DRAFT REGULAR MEETING MINUTES **WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 18, 2015** **KALIHI UNION CHURCH**

CALL TO ORDER – Chair Daniel Holt called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. **Quorum was established with 11 members present.** Note: This 13-member Board requires seven (7) members to establish quorum and to take official Board action.

PUBLIC SAFETY INPUT

Gozar departed the meeting at 7:05 p.m.; 10 members present.

Honolulu Fire Department (HFD) – Fire Fighter I Tommy Spellman reported the following:

- **January 2015 Fire Statistics** – There was 1 structure fire, 6 rubbish fires, 2 vehicle fires, 132 medical emergencies, and 36 miscellaneous calls for service. There were no major or unusual incidents.
- **Hiking Safety Tips** – HFD often responds to hikers who are lost or injured and would like to provide some tips courtesy of the State of Hawaii's Division of Forestry and Wildlife. When planning a hike, inform others of the plans, let someone know which trail the hike will be on, and when one plans to return. If something should go wrong, rescuers will have accurate information on where to start searching. Plan to have enough time to return from the hike and keep a fully charged cell phone. HFD relies heavily on phone contact when trying to locate a lost hiker or for information regarding an injured hiker.

Honolulu Police Department (HPD), District 1 – Lieutenant Baron Lee reported the following:

- **January 2015 Crime Statistics** – There were 0 motor vehicle thefts, 1 burglary, 10 thefts, 4 unauthorized entries into motor vehicles (UEMV), 3 assaults, 0 sex assault, 0 graffiti and 2 drug offenses. There was a total of 339 calls for service.
- **Pedestrian Safety Tips** – “Be safe, Be seen!” When walking or jogging at night, wear bright clothing and bring a flashlight to see. Look both ways when crossing the street, always use the crosswalk. Be alert, and do not assume cars will stop. Make eye contact with the driver before crossing the street and do not step off the sidewalk in between cars or other objects that can block the driver or the pedestrian's vision. Do not wear headphones or talk on a cellphone while crossing the street.

Questions, comments, and concerns that followed:

1. **Homeless** – Louie commented that he is glad that Bills 48 and 62 have passed but raised a concern about the homeless moving from the Downtown area into the Kalihi area, especially on Beretania Street. Louie noted that his neighbor was bitten by a homeless man's dog. Lieutenant Lee responded that Louie or his neighbor should have called 911 because the homeless man was obstructing the sidewalk. A resident raised concern about the relationship between HPD and the Department of Facility Maintenance

(DFM) because there seems to be a lack of understanding with the homeless and their tents along Aala Park. Lieutenant Lee responded that HPD has been working with DFM and commented that DFM will notify HPD of when they schedule a sweep. HPD will be on stand-by as DFM does their sweep. The resident asked and Lieutenant Lee responded that HPD will first give a warning and waits for DFM to call HPD and HPD will then fine the homeless person, DFM cannot fine the homeless person. There are limited resources and the dispatcher usually gives the officer a priority call which the officer must attend to. Chair Holt noted that the same issue is occurring at Kapalama Canal and hopefully Arakaki can share some of the ideas that was brought up at the Town Hall Meeting. Kolio asked what the penalties are for violating the laws. Lieutenant Lee responded that it is usually a misdemeanor that would only amount to fines.

2. Pedestrian Crosswalks – Guerrero asked if a pedestrian is crossing the street and there is a median strip, do the pedestrians have to stop at the middle or can they fully cross the intersection. Sergeant Castro responded that the pedestrian can cross if light allows them to but if the pedestrian is in the middle of a regular crosswalk, the cars at the light need to wait until the pedestrian is finished crossing the street. Guerrero commented that HPD should tell people to raise their hands at crosswalks because eye contact is not safe enough.

Honolulu Police Department (HPD) District 5 – Lieutenant Brian West reported the following:

- January 2015 Crime Statistics – There were 16 motor vehicle thefts, 11 burglaries, 73 thefts, and 35 unauthorized entries into motor vehicles (UEMV), for a total of 3,508 calls for service.

Questions, comments, and concerns that followed: Gang Violence – Mandado asked if HPD has any updates on the gang violence in the Kalihi area. Sergeant Bonnell responded that there were multiple fights that occurred, but HPD addressed those situations and made one (1) arrest. Mandado asked and Sergeant Bonnell responded that HPD cannot share any information regarding the shooting that occurred on Gulick Avenue. Kolio asked if the violence is a gang amongst themselves or against rival gangs and if they are targeting regular people. Sergeant Bonnell responded that they are targeting other gang members not the public, but the public should still be aware of the situation.

Board of Water Supply (BWS) – Diane Moses reported the following:

- Water Main Breaks – There was one (1) water main break on Wednesday, January 28, 2015, a 12-inch water main broke at 555 North King Street which was installed in 1931.
- Bank of Hawaii (BOH) to Accept Water Bill Payments – Effective Wednesday, April 1, 2015, customers will have the option to drop off water bill payments at any BOH traditional branch on Oahu (excluding in store branches). Customers currently paying the water bill at First Hawaiian Bank (FHB), please note that FHB will no longer be accepting payments after Saturday, March 21, 2015. To drop off payments at BOH, provide the teller with a check (made payable to Board of Water Supply) and the bill payment stub, which must be detached from the bottom portion of the bill. Payments may also be deposited into the Express Teller boxes in BOH's traditional branch locations. Visit www.boh.com for a list of BOH locations on Oahu. - New Customer Parking Procedure at BWS Headquarters – Beginning in March 2015, the BWS will be starting new parking procedures at its Beretania Street headquarters. Parking control arms will restrict use of BWS parking stalls to only visitors on official BWS business. The three (3) steps to enter the parking lot are: (1) Press the intercom button to speak with BWS security staff. (2) State the purpose of the visit. (3) Once cleared for entry, the parking arm will rise and allow one to park. For more information contact the BWS Security Center at 748-5911.

RESIDENTS'/COMMUNITY CONCERNS

Citizen Concern – Louie raised a concern about seeing a homeless man purchase over \$200 worth of Spam from the Pali Highway Longs. The homeless man then brought the shopping cart to a man with a station wagon where the man paid the homeless man for the Spam and then drove off.

Farrington High School – Enos announced that Farrington High School finally broke ground to start their renovations. Enos thanked all the Representatives in the district that helped get the money allocated for the school. Enos noted that there are still more renovations needed but this was a good start.

Graffiti – Guerrero raised concern about the amount of graffiti that he is noticing in the area. Guerrero commented that he has called HPD on a few occasions because he would see people tagging walls with their graffiti and suggested that the penalties should be raised and noted that even when DFM comes and paints the walls, people just come back and tag the wall again.

Department of Health (DOH) – Enos announced that he would like to hear from the Department of Health (DOH) about the number of different spills that have been occurring.

CITY ELECTED OFFICIALS

Mayor Kirk Caldwell's Representative – Director Sheri Kajiwarra reported the following:

- City Newsletter – The February 2015 City Newsletter there are sections on pedestrian safety, road repair, and making urban housing an age friendly environment.
- Neighborhood Board Elections – The deadline to apply is Friday, February 20, 2015. More information on the Boards and the election are available online or by calling 768-3708. The community can also apply online at www.honolulu.gov/nco.
- Honolulu Zoo – The Mayor's Office of Culture and the Arts (MOCA) and the Honolulu Zoo are asking for donations of ti leaf to help repair the hale la'i. Hundreds of leaves will be needed; green, yellow or brown leaves with stems may be dropped off in plastic bags at the Honolulu Zoo entrance.
- Sew a Lei for Memorial Day – Memorial Day is on Monday, May 25, 2015. All Hawaii school students grades K-12 are invited to enter the City and County of Honolulu's "Sew a Lei for Memorial Day" Poster Contest, which will run from Monday, January 26, 2015 through Friday, February 27, 2015. The poster will depict lei-making activities or ceremonial actions at the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific at Punchbowl. - Department of Transportation Services (DTS) Advisory – DTS Traffic Signals and Technology Division will begin placing the crosswalk stickers on crosswalk signal poles, as they go to inspect or repair crosswalk-signal poles, island wide.

Questions, comments, and concerns that followed:

1. Crosswalk Light – Enos raised concern about the crosswalk lights and asked if the City can get rid of the countdown timers. Kajiwarra will follow up.
2. Wi-Fi on TheBus – Mandado asked if it would be possible to have free wi-fi on TheBus. Kajiwarra will follow up.
3. Repaving – Ibay raised a concern about the condition of the streets on Gulick Avenue and King Street and asked when it will be repaved. Kajiwarra will follow up and noted that a list of when roads will be repaved is on the City's website.
4. Sand Island – Louie asked what happened to the Sand Island Transition Center project. Kajiwarra responded that the City has been having issues with the site because of all the hazardous materials in the soil. Louie responded that the solution would be to replace the soil in the area and continue with the project because it was a good idea.
5. Container Housing – Williams asked for information on the State or the City plans to use the containers for housing. Kajiwarra deferred the issue to the State Representatives and noted that she will follow up from a City perspective.
6. Aala Park – Guerrero raised concern about the grass at Aala Park and asked why the City has stopped watering the grass and noted that the grass is turning brown. Kajiwarra will follow up.
7. Condominium Trash Pick Up – Ibay asked when the will the trash pick up for condominium association will be suspended. Kajiwarra responded that legal action was taken and the Judge ruled that he City must continue picking up the trash until a decision has been made.

Councilmember Joey Manahan – Shirley Templo distributed Councilmember Manahan's newsletter and reported the following:

- Kalihi Waena Graffiti Paint-Out – On Saturday, January 31, 2015 members of the community, organizations, and City and State agencies collaborated to address the proliferation of graffiti in the Kalihi Palama community. The Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR) provided the paint and Weed and Seed and HPD's Community Policing provided the painting tools for the paint out.
- Safety Awareness Sign-Waving Event – On Friday, January 23, 2015 the Hawaii Bicycle League (HBL), HPD, Puuhale School, and Councilmember Manahan's Office collaborated to hold a safety awareness sign-waving event in Kalihi fronting Puuhale Elementary School on Nimitz Highway and Puuhale Road. This event was held to bring forth awareness for the safety of pedestrians, cyclists, and motorists and to

promote safe streets on the island. After the sign-waving event, there was a memorial walk for Elizabeth Malland who was a homeless pedestrian that was killed on Nimitz Highway on Friday, January 2, 2015.

- Farrington High School Going Green Day – On Saturday, March 7, 2015 from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. Farrington High School will be hosting a Going Green Day event where the community can recycle their waste and help turn trash into cash for the community programs. STATE ELECTED OFFICIALS

Governor David Ige's Representative – No representative was present; no report was available.

Senate President Senator Donna Mercado Kim – Cecile Yasay distributed Senate President Kim's Community Bulletin and reported the following:

- Community Survey – Senate President Kim is asking the community to participate in her community survey.
- Community Bulletin – Yasay announced that within Senate President Kim's Community Bulletin are issues including the cleaning of streams, the allocation of money for the budget, and Community Improvement Projects (CIP) to help Farrington High School and the other elementary schools in the district. Yasay noted that if anyone has any issues they can call Senate President Kim's office.

Senator Suzanne Chun Oakland – No representative was present; an information packet was made available.

Representative Karl Rhoads – April Bautista reported the following:

- Aala Park – Representative Cachola and Representative Rhoads both wrote to DFM about the tents and shopping carts along the sidewalk of Aala Park. Representative Rhoads also received a complaint about the water fountains and faucets at Aala Park is not working. The issue has been forwarded to DPR and DPR confirmed that they are aware of the issue and will begin repairing the issue by the end of February 2015.
- Playground Slide – Representative Rhoads received a request to reinstall the playground slide at Kalakaua District Park. Representative Rhoads contacted DPR and was told that the slide has been placed on the waitlist to be replaced.
- Home Lane – Representative Rhoads received a complaint regarding rubbish and bulky items blocking the street on Home Lane. Representative Rhoads forwarded the issue to the City.
- Kohou Street – Representative Rhoads received a complaint about the homeless tents along Kohou Street in front of the Home Design Center building at 1030 Kohou Street. Representative Rhoads has forwarded this issue to HPD, DFM, and IHS.
- Community Meeting – There is a Kookia Kapalama Community Meeting scheduled for Wednesday, February 18, 2015 at Honolulu Community College. Community members will be discussing crime prevention and community policing of the Kapalama area. They will also be discussing ideas on how to address the homeless issues in the area.
- Capital Improvement Projects
 - Signalized Crosswalk – Installation of a signalized crosswalk on Kalihi Street between Ashford Street and Kahanu Street.
 - Central Middle School – Repaving and resurfacing of the Kukui parking lot, Administration parking lot, the Queen Emma parking lot and the repainting of all buildings and structures of the school.
- Bills of Interest
 - House Bill 25 – Prohibits the discrimination in the rental of real property based on the tenants' source of income. The measure has passed Second Reading and is referred to the House Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce and the House Committee on Judiciary.
 - House Bill 32 – Requires motorists to stop for pedestrians at a non-signalized crosswalk as soon as the pedestrian steps foot onto the crosswalk even if the driver has started to make the turn into the crosswalk. The measure was passed by the House Committee on Transportation and is awaiting a floor vote for Second Reading.
 - House Bill 33 – Requires a landlord to provide the rental applicant with a copy of any report (background/credit check) obtained during the screening process if the landlord had previously charged the tenant an application screening fee. Any unused amount of the application fee will be returned to the applicant. The measure was scheduled for a hearing on Wednesday, February 18, 2015 at 3:00 p.m. by the House Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce.

- House Bill 228 – Reduces the maximum fee a check casher may charge under a payday loan agreement for deferring the deposit of a check from 15% to 7% of the face value of the check. The measure passed the House Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce and is awaiting a floor vote for Second Reading.
- House Bill 1241 – Appropriates money for the Department of Health lead poisoning activities. The measure is scheduled to be heard by the House Committee on Health for Thursday, February 19, 2015 at 11:00 a.m. in Conference Room 329.
- House Bill 1346 – Establishes a program within the Office of Youth Services for positive youth development through after school and school break programs. The measure has passed the House Committee on Housing and is awaiting a floor vote for Second Reading.
- House Bill 1408 – Requires the counties to repair and maintain private roads. The measure is scheduled to be heard by the House Committee on Judiciary for Thursday, February 19, 2015, at 2:00 p.m. in room 325.

Questions, comments, and concerns that followed:

1. Container Homes – Williams asked for more information on the container homes project. Bautista will follow up.
2. Muffler Noise – Mandado raised a concern about the bill regarding muffler noise not being on the list and asked for the bills status. Bautista noted she will follow up. Chair Holt asked for the status of a similar bill for the Downtown area that would prohibit loud noises after 10:00 p.m. Bautista responded that the bill has died.
3. House Bill 1408 – Mandado raised a concern about the incident that resulted in a death on Kalani Street and asked if House Bill 1408 could work in a similar situation in the future. Bautista will follow up.
4. Notice of Committee Meetings – Guerrero asked if the State can have a simplified notice of the Committee Meetings. Bautista responded that the list of scheduled meetings can be found on the Capitol website and noted that if the community goes to the public access room link, all the bills and notices can be tracked.

Representative Romy Cachola – Carl Campagna reported the following:

- New Assignment – Representative Cachola has been appointed Chair of the Finance Sub-Committee.
- Capital Improvement Projects – Representative Cachola has requested funding for several schools in the district, as well as one (1) outside of the district.
- Oahu Community Correctional Center (OCCC) – House Bill 840 has been referred to the Finance Committee.
- Container Housing – Representative Cachola noted that there has been much discussion on how to address the issue. Campagna commented that currently, the bills are exploring different issues and will follow up with more information.

Questions, comments, and concerns that followed: House Bill 840 – Kolio asked if House Bill 840 passes, will the population move to Halawa. Campagna responded that a suggestion was to combine the two (2) until funds have been appropriated. Kolio asked if the Courts would move as well. Campagna will follow up.

With no objections, Chair Holt took the agenda out of order to Councilmember Joey Manahan.

Kokua Kapalama Community Meeting – Dennis Arakaki reported that the meeting went well and noted that The Managing Director, Councilmember Manahan, Senator Wakai, the Director of the Department of Facility Maintenance (DFM), HPD, IHS, and others have met with business owners on the impact of tent cities and those who are suspects of stealing and damaging property. The meeting was to address business and home owner's worries and concerns. Williams asked who is responsible for the junk that gets dumped into the canal. Arakaki responded that the canal belongs to the City and they are responsible for cleaning and maintaining the canal. Councilmember Manahan reported that the Kapalama Canal is a City issue, and noted that everyone thought it belonged to DFM. Councilmember Manahan noted that there are increasing tensions with different agencies and the community and commented that if nothing is done soon, there will be a serious problem. Arakaki noted that a possible solution was to build a fence along the canal, but noted that some of the homeless might use the fence to build their homes. Louie thanked Councilmember Manahan for the Sit/Lie Bill and noted that the homeless are moving to Beretania Street. Councilmember Manahan responded that all the agencies are working on the issue and noted that it is difficult because HPD noted that there are families along the canal and some along Beretania Street. Arakaki noted that they will work on the issue because there is a number of students who are homeless

and commented that HPD and the City are trying to help the homeless get into programs but it is hard when other services are supporting them to the point where the services are enabling the homeless.

Questions, comments, and concerns that followed:

1. Representative of Programs – Kolio asked if anyone is representing the programs that could help the homeless get into housing. Arakaki responded that there are representatives but it is hard to convince the homeless to join programs or get into housing. Kolio noted that it could be happening because the homeless and the people do not trust each other right away and suggested that the representatives take smaller steps. Arakaki agreed and noted that it all depends on the approach taken.
2. Expectations – Williams asked what the community can expect from the outcome of the Community Meeting. Arakaki responded that they will continue to work with the different agencies but if nothing can be done, Councilmember Manahan will ask the legislation for help because it will need more resources. Chair Holt noted that there are bigger strategies coming soon that will hopefully help the situation.

Senator Glenn Wakai – Senator Wakai reported the following:

- OCCC Relocation – Senator Wakai noted that a lot of good things are happening and commented that there is a bill on land exchange which is advancing to the Senate. There is a possibility of switching the land exchange with Dole. The tentative plan is to do the land exchange and use the money to pay for the new prison.
- Farrington High School Groundbreaking – A groundbreaking was held on Monday, February 9, 2015 for the school's new \$15 million athletic complex. By the fall of 2016, students will have a new football field, track, grandstand, and locker rooms. The next phase is part of the Department of Education's \$100 million renovation of the Farrington campus.

Chair Holt resumed the order of the agenda with Unfinished/On-Going Business.

UNFINISHED/ON-GOING BUSINESS

Honolulu Rail Transit Project (HRTTP) – Pat Lee reported the following:

- Updates – Lee answered for Mandado that the Rail will have free wi-fi throughout the cars and stations. Work on the rail guideway continues to progress eastward through the alignment from East Kapolei off of Kualakai Parkway towards Waipahu. These latest highlights are more than 140 columns have been erected, more than 200 foundations placed, more than 2,200 segments have been casted, and more than 86 spans have been completed. There will be a total of 422 columns for the first 10-mile section of the rail alignment, from East Kapolei to Aloha Stadium.
- Growth – Rail is a catalyst for smart growth and will promote livable, walkable, and healthier communities. It will help create a greener, more sustainable environment with less dependence on foreign oil. Rail will help preserve pristine parts of Oahu for future generations as well as create affordable housing opportunities and improve the quality of life for the residents all over the island.

Questions, comments, and concerns that followed:

1. Budget – Louie asked and Lee responded that there are currently five (5) people on HART's payroll. Louie noted that there is a two (2) part deficit even though the first 10 miles are on the budget, but the second 10 miles and their stations are having issues. Lee noted Louie's concern and responded that HART is not selling anything, but providing information where a lot of comments and concerns but noted that public involvement is high. Chair Holt asked if Lee can provide the price of the entire project will be. Lee responded that they will not know the price until the other contracts have finished, but noted that 60% have been approved, while the other 40% has not met yet.
2. Public Awareness – Enos noted that he was against, but is now for the Rail, and commented that there is barely any public news regarding Rail. Chair Holt noted that the extension is a little much. Lee responded that it is not just for completion of the project but is for the public design which is changing and difficult.

BOARD BUSINESS

Resolution to Support Funding of Social Services – Chair Holt read the resolution and called for the discussion. Kolio noted that the resolution is a great idea and suggested the Board supports the resolution. Chair Holt called for the vote.

Kolio moved and Mandado seconded that the Kalihi Palama Neighborhood Board No. 15 support the resolution of supporting the funding of social services. The motion was UNANIMOUSLY ADOPTED, 10-0-0. (AYE: Cummings, Dumayag, Enos, Holt, Ibay, Kolio, Louie, Mandado, Velasco, and Williams.)

Resolution to have the People's Open Market at Banyan Court – Chair Holt read the resolution and called for discussion. Kolio asked why the People's Open Market was closed in the first place. Chair Holt responded that it originally operated on City property, but the City gave the property to the Church and an open market cannot operate on private property. Chair Holt called for the vote.

Kolio moved and Mandado seconded that the Kalihi Palama Neighborhood Board No. 15 urges the Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR) and the Honolulu City Council to find a suitable location to replace the People's Open Market in the Banyan Court Mall and Kaumakapili Church area. The motion was ADOPTED, 9-0-1. (AYE: Cummings, Dumayag, Enos, Holt, Ibay, Kolio, Mandado, Velasco, and Williams.) (Abstain: Louie).

APPROVAL OF THE JANUARY 14, 2015 REGULAR MEETING MINUTES – **Cummings moved and Mandado seconded that the Kalihi-Palama Neighborhood Board No. 15 approve the January 14, 2015 regular meeting minutes as amended. The motion was UNANIMOUSLY ADOPTED, 10-0-0 (AYE: Cummings, Dumayag, Enos, Holt, Ibay, Kolio, Louie, Mandado, Velasco, and Williams.)**

Amendments as follows:

- Page 2 – Shooting on King Street should read: Shooting on Gulick Avenue.
- Page 4 – Senator Suzanne Chun Oakland – should read: No representative was present; an information packet was made available.
