**DRAFT-REGULAR MEETING MINUTES
THURSDAY, AUGUST 20, 2015
MAKIKI DISTRICT PARK – ARTS AND CRAFTS BUILDING**

CALL TO ORDER: Chair John Steelquist called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. **Quorum was not established with nine (9) members present.** Note – This 17 member Board requires **nine (9)** members to establish quorum and to take official Board action.

Vacancies: There were two (2) seats), one (1) in Subdistrict 2 and one (1) in Subdistrict 3.

VACANCIES: Chair Steelquist asked if there was any person present interested in filling a vacancy. As there were no nominations or volunteers, the seats remained vacant.

CITY MONTHLY REPORTS

Honolulu Fire Department (HFD): Firefighter Ernesto Ducusin reported the following

- July 2015 Fire Statistics: There were 0 structures, 0 wildland and 0 vehicles fires; 3 rubbish fires, 87 medical responses and 38 miscellaneous calls for service. There were no major or unusual incidents.
- Fire Safety Tip: Hawaii is currently in its hurricane season, which runs from June through November. The Honolulu Fire Department encourages every family to take the necessary steps to ensure they are prepared. Do you have an evacuation plan or survival kit prepared? For answered to these question and more information visit the City and County of Honolulu Department of Emergency Management's website at www.honolulu.gov/dem.

6:33 p.m. Board member Darrell Ah Yong arrived; **10 members present.**

Questions, comments and concerns followed:

1. Rubbish Fire: Miller asked Ducusin replied that a rubbish fire is any trash set on fire including in dumpsters.
2. Average Number of Response Calls: A guest asked what the average number of fire response calls are.

Honolulu Police Department (HPD): Lieutenant B. Lee reported the following:

- July/June 2015 Crime Statistics: There were 14/8 motor vehicle thefts, 8/9 burglaries, 43/36 thefts, 30/20 unauthorized entries into motor vehicles (UEMV), 6/9 assaults, 2/2 sex assaults, 2/2 graffiti and 2/4 drugs; totaling 1,746/1,765 calls for service.
- Hurricane Safety Tip: Hurricane season begins June through November 2015. To prepare. HPD is asking the community members to have the preparedness/disaster kits ready. Get two (2) five (5) gallon buckets with a sealable lid. One (1) bucket will be market "Go Kit" and the other a "Stay Kit" on the outside of the bucket. The "go" kit, should have items such as passports, birth certificates, medicines, high energy non-perishable dry food, warm clothing, sanitation items, portable radio, batteries and soap are a few examples. In the "stay" kit, items such as pictures, valuables, and other essential items so they do not get wet. These

items will remain at the residence. A comprehensive list was available on the back table. For more information go to Hawaii State Civil Defense-disaster preparedness kit.

Questions, comments and concerns followed:

1. Burglary: Reindollar reported being burglarized Friday night while at home. The suspect cut a screen, entered the home and stole some jewelry from a bedroom Reindollar commended HPD for the quick response and the detective who did a follow up call to Reindollar on Tuesday. Reindollar noted that when calling the detective the voicemail was on saying that the person was on vacation. There was no mention of direct number of who to contact or email address with an out of office notification. Captain Mahi, executive officer for District 1, apologized. Captain Mahi noted that HPD tries to give excellent service and the oversight will be addressed. Captain Mahi can be reached at 723-3327 with any questions. Reindollar added that neighbors were unhappy with each other, but Officer Dumlao did a good job mediating the situation.
2. Mopeds: A guest raised concern regarding mopeds running into pedestrians in the Ala Moana area. Captain Mahi explained that moped fall under the bicycle laws category. Legislation in the City Council has been introduced to require mopeds to get a safety check. However, there are laws in place for modified mopeds.

Board of Water Supply (BWS): Michael Cubas reported the following:

- Water Main Breaks: No water main breaks reported for the month of July 2015.
- 2015-2015 Halawa Xeriscape Garden Workshop Schedule: The BWS and Friends of Halawa Xeriscape Garden continue to offer Saturday workshops that highlight the concept of xeriscaping. Upcoming workshops include Plants Drink Tea too, Saturday, August 12, 2015; Daily uses for Neem, Saturday, September 26, 2015 and Economical Aquaponics, Saturday, October 10, 2015. - Pensacola Water System Improvement Project: RMY Construction, Inc. has been selected as the contractor for the Pensacola Street Water System Improvement Project. The work involves replacing approximately 3,000 feet of water mains along Pensacola Street starting from Kinau Street and ending at Kapiolani Boulevard. Night work hours to be determined. Call the BWS Construction section at 748-5730, email contactus@hbws.or or visit www.boardofwatersupply.com for more information.
- Responses:
 - Sediment after a main break: Unfortunately, water service interruptions, such as water main breaks, may stir up sediment in pipelines and cause water containing this sediment to enter nearby homes. There is no way for BWS staff to know how far the debris will travel once it enters into the water system. Should residents notice any discoloration or particulates in the drinking water, BWS recommends flushing the house pipes by running the outside front hose faucet at full force for a few minutes or until the water clears. If the problem persists for an extended period of time contact the BWS Water Emergency Hotline at (808) 748-5000
 - Discoloration/Smelling Water from Pipes: On Wednesday, July 8, 2015, BWS crews worked to repair a damaged four (4) inch water main on Piikoi Street. A disturbance in the water system, such as a water main break, may sometimes cause resident to notice discoloration in the water. BWS sincerely apologizes. It is recommends to flush the pipes in the house by running the outside front hose faucet at full force for a few minutes or until the water clears.
 - Seven (7) Year Drought Advertisement: BWS has a number of programs that focus on water conservation.
 - Promoting Individual Conservation and Island-Wide Conservation: Cubas read a few things that BWS does to promote water conservation.
 - Sandwich Isles Communication: There is no update at this time regarding money owed to by Sandwich Isles Communication.
 - Kapiolani Park: The irrigation system for Kapiolani Park is fed by the BWS potable water system. The BWS encourages all residents and businesses, especially public areas, to use water wisely. BWS recommends watering lawns just two (2) to three (3) times a week and to avoid watering between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. BWS contacted park maintenance staff to recommend that the watering schedules be adjusted to avoid water waste. For future reference call the BWS Water Waste Hotline at 748-5000.

- o Water for New Developments (Kaka`ako, Koa Ridge, etc.): The BWS has reviewed and approved water master plans for these developments and the water system is able to accommodate the proposed projects. The plans detailed certain pipeline infrastructure improvements that were designed to accommodate fire protection and mixed water use needs for industrial/high density residential development.

Questions, comments and concerns followed:

1. Pensacola Street Project: Kawano asked how the noise would impact the residents. Kawano also asked who made the decision for the project. Cubas will follow up regarding how up the street the noise would extend and the project start date.
2. Work Patch: Miller reported that the work patch at 1590 Thurston Avenue is now a dip and needs to be fixed. Cubas will follow up.

Honolulu Authority for Rapid Transit (HART): Pat Lee reported the following:

- Transit Savings Report: Every month, the American Public Transportation Association (APTA) releases a Transit Savings Report which shows how much a person can save on a monthly and yearly basis by taking public transit. In Honolulu, individuals who ride public transportation instead of driving can save more than \$12,000 per year. APTA determines the cost of the average monthly transit pass and compares it with the costs of driving, including gas, maintenance, tires, insurance, registration and parking fees.
- Social Equity: Rail is about transportation and land use, but also about social equity. There are many people who are too young or too old to drive, unable to drive or cannot afford to own and operate a car. These residents depend heavily on public transportation to get to their jobs, school, run errands and carry on with their lives. Rail would improve public transportation by increasing efficiency and reducing travel times compared to a bus-only trip, due to its frequent service and reliability. Bus routes would be redesigned to feed into the rail system from other areas to service more riders.
- Transit Oriented Development (TOD): Rail will also enable Transit Oriented Development near stations and along its route. TOD brings new retail and commercial opportunities, but also new opportunities for affordable housing in proximity to good public transportation. This would help those in the income groups who need housing and depend on public transportation.
- Construction Highlights: These are the latest construction highlights: Foundation shafts 267; Columns 187; Segments cast 3,090; and Spans 139. Over 3 miles of guideway are completed and the shafts, foundations and column work are now proceeding into the Pearl City area.

Responses to questions posed last month:

1. West Oahu Farrington Highway Guideway: The West Oahu Farrington HWY Guideway portion (from East Kapolei to Pearl Highlands) is now 66% completed, and tracking four (4) months behind schedule. The Kamehameha HWY portion (from Pearl Highlands to Aloha Stadium) is 39% completed, and six (6) seven (7) months behind, and the Rail Operations Center in Waipahu is 74% completed and on schedule.
2. Restrooms: Some transit systems provide rest rooms, but not at all stations. New transit stations are very conservative in providing rest rooms. Usually, rest rooms are provided at multi-modal transit centers where bus and rail come together at one location. In some cases, transit system are closing existing rest room because of extensive vandalism, safety and security issues and maintenance costs. HART does not have information on the number of rest rooms typically provided. But, a single uni-sex rest room is not uncommon. I've rode systems in Seattle, Portland, San Diego and Phoenix, and those rail systems don't have toilets at each station.
3. Platforms: The platforms and other areas will slope to provide adequate run-off of rain water. The platform slopes toward the track way. Rainwater will flow onto the track way. Drains in the track way will carry water down the interior of the guideway columns to storm drains or catchments at the street level. The safety gates would insure that nothing wheeled (strollers, wheel chairs, carts) would be caused to roll into the tracks.

Questions, comments and concerns followed:

1. Restrooms at Rail Stations: Mitchell pointed out that more than one (1) restroom is needed. Hawaii law does not require businesses to provide restrooms for public use.

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2. Businesses Impact: A comment was made regarding impact to businesses along the Pearl City corridor. It was noted that HART suggested that the businesses have specials or change the hours of operation. It is difficult for customers who do not have access to the businesses. Lee replied that the federal government has right-of-way allocations to businesses who lost 10 feet of property. HART is working with the businesses on marketing programs and other marketing techniques.

RESIDENTS'/COMMUNITY CONCERNS: There were no residents' concerns.

CITY REPORTS

City Councilmember Ann Kobayashi: No represent present. A written report was provided.

City Councilmember Carol Fukunaga: Chris Delaunay distributed the written report and highlighted:

- Skyline Application Filed: Councilmember Fukunaga reported that on Wednesday, August 5, 2015 Prospect Properties, LLC's filed a Punchbowl Special District Permit application with the City Department of Planning and Permitting (DPP).
- Nehoa Street Bridge Repair: Councilmember Fukunaga announced that the Nehoa Street Bridge Rehabilitation will begin next week.
- Dog at Thomas Square: The pit bull biting people at Thomas Square has been euthanized and the owner sentenced on multiple dog bite cases,
- Emergency Preparedness Tips and Recommendations: Everyone was encouraged to sign up for emergency notification at www.nixle.com. Also to purchase National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) weather radio; visit (www.nws.noaa.gov/nwr for more information. Make a plan and who to call and what to do in an emergency. Have an emergency kit. Visit www.ready.gov/build-a-kit for recommendations. More information was provided in written report.

Questions, comments and concerns followed:

1. Thank You: A) Dog at Thomas Square: Mitchell thanked Councilmember Fukunaga for assisting on the dog issue at Thomas Square. Mitchell stated that the dog had bitten nine (9) people. Mitchell pointed out not seeing a Department of Parks (DPR) employee doing anything about the issue. B) No Parking Restrictions: Chong thanked Councilmember Fukunaga for the assistance and reported that the signs near the King Street Zippy's have been changed.
2. Homeless Issue: Kawano commented that it seem as though the homeless situation is not going away. Councilmember Fukunaga replied that the entire state looks at homelessness as a crisis. Both City and State are supportive and providing resources for transitional and permanent housing in neighborhoods. Kaka'ako consists of different groups of people, such as migrant families, veterans and people with mental illnesses. The City/State are identifying locations available along the transit route.

Mayor Kirk Caldwell's Representative: Director Guy Kaulukukui noted that copies of the City News were circulated and highlighted the following:

- Title VI Program Report Public Hearing: As a recipient of Federal Transit Administration (FTA) funds, the Department of Transportation Services Public Transit Division (DTS-PTD) is required to comply with FTA requirements that prohibit discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, gender, or disability in all programs, activities, and services. A public hearing is scheduled for Tuesday, September 1, 2015, 10:00 a.m. at the Mission Memorial meeting room. - Parking Along Prospect Street: Per DTS, parking has always been prohibited on the unimproved sidewalk are along Prospect Street as per the Revised Ordinances of Honolulu, Section 15-14-2 which states that "No person shall stand or park a vehicle in such a manner that any portion of such vehicles obstructs a sidewalk or portion thereof; and signs are not required for enforcement." Completion of the Department of Design and Construction's (DDC) rock mitigation will not change the legal status of the parking on this roadway. Per DDC, the parking along Prospect Street is not related to the rock fall mitigation project. Section 15-14-2 of the City and County Traffic Code states it is illegal to obstruct sidewalk areas. The Hawaii Revised Statutes §291-C-1 defines the "sidewalk as the portion of a street between the curb lines, or the lateral lines of a roadway, and the adjacent property lines, intended for use of pedestrians". - Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR) Representative Request at Next Board Meeting: DPR replied that at this time there are numerous groups having ongoing discussion regarding Thomas Square. DPR

suggest that questions be provided to the NCO's Mayor's representative to be answered more efficiently. If general park questions are provided, DPR will research the concern and provide an appropriate response.

Questions, comments and concerns followed:

1. Thomas Square: Mitchell questioned if Thomas Square is an official or unofficial dog park. Mitchell pointed out that posted signage noted no dogs without leashes. However, dog shows are held with the dogs unleashed.
2. Prospect Street Parking: Miller was curious as to why DTS/DDC are adamant about parking on Prospect Street. Miller pointed out that the issue is island wide and a previous incident occurred on Mott-Smith Drive. The question was asked during HPD's report. Councilmember Fukunaga added that at a Council Transportation meeting discussing Bill 54, the DDC Director Kronig was asked about 50-60 parking stalls, took no position on the legal parking status. Upon completion of the development the plans will go back to DTS. DTS Director Formby is aware of the problems and will work with HPD on a more friendly process.
3. Piikoi Mini Park: Klink reported that this mini park, located at the corner of Piikoi and Lunalilo Streets is disarray and looks like an unofficial dumping spot.

7:30 p.m. Board Member Amsterdam arrived; **12 members present.**

STATE ELECTED OFFICIALS

Senator Brian Taniguchi: Tom Heinrich circulated the report and highlighted the following:

- Committees: Senator Taniguchi serves as Chair of the Committee on Higher Education and the Arts, and as a member of the Committee on Housing and the Committee on Ways and Means.
- Tantalus/Round Top Master Plan: \$450,000 has been allocated for the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) for a planning project. The project is to develop a master plan and environmental compliance documents to support urban forest management/urban interface in the 1,200-acre Tantalus/Round Top area. This project is independent of the effort to develop a master plan for the improvement of the DLNR Division of Forestry and Wildlife, Oahu baseyard located in Makiki Valley.
- Legislative Information/Research and Bill Drafting Requests: Bills that were still in committee at the close of the 2015 legislative session are "carried over" to the regular 2016 session. Visit the website at <http://www.capitol.hawaii.gov>. Now is a good time to submit suggestions for potential legislation. Deadline for submission is Monday, January 25, 2016.

- Watershed Meeting: a letter was received from Chair Lockwood of the McCully-Moilili Neighborhood Board No 8 about plans for a watershed meeting in October 2016 with elected officials. The meeting will include Neighborhood Boards from Kaimuki to Makiki. The HRS law has changed allowing more than two (2) Board members to attend a public meeting.
- Charter Commission: The Charter Commission is now meeting and has a meeting every 10 years. Deadline to submit proposals for consideration is Saturday, October 31, 2015.

Questions, comments and concerns followed:

1. Senate Committees: 1) Mitchell asked and Heinrich reiterated that Senator Taniguchi serves as Chair of the Committee on Higher Education and the Arts, and as a member of the Committee on Housing and the Committee on Ways and Means. Mitchell noted that bill allowing solar panels to work off the grid for the Big Island was killed in the House. Mitchell asked that the issue be revisited. Heinrich will follow up with Mitchell. 2) Miller asked if the committees are set. Heinrich answered that the Senate reorganized with committee chairs, vice chairs and members. Senate President is Ron Koichi. There were no changes to the House. Heinrich noted that the current 2015 Hawaii Directory of Public Officials is inaccurate.
2. Homeless: Amsterdam asked and Heinrich replied not knowing any homeless plans at this time.
3. Comment: Chong noted knowing that the Senator Taniguchi is busy, however the only time the Senator Taniguchi attends Board meeting is during an election year. Heinrich replied that Senator Taniguchi does make his rounds, but is at a Parent Teacher Association (PTA) meeting tonight.
4. Sex Trafficking Bill: Kawano expressed disappointed that the bill failed and asked Senator Taniguchi's position on the issue. Heinrich will follow up. Kawano commented that the matter cannot wait until the addressed by the federal government. Heinrich noted that there was opposition to the bill for various reasons. The local effort will be addressed.

Senator Brickwood Galuteria: No representative present; no report was provided.

Representative Sylvia Luke: No representative present; no report was provided.

Representative (Rep.) Della Au Belatti: No representative present; a written report was provided.

Governor David Ige's Representative – No representative was present. No report provided.

PRESENTATIONS: There were no presentations

NEW BUSINESS

Airplane/Helicopter Noise Concerns: Michael Montanga expressed concerns regarding noise from airplanes and helicopters. Montanga noted that four helicopters fly over Punchbowl all day long seven (7) days a week. Call to the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) had no results. Montanga stated that noise in general are from the aircrafts, helicopters, mopeds, garbage trucks and sirens. Other issues are irrelevant if the community cannot have peace and quiet. Montanga stated that government is not listening.

Questions, comments and concerns followed:

1. Times and Dates: Chair Steelquist asked and Motanga replied from 4:49 a.m. to 11:42 a.m. (helicopter noise). A resident added that aircrafts fly over at various times of the day. Scott noted that the military flies over in the mornings and evenings.
2. Flight Pattern: Montanga noted that per the FAA aircrafts must follow the FAA traffic pattern approved, such as the freeway in case the aircraft has to land. It was stated that helicopters are also guilty.
- 3.

Mitchell moved, Chong seconded that the Makiki/Lower Punchbowl/Tantalus Neighborhood Board No. 10 write a letter to the FAA requesting of flights flying over the Punchbowl area, and included the times and heights. The motion was ADOPTED UNANIMOUSLY, 12-0-0 (Aye: Ah Yong, Amsterdam, Carole, Chong, Kawano, Klink, Miller, Mitchell, Reindollar, Sabey, Scott, Steelquist and Young); Nay: 0; Abstain: 0). Chair Steelquist will draft the letter.

Genetically Modified Organisms (GMO) Bill Passed by the U.S. House: Carole explained that the U.S. House bill passed prohibiting GMO labeling. U.S. House Representatives Gabbard and Takai both voted no.

Carole moved, Chong seconded hat the Makiki/Lower Punchbowl/Tantalus Neighborhood Board No. 10 write a letter to U.S. Senator Brian Schatz and U.S. Senator Mazie Hirono asked that they vote on the GMO bill

Discussion followed: 1) The project is a 15-day experiment done by companies and provide a report at the end. Individual states are not allowed to use GMO labeling, only in Vermont. @) Mitchell noted that it has a lot to do with state rights. It is thought that the corporations controls everything, but are not transparent. Mitchell supported the motion. 2) Amsterdam asked if there are any pros/cons. Carole noted that the companies do a 15-day study with rats. Carole noted that rats do not get cancer in 15-days. Rats tested in France took a year to get cancer. The University of Hawaii (UH) will not do GMO studies or discuss the matter. 3) Kawano noted a previous GMO presentation and requested another one. 4) Scott noted not knowing what the bills is and expressing feeling of the Board to the U.S. House representatives. 5) Miller noted that some issues fall under the realm of the federal government, and the duty of the Federal Drug Administration (FDA) to decide. Carole noted that the FDA accepts reports from companies doing the research. 6) Mitchell commented understanding that Hawaii is the lead GMO capital for the United States, since the pineapple crops are gone. Mitchell agreed with Carole. 7) Amsterdam supported Carole and asked for more specifics.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Skyline Honolulu: Young reported that a letter was previously emailed to Board members and distributed a DVD.

Sidewalk on Nehoa near Hanahau`oli School: No report.

The Shaloha Quest: No report

Makiki District Park: No report.

King Street Cycle Lanes: Chong reported that the area is getting worse. Chong pointed out that in Seattle, bike lanes have traffic signals. It is difficult turning left off of King Street due to bicyclists not obeying the laws. Chong stated that now bicyclists have the right-of-way. Chong noted that something must be done to bicyclists breaking the law.

Dog Park Update: No report.

BOARD BUSINESS:

Approval of the July 16, 2015 Regular Meeting Minutes: **Without objections, the July 16, 2015 regular meeting minutes was APPROVED UNANIMOUSLY as amended. The amendments are:**

- Page 4, Discussion followed 1 should read, "...Kawano asked if statistics indicate that the `Olelo broadcast is more effective **than the newsletter...**"
- Page 5, Councilmember Carol Fukunaga 3 should read, "**Rockfall Mitigation Project. The construction of mesh barriers for the project on Prospect Street has been completed...**" 4. Should reference, "**...Bill 52 (2015)**. Sentence two (2) should read, "**The purpose of the bill is to help ease parking congestion in residential neighborhoods adjacent to major traffic generators, like universities and hospitals. The sample permit cost was taken from the Seattle ordinance, which costs \$65 for a two (2)-year permit...**"
- Page 5, Questions comments and concerns followed 2 Permit Cost should read, "**...Councilmember Fukunaga noted that the Seattle restricted parking zone permits offer discounted rates for low-income or senior citizen residents...**"
