit in most residential areas.

Board of Water Supply (BWS) – Lorna Heller reported the following:

- **Seedling of the Month:** BWS and the Friends of Halawa Xeriscape Garden are offering a free xeric (dry) seed or seedling of the month at the Halawa Xeriscape Garden. Visitors will receive Bird of Paradise seeds for February; one packet per household while supplies last. Xeriscape workshops are held on Saturdays. The full schedule is at www.boardofwatersupply.com.
- **Previous Questions:** Rian Adachi will have responses to previous questions from the Board next month.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed:

1. 2016 Calendars: Iwasa asked if BWS 2016 calendars are available. Heller will follow up.
2. Halawa Xeriscape Gardens: Reilly noted that the Halawa Xeriscape Garden is a wonderful place.

COMMUNITY ANNOUNCEMENTS

- Sandy Beach Parking: Chair Knudsen noted that the Sandy Beach drive resurfacing has been completed.
- Pahua Heiau: Reilly announced a community workday the last Saturday of every month at Pahua Heiau from 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. She also noted that Aloha Aina O Kamilo Nui is holding a plant sale and book signing with Heidi Bornhorst on February 27, 2016 from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.
- Hawaii Kai Strong: Garvin noted Hawaii Kai Strong presents on earthquakes at the Koko Head Park Community Center on March 2, 2016 at 7:00 p.m.
- Hawaii Kai Carnival: Chair Knudsen announced that the Hawaii Kai Carnival is scheduled for March 18–20, and March 24-27, 2016. More information is at www.ekfernandez.com.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed: Holes in Great Lawn: Resident Jim Proctor noted that the Hawaii Kai Carnival left holes in the ground from their fencing and provided photos. He stated the holes are a safety hazard and requested they be filled and graded. Chair Knudsen will follow up with E.K. Fernandez.

PUBLIC-GENERATED ISSUES – Hanauma Bay: Lisa Bishop, president of the Friends of Hanauma Bay (FOHB), announced that Roberts Hawaii has presented a transportation plan, at the request of the Mayor, which focuses on creating a tourism/transportation concession for Hanauma Bay. Roberts Hawaii presented the plan to the FOHB February 17, 2016. Issues for FOHB include that the bay is a nature preserve, not a tourist facility, and the increase in the number of people coming to the bay. Bishop requested FOHB be on the March agenda to make a presentation regarding the transportation plan. They have opposed the plan twice and today were informed that Roberts Hawaii plans to seek a 1-year revocable permit.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed:

1. Permit: Reilly asked who would issue the permits. Bishop responded that she was unsure and noted that no answers have been received from Roberts Hawaii.
2. Fixing Hanauma Bay: Bishop answered Altonn that Roberts Hawaii has not responded when asked what is being “fixed.” The plan allows for a minimum of a 50-person busload every 30 minutes.
3. Working Group: Altonn asked if a working group has been proposed. Bishop responded that Michelle Nekota, director of the Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR), Roberts Hawaii, and the mayor held a meeting to discuss the plan. Michelle Nekota advised Roberts Hawaii to contact FOHB to discuss the plan and Roberts briefed the Hanauma Bay Advisory Committee on January 18, 2016. Altonn requested a presentation to the Board from Roberts Hawaii on the transportation plan.
4. Proposal Copies: Bishop noted that copies of the Roberts plan and the FOHB response letter will be provided to the board via email from member Jaxon.
5. Hanauma Bay Master Plan: Reilly asked what happened to the Hanauma Bay Master Plan, as this is not in it. She suggested the Kuliouou/Kalani Iki and Waimanalo Neighborhood Boards would be interested. Bob Kern commented that the Roberts Hawaii plan includes the video being shown on the buses and the passengers going directly to the beach upon arrival. This would contradict the 1989 management plan designed to prevent negative effects on residents.
6. Tour Bus Lot: Bishop responded to Salbosa that the commercial lot is currently being utilized by tour companies and taxis, with many tour companies managing their tours through taxi licenses. She stated that the Roberts Hawaii transportation plan claims their services would reduce the number of smaller competitors. Kern noted that the 1989 management plan was meant to limit the number of visitors to Hanauma Bay and the proposed plan would allow a busload every 57 seconds.

PUBLIC-GENERATED ISSUES CONTINUED – Pedestrian Safety: Resident Christian Hellum stated concerns with the pedestrian crossing at the intersection of Hawaii Kai Drive and Keahole Street. Garvin responded that the Board submitted a request for a left-turn signal or lane to the Department of Transportation Services (DTS). DTS responded that they will install a “yield to pedestrians” sign.

OFFICIALS' REPORTS

Mayor Kirk Caldwell's Representative – No representative was present. Chair Knudsen read the report provided.

- Lunalilo Home Road Signs: DTS will conduct an investigation and inform the board upon completion of their investigation into duplicate signs. Chair Knudsen requested Iwasa provide specific locations to DTS.

- Hawaii Kai Memorial Park: The Department of Planning and Permitting (DPP) noted that a storm water permit is not required, as only stockpiling work is being done. Reilly commented that the nursery has been damaged by run-off and City Councilmembers are meeting with her to view the problem
- Adopt-A-Park: DPR suggests contacting Clinton Jamile, Adopt-A-Park Coordinator, at 768-3034 to discuss individuals participating in adopt-a-park when not an organized group.
- 2016 Mayor's Memorial Day Poster Contest: Open to all students, K-12th grade; artwork should reflect the Hawaii tradition of sewing, donating, or collecting lei for the gravesites at the National Cemetery of the Pacific on Memorial Day. Deadline to submit artwork is March 2, 2016, through the DOE, or March 4, 2016 if delivered directly to the DPR office in Kapolei. For more information, contact 768-3003. Chair Knudsen encouraged the community to participate in sewing leis for Memorial Day.

Councilmember Trevor Ozawa – Michele Nagamine provided a newsletter and reported the following:

- 394 Portlock Road: Dave Holzman provided a photo of the cleared lot on February 2, 2016.
- Kamilonui Valley: Councilmember Ozawa will be holding a Kamilonui Valley site visit with member Reilly on March 8, 2016, at 10:00 a.m.
- Hanauma Bay Plans: Councilmember Ozawa's Chief of Staff Kenny Yamazaki attended the FOHB Hanauma Bay meeting on February 17, 2016, and their office is monitoring the situation.

Governor's Representative – No representative was present; a newsletter was provided.

Senator Sam Slom – Senator Slom distributed his newsletter and reported the following:

- Senator Kahele: Senator Gilbert Kahele's son, Kaiali'i Kahele, was appointed for Senate District 1.
- Maunaloa Bay Advisory Group: The bill to establish a Maunaloa Bay advisory committee was deferred.
- Capitol Dancing-Waters Fountain: Cachola has introduced a bill to add a dancing-waters fountain at the State Capitol to assist in maintaining the reflection pools.
- Marijuana Dispensaries: There are currently 59 applicants for the 8 certified marijuana dispensaries. Senator Slom and the Honolulu Star-Advertiser filed a lawsuit against the Department of Health (DOH) requiring release of the names of the panel for marijuana licensing.
- Questions, comments, and concerns followed: Legislative Process: Iwasa asked the last date that bills can be heard and Senator Slom responded that any bill can be revived throughout the session. Senator Slom noted for Altonn that there are no rumors regarding changes in the 48-hour meeting notice rules and members can ask for exceptions to the rules.

Senator Laura Thielen – Senator Thielen distributed a newsletter and reported the following:

- Process: Senator Thielen explained the crossover process and the holdover aspect of 2015 bills.
- Senate Ways and Means Committee (WAM) Testimony: WAM continues to accept testimony for all bills previously heard in their committee (written only). A rumor has spread that WAM also will not allow written testimony. Senator Thielen will follow up.
- Boards and Commissions: The Senate confirms the governor's appointments to statewide boards and commissions. Senator Thielen encouraged residents to apply for board and commission appointments at <https://forms.ehawaii.gov/pages/board-survey>.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed:

1. SB2358: Reilly asked if there had been changes to the bill. Senator Thielen responded that there was not as much public testimony as hoped. The General Contractors Association (GCA) opposed the bill, but some contractors already dispose of waste legally and she is currently working with GCA on the bill. She urged residents to contact the WAM chair asking that the bill be heard. Reilly noted all the stockpiling in Kamilonui Valley is from City projects. Senator Thielen suggested sharing with other neighborhood boards as it is also a big problem in Waianae and Waimanalo.
2. Portlock Beach Plantings: Senator Thielen responded to Altonn that a law was passed requiring private property owners to keep vegetation from hindering public access to beaches. She requested the specific addresses and will come to look, then follow up with the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR).
3. WAM Testimony: Iwasa asked if the public might voice their concerns regarding limiting testimony. Senator Thielen clarified that it is just a rumor and she will follow up.

Representative Gene Ward – Representative Ward distributed a newsletter and reported the following:

- Lease Land Conversion Bill: The bill regarding lease-to-fee conversion of commercial property died.
- Survey: Representative Ward highlighted the results of his Hawaii Kai survey reported in the newsletter.
- Department of Hawaiian Homelands (DHHL): Rep. Ward noted his opposition to the State administration's amicus brief against the Nelson case ruling on the funding of DHHL.

- Maunalua Bay Community Forum: A forum will be held March 10, 2016, from 7:00-8:30 p.m. at the Japan-America Institute of Management Science (JAIMS) Hawaii Kai. Robin Bond, Alan Hong, and Dick Baker will be the highlighted guests. Robin Bond wrote the original plan for Hanauma Bay.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed: Clarifications: Reilly noted that Donna Ikeda was instrumental in past Maunalua Bay discussions and there was extensive community involvement in creating the Recreational Plan for Maunalua Bay. She suggested the Recreational Plan be included in the discussion. Chair Knudsen clarified that the discussion is not focused on regulating Maunalua Bay as is done at Hanauma Bay.

Representative Mark Hashem – Frances Kam reported the following:

- President Obama Garden: Per Chair Knudsen's request, a House Concurrent Resolution (HCR) has been introduced proposing a "Birthplace Garden" for President Barack Obama at 6091 Kalaniana'ole Highway. Chair Knudsen clarified that his request was made as an individual.
- Hahaione Principal: Shannon Goo, Hahaione Elementary School Principal, will be recognized in the State House Chamber March 17, 2016. Hahaione Elementary School is 1 of only 3 Hawaii schools to be nominated as a National Blue Ribbon School.
- HB1753: HB1753 (regarding moped noise) will be heard February 26, 2016, at 2:00 p.m.

PRESENTATIONS

Oahu Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (Oahu SPCA) – Manager Tierra Wong and veterinarian Suzanne Byrd introduced themselves and reported that last month the Kalama Valley Shopping Center facility worked on improvements in response to the concerns about cleanliness and noise. They began working with the feral cats in the parking lot and Byrd noted Oahu SPCA is looking for more staff and volunteers.

Questions, comments, and concerns followed:

1. Zoning: Chair Knudsen noted concerns with zoning issues for the Kalama Valley facility. Wong responded that the facility is within the parameters of the law, as far as she knows; their president could speak to that.
2. Concerns: Salbosa commended the Oahu SPCA for addressing cleanliness concerns and additional volunteer workers. Wong responded to Chair Knudsen that Oahu SPCA has found an alternative storage method.
3. Air Conditioning: Wong answered Chair Knudsen that due to the difficult configuration of the building, they are still looking for someone willing to work on installing air conditioning.
4. Feeding Feral Cats: Byrd responded to resident Ed McChuley that Oahu SPCA has not been feeding or watering the feral cats. Oahu SPCA's focus is on trap, neuter, and release efforts to control feral cat numbers. Wong urged any "colony managers" to work with them on viable options for the treatment of the cats. Chair Knudsen asked about Oahu SPCA's position on a bill banning feeding of feral cats. Wong responded that their mission is the humane treatment of all animals.
5. Feral Cat Control: Representative Ward thanked the SPCA for assisting in controlling the feral cat population and asked if they could go on to the Park 'N Ride if they are successful in Kalama. Byrd noted that Oahu SPCA is willing to assist, but funding is an issue. Byrd explained for Rep. Ward that the cats are baited with food inside a humane trap, given an anesthetic, neutered, ear notched for tracking purposes, and released. There are no current estimates of the feral cat population.
6. Lease Length: Byrd responded to resident Brad Coles that she believes that the facility is currently on a month-to-month lease, but would defer the official response to Stephanie Ryan.
7. Suggestions: Coles noted that the facility storefront looks bad and asked about their services. Byrd responded that the SPCA provides limited public low-cost services, such as neutering. She noted that vaccinations are possible, if necessary, but they refer most issues to full service veterinarians. Wong stated that the windows were terrible prior to the SPCA's occupancy. She noted that tinting has been discussed, but the cost may be too high. Alternative measures, such as curtains, have been installed to address some aesthetic concerns.

NEW BUSINESS

Hearing no objections, Chair Knudsen moved the agenda to item 7.4.

Hawaii Kai Shopping Center: Multiple residents voiced safety concerns about deteriorating conditions of the Hawaii Kai Shopping Center parking lot and the roofing. A resident noted that it is private property, possibly owned by a Texas-based company. Clark read a letter to the Board from the general manager of the Hawaii Kai Shopping Center stating that repairs and re-striping of the lot are underway and will be completed based upon the contractor's availability. Clark noted the management must deal with budget constraints and the Board cannot take action against a private entity. Grey voiced appreciation for residents coming forward as she is also concerned with the situation.

Reilly moved and Garvin seconded that the Hawaii Kai Neighborhood Board No. 1 write a response letter to

the Hawaii Kai Shopping Center management, with a copy to be sent directly to the property owners, thanking them for their follow up, sharing the residents' concerns, and requesting an update on the repairs.

Discussion followed: Altonn suggested addressing the owner of the property directly. Clark noted the general manager and the owners are aware of the issue. Schreiner suggested a letter to the manager with a copy to the owners.

The motion was APPROVED UNANIMOUSLY, 12-0-0 (AYE: Altonn, Clark, Garvin, Grey, Iwasa, Jaxon, Knudsen, Lockard, Makino, Reilly, Salbosa, Schreiner; NAY: none; ABSTAIN: none).

Chair Knudsen returned the order of the agenda to item 7.1.

Board's Position on Proposed Honolulu Charter Amendments – Iwasa noted that the Honolulu Charter Commission met February 19, 2016 to discuss each of the proposals, but took no action and is looking to increase public participation. Iwasa described each proposal in turn:

- Proposal 9: Would increase the number of councilmembers to 36 (one for each neighborhood board).

Iwasa moved and Clark seconded that the Hawaii Kai Neighborhood Board oppose Proposal 9. The motion was APPROVED UNANIMOUSLY, 12-0-0 (AYE: Altonn, Clark, Garvin, Grey, Iwasa, Jaxon, Knudsen, Lockard, Makino, Reilly, Salbosa, Schreiner; NAY: none; ABSTAIN: none).

- Proposal 19: Would reduce the number of neighborhood boards to 9 (one for each council district).

Iwasa moved and Clark seconded that the Hawaii Kai Neighborhood Board oppose Proposal 19.

Discussion followed: Salbosa noted some neighborhoods are not represented in the City Council.

The motion was APPROVED UNANIMOUSLY, 12-0-0 (AYE: Altonn, Clark, Garvin, Grey, Iwasa, Jaxon, Knudsen, Lockard, Makino, Reilly, Salbosa, Schreiner; NAY: none; ABSTAIN: none).

- Proposal 30: Would limit neighborhood boards to addressing only City and County matters.

Iwasa moved and Clark seconded that the Hawaii Kai Neighborhood Board oppose Proposal 30. The motion was APPROVED UNANIMOUSLY, 12-0-0 (AYE: Altonn, Clark, Garvin, Grey, Iwasa, Jaxon, Knudsen, Lockard, Makino, Reilly, Salbosa, Schreiner; NAY: none; ABSTAIN: none).

- Proposal 113: Would align neighborhood board member elections with their councilmember elections. Iwasa noted the proposal also requires board member candidates to acquire 40 nomination signatures.

Iwasa moved and Clark seconded that the Hawaii Kai Neighborhood Board oppose Proposal 113.

Discussion followed: Chair Knudsen noted that neighborhood board elections have had very low voter turnouts and Proposal 113 might increase the turnout. Iwasa noted that balloting would be complex if this occurred. Garvin stated opposition to requiring 40 nominations signatures as it is difficult to get people to volunteer to run as it is.

The motion was APPROVED UNANIMOUSLY, 12-0-0 (AYE: Altonn, Clark, Garvin, Grey, Iwasa, Jaxon, Knudsen, Lockard, Makino, Reilly, Salbosa, Schreiner; NAY: none; ABSTAIN: none).

- General Administration: Iwasa asked how the Board would like the testimony to be submitted, noting Commission meetings are scheduled for February 25, 2016 at 3:00 p.m. and March 4, 2016 at 5:00 p.m. Chair Knudsen noted that, in addition, Proposal 115 is scheduled to be heard. He stated that simple testimony would be sufficient.

Board Action/Position on SB2358: Chair Knudsen summarized that SB2358 requires all State and City contracts that include the disposal of liquid or solid wastes to provide receipt of legal dumping. He noted the only current amendment is a defective date. Salbosa stated that her testimony in support was not accepted by the online submission system. She urged the Board to request a hearing by WAM for SB2358.

Knudsen moved and Clark seconded that the Hawaii Kai Neighborhood Board No. 1 support Senate Bill 2358.

Discussion followed: Reilly clarified that Salbosa would draft the letter and forward it to Chair Knudsen for submission

promptly to WAM. Iwasa noted that testimony can be submitted to committees directly. Grey urged board members to contact Senator Tokuda requesting SB2358 be set for hearing.

The motion was APPROVED UNANIMOUSLY, 12-0-0 (**AYE:** Altonn, Clark, Garvin, Grey, Iwasa, Jaxon, Knudsen, Lockard, Makino, Reilly, Salbosa, Schreiner; **NAY:** none; **ABSTAIN:** none).

Board Action/Position on HB1753: Chair Knudsen summarized the intention of the bill is to require annual safety inspections and registration for mopeds. Kern clarified that the recent draft of HB1753 deleted the annual inspection but added a requirement for license plates. Kern noted that HB1753 is scheduled to be heard again on February 26, 2016, in the House Judiciary Committee and he hoped that previous requirements would be restored. He asked that this Board adopt the resolution, as has been by other boards. Altonn stated support for the proposed law, but believed it is unenforceable. Kern disagreed and noted that discussions are ongoing with HPD. Chair Knudsen suggested the Board consider the draft resolution provided in March 2016.

BOARD COMMITTEES

Planning and Zoning – Chair Knudsen appointed Iwasa as Chair of the Planning and Zoning Committee. Iwasa noted a planning and zoning committee meeting will be tentatively scheduled for the end of March 2016.

BOARD BUSINESS

Approval of January 26, 2016 Regular Meeting Minutes: **The Hawaii Kai Neighborhood Board No. 1 January 26, 2016, Regular Meeting Minutes were APPROVED UNANIMOUSLY as amended.** 12-0-0 (**AYE:** Altonn, Clark, Garvin, Grey, Iwasa, Jaxon, Knudsen, Lockard, Makino, Reilly, Salbosa, Schreiner; **NAY:** none; **ABSTAIN:** none). The amendments are as follows: Page 6: BOARD COMMITTEES: Planning: “Iwasa noted the permits were renewed and have been renewed annually.” should be added; Page 5: Councilmember Trevor Ozawa: Questions, comments, and concerns followed: “The deceased property owner’s daughter could not make arrangements to clean up the property before returning to Japan” should be stricken from the record.

REPORTS

Treasurer’s Report – Chair Knudsen reported expenses of \$24.32 and a remaining balance of \$209.08. The report was filed.
