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DRAFT REGULAR MEETING MINUTES WEDNESDAY, MAY 25, 2016 KAPOLEI HALE

WELCOME– MESSAGE OF ALOHA – Shad Kane of Aha Hui O Sawila/Kalaeloa Heritage Park gave the message of aloha and invited everyone out to the Kalaeloa Heritage Park on Saturday, July 23, 2016 from 10:00 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. for the 2nd Annual Luau Fundraiser.

CALL TO ORDER – Chair Evelyn Souza called the meeting to order at 7:15 p.m. **Quorum was not established with four (4) members present.** Note – This nine (9) member board requires five (5) members to establish quorum and take official Board action.

Board Members Present – Dean Kalani Capelouto, Kioni Dudley (arrived at 8:58 p.m.), Jack Legal (arrived at 7:56 p.m.), Michael Madix (arrived at 7:41 p.m.), Thad Spreg, Evelyn Souza, and Brandon Mutchek.

Board Members Absent – Troy Cullen and Kanani Wond.

Harkins; and Sharon Baillie (Neighborhood Commission Office).

Roll Call/Statement of Order and Decorum – Attendance was taken by roll call.

CITY MONTHLY REPORTS

Honolulu Fire Department (HFD) – Firefighter III Edward Lee reported the following:

- April 2016 Statistics – There were 2 wildland/brush and 2 nuisance fires with 8 activated alarms. There were 117 medical emergencies, 8 motor vehicle crashes/collisions, 1 ocean rescue, and 2 hazardous materials incidents.
- Fire Safety Tip – Wildland fires, also known as brush fires, can cause extensive damage in communities.
 - The National Fire Protection Association suggests taking the following preventative steps around the home:
 - Remove flammable materials, such as dead vegetation and wood piles, from within 30 feet of the home.
 - Keep lawns hydrated and maintained. If the lawn is brown, cut it down to reduce fire intensity. Dry grass and shrubs are fuel for brush fires.
 - Clear leaves and other vegetative debris from roofs, gutters, porches, and decks. This helps prevent embers from igniting the home.

Comments, questions, and concerns that followed:

1. Statistics – Souza asked and Lee answered that they are anticipating the statistics to go up since it is dry season and that every department goes through strategies to maintain fires during the dry season.
2. Fire Hazard – A resident asked if HFD was aware of a parcel of land on Nohona Street with a King Kamehameha sign that has a lot of brush on it. Lee and others will check out the area for potential hazards.

Honolulu Police Department (HPD) – Lieutenant Randall Arakaki reported the following:

- April Statistics – There were 43 motor vehicle thefts, 59 burglaries, 167 thefts, and 49 unauthorized entries into motor vehicles (UEMVs). A total of 7,464 calls were placed for service.

Comments, questions, and concerns that followed: Officers – Souza noted the high number of calls for service and Arakaki replied that the calls were for all of District Eight (8).

Board of Water Supply (BWS) – Rian Adachi reported the following:

- Main Breaks – There was one (1) water main break on Thursday, April 21, 2016 on Kalaeloa Boulevard between Malakole Street and Opakapaka Street.
- General Water Announcements – The 2016 Water Conservation Week poster and poetry winners were announced. The BWS would like to thank everyone who participated in the contest. For a full list of winners and an online art gallery visit www.boardofwatersupply.com.
- Newsletter – The latest edition of the BWS's customer newsletter, Water Matters, is currently being distributed to BWS customers as a water bill insert. Should you have any questions or comments, please contact the communication office at 748-5041.

Comments, questions, and concerns that followed:

- Testing – Capelouto inquired and Adachi replied that testing water along the railway construction is a Department of Health (DOH) issue.
- Desalinization – Souza asked and Adachi replied that in 10-15 years the West Side of the island could be drinking desalinated water.

BOARD BUSINESS

Commendation to Kapolei Property Development for the Opening of long waited Streets and Roadways in Downtown Kapolei Proper – Souza and members of the board thanked Steve Kelly for the work his company has done on streets and roadways in Kapolei, which Souza noted did not cost tax payers any money. Kelly noted to Spreg that it would be up to the City and County of Honolulu Department of Planning and Permitting (DPP) or the Department of Transportation Services (DTS) to put in crosswalks or lights at places such as Wakea Street and Ala Kahawai Street.

Resolution for Protection and Preservation of the Ewa Airfield as a National Historic Military Monument and National Battlefield – John Bond reported the following: Marine Corps Air Station (MCAS) Ewa was one (1) of the first airfields in Hawaii, established in 1925. It was one (1) of the first United States (US) facilities attacked by naval air forces of Japan on December 7, 1941. Marines and civilians lost their lives during this attack. Ewa served as a hub for all Marine aviation units heading into combat in the Pacific Theater in World War II. On Monday, May 23, 2016 Ewa Battlefield was listed to the National Historic Site Registry. The next step would be for the President to expand the Pearl Harbor National Monument to include the Ewa Airfield or be designated a National American Battlefield by the National Parks Service. The community would like to see Ford Island Properties LLC and the Hawaii Community Development Authority (HCDA) work towards developing plans to preserve MCAS Ewa Field. There will be a Memorial Day Celebration on Monday, May 30, 2016 at 10:00 a.m. with flyovers and a much larger celebration to take place on December 6, 2016 for the 75th anniversary of the attack on Pearl Harbor.

Madix arrived at 7:41 p.m.; Five (5) board members present; Quorum established.

Capelouto read the Ewa Airfield Resolution.

Legal arrived at 7:56 p.m.; Six (6) board members present.

Madix motioned and Mutchek seconded to support the Resolution for Protection and Preservation of the Ewa Airfield as a Historic Military Monument and National Battlefield. The Board UNANIMOUSLY ADOPTED the resolution 6-0-0 (AYE: Capelouto, Legal, Madix, Spreg, Souza, and Mutchek; NAY: None; ABSTAIN: NONE).

Discussion and Action of Change for Future Board Meetings June 2016 through June 2016 – Souza noted the June 2016 through October 2016 neighborhood board meetings will be held at Kapolei High School, recess the November 2016 meeting, and the December 2016 through June 2017 meetings will be held at Kapolei Hale.

The Board UNANIMOUSLY ADOPTED to hold the meetings at the locations stated for the next year. 6-0-0 (AYE: Capelouto, Legal, Madix, Spreg, Souza, and Mutchek; NAY: None; ABSTAIN: NONE).

Discussion and Action of Board member Troy Cullen's Three (3) Absence Notification – The board appreciates the service Cullen provides for the country for being in the military, however at this time wants someone who would be

able to come to the meetings and help make decisions for the betterment of the community. The board would be willing to have Cullen back if his schedule changed and there was a vacancy on the board.

Spreg moved and Legal seconded to vacate the seat. The motion was adopted 5-0-1. (AYE: Capelouto, Legal, Madix, Spreg, and Souza; NAY: None; ABSTAIN: Mutchek).

PRESENTATIONS

Discussion and Action supporting a Resolution to Protect the Federally Endangered Pueo in the Ewa Plains – Mike Lee reported the following: Pueo – The Hawaiian Owl or Pueo has a special place in Hawaiian Mythology. Pueo once grew in great numbers but today are now endangered especially in the 'Ewa Plain. Lee discussed in length the importance of the Pueo and what it could be for the state and surrounding areas.

1. Protected – Legal asked and Lee answered that the Pueo is protected under the federal migratory species act but is not a federal protected species. Lee noted there are grants available to help protect the Pueo through federal and state monies.
2. Reservations and Changes Legal noted his reservation for the portion in the resolution which states that the board would support any State or Federal legal remedy, as the board is only advisory in nature. Capelouto noted taking that out of the resolution would take the meaning out of the resolution. Legal suggested a letter be sent instead.
3. Consideration – Wong suggested the board look into the resolution being discussed and take action at next month's meeting. He stated the Pittman-Robinson act is for wildlife restoration through taxes on firearms and ammunition used for sport hunting, but not to redistribute to other agencies and non-profits for development of programs as Lee had mentioned earlier in his presentation.
4. Updates – Senator Gabbard read an email that updated the board on the process the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) is in with a request for proposals (RFP) to do a study on the Pueo population on Oahu and Maui, since little is known about the population and habitat. The RFP fulfills mitigation obligations in several habitat conservation plans. Souza would like Senator Gabbard, Capelouto and a few others to get together and discuss steps going further to help bring the resolution to fruition.

Dudley arrives at 8:58 p.m.; Seven (7) board members present.

5. Resolution – Capelouto would amend the resolution to take out the part where it reads the State has failed to take pro-active measures, as well as the sentence mentioning the board would support legal remedies in its entirety.

Capelouto moved and Madix seconded to approve the Pueo Resolution as amended adding “need to take more pro-active measures” and taking out “support legal remedies”. The Board UNANIMOUSLY ADOPTED the resolution 7-0-0 (AYE: Capelouto, Dudley, Legal, Madix, Spreg, Souza, and Mutchek; NAY: None; ABSTAIN: NONE).

Dudley moved and Madix seconded to add an announcement by AECOM about a Wastewater Facilities Plan to the agenda. Without any objections the board added AECOM to the agenda 7-0-0. (AYE: Capelouto, Dudley, Legal, Madix, Spreg, Souza, and Mutchek; NAY: None; ABSTAIN: NONE).

AECOM Honouliuli/Waipahu/Pearl City Wastewater Facilities Plan – Rae Loui and Lambert Yamashita reported the following: Public Meeting – There will be a public meeting Tuesday, June 14, 2016 from 7:00 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. at Kapolei Middle School to discuss the Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS) covering the Wastewater Treatment Plan for Secondary Treatment and Support Facilities. An upgrade to full secondary treatment is required by consent decree (cd) between the city and county of Honolulu, State of Hawaii Department of Health (DOH), and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). Comments on the DEIS are due by Wednesday, June 22, 2016. Reports of DEIS were made available at the meeting.

COMMUNITY/BOARD – CONCERNS/ANNOUNCEMENTS

- Meetings – Dudley mentioned his and Chair Souza's attendance at the Pearl City Neighborhood Board No. 21 meeting the previous night. Tuesday, May 24, 2016. He also mentioned his attendance at the Waianae Neighborhood Board No. 24 meeting before joining his own board meeting tonight. He stated the board's transportation resolution is getting a lot of positive feedback and that boards are starting to work together towards a common goal.
- Town Hall – Capelouto announced that there will be a town hall meeting on Wednesday, June 1, 2016 from 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. at Kapolei Hale to discuss traffic and potential solutions to mitigate traffic issues.

- Father's Day – Chet Adessa from the State Commission on Fatherhood announced the 18th Annual Celebrate Father's Event which will be taking place Saturday, June 18, 2016 from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. at the Windward Mall Center Court.
- Partnership – Larry Veray, Chair from the Pearl City Neighborhood Board No. 21 mentioned he looks forward to partnerships with this board and others on resolving common issues they all may have.

APPROVAL OF THE APRIL 27, 2016 REGULAR MEETING MINUTES – The board approved the April 27, 2016 regular meeting minutes 6-1-0. (AYE: Capelouto, Dudley, Legal, Madix, Souza, and Mutchek; NAY: Spreg; ABSTAIN: NONE).

MONTHLY REPORTS

Mayor Kirk Caldwell's Representative: Clark Wright, Royal Hawaiian Bandmaster reported the following:

- Parks – Mayor Caldwell would like to encourage residents to call 911 to report any suspicious activities in community/neighborhood parks.
- Summer Fun – For registration information and a listing of Summer Fun program locations for walk-in registration, visit <http://www.honolulu.gov/parks/dprsummerfun.html> or call the park district offices during regular business hours.
- Resolution Response – The Caldwell administration appreciates the concerns of residents in Ewa and Central Oahu, however having a moratorium on construction would further delay projects that have been on the books for years and drive up the cost to build and purchase these homes.
- Awards Program – The Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR) is unable to support the resolution regarding an awards program in an effort to reduce property damage. HPD has an effective working relationship with CrimeStoppers Honolulu, Inc. in helping to reduce property damage. CrimeStoppers does not currently provide signage on city property.

Questions, comments, and concerns that followed:

1. Moratorium Request – Chair Souza and other members of the board would like to know why and where in the Department of Planning and Permitting (DPP) response they get the rail issue from? Where does it say #34 does not want these houses being built from their resolution submitted? The board would like a moratorium on permitting.
2. Sign Cost – Chair Souza would like to know what the cost would be to put signs up in all City and County of Honolulu restrooms versus putting cameras in the restrooms.

Councilmember Kimberly Pine – No representative was present; A report was provided. Presentation Request – Capelouto noted he had emailed the Councilmembers office in regards to a question about the Makakilo Drive Extension. He would like a presentation and an answer on the funding of \$1.5 million either being the same funds from last year or the second part of \$3 million allocated towards the project.

Governor David Ige's Representative – No representative was present; A report was provided.

Hawaii Community Development Authority (HCDA) – No representative was present; A report was not provided.

Honolulu Authority for Rapid Transit (HART) – Pat Lee reported the following:

- West O'ahu Stations – Lee reported general information on the rail project and noted the three (3) rail stations to be in West O'ahu; East Kapolei Station, University of Hawaii West O'ahu Station, and Ho'opili Station (and provided renderings of these stations).

Questions, comments, and concerns that followed: Ho'opili – Madix asked and Lee replied that the first 10 miles of the rail project are fully funded including the Ho'opili Station.

Mr. Pat Lee indicated that going underground with utilities would be expensive.

Mr. Pat Lee introduced Justin Baifield from NAN Incorporated. Chair Souza thanked NAN for donating one million dollars to Kapiolani Hospital. Natasha Jones from Kiewit was introduced. Kash Reid from HART staff was introduced. Chris Wong was introduced as a quality assurance and inspection team.

Treasurer's report. \$64.47 beginning balance, \$24.93 ending balance.

RESOLUTION SUPPORTING PROTECTION OF THE EWA AIRFIELD AS A NATIONAL HISTORIC MONUMENT AND NATIONAL BATTLEFIELD STATUS

WHEREAS, historic Marine Corps Air Station (MCAS) Ewa, one of the first airfields in Hawaii, was established in 1925; and

WHEREAS, the US Navy, which had owned the property, has transferred 499 acres of land, including parcels containing the former Marine Corps Air Station, to private developer Ford Island Properties LLC, a subsidiary of Texas-based Hunt Companies; and

WHEREAS, the transfer took place without the historic resource inventory analysis requested by the Historic Preservation Division of the Hawaii Department of Land and Natural Resources, a survey that would have cataloged the historically significant architectural, archaeological and cultural elements of the property; and

WHEREAS, this neighborhood board, is of the opinion, that Ford Island Properties, a subsidiary of Hunt Company have failed to acknowledge the historical significance of the area, by actively blocking its nomination to the historic register, and

WHEREAS, this neighborhood board, is of the opinion, that Hawaii Community Development Authority (HCDA) has failed to acknowledge the historical significance of the area, by complicit refusal to take pro-active measures to protect the area, and

WHEREAS, the terms for the lease between Ford Island Properties and the Navy have not been made public, to our community, which is not in keeping with the requirement for government transparency, in all of its actions, and

WHEREAS, MCAS Ewa was a designated mooring site for the US Navy's dirigible program of the 1930's; and

WHEREAS, MCAS Ewa was the first US facility attacked by naval air forces of the Empire of Japan on December 7th 1941; and

WHEREAS, four United States Marines (Sergeant William E. Lutschan, Sergeant Karolo Micheletta, Private First Class William George Turner and Private First Class Edward Steven Lawrence) gave their lives defending the air station; and

WHEREAS, two innocent civilian residents of the Ewa community, six-year-old Yaeko Lillian Oda and 34-year-old Francisco Tacderan, were also killed by the attacking Japanese naval air forces; and

WHEREAS, MCAS Ewa was the major United States Marine Corps aviation headquarters in the Pacific during World War II and a staging and transit point for all Marine aviation assets moving into the combat zones of the South Pacific; and was also the place to which all Marine aviation assets returned after hard combat against the air, naval, and ground forces of the Empire of Japan; and

WHEREAS, MCAS Ewa is the birthplace of Marine Fighter Squadron Two One Four, made famous as "The "Black Sheep," as well as other famous Marine aviation units, and

WHEREAS, MCAS Ewa Field is being considered by the President of the United States to establish the airfield at Ewa as an expansion of the Pearl Harbor National Monument; and

BE IT RESOLVED that MCAS Ewa Field either be designated by the President of the United States as an expansion of the Pearl Harbor National Monument; or be designated a National American Battlefield by the National Park Service; and that it be registered as a National Historic Landmark; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the aforementioned Historic Preservation Division be permitted to inventory MCAS Ewa Field's historic elements; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED Ford Island Properties LLC and the Hawaii Community Development Authority work together with the community on development plans for the area that would include the preservation of MCAS Ewa Field; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the members of the Hawaii Congressional Delegation actively support the preservation of historic MCAS Ewa Field and encourage all parties involved to actively cooperate in achieving that objective; and

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED that copies of this Resolution be forwarded to the President of the United States; all members of Hawaii's Congressional delegation; the Secretary of Defense; the Secretary of the Navy; the Commander, United States Pacific Fleet; the Commandant of the Marine Corps; the Commander, US Marine Corps Forces Pacific; the Director, National Park Service; the Governor of the State of Hawaii; all members of the Hawaii State Legislature; the State of Hawaii Department of Land and Natural Resources; the Mayor, members of the City Council, Managing Director, Director of Parks and Recreation and the Director of the Office of Economic Development (all of the City and County of Honolulu); Ford Island Properties LLC; to all Oahu Neighborhood Boards, Managing Editor of the Star Advertiser, Voice of Kapolei, and the KHON News Desk

**RESOLUTION SUPPORTING AND DEMANDING IMMEDIATE PROTECTION MEASURES FOR THE
ENDANGERED 'EWA PLAIN PUEO**

WHEREAS, the Hono'uli'uli 'Ewa Plain Pueo, disappearing sacred guardians of native lands on the 'Ewa Plain, is listed by the state of Hawaii as an endangered species on the island of Oahu; and

WHEREAS, the Pueo or Hawaiian Owl has a special place in Hawaii's mythology. They are considered the "bird of wisdom" known for offering guidance and protection, and have silently sailed over the Hawaiian Islands for well over one thousand years; and

WHEREAS, the Pueo is a subspecies of the short-eared owl, scientific name *Asio flammeus sandwichensis*, and is an endemic species, which evolved in the Hawaiian Islands, and

WHEREAS, there are Pueo Awards, Pueo Scholars, Pueo Programs, Pueo Pride, UH West Oahu Pueo mascot, and throughout Hawaii, streets, areas, and valleys bearing the Pueo owl's name, with many such places having an intriguing legend attached to them, and

WHEREAS, the guardian Pueo owl belongs to the spiritual and physical worlds, and it was believed that after the death of a person, his or her spirit could still protect and influence the remaining family while acting through the body of the Pueo owl; and

WHEREAS, The Pueo was revered by the ancient Hawaiians, and was an 'aumakua or ancestral guardian of many Hawaiian families, and an encounter with the Pueo is considered to be an omen, and

WHEREAS, pueo once flew in great numbers in the late 1800s on Oahu, but today are endangered, especially on the 'Ewa Plain; and

WHEREAS, Pueo truly fly without as much as a whisper of sound, the owl's lethal talons and beak are hidden in a cloak of soft, attractive thick feathers, and their eyes, big and round, seem human but deeply penetrating; and

WHEREAS, Pueo owls nests right on the ground, in grassy areas, laying three to six eggs over a few months as the eggs hatch at different times, and young may fledge from nest on foot before they are able to fly, and depend on their parents for approximately two months; and

WHEREAS, the young pueo nestlings are vulnerable to feral cats, dogs, rats and mongoose, and the State has listed the pueo as endangered on Oahu 'Ewa Plain, and the imperiled pueo therefore need an established habitat protection plan all for themselves; and

WHEREAS, Pueo can benefit from State and privately supported management activities designed to conserve other endangered birds, and also can benefit from game bird management so that higher densities of pueo occur on lands where game birds also are common; and

WHEREAS, this neighborhood board, is of the opinion, that HART, the State of Hawaii, and the State Legislature need to take more pro-active measures to protect the endangered Pueo on the 'Ewa plain, and that the community is seriously concerned by the lack of concern for this while construction is in progress; **now, therefore,**

BE IT RESOLVED that the Makakilo/Kapolei/Honokai Hale Neighborhood Board No. 34 strongly and urgently requests that the State of Hawaii, City and County of Honolulu, DR Horton, the Department of Hawaiian Homelands, UH West Oahu, and HART immediately take pro-active measures to protect the endangered 'Ewa Plain Pueo, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the board will do "everything within its power" to support this measure, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Resolution be transmitted to
